Legislature May
Plug Gun Laws
Martinez Firm On Sales Tax Veto

TALLAHASSEE — The
Legislature may finally plug a
loophole in Florida's permissive
new gun law while the House
planned to take up a com-
promise services tax bill in
defiance of Gov. Bob Martinez'
threat to veto any legislation
that fails to repeal the con-
troversial levy outright.

Educators To Get Booklet On Students' Condom Use

Seminole County AIDS Victims Growing In Numbers

From Staff And Wire Reports
The number of people diagnosed as having
AIDS (Acute Immune Deficiency Syndrome) in
Seminole County is growing, as it is in the rest of
the nation, according to Bernice Duncan, county
director of community health. Of the 28 people in
Seminole County diagnosed since 1983 as having
the almost always fatal disease, 12 have been
diagnosed since Jan. 1 of this year, she said.

Duncan said the county health department
does not keep records of what sex the AIDS
patients are, but does try to ascertain how the
disease was contracted. Of the 28 diagnosed in
the county so far, 11 were classified as
homosexual, six as bisexual, four as intravenous
drug users, two contracted the disease through
blood transfusions, and how the other six
contracted the disease is unknown, she said.

presidents of parents' groups and other education
officials, includes such controversial topics as use
of condoms and when children with AIDS should
attend public schools.
The Seminole County school district has a
committee currently evaluating the whole
concept of sex education, including AIDS prevention,
for use in seventh grade (12- and 13-year-olds)
health classes, according to Karen Coleman,
district spokesperson.
Coleman said she hopes the district will receive
enough booklets for each member of the
committee, which is made up of teachers, parents
and administrators, so it can be considered along
with other materials. The committee also plans to
survey the parents of 10 percent of the students
to solicit their opinion on what type of material

should be included in such a program.
"The subject of correct use of condoms, or even
their mention to students is one which has been
discussed by the school district in connection
with AIDS prevention material, and will be
discussed by this committee," Coleman said. The
committee is to have a recommendation on a sex
education program, to include AIDS prevention,
to present to the school board by the end of this
school year.
Seminole County School Board Chairman Joe
Williams said he couldn't comment on whether
the district should use the booklets in area
schools until he actually sees one. "Unless I see
how in-depth and explicit the material is and what

Police Probe Longwood Link
With Orlando Child-Murderer

Longwood police have been
contacted by Orange County
authorities about similarities in
the person Longwood police are
seeking for the rape of a
Longwood woman last month
and the man wanted for ab-
ducting a girl in south Orange
County Tuesday.
Capt. Terry Baker of the
Longwood Police Department
said law enforcement authorities
in Longwood, Kissimmee and
Orange County are comparing
notes on sex-related crimes in
Longwood and Kissimmee, and
the abducting of a 12-year-old
girl in south Orange County.
"At this point, there are some
similarities, and we are just
comparing notes to see if it is
possibly the same person,"
Baker said. A Longwood woman
was raped in her home Sept. 23,
and the assailant fled in the
woman's car, which was later
found in Kissimmee by police
looking for the abductor of two

sets of sisters.
Tuesday a 12-year-old girl was
abducted from her home in
south Orange County and her
body was found in woods behind
her home. Authorities have not
said whether she was sexually
assaulted.
Orange County Sheriff's de-
puties described the man they are
seeking as white, 5 feet 10
inches to six feet tall, 160-180
pounds, with light brown or dark
blond curly hair, either short or
possibly neck length.
Residents of south Orange
County are stunned by the
abduction and murder of the girl
and her killer's escape through a
massive dragnet of law en-
forcement officers.
"It's just shocking," said
Phyllis Caulfield, who resides
with her mother in the Sky Lake
subdivision from which Angeli
Bare was kidnapped Tuesday.
"I've lived here for 27 years and
nothing like this has ever hap-
pened."

The girl's partially clothed
body was discovered in a
wooded area heavily populated
with homes and businesses
south of Orlando near the junc-
tion of U.S. Highway 441 and
State Road 428.
Nearly 100 officers searched
on foot, from the air and on
horseback without success for
the gunman who snatched
Angeli, killed her and left her
body in a wooded area near the
Sky Lake subdivision to which
her family had moved only last
week.
The girl was alone in the
house and getting ready for
school when her car pool driver
alerted the sheriff's office Angeli
had screamed for him to go away
or a man with a gun inside the
house would kill him, too,
authorities said.
The driver left the house and
alerted the Orange County
Sheriff's Office, but the suspect
got the drop on Deputy Richard

### Man Reportedly Tries To Abduct, Threatens Estranged Wife's Life

Marvin Brunt, 36, of Altamonte Springs, is accused of reaching through a bedroom window he opened to grab his estranged wife and try to pull her out of the home where she was sleeping.

Brunt allegedly threatened to kill her as he pulled on her at about 1 a.m. Monday at 1067 Williams St., Altamonte Springs, but he reportedly stopped the attack when the homeowner walked into the room and told him to leave.

At about 2:20 a.m., Brunt surrendered to Altamonte Springs police at the police station to be charged with burglary and battery-spouse abuse. He was arrested by Seminole County sheriff's deputies and was being held in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

### Car Picked Up; Owner Fired At

Mark A. Gafjen, 25, of 185 E. Altamonte Drive, Altamonte Springs, reported to Seminole County sheriff's deputies that when he went to a home at 321 Hidden Pines Circle, Casselberry, at about 2:15 a.m. Monday to pick up his car, which was taken without his permission by an ex-girlfriend, he was met at the door by an armed man.

Gafjen said he got the keys for his car from the woman and, as he was driving away, the man came out, pointed the handgun and fired a shot at the car. Gafjen and two friends who were with him went to a nearby convenience store to call Casselberry police.

At 3:21 a.m., police arrested Mark Steven Miller, 21, of the Casselberry address, at his home. He was charged with aggravated assault and has been released on \$1,000 bond to appear in court Oct. 28.

# Man Admits To Foiled Robbery

A Chuluota man faces four and a half years for a botched robbery in May. It was one of two cases heard recently.

William Johnny Case, 33, of 254 Sixth St., is set to be sentenced Nov. 13 by Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton Jr. The state is recommending a sentence of four and a half years.

Case pleaded guilty to robbing a Circle K Store at 670 Ave. B, Chuluota. The incident occurred May 12th around 12:05 a.m.

Case entered the store on that date and asked the 28-year-old clerk, "What would you think if this was a robbery?" according to court records. Case then demanded cash and threatened to pull a gun.

As Case picked up the money, the clerk grabbed the telephone and dialed 911, but Case ripped the phone off the wall then fled. The clerk chased Case until the clerk slipped and fell, injuring his right shoulder.

Back at the store, however, was Case's shirt, a pack of cigarettes and sunglasses he apparently lost in his haste to leave.

Further, after the robbery, a man called 911 and reported to the sheriff's department that his

shirt had been stolen. The man did not want to speak to a deputy about the alleged theft but only to report it. The call was traced to Case's Sixth Street address. Later the same day, a sheriff's investigator met with some men who said Case told them he was the robber. The investigator met with Case and, after questioning them at the sheriff's department, placed under arrest.

In a second case, a Longwood man and his wife, arrested following a family dispute, have both pleaded no contest resulting arrest with violence and he additionally to aggravated battery. One other person arrested in the incident awaits final disposition of his case.

Edward Ray, 69, and his wife Edith Odilane Ray, 52, are scheduled to be sentenced Nov. 13 by Eaton.

They were arrested in April after a family dispute and a shooting at their residence, 109 Chapman Ave.

Deputies said they responded to a disturbance call at the Ray home at about 11:20 p.m., April 26. Records show that earlier that day, a 14-year-old girl who apparently was the Rays' granddaughter had been placed in the home by the state because the

girl's mother reportedly had been arrested for child abuse.

The child told the deputies that her grandfather, Edward Ray, had hit her. She said she did not want to stay at the home.

Edith Ray let a deputy enter the home to call his supervisor and make contact with the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. Meanwhile, two other deputies arrive and Robert Larry Ray, 32, the Rays' son, reportedly became belligerent toward the deputies, especially the female deputy.

After the call, a scuffle ensued and the deputies tried to take the adults into custody as well as round up the girl and a 5-year-old boy who apparently went across the street.

At one point, the 5-year-old was put in a patrol car while Edith Ray interferred, according to court records. At that moment, two shots were fired from inside the Rays' home. The deputy forced the woman into the car with the boy, the girl got in and the deputy drove away from from the scene, radioing for help.

Three house flood lights came on and Edward Ray, the grandfather, came out with his hands up to be arrested.

# Reststop Robbery, Beating Reported

Seminole County firefighters were called to the eastbound rest area of Interstate 4, near Longwood, at about 12:50 p.m. Monday to treat a 40-year-old Eustia man who had been robbed and beaten by a gang of seven that included one woman.

Richard Evans Bills suffered a split lip and black eye in scratches in the attack. He also lost \$32, a \$30 watch, his \$7 wallet and two sets of keys to the gang.

Bills told Seminole County sheriff's deputies he was in a restroom at the reststop at about

12:30 p.m. when he was attacked and ordered to strip.

A witness saw the gang flee east in two cars. All the suspects were estimated to be between 18 and 22 years old. Bills' clothing was recovered from another area of the reststop. —Susan Leden

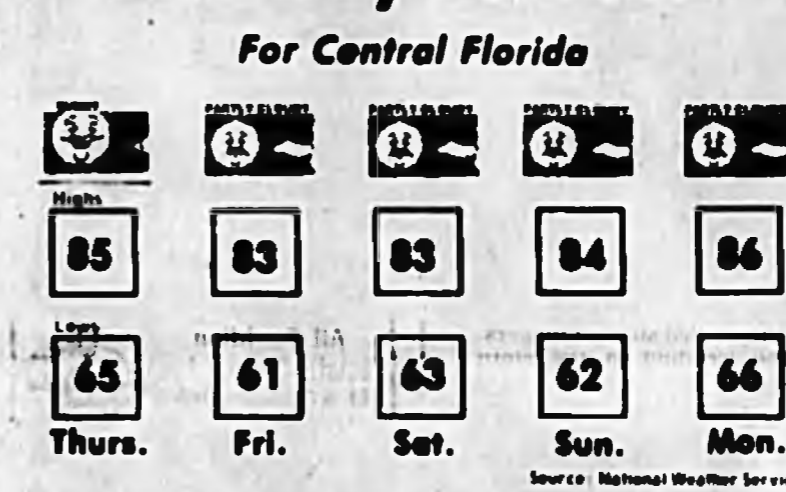

## East Cools Off As West Sizzles

Wasn't it fun last night? Wandering out into the cool evening, down to the mid 50s in some parts of Seminole County, looking up to the Harvest moon to witness the eclipsing effect in the center with Jupiter proudly overseeing the process, then having difficulty discerning any difference. Some skeptics even say it didn't happen.

Please recall from this space on Tuesday citing the eclipse and also calling attention to the hole in the ozone layer. Well, perhaps the two got mixed up. Attempts to contact Carl Sagan for an explanation of the visual misadventure on the moon were totally in vain. However, you can imagine his reply: "There are billions and billions of moons in the universe, even as grains of sand on the beaches of Earth, so perhaps you were viewing the wrong satellite."

The National Weather Service issued a flood watch today for small streams in the Catskill area.

Afternoon temperatures climbed into the 60s Tuesday and helped melt the snow that also fell during the weekend in Vermont and Massachusetts.

The weather service forecast a mix of light snow and rain for parts of Michigan today. Rain was predicted from the lower Great Lakes to New England and the northern Ohio Valley.

The cooling trend, however, is no fantasy. And the lows in the 50s should continue until the week-end. Highs will remain in the low to mid-80s with a small chance of afternoon showers. The coolness is shared throughout the eastern

United States, while the west is in a broiler.

Warm weather melted a blanket of snow and brought fears of flooding in the Northeast, while a light snow was forecast today for Michigan and officials predicted a fifth day of steamy temperatures in the West.

In upstate New York, autumn weather returned to nudge away the wintry chill accompanying a freak Sunday storm that blanketed some parts with as much as 20 inches of snow.

"It's melting fast," said a Greene County sheriff's deputy in Catskill. "It looks like fall again."

The National Weather Service issued a flood watch today for small streams in the Catskill area.

