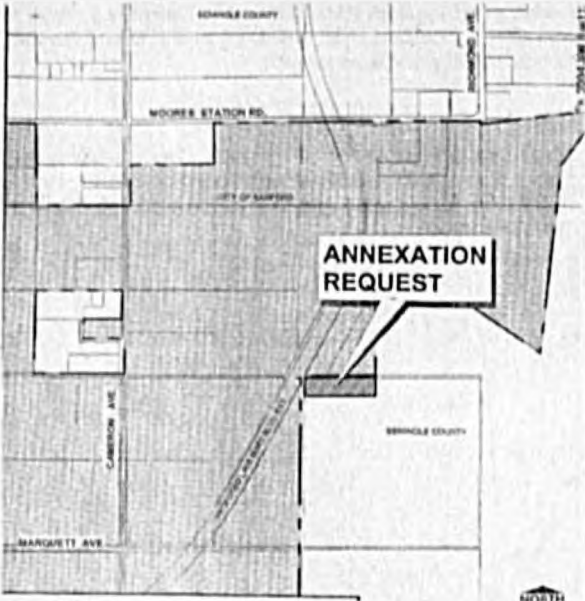

Investigators seeking info on credit card theft

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is seeking information regarding a suspect, caught on tape, using a stolen credit card obtained during a vehicle burglary.

SHS helps grieving families

SANFORD — The loss of two teenagers from an automobile accident Monday is bringing Seminole High School and the community together to support the grieving families.

Eighteen-year-olds Arulfo Mario Gallegos and Abraham "Abe" Lindsey were killed on Orlando Drive when police say Gallegos lost control of his speeding vehicle and crashed into a fire hydrant and

utility pole.

The next night, students and friends of the well-liked teenagers gathered for a candlelight vigil at the scene and support continues for them at their former school. Gallegos and Lindsey both attended Seminole High School last year. Lindsey has two sisters, Sarah and Jessica that currently attend the high school. His other sister April also previously went to the school.

During each lunch hour at SHS, students are taking up col-

lections for the two Sanford families. As of Friday morning, they had raised more than \$400. Students are not the only ones pitching in as teachers and administrators have supplied financial and emotional support too.

"The first day we brought over some food and yesterday a staff member also brought over some food and money that was collected," said Robin Purdy-Thompson, a SHS guidance

Central Florida Zoo unveils train, carousel this weekend

All aboard — the Central Florida Zoo is opening a new train ride and colorful animal carousel for visitors to enjoy. The Grand Opening is scheduled for Feb. 7 and 8.

Champ the Train will allow visitors to enjoy a 10-minute tour of scenic wetlands and Florida's natural surroundings in the park area just outside of the zoo. Champ is a quarter-scale G-16 miniature train built in 1951 and modeled after the Florida East Coast "Champion" streamliner. The train consists of four coaches, seating 36 to 48 passengers. It is a real railroad complete with crossing gates, ticket booth, covered platform for boarding passengers, a maintenance facility and train tunnel.

Restoring the train was an intensive process including a complete "frame off" restoration, two new engines, hydraulic propulsion, new electronics and brakes. Champ's red and yellow colors represent the Flagler Systems Florida East Coast Line, which transported tourists from New York to Florida. The railroad investment is more than \$750,000.

The Animal Carousel stretches 22 feet in diameter and features one horse, a giraffe, a zebra, an ape

Farmers' Market pleads for support

SANFORD — Billed as the spot where Sanford residents could purchase fresh fruits and vegetables, the newly renovated state farmers' market has fallen on hard times.

Several weeks last month, no more than a half dozen vendors were out selling their wares and the lack of business has caught the attention of at least one county commissioner.

The Sanford Farmers' Market at 1400 S. French Ave. was touted by Florida Agriculture Commissioner Charles Bronson at the grand opening of the facility Dec. 19 "as the best, newest renovation in the entire state." But, in less than two months the newness of the facility has apparently run out with area residents.

"We put several thousand dollars in it because (we were told) there was a need, but I have seen relatively no use of it," said Commissioner Carlton Henley.

The renovation of the Sanford Farmers' Market

Theater hires new director

SANFORD — Kim Nelson, a long-time non-profit arts administrator, has been named manager of the Helen Stairs Theatre.

Nelson calls herself an "arts advocate" and believes the Stairs Theatre is an important component in promoting arts in the community.

