#### Warner 'Midsummer Night's Dream' Full Of Humorous Moods

Shakespeare's greatest comedy, "Midsummer Night's Dream," is being shown in a new production by Warner Bros. The film is a masterpiece of comedy, featuring such great comedians as Joe E. ### Sleep Inducing Machine Shows At Northwest

#### Gadgets Drive May Produce Slumber For The Wakeful

EVANSTON, Ill., Feb. 25.—(AP)—Science has pulled a new one out of the bag—a sleep-inducing machine. It has pulled a new one out of the bag—a sleep-inducing machine. It may even be used to put most of the nation to sleep at a given hour every night, suggests John J. Morgan, the Northwestern psychology professor, who invented it.

Instead of coming back sleep or reading till you get drowsy you would simply turn on the radio—and let science do the rest.

The machine, which Morgan says he has used successfully on individuals and groups in his psychology classes, is no larger than a small radio set. It contains an electric motor-driven mechanism causing a diaphragm to vibrate 10 times a minute with a tone two octaves below middle "C."

The "r-u-u-m, r-u-u-m, r-u-u-m" of the machine, like the drone of an airplane motor in full flight, induces relaxation, weariness and then sleep, says Morgan, in all extreme cases. Only a small number of persons find the tone irritating, he says.

The time required to produce sleep varies with the person, his immediate mental and physical alertness and his environment but the professor says he has found that usually one becomes passive and drowsy in a few minutes.

The tone frequently can be regulated by the professor says that 20 times a minute is most effective. The listener is inclined to co-ordinate his breathing with the 20 time rate which, like his breathing when asleep, is slower than the cadence with which he usually breathes.

Morgan suggests it might be possible to put the nation to sleep each night if radio broadcasting stations would send out a series of notes similar in tone and cadence to that produced by his machine. The tones would be broadcast at an hour most persons go to bed—if that could be determined.

He says that households wishing to tune in could do so without worrying about turning off their radio sets if they had an automatic attachment which would take care of that.

The few persons who find the tone irritating could avoid it by not tuning in on the particular stations broadcasting it.

Morgan sees the possibility that many persons might be caught almost anywhere except in bed at the "bed time hour." Anyone who is bored or capable of being thrown into a passive state of mind might be induced to sleep whether he be visiting, reading, eating or driving an automobile.

"It might even be helpful in putting a restless child to sleep," the professor says. "Repetition of the tone could easily catch the child's attention, dull it into passivity and put it to sleep."

### Spanish Government Troops Enjoy Good Health, Get Sufficient Food

GENEVA, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Spaniards, at least in government territory, are enjoying good health despite the famine and are getting enough to eat.

That is the picture of life under the terror painted by a League of Nations medical commission back from a first-hand survey on the civil front.

In a two-week tour of loyal territory, the commission, headed by Dr. A. Lauer, a member of the French Academy of Medicine, visited Alcaniz, Valencia, Madrid, Alcanar, Albarracín and Barcelona.

"Business as usual" is a fair summation of its findings. Public health control is functioning smoothly and efficiently, medical personnel is available in large numbers, their professional standards are good and their devotion to their work is untiring.

Although none of the usual causes of epidemic has been lacking, the league experts found that there has been no epidemic of any sort since the outbreak of hostilities.

The population is in good health, the commission reports, and despite the absence of meat, is adequately nourished. Its morale remains excellent, and it has a desire to leave.

Special arrangements have been made, however, for women and children, including provision for maintaining 50,000 stranded youngsters in France and 3,000 in Belgium.

"Food is... very cheap... and the refugees' three meals never cost more than 1 peseta 50 (about 15 cents)," says the report. "Warm clothing for children is obtained by gifts."

### Wandering Vessel, Hungarian Craft, Never Goes Home

LONDON, Feb. 25.—(AP)—A Hungarian ship never has been to its home port and never can go. It is the cargo steamer Colossus—too big to go into its own harbor.

Captain Tokai, of Budapest, the motor, explained the situation on a voyage here.

The Colossus, 7,000 tons, was built in 1915 in Sunderland by a British firm. She was registered in Budapest, but can certainly never go there since she draws 23 feet of water and there is only six feet in the Danube at Budapest.

