

WASHINGTON, June 2 .- In . WASHINGTON, June 2.—In Senate Passes to pass the huge relief and deficiency bill, the Administration forces in the Senate by a narrow margin of 35 to 32 turned back a Republican move to reconsider the vote on an amendment to authorize a new survey of the Florida Ship Canal.

The motion to reconsider, by Senator Hastings (R Del.), was killed without debate on a motion by Democratic Leader Robinson of Arkansas to lay it on the tab'e. The amendment, which would provide for continuing work if the survey is favorable, was added to the bill by the Senate Saturday on a similar vote, 35 to 30.






