





Cape Kennedy's Top Role In Space

it seemed as though nature and man had finally made a rendez-vous which could never be surpassed as Apollo 16 blasted into space with the moon as its destination.

For this was a techically superb demonstration of the ability of man to perform one of the scientific marvels of our age with a certainty that only experience can bestow.

But it was the spectacular beauties of sky, clouds and the whole stage of Cape Kennedy which put the icing on this cake. Indeed, it seemed sort of icy, when a half-ton of ice from the giant Saturn's super cold fuel tanks hit the

It was super, indeed, when the VIP roster was finally determined. But the hosts, of men, women and children who turned the launch area - land and water-into a place of picnic and holiday-were more symbolic of what Cape Kennedy now means to the American public. This is also a moment when the successes of

the past should be put into perspective as the true portent of what the future for this space complex now holds for mankind in general Florida as a whole, and especially for Brevard county which has suffered grievously, are noted. For Cape Kennedy, a billion-dollar space pad-is to be the nation's major shuttle port to an

orbiting station far out in space. The station, for its part, is to be a terminal for extensive exploration of available planets Of course the impact of the space shuttle

operation is in the future. But it is as certain as anything can be in this time when crisis of major proportions seems to be the normal and changes far beyond any logical determination are the rule and not the exception

We believe that it is of the greatest importance that space be given the prime rating which it deserves as the one great place for exploration in which the most critical of national ambitions could clash.

Yet there are some pretty solid signs that in space the two nations which have made space a matter of national pride and achievement-the



Start Of A Revolution

A British Soldier Fired: War Began

"Don't make so much noise," the guard told Paul Revere when he came galloping into Lexington that memorable

two important gentlemen asleep in the house he was guar-ding-John Hancock and Samuel Adams. "Noise?" Paul shouted back. "You'll have enough noise before long-the regulars are coming!"

The fellow was afraid the disturbance would awaken the

Revere was right. Within a few hours occurred the shot that was heard 'round the world, the first shot fired at a British soldier and the one which truly started the American The date was April 19, 1775-Patriots' Day.

The British in Boston, hearing the Massachusetts patriots were collecting powder and military stores at Concord, 20 miles away, had sent a 25,000-strong detachment there. The soldiers were instructed to go by way of Lexington, and arrest the rebels, Adams and Hancock, before going on to Concord to seize the militia's supplies.

They arrived at Lexington's village green just before daybreak following a night's march. But the alarm had been made out a grim band of about 50 Minute-men-armed Colonists-lined up across the common waiting for them. "Disperse, ye rebeis!" ordered Maj. John Pitcairn, the

No one moved. So Pitcairn gave the order to fire. A volley blazed out-and eight Americans feel dead. The redcoats pushed on to Concord to destroy such military stores as they could find. At Concord Bridge they found more armed patriots lined up to bar their way.

Shot were fired by both sides. It was the opening battle of the Revolution-where the first British blood was shed and the first British ware war graves dug. The redcoats drew back from the bridge, leaving the Americans in possession of it, and began their return march to Boston. By now, however, the whole countryside had been aroused. All along the road, from behind stone walls, hillocks and houses the enraged patriots fired on the British soldiers. Their march turned into a fast retreat.

The weary column, or what remained of it, finally stumbled into Boston, having suffered losses nearly three times those sustained by the Colonists. Nearly 300 redcoats lay dead or dying on the road. The news of Lexington and Concord, spreading quickly across the 13 Colonies, was all that was needed to fuse them

into one defensive whole. Now it was war - real war - and

the spirit of patriotism burned fiercer than ever as Colonists from Maine to Georgia rallied to fight in a common cause. In England, a group of friends sympathetic to the American cause made up a purse of \$500. It was sent to Benjamin Franklin to be distributed among the wounded patriots, and the wives and mothers of those who were killed



"On the contrary, they are most likely: they're trying to tell people, 'Listen. I'm really in trouble.' They should be taken seriously."

Wylie explains that traditionally religious and moral taboos have prevented even recognition, let alone intervention and treatment, of suicide and potential suicide. "School" is back in session after a brief recess for the bass on the various striking grounds on the river east of Sanford and many good strings of these school size fish have been taken in the past few days. D. A. Jenkins was one of the locky anglers who was in the right place at the right time last Wednesday. When the action ended, Jenkins counted nine on his stringer. Needless to say, the next day found the same fisherman in the same place, this time accompanied by Professor Refoe. The unpredictable bass did not oblige as well as the first trip, but several ended up on the stringer.

Pat Brooks, Lemon Bluff Fish Camp, reports that bass are schooling early mornings in that area. One catch of 15 was mentioned with the top one about seven pounds. "Bream fishing is excellent" said Pat, "with a few specks being taken

Shirley King of Marina Isle Camp on East SR 46 had similar news. Bream and catfish biting real well, specks fair for those hunting them and bass plentiful. Crickets are still the best bet for bream, with worms taking their share also. Osteen Bridge Camp, Paul Johnson, owner, had news of some bass striking in the cut toward Lake Monroe, with plenty of speckled perch hitting in shallow water. Johnson

said that bream fishermen had it good early in the week with a slow tapering off over this weekend. The Wekiva River furnished a couple of TALL TALES this week. The first one was supplied by George Cheney of the Wekiya River Haven Camp, It seems that last Tuesday, Billy Sanders of Plymouth and his father-in-law, Adney Reed, of Houston, Texas and formerly of this area, left the camp with one object in mind-a mess of Wekiva River catfish! They succeeded to the tune of 26, weighing a total of 21 pounds. Adney however, added to the poundage with a monster which made the rest of the string look like midgets. A 30 pounder took the bait and after a long and sometimes heated