Afternoon temperatures climbed into the 60s Tuesday and helped melt the snow that also fell during the weekend in Vermont and Massachusetts.

The weather service forecast a mix of light snow and rain for parts of Michigan today. Rain was predicted from the lower Great Lakes to New England and the northern Ohio Valley.

A freeze advisory was called for North Dakota, where lows were in the 20s early today.

Highs in the upper 90s were forecast for parts of California and southwest Oregon as a record-setting heat wave headed into a fifth day today.

In San Francisco, the mercury fell to a high of 90 Tuesday after the city perspired through its hottest day ever, at 102 degrees, Monday. Late Tuesday afternoon, sea breezes were returning to the bay area and temperatures were dropping up to 6 degrees an hour. The weather service predicted a return to the normal 70s for the rest of the week.

## Local Report

The high temperature Tuesday in Sanford was 83 degrees and the overnight low was 56 degrees as reported by the University of Florida Agricultural Research and Education Center, Celery Avenue. There was no rainfall recorded. Partly cloudy today with expected high in the low 80s and little chance of afternoon showers.

## Trial For Alleged Drug Kingpin In 3rd Day Without a Juror

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The drug smuggling trial of alleged Colombian cocaine kingpin Carlos Lehder Rivas goes into its third day today with lawyers still trying to choose the first juror.

Defense lawyers and prosecutors questioned seven potential jurors in detail Tuesday, bringing to nine the total from the first group of 68 who have answered attorneys' questions at length.

U.S. District Judge Howell Melton excused two men who said they could not sit on the panel for the three months the trial is expected to take.

Lehder, 38, is accused as one of the leaders of the violent "Medellin cartel," which prosecutors contend is responsible for half the Colombian cocaine imported into the United States. Investigators in Colombia and the United States have linked cartel members to numerous assassinations in both countries.

## Martinez: Bond Freeze Political

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Bob Martinez charges the vote by Democrats on the Cabinet to freeze state bond issues was politically motivated.

The Cabinet Tuesday voted 4-2 to override Martinez' wishes and prohibit bond sales until Standard and Poor's lifts the credit watch it imposed on Florida in September. No bond issues are scheduled until November, so the ban will have no immediate effect and actually could be removed before any bond issue comes up.

But Martinez charged the prohibition was not necessary, and could actually cost money by postponing bond sales on construction projects. The small interest increase the credit watch will cause could be outweighed by construction cost increases while the state postpones building for lack of funds, he argued.

## Citizens Hot Against AIDS Home

BEULAH (UPI) — Angry residents of Escambia County came out in force for the second time in two months to object to a state plan that would put a home for sexually active youths carrying the AIDS virus in their community.

"We don't want this, we're not going to have this," said Beulah resident Jim Andrews. The crowd, numbering approximately 400, responded with applause. "If we stick together, things like this will never happen."

The community meeting was called to discuss a plan by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services to open a home for a half-dozen sexually active youths aged 13-18 who tested positive for the human immunodeficiency virus, which can cause AIDS.

## Supermarket Singles Tie Knot

DAVIE (UPI) — A couple who believe a supermarket is a better place to meet someone than in a bar, drove home their point by getting married next to a Publix cash register.

Victor Radeka met Deborah Francis about a year ago during the first in a series of singles' nights at South Florida Publix Supermarkets. He was a Pompano Beach mechanic, she a telephone saleswoman for a Fort Lauderdale pharmaceutical firm.

When they decided to marry, they called store managers. Publix suggested they hold the wedding in the store Tuesday, another singles' night.

# Consumer Confidence Rises Again

GAINESVILLE (UPI) — Confidence among Florida consumers, encouraged by a continued strong economy, rose again in September and the result could be more home buying and major purchases, a University of Florida survey showed.

The Florida Consumer Confidence Index is computed from a random statewide survey of 515 households by UF's Bureau of Economic and Business Research. It rose to 98.8 in September from 91.8 in July. The survey is not conducted in August.

The seven-point jump in confidence, the largest in the three-year history of the College of Business survey, was a turn-about from the July survey, which recorded the sharpest decline in a year. The index had reached 95.2 in June.

A similar index, computed from a nationwide survey by the University of Michigan, stood at 93.8 in September, down from 94.4 in August and 93.7 in July.

"The bull market in stocks, the declining national unemployment rate and continued economic growth combined to lift consumers' spirits," said UF economist Dave Denalow.

"In our Florida survey, 44 percent of the respondents reported they are better off now than a year ago," Denalow said. "Only 18 percent said they are worse off. More than half — 51 percent — expect to be better off a year from now, versus a scant 7 percent who expect to be worse off. Consequently, consumers think now is a good time for major purchases."

Compared with the July survey, buying plans for most large-ticket items such as washing machines, clothes dryers, microwave ovens, refrigerators and air conditioners, were up in September.

"Wanting to obtain mortgages before interest rates go even higher, Floridians boosted their home-buying plans by 35 percent over July figures and by 25 percent over a year ago. On average, respondents expect rates on conventional mortgages to rise by more than a point during the coming year."

## Solons, Reagan Mortgage Future

Lawmakers have put a spending gun to Ronald Reagan's head and extorted his signature on terms of surrender in the war against Washington's debt binge.

For all practical purposes, the 100th Congress and the 40th president have put off to their successors the job of balancing the budget. Scant progress, if any, will be made in reducing the \$150 billion federal deficit until after the 1988 presidential and congressional elections. In fact, an economic downturn in the meantime would send the deficit soaring again.

Worse still, the Herculean task of paying off the government's long-term debt—now a staggering \$2.3 trillion—must come from the earnings of the next generation.

The capitulation signed by Reagan at a White House ceremony on Tuesday was disguised in a bill to restore the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction measure. For a time, the law held out the promise of establishing fiscal discipline on Capitol Hill. Last year, however, its enforcement mechanism was gutted by the Supreme Court.

Although lawmakers now have put new teeth into Gramm-Rudman, they softened its bite by easing the law's deficit-reduction goals.

To overcome the Supreme Court's objections, Congress vested with the president's Office of Management and Budget, rather than the congressionally controlled comptroller general, the authority to impose automatic spending cuts. Such reductions are required if lawmakers and the president fail to achieve Gramm-Rudman's deficit targets.

Yet, as though to prove they lacked the courage of their convictions, lawmakers relaxed the targets considerably. The new date for reaching a balanced budget has slipped from 1991 to 1993, with the most painful cuts or tax hikes to come after next year's elections.

Similarly, a whopping \$500 billion increase in the federal debt ceiling, to \$2.8 trillion, was taken on to provide for the government's insatiable borrowing needs through early 1989, effectively sweeping the debt issue under the rug during next year's balloting.

For Reagan, Gramm-Rudman II amounts to submission to the Democratic majorities in the Senate and House. They rewrote the formula by which the automatic cuts would be enacted, requiring that half of the savings come directly from the Pentagon budget and placing a number of popular domestic spending programs off limits. Their intent was to force the president to choose between tax increases and steep reductions in defense outlays.

The Democrats envision \$64 billion in new taxes during the next three years. Reagan has pledged to veto any general tax hike, particularly one of that magnitude. But he has signaled his willingness to accept higher fees paid by visitors to national parks and other users of federal services.

In the end, this will add up to higher deficits, higher domestic spending, and a military budget that is shrinking in real terms. This scenario will no doubt undermine the prospects for better relations with the Soviet Union—which are a product of the Reagan defense buildup.

Thus, the nation will continue to sink deeper into debt until the voters elect a Congress and a president possessed of the political courage to break Washington's voracious spending habit.

# Should Judges Try Judges? Some Say Yes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The founding fathers, who were much praised during last month's 200th anniversary of the Constitution, gave federal judges lifetime tenure to insulate them from the political pressures of the day.

In 1787, the Constitution's writers properly presumed that lifetime tenure would let judges render potentially unpopular but constitutionally correct decisions without fear of losing their jobs.

But the founding fathers didn't want federal judges to get too cocky either, so they gave Congress the right to remove a sitting federal judge for cause through the impeachment process.

The House could bring charges and, if the a majority of House members agreed a judge committed an offense, they would vote impeachment—tantamount to an indictment. The Senate would try the case and decide the judge's guilt or innocence.

But now some lawmakers want to remove Congress from the time-consuming process of firing flawed federal judges. They want to

change the Constitution to allow judges to judge judges and decide on removal. Congress would retain the power to impeach and try other officials, like the president.

In the Constitution's 200-year history, only 10 federal judges have been impeached by the House, with five of them getting booted off the bench by the Senate after trials.

The most recent case—and the first in 50 years—took place last fall when the House impeached and the Senate removed federal Judge Harry Claiborne of Nevada, who earlier was convicted in court of tax evasion and sent to prison.

Rep. Gerald Kleczka, D-Wis., co-author of a recently filed constitutional amendment allowing Congress to establish an alternative system for removing bad federal judges, argues that in modern times the impeachment process "is simply too time-consuming."

"Because of the enormous demands placed on us, individual members cannot devote the time necessary to conduct a thorough impeachment and trial," Kleczka said.

Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., co-sponsor with

Kleczka, says Congress is "not capable ... of making the kinds of judgments that you ought to make in an impeachment."

"You can't expect people to all of a sudden treat congressmen as judges when most of the time we're politicians," Frank said. "We haven't got the time and we haven't got the proper motivation. ... No one would tolerate a judge in a major case being as busy as we are with other things."

Curiously, many manage to find plenty of time to raise millions of dollars in campaign contributions, to attend an endless number of parties, dinners and receptions, to take overseas trips of questionable value to taxpayers and to meet and have their pictures taken with every Boy Scout and senior citizen group that visits the Capitol from back home.

It makes one wonder why they can't squeeze in a few hours to carry out their constitutional mandate to consider removing a federal judge every 10 or 20 years.

# American Pride Needed

Helicopters from the Navy ship Guadalcanal are clearing mines and providing gunship protection for oil tankers in the Persian Gulf. Unlike the larger fleet carriers whose jets fly cover from outside the gulf, the Guadalcanal sails with the convoys. But the Guadalcanal was built to serve off a hostile shore, its primary function is to launch its embarked Marines in an amphibious assault. Thus it takes its name from one of the great Marine campaigns of World War II.

The 1st Marine Division waded ashore at Guadalcanal on August 7, 1942. Today, American politicians and newsmen cringe in fear of Iranian motorboats and mines. Every rumor of shots fired and every threat from the Ayatollah brings forth calls for retreat and withdrawal of American forces. Yet the superiority enjoyed by U.S. air and naval forces in the Persian Gulf today was beyond the dreams of those who fought for six months at Guadalcanal.

Guadalcanal marked the first American counterattack into enemy territory. The U.S. Navy was outnumbered at sea and in the air. The waters were so dangerous that the main U.S. Fleet pulled out as soon as the Marines were ashore. Two nights after the landing, the Japanese inflicted a major defeat on the Allies, sinking one Australian and four American cruisers plus a destroyer without loss to themselves. After three months of fighting, the U.S. Navy had only one aircraft carrier left in operation in the entire Pacific, the Enterprise, and it was so damaged that it put to sea with a repair tender tied alongside.

In those most desperate days American determination and morale were stronger than they seem today. Two days after Pearl Harbor was attacked, President Roosevelt told the nation that "the United States can accept no result save victory, final and complete." And the American people believed in the president, because they believed in themselves. They never doubted that America would win. In contrast, most of today's would-be presidents seem unable to use the word "victory" in regard to defense or foreign policy.

By every material measure, the U.S. is a more powerful and prosperous nation than it was 45 years ago. But the intangible elements of pride, confidence and the will to win are missing.

