Holt Discovered Cora Harris; To Speak At Chapel

Rollins Prexy Is To Deliver Address On Dedicatory Program

WINTER PARK, June 1.—Hamilton Holt, president of Rollins College, who "discovered" the late Cora Harris 27 years ago when he was editor of "The Independent," and was the first editor to publish her work, will be one of the principal speakers at the dedication of the Cora Harris Memorial Chapel in the Valley near V. I. George's, next Friday afternoon, June 5.

The other speakers will be John Patchall, associate editor of the Atlanta Journal, who published her last work, "A Candle-Lit Cottage," three times a week in the Journal. George Horace Jackson, editor of the Saturday Evening Post will send a special tribute to the woman who represented the magazine as its first American correspondent during the World War, an who did some of her best work for it.

The woman who enriched American literature with 20 novels and scores of short stories is buried in the foot of the chapel altar. The structure, designed by the architects of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York, and built of valley stone, was erected by her nephews, Al Harris, Philadelphia advertising man, Captain Fred Harris, an army officer stationed in Philadelphia, and John D. Harris, cotton mill executive of Manchester, Ga. It is situated on a mountain cabin (where she lived and worked).

Ever since Hamilton Holt first published Cora Harris' work they had been close friends. When Dr. Holt became president of Rollins College ten years ago, Cora Harris adopted the college as a special interest. Her brochure, "A Town that Became a University," an essay on the cultural development of Winter Park, has been published over and over again in the college. She came to Winter Park often from her home in the hills

War On Slots

F.D.R. Withholds Attack On Shifty Republican Target

WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP) —The prediction that President Roosevelt would compete with the Republican national convention for publicity, and seek to blanket it, seems likely to qualify as the season's worst political guess.

There were at least two good reasons, all the time, for being certain he would attempt no political bombarding in the speeches he was booked to make in the South and West during Cleveland convention week.

One was that that hardly would be the time when the Republican picture was changing from day to day, to take up major campaign issues. It would be too much like shooting at a rapidly-moving target.

Another reason was that it would take something like a super-human effort to dislodge any national convention of a great party from page one. The reading public likes its conventions too much.

No one versed either in politics or publicity was surprised when it developed that Mr. Roosevelt proposed to confine his speeches to more or less philosophic discussions of past historic events, and leave the event at Cleveland for future reference.

Many manifestly futile speculation likewise is being expended on the question whether the President, or anyone else, will insist that Governor Lehman of New York reverse his decision and run for re-election.

If the draft is exercised on Mr. Lehman, it will not be done for some time. It would be the worst political in the world for the governor to say one week he wouldn't run, and then say the next he would.

Washington has been hearing a lot about another Democratic governor, but in a different way. In Indiana, a state executive is ineligible for re-election. Instant word has come out of that state, however, that Governor McNutt is to be kept in the national picture one way or another.

Some time back McNutt partisans were pointing out what a fine candidate for vice-president he would make. Nothing came of that, and then the talk turned to his qualification for a place in the cabinet.

The latest and best prediction is that Senator Minton will be elevated to the federal bench after the election, and McNutt appointed senator to succeed him.

Democratic headquarters strategists have been presented with a campaign hint in the keynote speech of Senator Clark before the Missouri state convention.

Instead of lambasting the Republicans, Senator Clark largely ignored them. He praised Mr. Roosevelt, and then turned loose on John J. Raskob, the duPonts and the Liberty League as the real enemy.

By SIGRID ARNE WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP) Democratic women, says Democratic Representative Caroline O'Day from New York, want 1936 party plank, advocating preservation of the Social Security Act, and in further work to eliminate child labor.

Republican women, asserts Republican Representative Edith Nourse Rogers of Massachusetts, are concerned with government spending and many are writing me they would like to see responsibility for relief expenditures turned back to the states.

Both legislators, actively gathering data for their respective parties, believe the approaching campaign will see more women engaged in political work. Both feel that women will wield a greater influence at the party conventions and in the campaign.

Mrs. O'Day, although she is completing her first term in Congress, has attended all Democratic conventions since women were given the vote in 1920. She believes each convention has seen the women taking a more effective part in proceedings, although the progress has been slow.

"However, whenever women have anything worthwhile to suggest I notice the men listen and usually act," she says.

"But politics for the average woman citizen is still pretty much like church work where women give the strawberry festivals, take in \$500 and then turn the money over to the men to spend. It's amazing, however, what faithful work women are doing in the home precincts without hope, or even expectation, of reward."

