More Nylons And Tires To Be Had Soon

Government Relaxes Controls On Short Items And Moves To Hold Prices Down

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22, (AP)—New tires, nylon stockings, new radios—the government dropped the good news about all three into American laps today. A 100 percent jump in rubber production in the next 90 days may mean more tires for civilians, government officials said.

The OPA administrator thought could hold most new peacetime goods at or near 1942 prices. But manufacturers contend 1945 production costs demand higher prices than 1942 prices.

Nylons may be back in circulation by Thanksgiving. The government has released controls on nylon and rayon. The WPB said there will be 2 1/2 million radios by Christmas. Rent ceilings are expected to end in areas where army camps close, or war plants shut down.

Naval Training Stations To Keep Going For Year

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 22 (AP)—Naval training of newly-designated aviators will continue without reduction at the present rate in order that personnel may be prepared for service with the fleet, Rear Admiral Ralph Davison, chief of Naval Air Operational Training, said yesterday in a circular letter addressed to commanders-in-chief of the command.

On September 1, the letter said, the input to pre-flight training will be reduced and maintained at 130 students per week. This reduction, however, will not be felt until about 1946, when the Chief of Naval Air Operational Training proposes to maintain the following stations: Naval Air Station, Jacksonville; Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Cecil Field, NAB, Green Cove Springs, NAB, Mayport, NAB, Banana River and NAS, Miami.

Meanwhile Naval Air Operational Training Command will operate to full capacity, Admiral Davison pointed out, with an input of approximately 180 to 200 pilots per week. Post-war training plans for combat air crewmen have not been definitely decided.

The mission of Naval Air Operational Training Command shall continue to be to process newly designated Naval aviators, and other designated personnel, through an advanced training program in order that such personnel may, on completion of their operational training, be ready to be transferred to the most competent fleet in the world. Admiral Davison's circular letter pointed out.

Naval air training shall continue on the pre-flight, primary, advanced, and Naval Air Operational Training Command of varied training with present training efforts. Hereafter the bulk of the command will be operating on a seven day week, but commanding officers were authorized by Admiral Davison to continue training on a five-day week, if they deem it necessary. Commanding officers were instructed to stress safety and accident prevention to the utmost.

Officers and men of the command were praised for their part in preparing Naval aviators for combat duties.

The Chief of Naval Air Operational Training, Rear Admiral Davison, said "Another challenge now faces the NAOOT—the cessation of efficient post-war commitments."

4 Lost Fliers Of Doolittle Found In China

Held In Peiping As Prisoners Of Japs, They Helped Bomb Tokyo In April '42

CHUNGKING, Aug. 22 (AP)—Four of the lost airmen who bombed Tokyo in the historic raid led Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle in April, 1942, have been rescued by a daring American team which dropped from the skies on Japanese-occupied Peiping, it was announced today.

Even as the news of their rescue was radioed to Chungking, it appeared that arrival here of another American soldier-hero, Lt. Gen. Johnathon M. Winwright, was being delayed by Japanese in the Mukden area who were possibly fearful of doing anything that might get them into difficulties with the Russians.

A parachute team sent by Office of Strategic Services liberated the four fliers, who had been charged by the Japanese with being spies. Their names were withheld pending notification of their rescue, but they were rescued from their prison camps in the east coast of China.

The message radioed here said the fliers now were in the Grand Hotel at Peiping and were receiving the best care possible. (The rescue of such airmen was considered a high priority because of the danger of their being captured and turned over to the Russians.)

It was possible that the four were the only survivors of eight Tokyo raiders whose capture was disclosed by the Jap department more than a week after the raid. President Roosevelt announced that on March 17, 1943, the U. S. government had learned through neutral sources that the death penalty had been pronounced on the captured airmen after their trial and severe punishment. The sentence was commuted for some and carried out for others, the President said.

The raid, led by Lt. Gen. (then Lt. Col.) James H. Doolittle, was staged on April 18, 1942. The eight men captured were Lt. George Barr Madison, Wis.; Lt. William Glover Farrow, Washington, D. C.; Lt. Robert L. Hite, Earth, Tex.; Lt. Robert J. Moler, Lakewood, Ohio; Lt. Chase J. Bushman, Hyrum, Utah; Lt. Donald E. Hallmark, Dallas, Tex.; Cpl. Jacob B. Deshaizer, Madras, Ore.; Sgt. Harold A. Spatz, Leno, Kan.

The meanest man in the world has at last been found. Julius Goss admitted in a Chicago court the other day that for 48 years he had enjoyed a fairly steady income by robbing the church boxes for the poor.

