Children were termed the "greatest asset" in this time of stress and confusion in an address by Barry Crim of Deland, chairman of the St. John's District Scouts of America, at the recent annual Blue and Gold Banquet of Lake Mary Cub Pack 442.

Crim was introduced by Tom Albert, district scout executive who previously spoke on scouting's recent 50th anniversary celebration, noting that on Jan. 17, this year, the sixth millionth Scout was registered, and that at this time of celebrations, the six million boys and girls are the five members of their families, made a total of some 30 million people attending annual dinners.

Crim, in his talk, continued this thought by pointing out that family participation is one of the greatest assets of the Scout program in the United States.

"Nothing is so interesting as trying to understand the problems we know and one of the biggest problems is communication. If we can't communicate with our youngsters, we cannot participate with them toward love of God, country and community."

"The greatest factor of Boy Scouts is that the program teaches communication between families and the boys. The number one desire of parents is the hope that their children will move toward constructive success in life... not just success which can destroy ideals in the push toward that goal."

Russians Harassing U.S. Ships—Report

WASHINGTON (AP) - Soviet ships have reportedly harassed U.S. Navy vessels about a dozen times in the waters off Korea since the Communists' recent seizure of the intelligence ship Puchin.

Most of the harassments have gone unreported, officials said, apparently to avoid aggravating American tensions over the situation growing out of the seizure of the Puchin and its crew.

The one unreported incident involved a collision, described as minor, between the U.S. destroyer Hanan and a Soviet merchant ship the Kapitun Vi in the waters off Korea on Jan. 21. The U.S. claimed the Hanan had the right of way.

Both countries have scaled down their naval forces in the waters off Korea recently. At one point, the Soviets had some 14 warships, including two cruisers, operating in the same general area where the U.S. fleet had been built up.

This Soviet naval presence has now been reduced to about five or six destroyers and a few intelligence vessels. The rest reportedly have moved back toward Vladivostok, the main Soviet naval base in the Far East.

American War Casualties Mount

SAIGON (AP) - The U.S. Command reported today that enemy military losses through February 21, 1966, exceeded 23,000 and 20,000 deaths, the highest toll of the Vietnam war with 470 men killed and 1,832 wounded. The U.S. casualties exceeded those of the South Vietnamese forces which reported 434 government troops killed, 1,332 wounded and 135 missing or captured.

Both tolls were for the week ending last Saturday. Many of the casualties occurred in the heavy fighting in Hue, last city to be well contested, but now in allied hands.

As against this total, allied forces reported killing 5,769 Communist soldiers last week. The U.S. toll of 49 dead last week exceeded in the previous week when 543 American servicemen were killed at the February fighting to set a new high for the war.

Last week's total of 2,075 American wounded was the highest since the war's first week, the first week in February when 2,707 U.S. troops sustained wounds.

The U.S. Command also reported that 1,330 men required hospitalization or about half the total. The rest were treated without being hospitalized and returned to duty.

There was no report of any U.S. soldiers missing in last week's tabulation, nor of any other allied troops missing or mistaking or captured.

Schools Disputes Spread Over U.S.

In several areas of the nation to dispute affecting thousands of public school pupils continued. In Pittsburgh, Pa., a teachers union set up picket lines outside the public schools before classes began today, despite a court order barring a strike.

In Oklahoma, the state's 27,000 public school teachers called for a one-day protest without next week. And while Albuquerque, N.M., teachers voted to return to the classroom today after a week-long walkout, the 1,500-member San Francisco Federation of Teachers, A.F.L.-C.I.O., announced that it would support a strike, but that it would not support a strike.

Meanwhile heavy snows blanketed parts of the southeast for the second time in a week. Cold-wave warnings were in effect for an eight-state area from the Central Plains to the western Great Lakes region.

The loosely organized pattern of snow associated with the advancing cold was scattered as far west as Kansas and northward through the Appalachians.

The plane, which will be designed to carry 250 troops and their equipment, is comparable to the size of a ship.