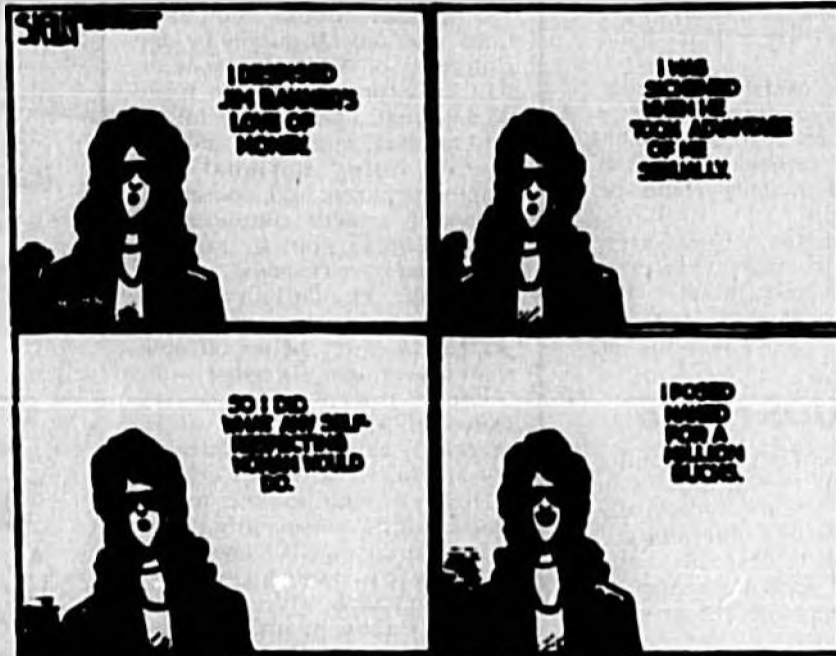

# Love, Death In Terrorists' Own Hell

WASHINGTON — Barbara Newman's journey to the "suburbs of hell," as she describes the terrorist stronghold of Baalbek, was an exercise in journalistic enterprise and daring. Carrying Jack Anderson credentials that would only have antagonized the terrorists she went to observe, she ventured into the most forbidden corner of Ayatollah Khomeini's dark realm.

Yet possibly even more intriguing than the journey itself is the story of how Newman arranged the trip and why she went. We warned her not to go. We won't send a reporter anywhere we won't go ourselves. We told her we would have grave fears about visiting Baalbek, which for an American is the most dangerous place on earth. But she was determined to go.

She went, first of all, to score a journalistic coup. She became the first Western correspondent to visit Baalbek since the ayatollah turned it into a terrorist training center in 1979 — except for the Associated

# President Kirkpatrick?

The idea that Jeane Kirkpatrick could be the desirable Republican presidential candidate in 1988 has been kicking around for about five years, and the case for it has most recently been put with his usual logic and eloquence by Norman Podhoretz and his newspaper column.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick has powerful qualifications. This has nothing to do with her gender. Her qualifications would be exactly the same if she were a male.

Geraldine Ferraro was a disaster in 1986 not because she was a female, but because she was an utterly unqualified Queens pol married to a man who brought her the wrong kind of publicity.

Rep. Patricia Schroeder of Colorado, who recently dropped out, was out of the question anyway. Not because she is female, but because she is a far-out leftist, managing somehow to get to the left of even the seven Democratic dwarfs. Mickey Mouse could have beaten Pat Schroeder.

But the case for Jeane Kirkpatrick has power. She became a Republican when the Democratic Party drifted irreversibly to the left. Even before officially switching parties in 1985, she had spoken eloquently for decent principle as President Reagan's U.N. representative. She has written both publicly and in scholarly journals. Intellectually, she is as qualified as Woodrow Wilson was when he left the presidency of Princeton.

But there is more to say in behalf of a Kirkpatrick candidacy, and Mr. Podhoretz says it.

Mikhail Gorbachev may be a good pundit in foreseeing a Bush-Dole ticket — and foreseeing that it would win — but Bush-Dole is not "turning

on" the conservative political "activists" as the media calls them. They want stronger wine. Mr. Podhoretz speculates that Jack Kemp may well remain at about 10 percent into October. Then Jeane Kirkpatrick "would stake her own claim to the conservative constituency. And having set the conservatives on fire at the 1984 Republican convention when she made her famous speech attacking the 'San Francisco Democrats' who 'blame America first,' she could again set them on fire in 1988.

Yes, she could, and the rationale for this kind of speculation is that this is a most peculiar presidential election that is upcoming in 1988. Most of the time, in both parties, there is one or at most two leading contenders: Eisenhower or Taft, Stevenson or Kefauver, Nixon or Rockefeller, Kennedy or Stevenson, Mondale or, sort-of, Hart. Often it's just one candidate: Roosevelt, Eisenhower, Johnson, Nixon, Reagan. But this time, there is no commanding candidate in either party. Bush-Dole could turn out to be strong, but the conservative "activists" might not even attend the nominating convention.

Hence Mr. Podhoretz's Kirkpatrick speculation.

It could happen, and I would gladly vote for her. But she has never run for office or commanded a single vote cast. Woodrow Wilson, after all, was governor of New Jersey. The last time anyone who had never run for office was nominated for President was in 1952 when the Republicans nominated Dwight Eisenhower.

Also, Jack Kemp may not stay at 10 percent. Political insiders say that he is picking up steam.

# Medical History On Card

HOUSTON (UPI)—Astronauts attending others who become ill in space will be able to place a small plastic card in a laser scanner and review the patient's entire medical history.

The medical "credit cards" are being developed by a University of Houston professor of biology through a three-year, \$180,000 grant from NASA's Johnson Space Center.

Lasers are used to place up to 800 pages of medical information on the cards, said Dr. J.H.U. Brown.

"If you look at the average medical record, you have 80 or 90 pages of ordinary 8-by-10 typewritten pages of information — lab data, X-rays, drugs and so on," Brown said. "We can take all of that and put all that ... on a credit card."

The cards will be carried with astronauts and the information on them can be called up on any ordinary personal computer, he said. New data also can be added to the cards following medical exams or treatment.

In addition to carrying needed medical information into space in a tiny form, the cards also will allow astronauts to carry their medical histories with them as they travel to various NASA centers nationwide.

"You could also add information about the type of work they're doing, whether they've been trained in certain ways and other information," Brown said. "That information is always with them and always available."

The "credit cards" have a gold-colored strip made of a chemical compound. A laser beam can be used to etch information into that compound. Information is placed on the card in code so that it cannot be tampered with if it falls into the wrong hands.

Brown, who has been developing the cards through Sumitomo Corp. of America, also is working on a pilot project to provide similar medical cards for some patients in the Harris County Hospital District.

He said such cards eventually could be used to carry academic records from kindergarten through the PhD level.

But Brown said the cards are "a natural for NASA" and eventually could be used in a variety of ways at the agency's space centers.

### Overloaded Boat Tips Over; Scores Feared Slain By Sharks

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — A 35-foot boat believed loaded with people seeking legal entry into Puerto Rico capsized in shark-infested waters off the north coast of the Dominican Republic Tuesday, officials said.

Spokesmen for the Dominican government and the U.S. Embassy said from 40 to 150 people may have died in the mishap.

Dominican Civil Defense Director Eugenio Cabral quoted one survivor as saying there were close to 180 people jammed aboard the small boat and that only about 20 survived. But a U.S. Embassy official said he had been told the 35-foot boat was carrying about 70 people and 20 to 30 of them survived.

### Rebels Plot To Reinstate Marcos

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — Armed forces chief Gen. Fidel Ramos told the Cabinet today an alliance of renegade soldiers and rightwing politicians will attempt a coup this month to restore ousted ruler Ferdinand Marcos.

President Corason Aquino and her Cabinet agreed immediately after the briefing, held in a heavily guarded and sandbagged Malacanang Palace, to close three or four radio stations believed to be transmitting "propaganda" from the coup plotters.

Troops in combat gear, supported by tanks and armored personnel carriers, remained on alert after an all-night vigil around the palace prompted by reports of an imminent attack by Marcos loyalist Col. Reynaldo Cabautan, a fugitive coup leader.

### Fiji Says British Apron Strings Cut

SUVA, Fiji (UPI) — Coup leader Col. Sitiveni Rabuka today ended Fiji's 113-year-old link with the British Crown, proclaiming the South Pacific island nation a republic to be ruled by native Melanesians rather than the Indian majority.

Rabuka's midnight declaration over army-controlled Radio Fiji, coming in the 11th day of his second military takeover of the country in five months, drew swift condemnation from the United States, Britain and other Western nations, which said they still considered Queen Elizabeth II as titular ruler of Fiji.

# Iranian Boat Damages Saudi Tanker

MANAMA, Bahrain (UPI) — An Iranian patrol boat attacked a Saudi Arabian tanker today but caused only minor damage, hours after Iraq said its warplanes hit another ship off the coast of Iran, shipping sources said.

The sources said there also were unconfirmed reports that a cargo vessel had been attacked

at dawn off the United Arab Emirates port of Sharjah. Residents said four to five simultaneous explosions rattled windows of houses along the coast.

The 12,770-ton Saudi tanker Raad Al-Bakry came under Iranian Revolutionary Guard attack early today off the UAE port of Dubai as it headed toward the Strait of Hormuz after loading at

the Saudi terminal at Ras Tanura, shipping sources said.

Damage was minor, and the vessel continued on its way, they said.

Lloyd's of London, the insurance broker, said the tanker was attacked by an "Iranian fast patrol boat" but provided no other details.

The attack came less than 12 hours after Iraq said its warplanes raided a "big naval target," military parlance for a large tanker or cargo vessel in

Iranian service. The vessel was not identified and shipping sources could not confirm the raid.

Official Tehran radio said today the Iranian Navy stopped and searched 11 merchant vessels in the gulf during a 24-hour period but let all of the ships resume their voyages.

It said Iranian long-range artillery early today destroyed radio, television relay and radar stations as well as a radar-jamming facility.

Sen. John Vogt, who represents the 17 Senate District, including Sanford, has appointed John C. "Jack" Horner, as his legislative aide for this area, with an office in Sanford.

Horner was president of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce for 13 years before retiring last year. He is a past president of the Sanford Rotary Club and is executive vice president of the Sanford-Seminole Development Company.

Sen. Vogt, who is currently serving as President of the Senate, has another office in Cape Canaveral, but has not had one in Sanford before, Horner said.

"I have always been an admirer of Sen. Vogt," Horner said.

"I like his politics and his manner. He exerts a soft-spoken, strong type of leadership that is in the tradition of senators in this district and I was happy to accept the job."

# North Koreans Sink Boat Of South Koreans

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — A North Korean military vessel attacked two South Korean fishing boats in international waters today, sinking one of them with 13 people aboard, a Ministry of Defense spokesman said.

The spokesman said one fisherman was pulled from the water by a South Korean military boat, which was searching for the remaining 12 men. The fate of the second boat was not known, ministry spokesman Lt. Lee Yong-kwon said.

Details of the type of North Korean vessel involved or how the South Korean trawlers were attacked were not immediately available from the Defense Ministry.

A spokesman for the United Nations Command, which oversees a combined U.S.-South Korean force of more than 640,000 men, said it was aware of the incident but had nothing to add to the information released by the Defense Ministry.

"This is an outrageous act," the South Korean government said in a statement. A protest will be filed, said ministry spokesman Lee Yong-kwon.

The attacks occurred about 5 a.m. today, 40 miles west of Paengnyong-do, a South Korean-controlled island off the coast of communist North Korea, the spokesman said.

Paengnyong-do, a South Korean military outpost and listening station, is 11 miles off the coast of North Korea, 130 miles northwest of Seoul and 92 miles southwest of Pyongyang, the North Korean capital.

The ministry spokesman said one of the boats was a 101 T-class trawler called the No. 31 Chinyong Ho, captained by Chu Yong-sook, 45. The boat was based in the southern port city of Yosu, 201 miles south of Seoul.

There were no details available about the second boat, the spokesman said.

North Korea seized a Japanese vessel Oct. 1 for allegedly violating a 200-mile ocean economic zone claimed by the communist state off its coast.

## Reagan Still For Arming Contras Despite Nicaraguan 'Reforms'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Possible movement by Nicaragua's Marxist-led government to comply with a Central American peace plan has done nothing to dim President Reagan's determination to continue arming the Contra rebels.

As far as the White House is concerned, the jury is still out on whether the Sandinista regime in Nicaragua is sincere about instituting democratic reforms that could lead to an end of its civil war with the U.S.-backed Contras.

Reagan planned to use a speech to the Organization of American States today, however, to express hope of bringing Nicaragua "into the embrace of freedom" despite what he considers a poor track record of adherence to past promises.

"The OAS is where this all started with regard to the Sandinistas and their 1979 promises of democracy," said a senior administration official commenting on the eve of Reagan's speech. "So it's a good place for the United States to go back and discuss prospects for democracy there."