The Tokyo press reveals some fear among Japanese officials that hostilities will break out between the forces of the Army and American landing forces which MicArthur arrives in Japan. It might be a good idea for him to take a couple of those atomic bombs along with him.

A city in Illinois, suffering from a polio epidemic is being sprayed by airplane with DDT to see if the dread disease cannot be brought under control by this method. If the germ is carried by flies, mosquitoes and other similar bugs, as many scientists believe likely, no doubt getting rid of them by whatever method will greatly reduce the extent of the epidemic.

It comes as somewhat of a surprise to many Americans that the British government is trying to settle its foreign debts at 50 cents on the dollar and give I.O.U.'s for that. But who did we think was going to pay for Britain's socialist regime anyway? A bankrupt government can't buy the Bank of England and all Britain's coal mines without making somebody pay for them.

Ernest Bevin, foreign minister in Prime Minister Clement Attlee's socialist government, said in the House of Commons the other day that Great Britain would oppose all attempts to substitute "one form of totalitarianism for another" in Bulgaria, Romania and Hungary, as well as in the rest of the Europe. The form of totalitarianism which they had was Nazism. The only other form is communism.

An earlier beginning of Sanford's building program than had at first been expected now seems possible with an announcement by the Central Florida Builders Exchange that lumber and other building materials in almost unlimited quantities will be available in two or three weeks. The government is said to have had on order no less than 500 million board feet of lumber which will now be available for civilian construction, in addition to considerable salvage lumber from Army and Navy establishments soon to be dismantled. Furthermore, government restrictions on commercial construction is expected to be lifted within a few weeks.

The Japanese are giving every appearance of an enemy that is defeated but not whipped and, in allowing them to get away with this, we may be making the same mistake we made with Germany in the last war. As a matter of fact, very few of the Japanese soldiers actually have ever come in contact with American fighting men. Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Makin, Guam, Saipan, Iwo Jima, Okinawa, bloody as they were, were isolated engagements with comparatively small forces of enemy outposts. The only fighting done by the Japanese on a large scale was in China against the Chinese. Most of the Japanese still think they are pretty good soldiers.

One of the gravest dangers to the continued peace of the world is the common belief in the current fallacy that turning Japan and Germany into democratic countries will keep them from starting another war. In the first place there is no assurance that once a democracy, always a democracy. In the second place, it is not true that democracies do not start wars. The United States has been a democracy for over 150 years and it has started several wars, notably the War of 1812, the Mexican War, the Civil War and the Spanish-American War. The only war fought by democracy, and started by democracy, is the only way to stop future wars is to remove the causes of wars.

Hospital Care

A woman's best chance, when she is going to have a baby, is to go to the hospital. This shows up clearly in the statistics of the various geographic divisions of the United States, compiled by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

In the East and South Central states the maternal mortality in the white population was 25 per 10,000 live births in 1943. In the Pacific States, it was only 18 per 10,000, the statistics show.

The relatively unfavorable record of the East South Central states is clearly related to the fact that only 43 per cent of the confinements were hospitalized.

This is the lowest percentage of any in the various geographic regions of the United States. On the other hand, the Pacific states, with their superior record for maternal mortality, had the highest percentage of hospitalized births, namely 95 per cent. Between these extremes, the situation in the other areas conforms generally to the pattern of relatively higher maternal mortality where hospitalization is low.

It is highly characteristic of our times that there has been a rapid trend towards hospitalization for confinement. So, for example, in 1936, only 41 per cent of all births in the United States occurred in hospitals; in 1943, the figure had risen to 72 per cent. The great importance of hospital care was prominently featured by the Federal Government when it set up its program of Emergency Maternity and Infant Care for wives of men in the lower ranks of the armed services. In the two years of operation since the program was started in March, 1943, more than 750,000 mothers have been cared for at a cost of about \$70,000,000.

The Metropolitan particularly points out that at a hospital the prospective mother benefits by the latest developments in chemotherapy, such as the use of sulfa drugs. These have been a "prime element in the favorable trend in mortality from puerperal septicemia", the major risk of childbirth, deaths from which in the white population amounted to 8 per 10,000 live births in 1943. This is less than half of the corresponding figure of only three years earlier in 1940.