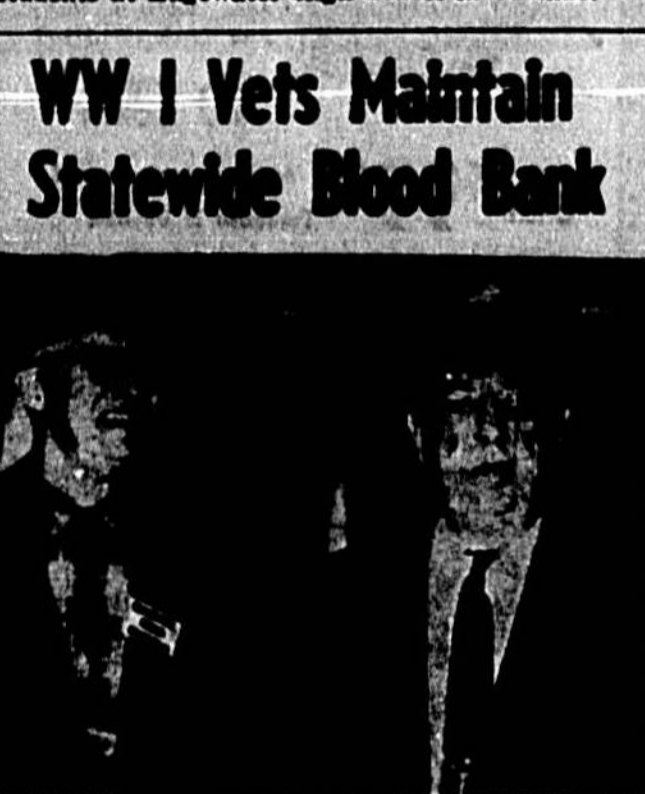
Top officials of the United States and other countries are expected to attend the unveiling of the plane — which is several years away from development — would carry up to 700 passengers and include several decks.

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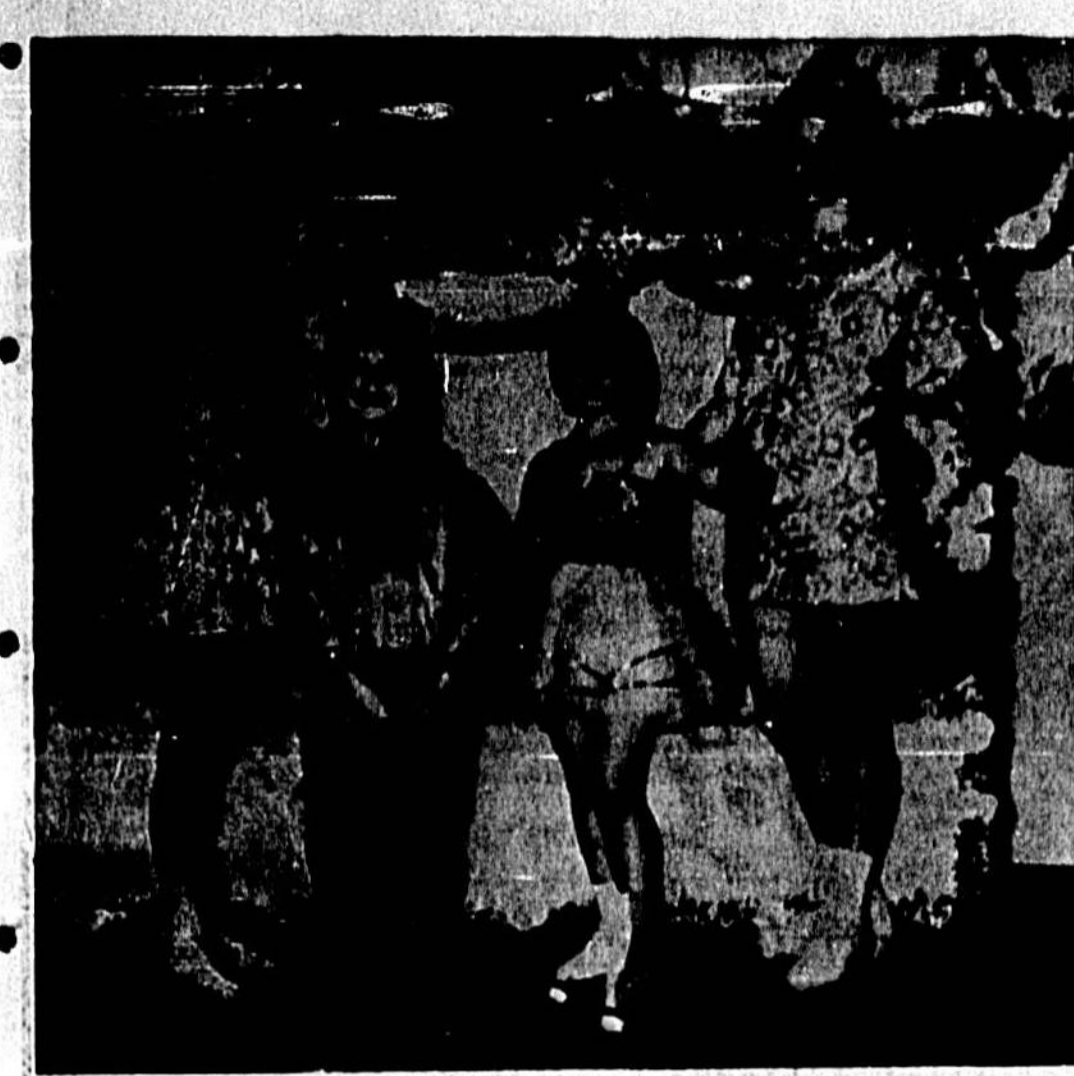

Marine Chopper Downed; 19 Die

BAIQUON (AP) — Guided by the Song Ho airfield 100 miles north of Saigon, the U.S. Marine Corps helicopter was hit by a rocket type rocket as it approached the runway to land. The plane made a crash landing and burned but no casualties were reported.