## No Bribes For Zaccaro Witness

NEW YORK (UPI) — A cable television company employee testified he did not think John Zaccaro was asking for a bribe when he said "a substantial amount of money" could help gain the cable franchise for the borough of Queens.

But Richard Flynn, attorney for Cablevision Systems Corp., testified Tuesday in state Supreme Court in Queens that he did believe Zaccaro "was speaking about an unlawful payment."

Flynn was scheduled to return to the witness stand today in the extortion trial of Zaccaro, 54, the husband of Geraldine Ferraro, the 1984 Democratic vice presidential candidate and a former Queens congresswoman.

## Ulcer Re-Postpones Swearing-In

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (UPI) — William Sessions, incapacitated a second time in as many weeks with an ulcer, will be hospitalized for at least five days, delaying again his swearing in as director of the FBI, his doctor says.

Dr. Richard Rubio, Sessions' private physician, said the 57-year-old federal judge was admitted to Methodist Hospital at 1:03 p.m. EDT Tuesday after being re-evaluated earlier in the day. He was in satisfactory condition Tuesday night and "resting comfortably," Rubio said.

Last Thursday, Sessions was hospitalized in Washington for a bleeding ulcer shortly after he arrived for his swearing-in ceremony.

# Committee Recommends That Senate Nays Bork Nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John Breaux, joining the growing ranks of Southern Democrats today he will vote against confirmation of Robert Bork to the Supreme Court, but President Reagan and White House allies claimed they can still rescue the nomination.

With key Republicans and Democrats urging Reagan to give up the battle, Senate Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas said he might confer with Bork today about the possibility of the judge withdrawing his own name.

"It's a possibility," conceded a subdued Dole after the Senate Judiciary Committee voted 9-5 Tuesday for a recommendation that its colleagues reject the Bork nomination.

"(Bork) told me he wanted me to continue to look at the options and he wanted me to get back to him tomorrow," Dole said in a television interview. "I told him it looks pretty grim, and I think he shares that view."

Breaux, D-La., in brief Senate remarks, announced his position and urged Reagan to "go back and look again" for a Supreme Court nominee and "send us the best you can."

The freshman senator became the fifth Southern Democrat to declare against Bork and was one of the dwindling number of senators the White House was counting on to salvage the nomination. Committee Chairman Joseph Biden, D-Del., said the full Senate would take up the nomination no later than

# Trident-2 Missile Launched

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — A Trident-2 submarine missile carrying a dummy warhead blasted off Tuesday from a ground launch pad to chalk up the seventh successful test flight of the Navy's most powerful nuclear warhead.

The three-stage, \$23.7 million missile blasted off from the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station at 1:02 p.m. EDT and streaked through a partly cloudy sky and out of sight leaving a twisting contrail of exhaust in its wake.

"It was declared a complete success," said an Air Force spokesman.

As with all such test firings, no details were provided about how far the dummy warhead flew or where it landed in the Atlantic Ocean.

The maximum range of a solid-fuel Trident-2 missile is believed to be about 6,900 miles depending on the number of warheads carried. The missiles are thought to be capable of carrying 10 to 15 independently targetable warheads.

The 126,000-pound missiles, built by Lockheed Missiles and Space Co., are thought to be so accurate they can deliver a nuclear warhead to within about 400 feet of target.

The launching was the seventh in a series of 20 planned test firings scheduled before deployment aboard Ohio-class nuclear submarines begins in late 1989. All test firings to date have been successful.

The Navy plans to build 384 Trident-2s by 1996. Eight Ohio-class subs, each equipped with 24 missile tubes, are currently operational and a ninth was launched late last year. Five other Ohio-class boats are under construction and funds to begin work on two more were authorized in the fiscal 1987 budget for a total of 16.

## Democrats Penalize Two States

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Democratic Party moved Tuesday to take stiff disciplinary action against Minnesota and South Dakota for defying party rules governing selection of their 1988 presidential delegates.

All six Democratic National Committee members from Minnesota and the four from South Dakota were stripped of their delegate status to the Atlanta convention, which begins July 18, by a resolution passed unanimously by the party rules committee.

The complete DNC was expected to give final approval Wednesday.

The two states also were barred from participating in selecting hotel rooms and convention floor space. They will have to settle for those accommodations left after the other states and jurisdictions make their choices.

The DNC's Compliance Assistance Commission, which has authority over enforcing the rules, will hear a final appeal from Minnesota but is expected to reject any delay or softening of the penalties.

In the first disciplinary action the party has taken in recent years against a state for breaking party rules, the national

party retaliated because Minnesota scheduled its caucus and South Dakota set its primary for Feb. 23.

In a move to tighten the nominating schedule, the party banned all such polling before March 8, except for such traditional events as the Iowa caucus and the New Hampshire primary.

Most actions taken against states by the Democratic Party in the past involved civil rights.

The exception was in 1972 when the Illinois delegation was unseated because of the illegal state-making tactics used by the late Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago to deny seats to legitimate opposition factions in the party.

In the past two presidential elections, the party has threatened to act against states that did not follow the delegate selection rules. But each time the party backed down and allowed the exceptions.

Before Minnesota and South Dakota can be seated at the 1988 convention in Atlanta, they must get approval from the convention credentials committee.

The two states most likely will receive that approval because the presidential candidates, who by that time will control the delegates, will not want

threat to veto the package, the Legislature might have to return to Tallahassee later this fall or winter. Lawmakers are scheduled to meet again in November to take up the malpractice insurance crisis. But Martinez is reluctant to bring the tax controversy into the highly complex and tightly contested malpractice debate.

Rep. Art Grindie, R-Altamonte Springs, said he hopes the issues will be over by Friday when he is due back in Seminole County for fund-raising activities.

The compromise would repeal the tax effective Jan. 1 unless voters choose to retain it in a special election this winter. If the services tax is repealed, the sales tax on goods would be increased to 5.5 cents on the dollar. Martinez has proposed the half-cent increase to avoid

massive budget cuts.

The package leaves untouched the one cent local sales tax increase available to county commissions through referendum. Martinez wants to reduce the local option tax to one half cent, but would allow counties to raise the money without a referendum. Lawmakers were also considering removing the referendum requirement.

The services tax was approved at Martinez' urging in April and has been in effect since July 1. By extending the 5 percent sales tax on goods to services, state leaders hoped to stabilize Florida's tax base to cope with heavy population growth through the rest of this century.

The service tax is expected to raise about \$750 million this year and more than \$1 billion each subsequent year.

National advertisers, broadcasters and some newspapers launched a massive public relations campaign against the levy,

including television attacks tax supporters call wildly misleading and "lies." Public opposition to the tax has run as high as 80 percent.

STOP, a Miami-based citizen group says it has collected 150,000 signatures in its drive to put the question of a service sales tax on a statewide referendum ballot.

Richard N. Friedman said Tuesday that regardless of what action the legislature takes STOP will assume the issue will surface again in April and by then the group will have enough signatures to challenge any service tax and place it up for referendum in November, 1988.

"It's a circus up in Tallahassee right now. I say circus because there are some people there trying to thwart the will of the people of Florida," he said, which is to scuttle the service tax.

## Acquitted Of Killing Priest

ORLANDO (UPI) — A jury deliberated four hours to end a weeklong trial before acquitting a Delray Beach man of a first-degree murder charge in the killing of a Brevard County priest.

David Feciakonis, 24, was found innocent Tuesday of stabbing to death Louis Bamundo, the associate pastor at St. Teresa's Catholic Church in Titusville. His body was found dumped in a parking lot in the hub of Orlando's adult entertainment district.

Feciakonis' attorney, Dan Perry, maintained throughout

the trial his client was the victim of mistaken identity in a sensational case in which witnesses testified the priest visited a topless bar, an adult bookstore-peep show and a known homosexual entertainment complex the night of his murder, Sept. 23, 1986.

Perry argued Timothy Howard, a 24-year-old Feciakonis look-alike, committed the murder. Howard was arrested but later released and remains a fugitive on a warrant charging him with robbing a store three days after the priest's death.

## Jailed Man Falls Victim To Car Thief

Michael Edward Fedora, 33, of Sanford, fell victim to a car thief while Fedora was in jail himself Tuesday evening.

Fedora was charged for allegedly passing a fake prescription at Medco Drug Store in the Pine Crest Shopping Center, U.S. Highway 17-92, Sanford, at about 5:50 p.m. Tuesday. He left his car at the shopping center while he was transported to jail.

After Fedora was released on \$1,000 bond, he returned to the shopping center at about 10:45 p.m. and found that his 1974 Chevrolet valued at \$800 had been stolen. He reported the loss to Sanford police and told police that the car had been locked but that he had left the keys inside.

The car had been parked near Medco Drug Store, where Fedora is accused of passing a fake prescription for Tylenol 4, a controlled drug. A pharmacist reported the suspect forgery of a prescription to police.

When Fedora was charged with attempting to obtain a controlled substance by fraud, he left his car behind at the shopping center. It was gone when he returned after about a four-hour stay in jail.

Fedora is scheduled to appear in court Oct. 26. —Susan Ledon

## Family Homes Account For Most Permits

Lake Mary reported that 43 separate building permits worth \$1,385,418 in new construction, additions and improvements to property and buildings were issued during September. The city received fees totaling \$5,381.15 from the permits.

The highest number of permits for the month came from the building of single family homes in the city. A total of 19 permits were issued for new residences amounting to a value of \$1,203,758. The city earned \$4,322.85 in fees from the single family homes category. Calton Homes, Maitland, led the city in the number of permits given in the category with nine.

The city gave 30 permits for miscellaneous building in the residential category in September totaling \$137,458. Fees received by Lake Mary for that money amounted to \$834.35.

The miscellaneous category includes such items as constructing swimming pools, building garages or installing gutters. New swimming pools topped the list of permits in that category with 12 new ones being applied for by residents and city residents.

No permits for commercial construction were applied for last month, but the city granted four permits for miscellaneous commercial construction. The city got \$223.95 from the four projects' \$44,200 worth.

August figures showed the city issued permits totaling \$1,584,138. Lake Mary charged those applying \$6,134.65 in permit fees on that amount.

City Planner Matthew West said building permits stayed "fairly steady" during September. "I was shocked one day when we didn't have any permits," he said.

According to West, the city soon will start having to issue permits on an even larger scale because of the Timucuan development. "They came in the other day for their first permit for a single family home," West said. "They're going to be building 1,100 homes in the city, maybe a little less."

West said the Timucuan development project would cause a dramatic impact on the population of Lake Mary.

## Your Level Best Sometimes Not Enough To Win

There is one area in trying to teach or coach tennis that is very, very difficult to explain. Most tennis players do not understand it. In fact, many look at you like you have rocks in your head when you try to explain it.

It is called levels of the game. Levels of the game actually means the thousands of different stages that tennis players reach in their years of playing the game.

From the first level where the player is just trying to learn the basics to the top level occupied by the Lendl, Beckers and Connors of the tennis world.

Between the two are literally thousands and thousands of levels. Even on the beginning level we might find many, many degrees of beginners. It is true also on the top level, with maybe 500 players up there at varying degrees.

Confusing? You bet it is, but in really coming to an understanding of the game one must come to an understanding of the levels of the game.

Over and over I have students ask me... "Why can't I ever beat my friend? We are the same age, I'm as strong and as quick as he is, and I practice every day, yet I can never beat him."

Why? The answer to that question is that he is on a higher level than you. Probably two or three levels higher. If this is true then there is simply no way to beat the person who is a couple of levels above you.

Oh, if the person was injured or chose not to try, then you might win, but all things being equal, the person on the higher level will win every time. It may be 6-4, 6-4 (if the higher player wants it to be), but the final results will not vary.

What determines your level? Well, to be honest with you it is many, many things, but one of the most important is control of the ball. To put the ball where you want it, when you want to, and with varying degrees of spin and pace.

This is the key to reaching a high level. Really good players hit what is called a "heavy" ball. This is a ball that is hit deep, hard and with lots of spin. It always seems to get behind a lesser player and always keeps the opponent off stride, rushed and out of position.

An average player will probably be steady but will not hit the ball with enough pace. His ball is easy to get to and easy to come in on. Average players cannot hit the big serve in a tight situation and have trouble coming up with the good passing shot under pressure.

