saw a system of flexible supports, along the lines of the GOP-passed law.
This GOP law authorizes supports ranging between 60 and 90 percent of parity for major crops and from zero to 90 percent for other products. Supports would be highest in times of shortages and lowest in times of surplus.

Mr. Truman said this law, which he signed, "represents an important step forward in recognizing the difficulties associated with over-rigid supports. But he said it needs revisions to make it even more flexible.
The President said flexible supports would be useful in helping—that is, away from crops in surplus shifts in crop production plus supply to those in short supply. Rigid or equal supports for all crops would hinder such shifts, he said.

As for the GOP law, the Chief Executive said its formula for determining actual supports do not allow the Agriculture Department enough discretion in meeting special commodity situations.
Mr. Truman said price supports alone are not enough to assure farm prosperity. He said there is need for programs to boost consumption by low income families. He mentioned an expanded school lunch program, and measures "wider in scope for assuring proper diets for all the people."

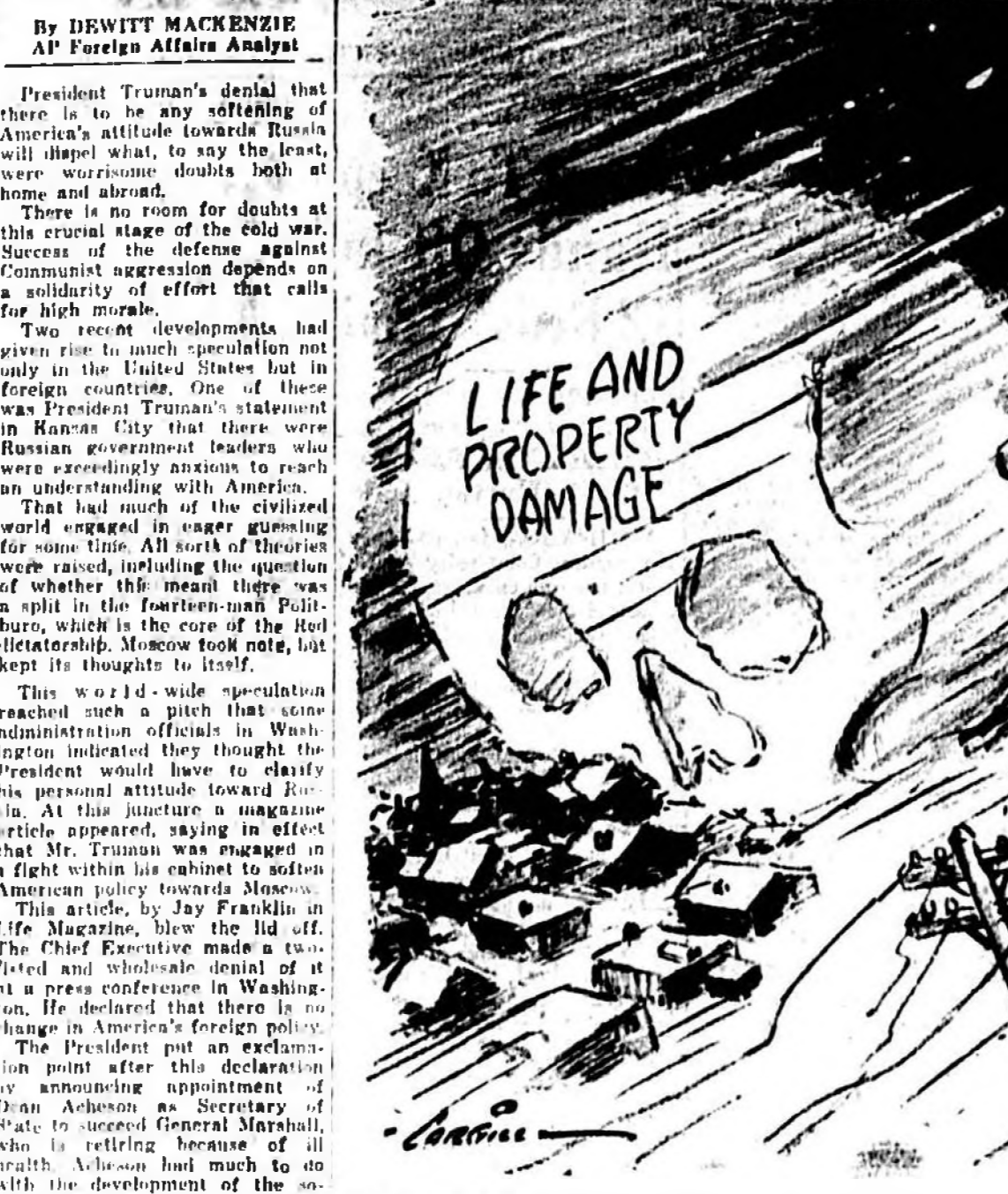

We have no idea of just how many miles of grass beds line the banks of this river, for in its rush to the ocean, it spreads itself in many points to form lakes with added coverts and points. Among these lakes are Harney, Monroe,

Assembly, Puzzle, Pointsett, Big and Little Lake George, Washington, Hill 'n' Blazes and countless more that offer the angler just about all the best possible in truly good fishing.

