according to reports, which have not been denied by Governor Sholtz.

Those close to him, claim that the Governor is seriously considering accepting the secretaryship, which would place him more in the national eye, and would probably prove a better stepping stone to the United States Senate—an honor really coveted by Mr. Sholtz.

There is much discussion as to who would succeed Governor Sholtz in the event he should resign. Should he resign the office now, then his successor would have to be elected in the November election. The procedure being, according to party leaders, that Chairman J. B. Hodges, State Democratic Committee to "nominate the party standard bearer." The man so named would become the Democratic party candidate just as if he had been nominated in the primary election.

In this extremity, it is believed that Claude Pepper, recent candidate for the Senate against Senator Park Trammell, would be "nominated." The opponents of Pepper are apprehensive of this, and may be counted upon to bring pressure on Sholtz to "hold on" until after the November election.

Should Governor Sholtz remain "on the job" until after the November election, and then resign, his successor, under the Florida Constitution, would be the president of the Senate, Hon. T. G. Futch, of Lake county.

Now here comes another political angle: Senator Futch is said to have powerful political influences not approving his possible promotion, and these opponents

**Level Headedness Prime Requisite Of World, Says Stimson**

LONDON, Sept. 24. —(AP)—Henry L. Stimson yesterday emerged from his summer retreat in Scotland's far north to counsel that "most political sides at home should keep their heads."

The secretary of state in the Hoover administration told The Associated Press in an interview that "calm thinking, not wild conflict, is needed to face what may prove to be our greatest crisis."

"And that applies," he added, "in a general sense to the world at large."

Bronzed, and apparently in the best of health as the result of the energetic days he has put in hunting and fishing, Stimson leaned back in his chair and pointed to the "economic revolution in the last century" as "the real cause of economic conditions today."

"It's ridiculous," he declared, "to say that this or that man, person, group or even nation caused conditions existing in the world."

"We are just seeing the fruits of an economic revolution and we need calm consideration, not bitter contention, to bring about better days."