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 25.—(AP)—An old rift in the athletic department at the University of Pittsburgh spread over wider yesterday with reports that Dr. John Bain Sutherland, football coach, will resign because of differences with W. Don Harrison, athletic director.

The latest—and maybe last disagreement—was generally agreed to have been based on these three points:

1.—That Sutherland wanted the Pitt players to receive some funds for a celebration after they trounced Washington in the Rose Bowl game last New Year's Day, but Harrison disagreed.

2.—That they argued about the celebration, and Harrison, in anger, declared to Sutherland: "I made you and now I'm going to break you."

3.—That recent changes in the coaching staff at Pitt were without Sutherland's approval, and came after Harrison disappeared increases in salary for the silent Scot's assistants.

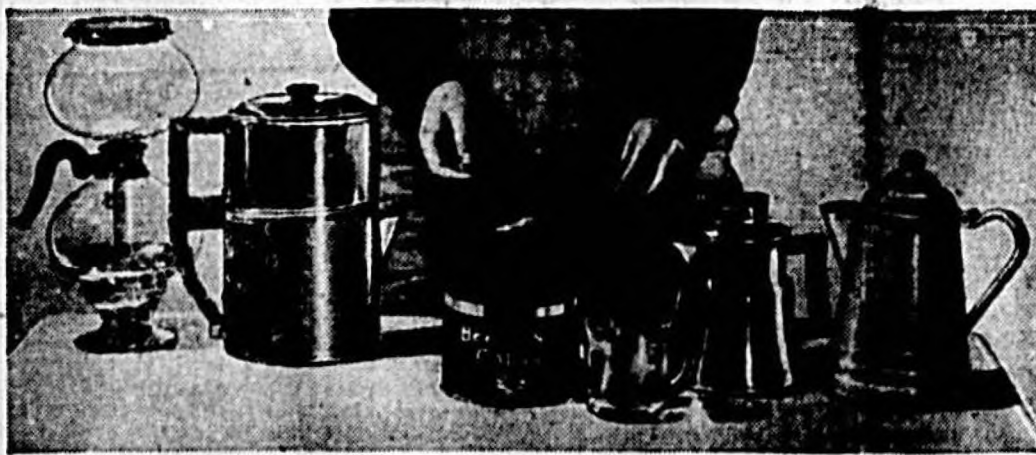

### Jews in Poland Call New Plan Step To Ghetto

#### Cultural And Trade Boycott Seen As Re- sult Of Nationalism

WARSAW, Feb. 23. — (AP) — Sharp differences developed Monday night over the plan for increasing Polish nationalism outlined Sunday by Colonel Adam Koc in a nation-wide broadcast. His adherents had opponents aligning themselves at opposite extremes.

An organized group of opponents declared through its newspaper that Colonel Koc offered nothing new and that his statement was too ambiguous and general. The paper was confiscated. The National Democratic newspaper, "Dziennik Narodowy," also censured the proposals, objecting to their stand on anti-Semitism, i. e.: "We cannot permit anti-Semitic acts of violence . . . but one must understand our instinct for self-defense and the struggle of the Polish people for economic independence."

Jews, who, sources close to Colonel Koc made clear Monday, "are not wanted in Poland," were among the critics. The few Jewish papers published in Poland resented their disapproval, pointing out that while Colonel Koc's speech was indefinite and veiled regarding the Jewish question, it was clear that an economic boycott against Jews would be followed, although violence would be discouraged.

A number of prominent Jews in Warsaw privately said they regarded the outlook as black, and