The novice player is still trying to learn to just get some balls in the court and is probably years away from worrying about the depth and pace.

Of course, it helps a lot if you are athletic. The higher level your athletic ability, the higher level you can reach in tennis. It is sad but true that a poor athlete will be a poor tennis player; an average athlete will be an average player; and a good athlete can be a good tennis player if he works hard at the game.

Connors, McEnroe and the other great players are superior athletes who have worked hard all their lives to become superior tennis players.

The mind, emotions and desire to be good, are areas that we must consider when talking about levels of the game. Many good athletes have become great tennis players because they were so "mentally tough."

On the other hand, thousands of good to superior athletes never reach their potential level because they do not have it "in the heart" or "between the ears."

It is possible to move up or down on the levels depending on how hard we work, how much we study the game, the level of competition we play and our relative age or health. There is a level for all of us when we simply cannot move up anymore.

The good thing about this game, though, is that most of us are too stubborn to accept it and keep trying to move up.

## Mathews Relieves Pressure Cardinals' Substitute Starter Stops Giants With Arm, Bat

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — The twitch in Danny Cox's neck is nagging Whitey Herzog.

Cox was scratched as the Cardinals starter Tuesday in the opening game of the National League Championship Series against the San Francisco Giants. St. Louis Manager Herzog chose to start rookie Greg Mathews, who allowed three runs on four hits in 7 1-3 innings and slapped a two-run single to lift the Cardinals to a 5-3 victory.

Cox is taking heat treatments for the stiffness on the left side of his neck and, depending on how he responds, he could be ready for Game 3 of the best-of-seven series Friday night in San Fran-

cisco. "If Cox can't pitch Friday, (Joe) Magrane will go," Herzog said. "I'm leaning to Mathews for Sunday."

Mathews' performance took some pressure off the Cardinals, who elected to go with just eight pitchers on the 24-man roster in favor of position players because of injuries to Jack Clark, Jim Lindeman and Willie McGee.

Herzog was forced to use Todd Worrell and Ken Dayley in relief Tuesday, but a solid performance from John Tudor against Dave Dravecky in today's Game 2, an off-day Thursday and a little luck with Cox could leave the Cardinals in good shape. "Danny is a gamer and if he

Even Kelly concedes Detroit should be favored in the series, although he also adds it doesn't bother him.

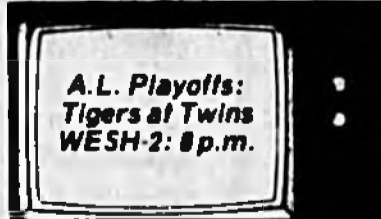

## 1-On-1: Donlan, Upshaw

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The chief negotiators for NFL players and management will resume contract talks today after side-stepping the key issue of free agency during a five-hour meeting aimed at ending the two-week-old players' strike.

Management Council Executive Director Jack Donlan and Players Association Executive Director Gene Upshaw discussed only two ancillary issues in a session from 5:30 to 10:30 p.m. EDT Tuesday at an undisclosed location in the Washington area.

"Free agency was not discussed," Management Council spokesman Peter Ruocco said in a statement. "Discussion centered on two minor issues — club fines and player discipline. Donlan indicated he believed resolution of the outstanding issues will take considerable time."

Ruocco said one-on-one talks between Upshaw and Donlan will resume today.

Little disagreement is seen in the two issues discussed. Management has proposed the first increases in club fines since 1977 and maintaining the Commissioner's broad authority in disciplining players.

Tuesday night's session marked the first formal contract talks since bargaining broke down Sept. 25 after Donlan said no resolution could be reached on the key issue of free agency.

But free agency, a player's ability to sell his services to other teams once his contract has expired, was avoided Tuesday night.

Earlier Tuesday, after a seven-hour meeting of the union representatives of the 28 clubs and about 30 other players in Rosemont, Ill., Upshaw hinted the union was willing to back off its demand for unrestricted free agency for players with at least four years experience in the league.

"We cannot let one single issue remain in the way of an agreement and I will not let it," he said.

The strike reaches its 16th day today. Striking players have until 1 p.m. EDT to report to clubs to be eligible for Sunday's scheduled non-union games.

At least 107 players have crossed picket lines since the strike started Sept. 22. Four-time Pro Bowl defensive end Howie Long and Los Angeles Raiders teammate defensive tackle Bill Pickel were among four players who crossed the picket line Tuesday. Long and Pickel reported to the Raiders facility in El Segundo, Calif. They crossed the picket line last week, but left camp on the urging of team owner Al Davis.

Doug Allen, the union's assistant executive director, said earlier Tuesday there is an outside chance the two sides will have an agreement by the weekend to replace the five-year contract that expired Aug. 31.

"That is humanly possible if management is totally committed to making sure that happens by negotiating in good faith, but we'll just have to see how it goes," Allen said.

Both sides apparently have formulated several new contract demands. Management is asking for a five-year contract rather than the previously agreed upon three-year deal; the players want the non-union games to be wiped from the standings and seek retroactive pay for striking players.

# 2 Trade In Avis

Lyman's Mike Whitaker and Victor Farrier traded in Avis rentals last week while John Curry, Jeff Blake, Sheldon Richards and Dan Ferris continued to drive a Hertz.

Whitaker, Lyman's hard-hitting linebacker, came up with 17 tackles Friday night to overtake Seminole's Earnie Lewis for the top spot in the county. Whitaker has 43 stops in three games for a 14.3 average.

Lewis, who had 13 stops Friday, has 55 tackles in four games for 13.8 average. Lake Mary's David Fencik (13.0) and Ferris (11.8) along with Lyman's John Scherpi (11.0) and Seminole's Ron Blake (11.0) and Steve Warren (11.0) are also in the hunt.

Farrier had both touchdowns in a 14-13 setback at Lake Howell. The two scores nudged the senior tailback ahead of Curry by one TD. Farrier's seven scores total 42 points. Curry has 36 and no one else is close. Lake Mary's Alex Birle leads the kick scoring, 16-15, over Seminole's J.J. Parlow.

Although Curry slipped to second in scoring, no one is making up much ground on the county's leading rusher. Curry's 510 yards easily lead teammate Ray Williams and Seminole's Jerod Jones. Both have 302. Curry moved ahead of Lake Howell freshman Marquette Smith in rushing average, 7.8 to 7.0.

Jeff Blake, too, has a comfortable lead in passing yardage despite two subpar performances the past Fridays. Blake has 587 yards compared to Lake Mary's Carlos Harshfield's 345. Blake has thrown twice the passes of the other quarterbacks, too. Blake's six TDs top the county as do Harshfield's seven interceptions.

Richards, despite sore ribs, holds onto his receiving lead. The sure-handed Rams' wideout has 11 catches for 216 yards. Seminole's Terrance Eady is next with 10 for 236. Eady's 23.6 average is tops. Lake Brantley's Derrick Sims (9/133) along with Oviedo's Alan Greene (8/104) and Seminole's Brandon Cash (8/84) are next in line. Greene's three touchdowns are tops.

Ferris, Lake Mary's cagey defensive end, picked up two more sacks to push his total to six. Oviedo strongman Emery Sneed collected a pair himself to give him five and keep the pressure on Ferris. Oviedo's Andy Palmer and Lake Howell's Greg Aatie

# Switzer: Charges Are 11-Years-Old

NORMAN, Okla. (UPI) — Barry Switzer, coach of the top-ranked Oklahoma Sooners, responded to recent allegations that football team members received illegal financial inducements by saying the school "doesn't buy players."

"Oklahoma doesn't buy players," Switzer said Tuesday at a weekly press luncheon. "When you buy players, they own you; you don't own them."

Switzer told reporters he and his staff do not arrange auto loans, sell game tickets or offer other illegal inducements to football players.

He said allegations made in a Dallas Morning News copyright story are out of date and do not reflect the university's current policy.

The newspaper carried on an investigation for months and came up "with a story that probably is 11-years-old," Switzer said. He said one of the people who contacted him "wrote the same story 11 years ago."

Switzer had previously told reporters he was "not so naive to think that boosters might not do favors for players."

"But I know nothing like that is orchestrated by anyone in the athletic department," he said.

Oklahoma quarterback Jamelle Hollaway and tight end Keith Jackson, who also met briefly with reporters Tuesday,

said they had never profited from ticket sales.

"I don't have any money in my pocket. I don't know anything about it," Jackson said.

"It shocked me," Hollaway said. "I wasn't here when that happened, so I don't know much about that situation. I never sold a ticket. I give mine to my family and my friends."

Switzer previously acknowledged that Sooners players sold their complimentary tickets prior to an NCAA rules change in 1982. He said under present policy, players do not receive tickets, but may submit names of a limited number of friends and relatives, who are given free tickets.

The newspaper alleged that some players netted as much as \$4,000 per season from sales of their complimentary tickets and some received preferential treatment on auto loans from a Norman bank.

# Emmitt Can't Run Enough To Save Gator SEC Hopes

GAINESVILLE — Watch Jane skip. See Jack jump. Run, Emmitt, run.

Even the running of "BIG E" was not enough to avenge the Gators' loss to LSU, 13-10, a damaging loss in the Southeastern Conference.

As it has been for the past four games, the Gator offense was almost all Emmitt Smith. The freshman tailback rambled for 184 yards on 32 carries, accounting for nearly half of Florida's 65 plays. Add Smith's four catches for 35 yards and he accounted for 219 of Florida's 284 net yards — 77 percent of the Gator offense.

While Smith was running his legs off, quarterback Merwin Bell turned in another subpar performance, completing only 12 of 23 passes for 104 yards and an interception. His longest pass was a 16-yarder to Smith.

It did not help that his receivers reverted to their pre-Mississippi State game antics. When the Gator wideouts celebrated against MSU, many believed that the pass drops of the first three games were a thing of the past. Many felt that Stacey Simmons and company were headed for the promised land (the end zone).

Guess again. Three passes were dropped, including two key third-down

passes that would have extended Gator drives into LSU territory. The worst thing about the dropped passes was where they hit receivers — in the hands.

With the loss, the Gators' SEC title (3-2 overall, 2-1 in SEC) hopes dimmed dramatically. To put it simply, they must go undefeated for the remainder of their SEC schedule to have any legitimate shot at the title. That schedule includes back-to-back away games against Auburn and Georgia later in the year.

Even if the Gators do go the rest of the way without a defeat, they must hope that another SEC team can help them out by beating defending champ LSU (4-0-1). Someone will also have to beat Tennessee along the way for Florida to come out on top.

Besides Emmitt, the only consistent force Florida has had on its side is a crushing defense. The defense has allowed just three touchdown passes in the last 47 quarters.

For the season, the Gator

defense has given up only four touchdowns (two rushing, two passing), including one touchdown run by LSU tailback Harvey Williams. That run did not occur before sophomore inside linebacker Pat Moorer had already forced a Williams fumble in the end zone early in the game. Junior free safety Louis Oliver recovered the fumble, preserving an early 3-0 Florida lead.

But no matter how long the defense kept the Gators in the game, the offense just could not punch the ball into the end zone late in the contest. A late Gator drive stalled deep in LSU territory, setting up an ill-fated field goal attempt by senior Robert McGinty.

So Gator fans can still see Emmitt run, but they probably won't be able to see the Gators snag an SEC trophy this season.

Well, wait until next year. Run, Emmitt, run.

**NOTES** — Freshman tailback Smith rushed 32 times for 184 yards, his fourth consecutive game with more than 100 yards, tying Jimmy DeBoe's school record set in 1975. Over the four games, Smith rushed for 890 yards, another UF record over a four-game period, breaking DeBoe's old mark of 874 yards. His 581 yards over the last three games is also a record, breaking DeBoe's record of 525 yards.

"We've overlapped maybe a week or 10 days, but never for this period of time," SOKC Director of Racing Tom Bowersox said. "I'm sure it's going to have some effect. It appears from records that we see, it has already lowered Seminole's handle."

Tom Blayney, general manager at Seminole, said when his track and Jai-alai went head to head in August, Seminole's handle was down "about \$50,000 per performance." SGP still doubled the fronton's attendance and handle on occasion.

"But when Jai-alai closed (Sept. 4), we did not pick up \$50,000," Blayney said Tuesday. "On the other hand, the month of September is traditionally a bad month. When the Daytona Kennel Club closed last

Wednesday, though, our Thursday handle picked up immediately."