The two helicopters were able to land safely after being hit.

The North Vietnamese news agency said U.S. planes rained Hanoi and its suburbs and one American jet was shot down. The Soviet news agency reported that residential quarters in the center of Hanoi were hit.

The radar-guided American warplanes attacked three vital targets around Hanoi and Hai Phong on Wednesday, including an army barracks hit for the first time in the war. But the U.S. Command announced Communist gunners shot down a big four-engine C130 transport plane and three helicopters over South Vietnam, and an F105 Thunderchief fighter-bomber over the North.

One of the helicopters was a big U.S. Marine CH-53 Sea Knight that was downed 11 miles northwest of the Marine fortress at Khe Sanh, in the northwest corner of South Vietnam. All 19 servicemen aboard the Sea Knight were killed, the U.S. Command said.

The latest North Vietnamese report to come off the Peninsula's restricted list was the Chuc Son army barracks 12 miles southwest of Hanoi. Air Force F4 Phantom jets and helicopters during 20 missions flown Wednesday, but overcast skies prevented the northeast monsoon prevented assessment of damage.

Navy A6 all-weather Intruders made the third attack in four days on the railroad yard 1.7 miles northwest of the center of Hai Phong as well as a repeat raid on a radio communications receiver station 10 miles south of Hanoi. Again weather prevented a survey of the damage.

The Hai Phong railroad yard is on the main Hai Phong-Hanoi line, and much of the war supplies from Red China and other Communist countries funnel through it.

The Hanoi communications station is believed to be a key link in North Vietnam's air defense network and was attacked for the first time in the war on Feb. 10.

The big Sea Knight helicopter in which 19 Americans were killed was on a combat mission when it was hit shortly after noon Wednesday by heavy automatic weapons fire. The chopper crashed and exploded between Khe Sanh and Camp Carroll, the U.S. artillery post 16 miles northwest of the big Marine fortress.

Escalation Of Military May Mean Tax Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Any Military spending in the current fiscal year was pegged last week at \$72.7 billion, including \$24.5 billion for Vietnam but this is based on a shuffling of funds in the Pentagon and cutbacks in nonwar defense programs.

The budget for the next fiscal year beginning July 1 pegged military spending at \$75.6 billion including \$25 billion for Vietnam.

Any escalation, especially if it draws on reserve forces and increases draft calls, could also be felt in increased inflationary pressure, a factor the administration undoubtedly would cite in seeking higher taxes.

When the major escalation of the war began in 1965 the unemployment rate was about 4.5 per cent but that rate now is at 3.5 per cent. Withdrawals from the labor force could create shortages and drive up labor prices.

The Commerce Department reported only Wednesday the broadest increase in wholesale prices in manufacturing since the Korean War, indicating inflationary pressures are widespread.

There was no official indication, however, of what course the administration would take in the present economic situation, one per cent of the surge means about \$1 billion in additional revenue.

The last time troop strength was escalated, Johnson coupled his announcement with a formal request to Congress for the 10 per cent surge.

That was last Aug. 3, when Johnson authorized an increase of at least 45,000 men in Vietnam by the end of the current fiscal year, raising total strength to 525,000 men.

The men are being sent but taxes have not yet been raised.

The budget sent to Congress last month for the next fiscal year envisions a leveling off of both men and money for Vietnam. Any new escalation could break that budget before it even goes into effect.

Rocky's Surge Grows As Romney Quits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican governors might be able to mount a formidable bloc of more than 400 presidential nominating votes for Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York if they decide to unite behind him.

Michigan Gov. George Romney's abrupt withdrawal from the race Wednesday left the party's moderates in a quandary. The immediate reaction was that they would push the publicly reluctant Rockefeller into the contest.

In his parting advice to his moderate colleagues, who number about 18 of the 38 Republican state executives, Romney called on them to get together quickly behind a standard-bearer who would offer some alternatives to President Johnson's policies—Vietnam included.

If the governors actually do achieve a unity they have not displayed before, they could smother a strident chunk of convention votes—mostly from the large industrial states—that might keep former Vice President Richard M. Nixon from repeating a handsome victory at the Miami Beach, Fla., convention in August.

Romney's decision to pull out seems likely to blunt the effect of what Nixon was counting on as a smattering series of victories in the presidential primaries to establish a new image as a winner.