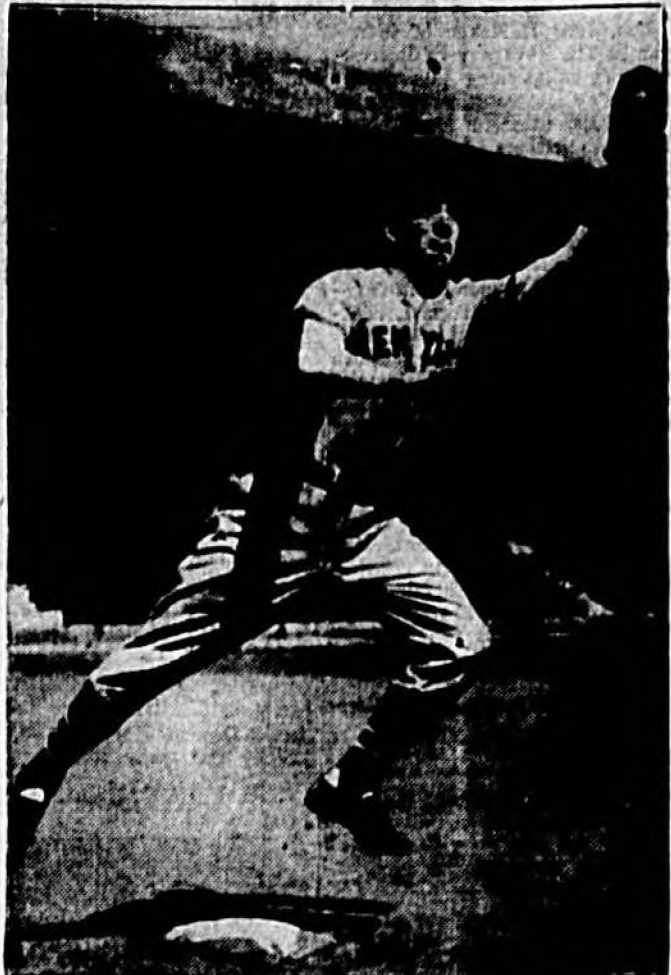

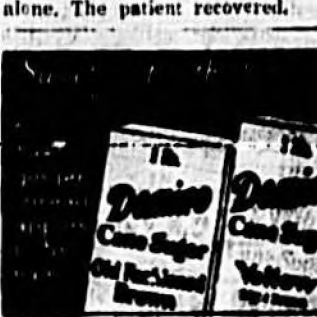

# California Relies On Sun To Heat Water For Homes

## Solar Rays Provide Sufficient Warmth To Insure Tepid Water Nine Months In Year

DAVIS, Calif., Feb. 24.—Free sunshine is heating water for thousands of California homes. Skeptics to the contrary, the system works at night as well as in the daytime.

Those who depend on sunshine exclusively for heating water get along comfortably as long as nine months a year without spending a cent, although a succession of cool, cloudy days occasionally may cause postponement of wash day or of one's hot bath.

Many householders, who want a scorching stream from the faucet at all times, have gas or electric heaters or furnace coils working in conjunction with sunshine. On sunny days the sun does the work, and on cloudy ones artificial heat takes its place.

An exhaustive study of solar heating systems has been made by F. A. Brooks, associate agricultural engineer at the University of California experiment station here.

Tracing the solar heater back to the days when a farmer merely lashed an iron tank on his roof, Professor Brooks has analyzed various methods of getting the most heat out of the sun's rays.

As the most practical heater, he selects a zigzag arrangement of iron pipe enclosed in a flat, insulated box with a glass cover and placed on a slanting roof. This is called an "absorber."

By a process known as thermosiphoning, the heated water flows from the exposed pipes to a storage tank which ordinarily is placed in the attic. Cold water replaces it, and in turn heated and stored. The tank is well insulated, so it supplies hot water through the night until the sun gets to work the next day.

A development by the California engineer is a tandem solar-electric heater which is entirely automatic, the electricity going on whenever the sun's rays are too weak to maintain the hot water supply.

"With such a combination," he says, "the housewife will never be bothered by lukewarm water, yet will save heating expense when the sun shines."

Any handyman can build his own solar heater, or one may be purchased ready-made. Professor Brooks warns, however, that before sending a booklet of instructions he cannot enter into correspondence with builders regarding their problems.

On solar heater is at the \$2,000.00 "estate" of Death Valley Scotty. His location—scorching Death Valley—is recognized as the hottest region on earth.

The January return is due during the month of February, and shall be filed as a consolidated return for all unincorporated branches in the State in which is located the employer's principal place of business.

## Hopkins Decries Work Of Private Charities

As he made these observations, the American Red Cross announced that total contributions to its 1936-37 relief fund had reached \$21,112,000—one of the largest funds raised by the organization since the World War.

"Relief has become a permanent problem and can be met hereafter only by the tax route," he said.