SOKC Chairman of the Board Jerry Collins has always been against extra dates. "Once you get greedy, you get needy," Collins has said time after time.

After discussing the extra dates, however, Bowersox said it would have been a poor business move not to expand with the others. "They would have given them to someone," he said.

Blayney said the days of the convenient three-way split are probably gone forever. "The good days are gone," he said. "It's up to us to do an effective job of marketing to get new bettors and also keep our present customers satisfied."

NOTES — General Manager Santi Echaniz said 80 percent of the fronton's roster has been playing at Big Bend. "The rest have been practicing here," he said. "They are in good shape and ready to go."

houses per acre (three houses per two acres) of developable land, which means land below the 100-year flood level, used for roads or easements or otherwise undevelopable could not be considered in figuring the ratio of houses to acres.

It also includes a requirement for documentation of lot sizes and soil types to support a plan to install septic tanks if a central sewer system is not available.

The committee is also to decide whether the proposed zoning classification will include provisions to allow clustered housing, which would allow houses to be built closer together than the maximum of two houses per three acres in parts of a development as long as the developer meets other special requirements concerning the amount of open space in the development.

In the draft code, county staff suggested requiring 15 percent of the development be open space if lots were 3/4-acre, 25

percent open space if lots were a half-acre, and 50 percent open space if lots were a quarter-acre.

Much of the committee's discussion centered on the state code relating to septic tanks and the county's plans for central sewer and water service for areas that do not now have such service.

Part of the committee's charge is to decide if there is infrastructure available or planned to support a higher density of residential development in the areas of the county which would be eligible for the new zoning classification. The county's road development plans for those areas will be presented at a future meeting.

Rick Salemi of the state health department, charged with enforcing septic tank rules, outlined those rules, which include sewage flow limited to 1,500 gallons per day with a private well and 2,500 gallons per day with a public water system, a minimum of 42 inches of dry soil under the bottom of the tank during the wettest time of year and a 75-foot setback from a private well or any wetlands or open water.

County Manager Ken Hooper said Seminole County only allows septic tanks in good percolating soils, and requires that they be placed on lots which have at least one acre of dry soil.

Committee member Rudy Sloan said he thinks the state minimum standards are too lenient. He said the 75-foot setback from wells might not be enough in clustered housing, citing information provided by Salemi that the average septic tank usually has a failure within five to seven years after it is installed.

kind of language it uses, I can't say much about the booklet," he said.

Williams said he feels there's a definite need for students to know the basic facts about AIDS. "It's a dangerous disease," he said.

The booklet was released on the same day that doctors from the National Institutes of Health reported that far less than 1 percent of hospital workers who accidentally jab themselves with AIDS-contaminated needles will probably become infected with the virus.

The 28-page booklet, "AIDS and the Education of our Children," was released less than one week after the Department of Health and Human Services launched a nationwide AIDS information and prevention campaign that includes the initial distribution of 45 million AIDS brochures.

Written by Bennett and his staff, the Education Department booklet explains AIDS, urges use of clear moral standards to help children resist social pressures and lists other sources of AIDS information.

In discussing condoms, Bennett admitted the booklet represents a thaw in relations with Surgeon General C. Everett Koop of the Public Health Service.

For months Bennett and Koop had been at odds over use of condoms with Bennett insisting on strict abstinence and monogamy without any mention of condoms and Koop agreeing with abstinence but insisting on instructing sexually active schoolchildren on how to protect themselves.

"We are much closer to agreement than ever before," said Bennett, stressing "on the main points, we are all in essential agreement."

Although condoms are discussed, Bennett focuses mostly on the negative aspect of the contraceptive, noting condoms "provide some but by no means complete protection from the AIDS virus" and they "can and do fail." The booklet said any discussion of condoms "must not undermine the importance of restraint and responsibility in the minds of young people."

As for children with AIDS in schools, the booklet urged community officials to keep confidential medical information about persons with AIDS and to isolate only those infected children who clearly may infect other children, such as through open wounds or lesions.

Adolescents are at risk of contracting AIDS, said the booklet, because sexual activity increases dramatically during the teenage years, contributing greatly to high rates of contracting sexually transmitted diseases.

Researchers from The NIH said they estimate the risk of infection for health care workers who have suffered on-the-job accidents is approximately 0.13 percent.

Only three health care workers in the United

States are believed to have become infected with the AIDS virus after cutting or jabbing themselves with needles used to draw AIDS patients' blood, according to a federal Centers for Disease Control spokesman in Atlanta.

Dr. David Henderson, a researcher at the NIH, said a new study of NIH employees who handle AIDS-contaminated blood indicates infection rate is very low.

Of the 1,020 workers studied, 332 had been jabbed with infected needles or had patients' blood splashed on open wounds, he said at an annual meeting of the American Society for Microbiology.

Five of 1,020 workers tested were infected with the AIDS virus, but none had experienced on-the-job accidents and all reported outside activities — such as homosexual encounters and intravenous drug use — that put them at risk of AIDS.

"It would appear none of the study sample had become infected through exposure to patients," said Dr. James Schmitt, another of the NIH researchers who worked on the study.

Sen. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., introduced a bill Monday to give \$623 million in federal funds to states that provide widespread testing for the AIDS virus and push abstinence to stop the spread of the disease.

Under the measure, federal money would help states pay for testing, counseling services, contact "tracing," health care planning, and educational programs that emphasize sexual abstinence as the primary way of preventing the spread of the disease.

"A reasonable, comprehensive national strategy against AIDS based on these two principles — caring and responsibility — must include detection, prevention, education, treatment and research," Kemp, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, said in a statement.

Under the Kemp bill, federal matching funds would go to states that provide mandatory or routine testing for those who donate blood, semen or organs; for those who receive health care for substance abuse or any sexually transmitted disease; for inmates in state prisons; for those admitted to a hospital between the ages of 15 and 50; and those applying for marriage licenses.

Matching funds also would be provided to states that provide counseling to AIDS patients.

Kemp's measure, which would provide \$623 million to the states over three years, is seen as a Republican alternative to a \$1.2 billion proposal by Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., chairman of the House Health and Environment Subcommittee.

The subcommittee is scheduled to take up Waxman's bill Wednesday. That three-year measure would provide federal funding to the states for voluntary testing and AIDS counseling, would ban discrimination against people infected with the AIDS virus and would provide for a civil penalty of up to \$2,000 for unauthorized disclosure of names or other information from AIDS testing records.

## Cook Of The Week Native Daughter's Artistic Flair Shows Up In Her Deliciously Different Recipes

Born with sand in her shoes, our Cook of the Week, Jean Marcel of Sanford, is still a native Floridian through and through and can recall when a streetcar or bus took folks anywhere in her hometown of Tampa "for a nickel or a dime. There weren't too many cars in those days, and Tampa was a pretty good sized city," she says.

"When we were young, my mother played the piano and my dad played the banjo ukule and we used to sing with friends in the evening," says Mrs. Marcel. "That was our main entertainment, and we had a lot of fun." Fishing and swimming were another form of entertainment that our cook will never forget. "We swam in the lakes and at Sulphur Springs," she says, "which is cooold!" Being the smallest in her class with blonde hair, our cook was usually chosen to be an angel in her elementary school operettas, and to this day she has kept her petite frame in top form with healthful cooking habits.

Turkey is a frequent item on the Marcel menu for its taste and versatility, besides being an excellent source of protein, and it's good for you. "As a child," says Mrs. Marcel, "I ate turkey at Thanksgiving and Christmas and, as a young mother with a freezer, I began serving turkey five or six times a year because it was easy to prepare, could be frozen to use later in a variety of recipes, and everyone seemed to enjoy eating it. And reheating turkey and dressing in the microwave oven of today makes the leftovers even tastier."

Mrs. Marcel's talented parents had a profound influence on their daughter's abilities to cook and sew in preparation for homemaking and motherhood. "I began teaching myself to sew and by the time I was 12, I had made many of my own clothes," she says, "and Dad taught me to use his commercial machines. Dad designed and made stage settings and costumes for the Amusement Corporation of America for several years before World War II. He and I made

beautiful Halloween costumes from fabrics on hand — velvets, satins, brocades, etc. — and I had unlimited fabrics to use for my evening gowns."

Her father traveled extensively in his work, and the family went with him as much as possible until it was time to start school in the fall. "We had a small house-car trailer," she says, "and often parked in someone's yard because there were few campgrounds available in the '30s and early '40s. Mother always checked with the chamber of commerce in each city to find out what there was to see and do and we visited museums, factories, parks and many other places. Mother did all of our cooking on a 2-burner

Coleman stove and used an ice box! One summer we picked wild asparagus growing along the highway, and it was delicious."

In 1939, Mrs. Marcel and her family put their car and trailer on a Canadian Pacific Railroad flatcar several times. "We rode inside the trailer as we traveled for almost two months in northwest Canada," she says. "The highlights of that trip were the Calgary Exhibition and stampee with Indians living in teepees, the Royal Mounted Police, chuck wagon races, log rolling contests, and much more. When Mother asked a clerk what kind of tea made good iced tea, he told her he had never tasted any. So, she asked what kind

made good HOT tea. At the Canadian fairs there were booths where hot water could be bought for making tea!"

In the fall of 1939, her parents decided to stay in Atlanta for the winter so that she and her brothers could see snow. "And they weren't disappointed!" says Mrs. Marcel. "That year they had the heaviest snowfall in over 60 years, and a beautiful ice storm in December." That same month, the premier of "Gone With The Wind" was held in Atlanta and they were fortunate to see about 20 Hollywood stars, "including Vivian Leigh and Clark Gable," she adds.

Hillsborough High School," says Mrs. Marcel. "we learned first hand about war. Tampa changed dramatically when thousands of men and women, representing all branches of the service, were stationed there. Shipyards worked constantly, we had air raid drills with citywide blackouts, war bond rallies, and rationing of tires, gas, clothing and food. Our neighborhood bakery would decorate a cake if the customer provided the sugar! Over 125 of her classmates were killed in action during those war years and several of her close friends were widowed while still in their teens. "Still," she says, "we danced often, entertained the troops, and formed many lasting friendships. We have also had class reunions in Tampa every five years."

When Mrs. Marcel met her husband, Gene, his family had moved to Orlando from Lynbrook, Long Island. "We met in Maitland," says Mrs. Marcel, "and three days later I told my parents we were going to get married! About three months later, we were among the first couples to be married in the outdoor chapel at the Maitland Research Studio, now the Maitland Art Center, and the carillon bells were played for us."

Now retired, her husband Gene worked in the communications department of the railroad for 30 years. "We enjoyed living in Maitland, Mulberry and Lakeland when they were very small towns," she says. "Gene was a scoutmaster and took 30-plus boys camping every month and even let them camp in our side yard once when one of our babies was due any day. He taught the boys how to cook over a campfire they had made, and almost every Saturday some of the Scouts prepared our lunch over a campfire in our yard — to earn a cooking merit badge."

"Many newlyweds are told about 'mother's cooking,'" Mrs. Marcel continues, "but Gene told me about the delicious meals his two grandmothers prepared — without recipes. My mother made at least one cake every Saturday, and fried chicken for Sunday dinner. She also fried the bass Dad caught often in the nearby lakes." For special meals, her family enjoyed the Spanish restaurants in the Ybor City area of Tampa, says Mrs. Marcel.

"We have four children," says

our cook, "and over the years 10 other people, family members and friends have lived with us, one or two at a time. And Gene often brought out-of-town railroad co-workers home for lunch or dinner with little notice. At one time, my mother asked if we were running a hotel!" Mrs. Marcel found that almost everyone liked turkey. "It was easy to fix, and inexpensive for a crowd," she says, "so we had it often. We always had the children eat at the table with us and often by candlelight." During this period, recalls Mrs. Marcel, they were also busy remodeling their "ramshackled house" they had bought as a challenge.