argument, Adney finally subdued his prize of eight pound test line. THESE TEXANS! The same due took to the river again the following day in search of the mate to the big one. They didn't find him but managed to land 24 of average size. Wonder what the folks back in Houston will think of our Sanford fishing? The other TALL TALE involves Dottie Hill, who is

rapidly becoming known in these parts as MISS CAMP SEMINOLE. Dottie fishes by herself from a tiny boat which carries the imposing name, "Dottie's Dingy." She and her little boat are a common sight on the Wekiva and so many big bass have fallen to her that other fishermen follow her trying to land some of the lunkers which are common place to this lady angler. She came in Saturday with a string of seven topped by a four pounder and a story of a big one that got away. Sunday morning, two bosy from the camp, noticed something struggling in the grass and rowed over to investigate. They discovered the commotion was coming from a large bass thrashing around, apparently hurt in some way. The scooped him up in their hands and found that he was choking on a large shiner and hook with a short piece of line still dangling out of his mouth. Dottie Hill swears that the line matches hers and the fish is the "one that got away"

Ottis Faulk, manager of Camp Seminole, noted also that several couples camping in the park landed panfish, mostly redbreast bream, every day this past week. Lake Jessup is in the news again with some outstanding

hauls of specks, bluegills and shellcrackers. Lowell Hiley, who runs Hiley's Camp on the south side of the lake, reported a catch of 60 specks for Bill Winderweedle, Mr. Koenig and Mr. Graves on Friday, fishing only three hours. Conrad Owensby, a Tennessee visitor, fished for two days out of Hijey's camp and had a combined catch of some 50 bluegills, shellcrackers and catfish. Hiley stated that he could hardly lift the string. Roger Coad, with his partner Leonard Chancery, landed 24 big bream in a short two hour trip, while Joe Berry and Paul Cherry had a string of 20 and ran out of

Salt Water Fishing

Sun-Glow Pier on the beach at Port Orange had word of large catches of sheepshead, as many as 25 to the person, nearly every day last week. Jean Opel, pier manager, also reported a cobia of almost 10 pounds landed Thursday and a few Spanish mackerel beginning to show up. At the Ormand Beach Pier, George Karch, employe, said a

few flounder, lots of spots, whiting and trout made up the menu, with bluefish being on the scarce side. Merle Keiler at the Main Street Pier in Daytona Beach

reported that the phenomenal run of Weekfish is still continuing there. "Cut mullet on the bottom, live shrimp fished with a float or casting with Seahawk plugs, it doesn't make any difference," said Keller. "Anything you throw at them, those weekfish will grab it." A few drum and whiting, along with some sheepshead are hitting also according to Keller. Deep sea parties on the charter boats out of Inlet Harbor

are getting their kicks with king meckerel. The bottom fishing craft are finding red snapper in fair numbers for their passengers with 35 to 40 being the average haul per day, along with the ever present black sea bass and a few grouper. The "Snow-White 2," Capt. Al Kline, was top boat of the week with a catch of over 100 red snapper up to seven pounds on a Tuesday trip. The County Reef, just four miles offshore, has afforded some fine sport for the small boat anglers for several days. Weekfish, blues and angelfish have been thick but are tapering off with the rise of water temperatures. A half day charter trip by the "Miss Behavin" Monday accounted for 105 angelfish. On Wednesday Capt. Don Welch of the "Blackduck" steered his party to 45 kings, a 17 pound dolphin, then switched to bottom fix hing and landed a fish box full of black sea bass, snapper and one grouper. On Thursday and Friday the same boat had 50 and 55 kings. A Wednesday trolling trip by the "Miss Behavin" accounted for 61 kings and a party of only 2 nursed some sore muscles on Thursday as they pulled in 75 kingfish aboard the same boat. Other boats in the charter fleet, the "Deep South," the "Dandy I," and the "Angler" produced catches of 60 to 75 each day with the "Angler" coming out as top boat for the week on kings

with a terrific haul of 90 on Sunday.

A party of Sanfordites, employes of Jack Prosser Ford Company, chartered the "Dandy L" for a weekend trolling trip. The party, composed of John Bruce, Gene Miller, Guy Thornton, Gene Michaels, Bill McClure and Bob Davidson







Old Tie Is Pattern

By POLLY CRAMER

ties I use a regular tie of the proper size as a pattern to follow for the width and length. I start at the wide end with a row of single crochet and add or decrease stitches as needed to follow the size of the pattern tie. This can be made all in one color or in stripes and I use 2- or 3-ply Orlon or wool for the work. When finished, I single crochet all around the tie for a nice neat finish. The weight yarn or thread used varies according to how heavy you wish the tie to be.-IDA

"Whether the grand jury will be called to investigate charges made by Thomas Todd, in a letter to the Supreme Court, will depend on what our investigation shows," Eaton added. Meantime, Sheriff John Polk today advised The Herald he would welcome an investigation

by the grand jury. Todd, arrested on a rape charge, later dropped by the state, wrote to the Supreme Court, telling of his alleged mistreatment while incarcerated in the county jail's solitary con-

A copy of the letter was forwarded to Circuit Court Judge Dominick Salfi by the Court. Salfi Tuesday discussed the letter's contents with Todd, who is serving a sentence for aggravated

Todd wrote there are no sanitary facilities in the cell and he was required to remain naked for several days. He was placed in the solitary cell after alleged misconduct with another prisoner. When pressed for a specific charge of alleged brutality, Todd told Judge Salfi, "Well,