Mrs. O'Day is preparing for the Democratic convention at Philadelphia in June by writing all Democratic national commit-

women to learn what planks they wish to see in the platform. She finds so far they are interested in peace legislation in preservation of the Social Security Act, and in further work to eliminate child labor.

On the other hand Mrs. Rogers is finding that women are more concerned over government spending.

"It's natural in this country where most men turn their money over to their wives to spend," she says. "Women resent waste."

Lower Fares May Put End To Travel As Grandpa Knew It

By ALEXANDER R. GEORGE
WASHINGTON, June 2.—(AP)—The old day coach, long a stuffy, under-stuffed symbol of American train travel, may be only a memory a few years hence.

Pushing their drive to regain lost passenger traffic, the railroads are replacing these old style coaches with "dirt-free, noise-free, air-conditioned cars with all the comforts of a luxurious living room."

Prospects of a banner travel season coupled with a reduction of fares under order of the interstate commerce commission have stimulated efforts of the rail carriers to enter to the passenger who can't afford sleeping or parlor car accommodations.

They are offering the traveler 25-cent dinners, deep-cushioned, adjustable seats, foot rests, deep-piled carpets, smooth starts and stops, and the "gliding" ride on faster schedules.

Even those protest railroads which have carried into the courts their fight against fare reductions by governmental mandate, particularly the clash in sleeping car rates, are making a bid for base-line passengers through improved equipment and service.

A western railway is introducing a new type of tourist train from Chicago to the Pacific coast which makes as fast time as the limiteds and provides a trained nurse as well as porter service.

Fares are drastically lower on these tourist trains; there are no extra charges for meals and no extra charges for those who do not want to pay the price of a sleeper.

Sleeper: Dining cars will serve breakfast for 25 cents, lunch for 30 cents and dinner for 35 cents.

An east-to-south railroad features "salon cars designed to provide the "finest kind of standard transportation." These cars are air-cooled, have big easy chairs, moderate reading lights and are attended ready to supply additional conveniences.

Another road boasts of its "refined individual seat coaches" with folding, complete, reclining or sleep for the economy overnight traveler. These coaches are fitted up in living room fashion.

Several of the new style coaches have lunch counters where sandwiches, coffee and light drinks are served, no item being more than 10 cents. There are separate smoking rooms for men and women, filtered drinking water and free paper cups.

The increased comfort for the average passenger, lower rates, additional streamlined trains powered by Diesel, electric and steam locomotives is expected to bring the railroads the largest passenger volume in five years.

In the first two months of this year the number of passengers carried increased more than 6,000,000 over January and February of 1935.

While southern and western railroads started cutting their passenger rates two and three years ago, the maximum basic rate of 3.6 cents a mile has prevailed generally in the east. On the basis the fare for 300 miles is \$10.80. A 2 cent rate reduces it to \$6.

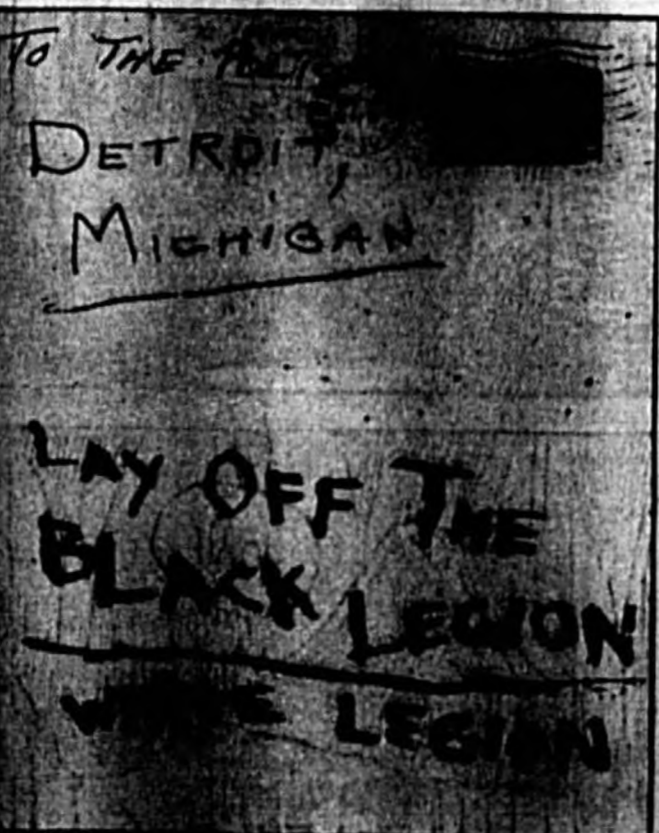