Both of Mrs. Marcel's sons are in the Navy on fast attack nuclear submarines. "Aiden has 23 years' service," says Mrs. Marcel, "and is working toward 30. He is a Command Master Chief and COB (Chief of the Boat) on the USS Fargo, operating out of Connecticut. Glenn has been in for six years and is first class on the USS Phoenix operating out of Virginia. They both are responsible for the submarine computer systems on their respective boats. Aiden explained to me that the Navy has SHIPS, but the submariners call their BOATS!" Mrs. Marcel adds that it has been extremely interesting to visit the different boats their sons have been assigned to. As parents of crew members, they have been privileged to tour a ballistic missile Polaris sub, a Poseidon sub, a Trident sub and a fast attack nuclear submarine. "We also boarded a World War II diesel boat, like the one Gene served on in the Pacific, while we were in Connecticut," she says. "What a difference!"

The Marceles' two daughters live in Florida. Lynette is office manager for her husband's law firm in Bradenton and they live in Key Royale on Anna Maria Island. Their daughter, Tara, lives in Orange City and is a respiratory therapist at Central Florida Regional Hospital in Sanford. "At the present time," says Mrs. Marcel, "Tara is working on the developmental phase of the pulmonary rehabilitation center scheduled to open soon."

"We don't have any in-laws," explains Mrs. Marcel. "When they got married, their spouses became part of the family." Aiden's wife is Marilee and they have three children, Kim, Denise and Missy. Glenn is married to Diana and they have a son, Christopher. "Lynette's husband's name is Michael," says Mrs. Marcel, "but we call him Mike." Daughter Tara and her husband, Mark, are the parents of Doug, Jeremy and Joshua. "We try to keep up with our children," she says, "and try to get the whole family together about once a year."

Gene Marcel was transferred to Sanford in December, 1958, and his family followed in April, 1959. "When our youngest child was three weeks old," says our cook, "Gene believes in a full time wife and mother who doesn't work outside the home," says Mrs. Marcel, "however, I had his encouragement when I worked on a part-time basis with my parents in their interior decorating business in Maitland, and again when I organized the decorating department for J.C. Penney when the Winter Park Mall was built. Later, I opened my own interior decorating studio in Sanford. However, my family needed more of my time than I was able to give and we decided to close the business."

The most challenging work Mrs. Marcel ever did was following through on her mother's idea. "When Maitland Civic Center was built, Mother offered to furnish the velvet stage drape," she explains. "She and my brother, Jack, would supply the fabric — and I would make it! I had never made one before, but I couldn't let my mother down. With Gene's help in lifting and turning the heavy fabric, I DID make the stage drape and it was dedicated in the memory of my Daddy. He would have been proud."

The Marceles have enjoyed camping over the years and for their annual vacations they set up tents in various Florida state parks. "Our older son was in the navy then," says Mrs. Marcel, "so I expected to take only three children. However, Gene suggested we let each child take a friend! I finally agreed to try it, and found we had a much more enjoyable time."

While her children were still in school, Mrs. Marcel worked as treasurer/manager for the ACL Employees Federal Credit Union on a part-time schedule, while her husband was re-elected to the office of president for 18 years. Later, she helped her brother at his Maitland office, the National Real Estate Exchange, keeping books on some of his properties and running confidential computer programs for his clients.

These days, the Marceles are enjoying every minute of their retirement. Mrs. Marcel's inter-

est in photography has won her the "Best in Show" award at the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs District 7 Art Festival held in Orlando last year. Her entry was a striking photograph of her brother's sailboat at sunrise. She is an active member of the Woman's Club of Sanford.

She loves gardening and prizes her Bird of Paradise and an enormous Staghorn Fern which has been well nurtured for several years. Her showy bloodlilies add a colorful touch to the native greenery in the Marceles' lush garden. Our cook likes any hobby that is art-related, and together with her husband, she often scans the antique shops and garage sales looking for collectibles.

Good cooks love to entertain and Mrs. Marcel is no exception. According to her husband, his favorite dish is lemon barbecue chicken. She also excels in the making of lasagna and veal scallopine. Several of her cake recipes are deliciously different and are all-time favorites that she learned from her mother. And, of course, there's the turkey. "I have always enjoyed trying new recipes," she says, "even though my family prefers eating their time-tested favorites. And I do like using my microwave, but I still prefer to cook from scratch."

Listed below is a selection from Jean Marcel's recipe file:

### LEMON-BBQ CHICKEN

1 young broiler, about 2 pounds or less. Chicken may be split in two or cut into individual pieces. If split chicken is used, make a compact serving by breaking the joints. Do this by bending, but do not cut. Pull the leg and wing close to the body and use skewers to hold in place.

To give the broilers the wonderful lemon-barbecue flavor, marinate them in the sauce (below) for about an hour before broiling. Shake off excess sauce and place the chicken in the broiler pan, NOT on the rack, cut side up. Place the broiler pan approximately 6 inches from the heat source.

If necessary, reduce the broiler heat so the chicken cooks slowly and thoroughly without burning. Use remaining lemon-barbecue sauce to brush the chicken during broiling, and turn every 10 minutes or so. Broil 40 minutes, or until both sides of the chicken are well browned and the flesh is tender. If individual pieces are used, add the wings and back pieces after the first 10 minutes of broiling as they take less time to cook.

Serve well done on a hot platter. Spoon some of the sauce left in the broiler pan over the chicken. Chopped parsley sprinkled on top will give a colorful touch.

### LEMON-BBQ SAUCE

1 small clove garlic (or 1/2 teaspoon prepared chopped garlic)  
1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1/2 cup lemon juice (fresh or bottled)  
2 tablespoons chopped onion  
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper  
1/2 teaspoon dried thyme  
Mash garlic clove with salt in a bowl. Stir in remaining ingredients. If possible, allow sauce to stand overnight to blend flavors. Makes 1/2 cup.

### VEAL SCALLOPINE

Approximately 1 pound veal, cut into 1-inch squares  
1/2 cup flour, seasoned to taste with salt and pepper  
1 medium sliced onion  
1/2 cup cooking oil, to cover bottom of frying pan  
1/2 cup sliced fresh mushrooms  
1 can (16 ounces) tomatoes  
1 teaspoon sugar  
Shake veal and seasoned flour together in plastic bag to coat the veal. Sauté onion in hot oil until tender. Remove onion from frying pan and set aside. Sauté veal in oil until golden brown on all sides. Return onion to frying pan and add remaining ingredients. Cover and simmer until veal is tender, approximately 1 1/2 hours. If desired, place all ingredients into a covered casserole to bake in a 350° oven for 1 1/2 hours. Serve over boiled white rice. Serves 4-6.

### PORK CHOPS AND RICE

pork chops (use one chop per

serving)  
washed, uncooked white rice  
1 large sliced onion  
1 green pepper, sliced or chopped  
salt and pepper to taste  
1 can (16 ounces) tomatoes or tomato sauce  
water as needed

Brown pork chops on both sides in ungreased frying pan. Put one large handful of rice on top of each pork chop, plus one or two extra handfuls "for the pot." Add onion, green pepper, salt and pepper. Pour tomatoes over contents and add water to cover. Cover frying pan and simmer gently for approximately 3 hours. Add water as needed to keep moist. If desired, use this same procedure to place ingredients into a covered casserole. Bake at 325° for 1 1/2 hours.

### CELERY STUFFING

1 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup butter or oleo, melted  
3 cups chopped celery  
2 (teaspoons salt (optional))  
1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 teaspoons poultry seasoning  
2 quarts bread cubes  
Sauté onion in 3 tablespoons of the butter. Combine with remaining ingredients. Mix well. Spoon lightly into the crop and body cavities of a 10-12-pound turkey. Close body openings with skewers. Make half of this recipe to stuff a 5-6-pound chicken or capon. I always cooked a 22-25-pound turkey and doubled this recipe. Because of the longer cooking time, it is not necessary to sauté the onions or use quite as much butter when stuffing a larger turkey.

### CHOCOLATE CAKE WITH BAKED FROSTING

1/2 cup water  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda  
1/2 cup cocoa  
1/2 cup butter  
1 1/2 cups white sugar  
1 egg plus 2 egg yolks  
2 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup sour milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Mix the water, soda and cocoa in a small bowl; set aside to add later.

In a large mixing bowl, cream together the butter and white sugar. Add 1 whole egg plus 2 egg yolks. Set aside 2 egg whites for frosting. Mix well. Alternately add the cocoa mixture, the flour/salt mixture and the sour milk/vanilla mixture. Beat and blend well between each addition. Pour into a greased and floured oblong pan approximately 9x13 or 10x15 inches. Bake in a preheated 350° oven for 45 minutes. Spread cake with the frosting mixture and return to the oven for an additional 15 minutes.

### Frosting:

2 egg whites  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1 cup brown sugar  
Beat egg whites until stiff. Add baking powder and brown sugar. Beat again. Spread over cake. May be sprinkled with nuts if desired. Cut into squares before serving. This frosting does not usually keep well after 2 days. However, it is so delicious it probably won't last that long!

### ICE CREAM STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup solid shortening  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 egg  
1 pint vanilla ice cream  
1 quart fresh strawberries, sliced and sweetened

Sift flour, sugar, baking powder and salt into mixing bowl. Drop in shortening. Add milk and vanilla and beat 150 strokes (1 1/2 minutes with mixer at low speed). Scrape bowl and spoon. Add egg and beat 150 strokes. Bake in greased 9-inch deep round layer pan in moderately hot oven (375°) for 25-30 minutes. Cool.  
Cut cake in half to make 2 layers. Spread lower half with vanilla ice cream and strawberries. Put other half on top and cover with remaining strawberries. Cut in wedges and serve immediately. Serves 8.

# Oktoberfest Calls For Robust German Foods

Celebrate October with Oktoberfest foods. The meals will be hearty and satisfying. With the return of cooler weather these heavier foods with robust flavors will be welcome.

The traditional long cooking times for most of these foods is cut in half when using the microwave oven for the cooking. The recipes in this column are designed for all types of microwave equipment, but the timings and procedures are for a 650-750 watt microwave oven with a carousel. If you have another type of oven with less wattage the timings will need to be adjusted.

Combine two German specialties in a one-dish meal.

## KRAUT AND BRATS

2 apples, cored and chopped  
1 medium onion, chopped  
2 tablespoons margarine  
1 can (16 ounces) sauerkraut  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 teaspoon caraway seeds  
1/2 cup white wine\*  
1/2 cup water  
1 pound smoked, fully cooked bratwurst\*  
Combine apples, onion, and margarine in a 2-quart casserole. Cover. Microwave on 100% power 5-6 minutes, or until tender. Drain kraut and add to onion along with brown sugar, flour and caraway. Mix to combine. Stir in white wine and water. Add brats, pressing into sauerkraut. Cover. M/W on 100% power 12-14 minutes or until heated through. Rearrange brats once.  
\* Apple juice can be substituted for the wine  
\* Wieners can be substituted for the bratwurst

For this German favorite, we use knockwurst and potatoes with a sweet and sour dressing.

## KNOCKWURST AND HOT GERMAN POTATO SALAD

3 medium potatoes  
3 slices bacon, diced  
3 small onions, diced  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1 teaspoon dry mustard  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1/4 cup water  
1/2 teaspoon celery seeds  
4 knockwurst  
1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley

Wash potatoes; dry and cut in half. Place in plastic bag, cut side down. Leave ends of bag open. Cook by microwave for 10 minutes or until tender. Remove skin and slice. Cook bacon and onion in 4-cup measure for 4 minutes. Stir in flour, sugar, mustard, salt and pepper; mix well. Add vinegar, water and celery seeds. Cook another 4 minutes, stirring once. Set aside. Make several cuts in plastic bag holding knockwurst. M/W on 100% power 3-5 minutes, or until heated through. Cut each into 6 pieces. Arrange meat and cooked potatoes in shallow bowl. Pour hot sauce over, toss to coat evenly. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.

Sweet and sour dressing is also good for beets, lettuce and green beans. Vegetables served in this manner are side dishes at a German meal.

## SWEET AND SOUR GREEN BEANS

4 slices bacon  
1 can green beans  
1 medium onion, sliced  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 cup vinegar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon white pepper  
Place bacon and onion in a 1-quart casserole. Cover and microwave on 100% power 4-5 minutes, or until onion is tender and bacon cooked, stirring once. Add sugar, vinegar, pepper and beans. M/W on 100% power 8-10 minutes or until heated through.

A rye bread with lots of caraway seed is usually served with a German meal. This batter bread bakes easily and quickly in the microwave oven.