"The importance of the arts is sometimes dismissed in American culture," Nelson said. "When school budgets are cut, the arts are the first thing to go. The theater has a role to play by filling that cultural niche."

Nelson has spent 18 years in arts administration and has managed a regional theater, an art museum volunteer group and a writers' project. She is active in the arts, herself as a singer with "Synergy," and her husband, Robert E. Mier is an artist specializing in Florida wildlife and landscapes.

Nelson said the Stairs Theatre can provide an alternative to television or movies. She also notes that for those interested in pursuing performance art

Iraqi Diary: Replacements are on the way

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

28 Jan. 2004 There was a big blast in Baghdad yesterday. A suicide bomber driving a van loaded with explosives blew out the front of the Shaleen hotel and left a huge crater in the road. It killed and wounded about 20 Iraqis but no U.S. soldiers. If you could see the aftermath of these suicide bombings, it looks like somebody blew up a meat market. I know that is graphic, but this is what the

public should know about instead of all the glory and hoopla junk.

Today we had to go out to measure the square footage of the detention cells at Al Karama Police Station, Al Meridi, Al Khansa, and the Al Rashad police stations. We got to the Al Rashad and they had 114 prisoners. I had Sgt. Coe and Sgt. Bates go in first with weapons and keep me covered while I measured the square footage of the cells. I'm not saying the prisoners would do anything,

but it was just for precaution. At Al Rashad I had my interpreter, Wa' Al calculate the footage for me. He is a civil engineer and quickly came up with the figures without me having to wade through all those prisoners.

After we finished at the police stations, we went over to Regiment HQ and ate chow. I saw Colonel May (2nd Cavalry Regimental Commander) and CSM Blackwood (Regimental Sergeant-Major). Colonel May asked for Dad's address as he had misplaced it. He

wished me and my squad a safe trip home when we redeploy to the states.

We returned to Camp Marlboro and began preparing and planning for the convoy escort mission south of Baghdad to pick up and escort our replacement unit into Baghdad. My squad will be the scout element and will be operating 10 minutes ahead of the main escort body. Our job is to clear the way of any enemy, IEDs (roadside bombs) or other obstructions. If the enemy is out there, we will be the first to engage him.

I had planned to leave my new gunner in camp, but

included the addition of the 6,000-square-foot pavilion, which was to be used as a community market open to the public each Friday from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., with the exception of holidays. Opened on Nov. 19, customer traffic and vendor support increased until its official grand opening and then support began to wane, said Zechariah Henderson, manager of the Sanford Farmers' Market.

"The problem that we have had thus far with the market, we had a number of vendors here," Henderson said. "It was packed the week the (agriculture commissioner) was here and it was packed just about every Friday prior to that. The problem is the vendors have decided not to return because

for some reason we're not getting any traffic and they're not making any money."

The lack of customers is puzzling Henderson and officials at Tallahassee. Before the opening of the market, an advertising campaign to promote the facility included mail outs with Sanford utility bills and other mediums.

Several vendors said Friday that it may be time to step up the advertising campaign again — before it is too late. Carl Moro, who has been selling soil and plant enhancements since the market opened, said business has been lousy and he's contemplating pulling out.

"There are not enough vendors and, of course, there are not enough customers," he said. "It's a Catch-22."

Moro said as of Friday at 10 a.m. only five customers had visited the market and only one was interested in growing anything organically. Nearby fruits and vegetables vendor Juan "Sergeant" Perez said the Sanford market isn't nearly as busy as the market in DeLand.

"Like this guy over there he made \$15 last week," he said. "You can't make a living doing that."

All markets go through tough times during the year, Henderson said. The downtown Sanford market in Magnolia Square on Tuesdays has had its shares of troubles in the past, he added. Commissioner Henley disagrees.

"It just sits there empty and that bothers me because it was

for the promotion of (the city)," he said. "The place up the street stays full all the time."

According to Henderson, the root of the problem could be the lack of interest from the community. During the whole month of January, vendors were given free space, but many didn't jump at the offer because they simply weren't making any money.

"Getting the vendors is really not a problem, it's keeping the vendors with the customers here," Henderson said. "It just seems to me the community has not supported it like it was originally thought."

Henderson and agriculture officials in Tallahassee are not sitting back and watching the market fail. They've considered changing the Sanford market to an evening event and are planning another round of various advertisements in the community.

"We've racked our brains to figure out how to get more traffic," he said. "I just don't know."

counselor. "There is a definite need for these families."