The ones who have fished the grand spots of this famous stream, are the anglers who have found black bass of a size not found in other states. Fishing camps and lodges will be found at strategic locations along the entire length of the beautiful river, and the angler can find among them, one to suit his fancy. The hundreds of tributary creeks and rivers joining with the big stream offer more miles of excellent fishing, and many large fish have been taken in the quiet of a semi-tropic setting. Natural beauty reigns supreme on the shores or banks, and lucky indeed is the one who can say he or she has covered the length of the grand river on a boat trip.

One of the more famous of the tributaries is the fast flowing Oklawaha, and in this river will be found truly grand angling. Silver Glen Springs, Black Creek, Jacksonville Creek, Duval Creek, and countless others are favorite areas for the sports fishermen and the strings of bream, perch, black bass and other specie of fresh water fish taken almost daily are the reward for time spent in the outdoors.

Each year anglers from every state and many from countries across the sea come here to partake of the sporty fishing found in the dark waters.

The St. Johns river offers more in fishing than the bass, bream and perch for between Jacksonville and the ocean are found the great tarpon, sea trout, channel bass, croville, mullet and many specie of salt water fish that furnish thrills to all who try for the gamesters of salt water. During the past few years, a new thrill in fishing has been given sportsmen much to talk about, for it was discovered the hard fighting shad would readily take certain trolled lures. When these silvery fish take a liking to a lure and are hooked, the fireworks start immediately, for like the tarpon, the shad is an aerial acrobat."

Tientsin Is Captured By China's Reds

Official Nanking Sources Concede That City Has Been Taken By Commies

NANKING, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Official sources today indicated the Reds either have occupied the great northern industrial city of Tientsin or that terms have been agreed on for its surrender.

These sources conceded that "Tientsin is gone." They declined, however, to furnish details.

The northern city has been under heavy attack for several days. Last previous reports here said Red troops were fighting in Tientsin's suburbs.

On the central front, Communist troops were reported systematically mopping up the trapped government armies on the northern approaches to Nanking. Government airmen called it "the heaviest fighting we have seen at any time at any time in China."

With the military picture darkening, government officials stepped up their flight from Nanking. Technically all ministries are still in Nanking. That's because the great vaults with which all official papers must be stamped are still here. But actually, few government functions continue, except the most urgent.

One official estimated more than half of the National government's personnel has disappeared from Nanking. The ministry of health will move en masse tomorrow to Canton in Southern China.

Canton reformosa (Taiwan) are favorite refuge of government officials. As many as 20,000 Chinese a week are reported arriving on Formosa. The island's Chinese population of 4,000,000 is expected to increase to 6,000,000 by 1950. Equipment and key personnel of government-owned factories have been loaded aboard a steamship for transfer to Formosa.

Asked what the wholesale flight of Chinese officials from the capital, one official still here explained: "For awhile strict orders were issued to keep all officials at their posts here. Now most ministries are anxious for their departure to help the government of the necessity of supporting them."

Hundreds of top level government officials are leaving the lower echelons to decide for themselves what to do. One ministry (continued on page 2)

333 Cities Increase Tax Rates In 1948

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—(AP)—A six per cent increase in tax rates on 333 American cities in 1948 over 1947 was reported yesterday. A survey also showed that there was a six per cent rise in the per capita assessed valuations in these cities, which have populations of more than 30,000.

The per capita increase was 15.7 per cent in 1947.

The study, published in the January issue of the National Municipal Review, said: "The rate increases are not unexpected. The pattern is familiar and manifests the relentless demand of local government for more money with which to operate."

The survey said the highest "adjusted" tax rate for cities over 30,000 population was 97.97 in Bayonne, N. J.

Cities of 250,000 in Boston and 248,700 in Jersey City, N. J., were listed as having the highest rates among the largest cities with 150,000 or more population.

Among cities of over 100,000 population, the lowest rate was 58.80 in Dayton, Ohio.

PLU IN FRANCE

PARIS, Jan. 11.—(AP)—An epidemic of influenza is spreading through France and threatening other countries in Western Europe.

Unlike the "Spanish Flu" in 1918, when the death toll ran into the thousands, the present epidemic has so far claimed only about two deaths per 1,000 cases, a government medical source said. The current epidemic is being referred to as "Italian Flu." It struck first in Italy and spread into France.

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 11.—(AP)—A St. Joe Paper Company attorney charged in federal court today that the Atlantic Coast Line had discriminated against it last summer by denying it flat car load pulpwood loadings at Thomasville, Ga.

The charge was made by Guy Patterson during the second day of court sessions for proponents and opponents of an ICC reorganization plan turning over the bankrupt Florida East Coast to the ACL.

The flat car situation was resolved when the ICC asked the Coast Line by what authority it relied upon "to support the objectionable practice" and what steps would be taken to satisfy complaints.

Patterson introduced various ACL station bulletin board notices and copies of letters of complaint to support his contention that the ACL, in hearings before the ICC, had said there would be no discrimination against St. Joe in the handling of freight over its line.

Federal Judge Samuel H. Sibley, admitting the evidence, commented "It looks a little bad on the part of it."