## RYE BATTER BREAD

1 cup milk, scalded  
1/2 cup margarine  
1/8 cup brown sugar  
2 packages dry yeast  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1 cup warm water  
2 tablespoons caraway seeds  
3 cups all-purpose flour  
2 cups rye flour  
1 teaspoon caraway seeds  
1/2 cup wheat germ  
In large bowl, pour scalded milk over brown sugar, salt and butter. Cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add to milk mixture. Add 2 tablespoons caraway seeds and about half of each flour. Beat at medium speed for 2 minutes or until smooth. Add remaining flour and beat until

well blended, approximately 1-1/2 minutes. Cover bowl and let rise until double, approximately 45 minutes. Stir batter for half-minute. Grease a 2-quart casserole and coat with wheat germ, reserving 1/4 cup for the top. Turn dough into casserole, sprinkle with caraway seeds and wheat germ. Cook at 30% power (simmer) 18-19 minutes, or until top springs back when touched. Place a donut-shaped piece of foil over top during last two minutes of cooking (this absorbs some of the microwave and prevents over-cooking of the top of the bread). Set dish on heat-proof table top for 10 minutes. Turn out on table top.

Complete the German meal with some warm apple dessert, apple strudel or apple crisp.

## APPLE CRISP

1 cup brown sugar, packed  
1 cup flour  
1 cup oatmeal  
1/2 cup butter  
1/4 cup chopped walnuts  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 cups sliced apples  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
Combine brown sugar, flour, oatmeal, butter, nuts, and salt. Mix with a fork until crumbly. Spread half of this mixture into bottom of a 12x8-inch baking dish. Arrange apple slices over crumbs. Sprinkle with lemon juice if apples are not tart, then sprinkle with sugar-cinnamon mixture. Cover with remaining crumbs. M/W on 100% power for 18-20 minutes, or until apples are tender.  
Serve warm with whipped cream.  
MICROWAVE HINT: Test apples for doneness before the cooking time is complete. Some varieties cook faster than others.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — My husband had a heart attack three years ago. His doctor told him to take two Timolol daily. His heart rate is normally 80 to 85, sometimes in the 40s. Does he need the drug?

**DEAR READER** — I can't say whether, in your husband's specific case, the medicine is necessary. Timolol is classed as a non-selective beta-blocker. This means that the drug reduces the work of the heart by slowing the pulse and preventing spasm of the arteries feeding the heart muscle. However, it can cause heart failure, worsen emphysema and bring on asthma. Many experts recommend the use of beta-blockers after heart attack because the medicine seems to protect patients against further heart damage.

The risk/benefit ratio for your husband may be such that Timolol is appropriate for long-term use. His doctor is the logical person to discuss this with, inasmuch as the physician is the one who is most familiar with your husband's heart problem.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — What do you know about ophthalmology? It's when a person trained in the procedure looks at the lines in your eyes and tells you your ailment.

**DEAR READER** — Ophthalmology, which is most often called tridology or iridology, is a quack "science." No reputable study has shown that it is useful in diagnosing disease. Stay away from this scam; its primary purpose is to separate a person from his money.

Diseases are often manifest as eye changes. This fact forms the basis for the reputable medical subspecialty of ophthalmology. Such M.D. specialists are trained in the recognition and treatment of eye disorders. An ophthalmologist, working with the family doctor, is an important resource — totally the

It's a sad day for bridge justice when 23 high-card points, almost all in aces and kings, can take only three tricks against four spades doubled. Could something have been overlooked on defense?

South traded on favorable vulnerability when he jumped to three spades, and his partner went along with the gag by bidding four. Naturally East doubled, and West could not visualize his side making 11 or 12 tricks in hearts, so he passed.

East took the king of clubs and continued with the ace. South trumped, and crossed hearts and clubs until he had ruffed his third heart with the spade jack in dummy. By this time the remaining club in dummy was a winner. When he played the

club, East discarded a diamond, hoping that West could trump. Alas, West had no trumps and declarer was able to shed a diamond as the club held the trick. Now a diamond was led from dummy to East's king, and East tried to cash the ace. South ruffed and exited with a low spade, and East had to win and lead back into the declarer's A-Q. That was an ugly 10 tricks for declarer, but of course East was at fault for not ruffing the last club. (Surely South had a seven-bagger to jump to three spades.)

East was more at fault for not reading yesterday's column. Then he would have known at the second trick to lead back the king of spades. Try as he might, declarer must now lose five tricks and be set 300.

## Entertain The All-American Way

### Elegant Brunch Menu Of The '80s Takes Inspiration From The '30s

#### HIGH HAT CHEESE SOUFFLE

1/2 cup margarine  
1/2 cup flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 1/4 cups milk  
2 cups (8 ounces) shredded sharp natural cheddar cheese  
6 eggs, separated  
Melt margarine in saucepan over low heat. Blend in flour and seasonings. Gradually add milk, cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add cheese; stir until melted. Remove from heat. Gradually add beaten egg yolks; cool. Fold into stiffly beaten egg whites; pour into 2-quart souffle dish or casserole. Place peppers on rack of broiler pan. Broil until

all surfaces are charred. Place peppers in plastic bag; close tightly. Let stand 15 minutes. Peel off skin under cold running water. Remove stems and seeds; cut into strips. In 10-inch skillet, saute peppers, onions and basil in margarine 4 to 5 minutes or until tender. Place pepper mixture in blender container or food processor work bowl. Cover; process until smooth. Combine pepper mixture, half and half and salt in small saucepan. Cook, stirring occasionally, over medium heat until thoroughly heated. Yield: 1 1/2 cups

#### CRAB CAKES DELUXE

2 6-ounce packages frozen crabmeat, thawed, drained, flaked  
1 cup fresh bread crumbs  
1 egg, beaten  
2 tablespoons mayonnaise  
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion

1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons margarine  
Combine all ingredients except margarine; mix well. Shape into six patties. Brown in margarine 2 to 3 minutes or until golden brown, turning once. Yield: 6 servings

#### VEGETABLE SAUTE

2 tablespoons finely chopped onion  
2 tablespoons margarine  
2 cups julienne-cut summer squash  
1 pound asparagus spears, diagonally-cut into 2-inch pieces  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
In large skillet, saute onions in margarine until tender. Add remaining ingredients; cook 4 to 5 minutes or until crisp-tender. Yield: 6 servings

#### CINNAMON BITES

1/4 cup margarine  
1/4 cup milk  
1/2 cup water  
3 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 packages active dry yeast  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 egg

1/4 cup packed brown sugar  
1/4 cup granulated sugar  
2 tablespoons cinnamon  
1/4 cup margarine

1 cup sifted powdered sugar  
1 1/2 tablespoons milk

Heat margarine, milk and water over low heat until warm. Add combined 1 1/2 cups flour, 1/2 cup sugar, yeast and salt. Beat 2 minutes at medium speed on electric mixer. Add 1/2 cup flour and egg; beat 2 minutes at high speed. Stir in remaining 1 1/2 cups flour. (Dough will be sticky). Place in greased bowl; brush with additional margarine, melted. Cover; let rise in warm place until double in volume, about 45 minutes. Punch down dough. Remove half of dough; place on lightly floured surface. Roll to 15x12-inch rectangle.

Combine brown sugar, granulated sugar and cinnamon. Cut in 1/4 cup margarine until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle dough with half of sugar mixture. Cut in half lengthwise with knife. Roll up, starting at long end. Seal ends; cut each log into 20 slices. Place, cut side up, in greased 13x9-inch baking pan. Repeat with remaining dough. Cover; let rise until double in volume, about 45 minutes. Brush rolls with remaining margarine, melted. Bake at 350°, 20-25 minutes. Cool slightly.

Brush rolls with combined powdered sugar and milk. Cool. Yield: 8 1/2 dozen.

#### BANANA-PECAN GEMS

1/4 cup margarine  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 eggs, separated  
1/4 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1/2 cup mashed bananas  
1/2 cup chopped pecans

Beat margarine and 1/4 cup sugar until light and fluffy. Blend in egg yolks and vanilla. Add combined dry ingredients alternately with bananas, mixing well after each addition. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and 1/2 cup pecans. Spoon into 2-inch foil-lined mini baking cups, filling each cup 3/4 full. Sprinkle with combined remaining pecans and sugar. Place in shallow baking pan. Bake at 375° 15-20 minutes or until wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool. Yield: Approximately 2 dozen.

#### SUNSHINE BISCUITS

2 cups flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
3 tablespoons sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup Parkay margarine  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup pure 100% unsweetened pasteurized orange juice  
1 egg, beaten

# Pork And Sauerkraut Favorite Combination In Cool Weather

Pork and sauerkraut are a favorite cool-weather combination. Today pork is leaner, with less fat on the cuts. Broil chops, and top with sauerkraut and sour cream for a quick dinner, but be sure not to overcook.

#### HUNGARIAN PORK CHOPS

1 1/2 teaspoons paprika  
1/2 teaspoon onion powder  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
4 pork loin chops, cut 1-inch thick  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup sauerkraut, rinsed and well-drained  
1/2 cup dairy sour cream

Combine paprika, onion powder and pepper. Rub mixture evenly on both sides of chops. Place chops on rack in broiler pan so surface of meat is 3 to 5 inches from heat. Broil at low to moderate temperature for 13 to 15 minutes on each side. Season with salt. Spread 1 tablespoon sauerkraut evenly over each pork chop; spread 1 tablespoon sour cream over sauerkraut. Sprinkle with additional paprika. Continue broiling 3 minutes or until sauerkraut is heated through. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 4 servings.

#### HOT POTATO SALAD WITH KNOCKWURST

3 potatoes  
2 slices bacon, diced  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/3 cup cider vinegar  
1/4 cup water  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1/4 teaspoon ground celery seed  
1/4 teaspoon caraway seed  
1/4 teaspoon dried parsley  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Dash of Tabasco pepper sauce  
4 knockwurst, cut in halves lengthwise  
Wash and dry potatoes, prick with fork, arrange in ring on paper towels. Bake in microwave oven on High for 15 minutes or until almost tender, turning once. Cool potatoes, peel and slice; set aside. In 2-quart, glass baking dish combine bacon and onion. Cook in microwave oven on High for 5 minutes; stir. In small bowl, mix vinegar, water, sugar, celery seed, caraway seed, parsley, salt and pepper sauce.

Arrange half the potatoes in baking dish with onion and bacon; pour half the dressing over potato layer. Repeat. Arrange knockwurst over potatoes. Cover with plastic wrap or waxed paper. Cook in microwave oven on High for 3 minutes. Turn dish. Uncover, cook 2 minutes longer or until heated

through. Let stand 3 to 5 minutes before serving. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 4 servings.

#### SPINACH-STUFFED FISH FILLETS

1 Tbsp olive oil  
1/2 small onion, chopped  
1 small garlic clove, minced  
1 cup finely chopped mushrooms  
1 medium-size tomato, finely chopped  
4 ounces spinach, coarsely chopped  
Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste  
4 5-ounce red snapper fillets  
Chopped tomato and green onions, if desired

In a medium-sized skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add onion and garlic. Cook, stirring occasionally, about 10 minutes, or until onion is transparent. Add the mushrooms, tomato and spinach. Season with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until spinach is tender and mixture is dry. Set aside to cool.

Prepare barbecue. Spray a fish basket or a piece of foil with nonstick spray. Place fillets on a flat surface and season with salt and pepper. Divide the spinach mixture among the fillets, pressing the mixture together.

Roll the fillets, starting at the small end. Secure rolled fillets with wooden picks. Place stuffed fillets in basket or on foil. Place on grill and cover with the grill lid.

Cook about 10 minutes, or until fish turns from translucent to opaque. Garnish with tomato and green onion, if desired. Makes 4 servings.

#### CAMPFIRE POTATO STEW

1 package (5.25 ounces) dehydrated, scalloped potatoes with sauce mix  
3 cups water  
1 cup milk  
2 tablespoons prepared mustard  
3 medium carrots, sliced  
1 pound cooked ham, cubed  
1 cup sliced scallions  
1 medium-size green pepper, cubed  
Juice of one small lemon  
2 or 3 dashes hot pepper sauce

In large kettle, combine potatoes, sauce mix, water, milk and mustard; mix well. Bring to a boil, stirring frequently. Reduce heat. Cover and simmer 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