For More Happy Returns

Here are a few suggestions to help make your serviceman's visit home more pleasant for him, reports Robert Reuben, war correspondent, in the September issue of True Confessions. Reuben, on his way back to the battlefield, feels many men, like himself, would get more out of their furloughs if the following were remembered:

- 1. Relatives and friends who want to see a soldier should go to HIS house instead of expecting the reverse. It only takes one evening out of his stay to visit you, but all those single evenings pile up!
2. If you're a parent, don't monopolize your son's time! Don't outline his activities or query him on what he's thinking. If he wants to make the rounds, or do nothing, don't feel that he's not enjoying his home. Give him the privilege of freedom.
3. Don't send him on errands. He's been standing in lines long enough. Have someone else pick up the groceries, run to the drug store or get his theatre tickets.
4. Let him eat, sleep, or do anything he wants for as long as he wants. He may be too thin or too fat, but remember he's an adult and knows how to take care of himself.
5. Don't be inquisitive about his experiences. Let him talk of them when and if he wants to.
6. Let him have plenty of time alone with his girl or wife. Affection is something he's not had while at battlefronts.
7. Don't nag him about trifles. If he now bites his fingernails, uses terrible language or seems to have forgotten his manners, forget it. He'll straighten himself out when he's been home a little longer.

It has been a long time since I've presented a guest columnist and this week I'm happy to sit back and let Charlotte Armstrong, USO entertainer, just back from 18 months overseas, tell you about some of her experiences.

Her message is primarily for the wives, mothers and sweethearts of our men serving overseas although her story should prove of genuine interest to all readers.

YOUR MAN OVERSEAS

Settle back in that easy chair—slide your tootles out of those pumps and get all comfy because this red headed woman is going to give you the lowdown on a subject nearest your hearts—Your man overseas.

I spent 18 months in the European Theater of Operations with the USO Camp Shows, that you generous contributions to the National War Fund helped to maintain, and I fell madly, desperately in love. Not with any one man but with the entire American Army. — I didn't have an opportunity to meet the Navy or Marines.

After a good deal of experience in various countries, I decided that our own G.I. Joe is the most fascinatingly beautiful hunk of man in the world. Even those faded, sea-green fatigues two sizes too large cannot deglamorize him—Perhaps it was the egotistical way he squared his shoulders and said, "Howya Babe?" or it may have been the Sir Walter Raleigh attitude he had while holding me stammering into a Jeep. Be what it may, I get all starchy eyed just thinking about him.

I became pretty well acquainted with several thousand males from our 48 states and I feel I know their womenfolk too. I have seen so many pictures of you and heard so much about you. I feel a bit like a yardstick as boys would come up to me and say "My wife is about your size" or "I have a sister with hair the color of yours" or "My girl wears the same size shoe you do," etc.

I was in Paris a couple of weeks and almost everywhere I went in to shop someone would come over with a bottle of perfume to ask if I thought their special girl friend would like it. I wish you could have seen them shopping for you. It was quite a treat to hear our rough, burly combat men sitting in the center of some "muddy" field discussing Chanel 5, Guerlain, Shalimar and Schiaparelli Shocking. But an even greater treat was to see some shy sweet kid from Wisconsin buying filmy lingerie or a rough Brooklyn Sergeant holding up a lacey black nightie and trying to decide if it would fit his wife. I hope you liked those gifts because a great deal of time was spent in choosing them. They must love you an awful lot because going on a shopping tour and trying to cope with that French lingo is really something.

Major Bud Keller from Pittsburg bought a glamorous red turban for his wife. It was the typical Parisian headpiece and towered skyward almost as high as the Eiffel Tower. But Paris wasn't where we spent most of our time. We lived in a little German farmhouse less than four miles from Aachen before that city fell. Our kitchen was the hangout for boys stationed nearby and they used to sit around and tell us about the pies and cakes their Mothers baked. We

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would compare snapshots of our families and our dogs. It made you seem very close to us and we forgot that shells were landing all around us and that we might never see you again.

I helped Capt. Peter Brown celebrate his anniversary. We sat a picture of his beautiful New York wife and their baby, whom he had never seen, on a table and a group of us toasted them while Peter told us all about the Brown romance from start to finish. — Bob Epstein was in a hospital when I met him, he was quite upset. When his infantry outfit was going through a small demolished village he found a beautiful Grandfather's clock. His mother had always wanted one so he strapped it on his back and marched on up the road. About five miles from there they were met by some Jerry soldiers so Bob had to ditch the clock, which

was lost in the melee that sent him to the hospital. You have a problem to face when your man comes home because he has put you on a pedestal. You are his life and

while he was tramping through mud, flying slack laden skies, parachuting into enemy territory or shopping in Paris, he was doing it for you. I only wish my husband could come home to me, but he, like many thousands of others, was killed so that you and I could go on living as free Americans.

So I urge you to hold your heads a little higher and know that to some one man you are brighter than the sun. If you ever fall off that pedestal, I personally will beat you full of bumps.