Unfortunately, Seminole High appears to be well prepared in handling these tragic accidents because it has happened too many times before. Dennis McCool, president of SHS booster club, lost his son Ryan four years ago in a traffic accident. Seminole High guidance secretary Laura Loveland's son Phillip was killed three years ago in another wreck.

"I have a little bit of an idea of what people go through in this situation, and you cannot give them enough support," McCool said.

He personally spearheaded the start of two funds at Community United Bank for the boys' families. He said a number of local businesses and leaders have already made contributions.

"The kids are at the school everyday wanting to help in any way that they can," McCool said. "They are collecting money at lunch and some classes are collecting money."

"We need to get as many people in the community aware of it as possible so if they are inclined to assist in anyway they will do it," he added.

Loveland visited the Lindsey family Thursday night, bringing some food items and donations that were collected at the school, but most importantly she offered some moral support.

"I know they are just having a terrible, terrible time getting help," she said. "Unfortunately, people don't think about getting life insurance for their children and it's a huge, staggering amount of money. And normal people don't have the kind of money. There isn't a payment plan when you have

to bury a child.

"It's just something nobody should have to plan for and most people don't think about (burying a child). And we pray people don't have to face it, but unfortunately it happens."

The Lindsey family is hanging in there thanks to the support of the community and high school, said Abe's father David Lindsey Friday.

"Mr. McCool is one of the finest gentlemen I have met in this area he is such a fine gentleman with a kind heart," he said. "He feels what were going through because he has been there. His efforts and work have just been outstanding."

Lindsey said himself and wife, Vicki, grew up in military families. About every three years, they would have to up and leave their friends.

"We decided for our own children that it would be nice to establish ourselves in a community and we chose Sanford," he said. "Let me tell you what, boy are we glad that we did. We have been really blessed with the community support. It's just blown me away. There's so much love here, there's so much compassion here. We have certainly been blessed for choosing Sanford for us and our children to grow up in."

Back in 1909

A look back at the early editions of *The Sanford Herald*

Considering that this newspaper, in celebration of returning to the name of *The Sanford Herald* (from *The Seminole Herald*) is offering a special one year subscription for \$19.08, in honor of the start of this paper in 1908, I was asked to look at some of the early editions and tell you what was going on. I did find it very interesting, but the earliest editions were so brown and brittle with age, I couldn't peruse them.

So, for those of you who were not subscribers to *The Sanford Herald* when it first started, I offer a look at what was going on and some of our advertising in 1909.

In August, a new electric light plant was ready to open. It will supply Sanford with street lighting. No poles on First Street, they will be on back streets and wired from the back of buildings. Sanford is coming of age.

With a roadway under construction from Kissimmee to Sanford (the forerunner of U.S. Highway 17-92) plans were announced to continue the roadway to Daytona Beach.

In addition to publications, *The Sanford Herald* also offered the Blickensderfer typewriter, the newest of its kind, for only \$80. "See them at *The Herald Office*, or phone 148" was the advertising.

A round trip from Sanford to New York City, via Atlantic Coast Line Railroad was advertised at \$35.

The Sanford Garage, on Oak Avenue between Second and Third streets is now selling new 1909 Model F Buicks. They also deal in Hudsons, and Chalmers-Detroit cars, and have them for hire as well.

M. Frank, Clothier and Men's Furnisher was having a sale. Men's suits, regularly \$16.50 were now just \$12.38 and regular \$10 suits were selling for \$7.50.

H.M. Estridge, while clearing his five acres of corn, killed 16 rabbits with clubs and chunks of wood. The story says it was not a good day for Estridge or the rabbits.

In September of 1909, it was announced that Sanford was full of visitors, and more than 100 acres of farm land had been sold in recent weeks. "Sanford will soon be a well-lighted, well-paved city with a good trolley car service. In Sanford, life is worth living." (Just two months later it was announced that 2,000 more acres were sold to Florida Land Company).

There was also national news in *The Herald*. "By the death of Oliver Newhouse in Indianapolis, his brother Albert, an inmate at the poor farm, becomes heir to property valued at \$200,000."

Or how about this one — "If Sanford's population continues to increase this season, newcomers may be forced to live in tents." (Sept. 3, 1909).

There was a classified ad — For rent, large unfurnished house with stable water. \$240 per year or by month, \$25, payable in advance to C.W. Rantoul.

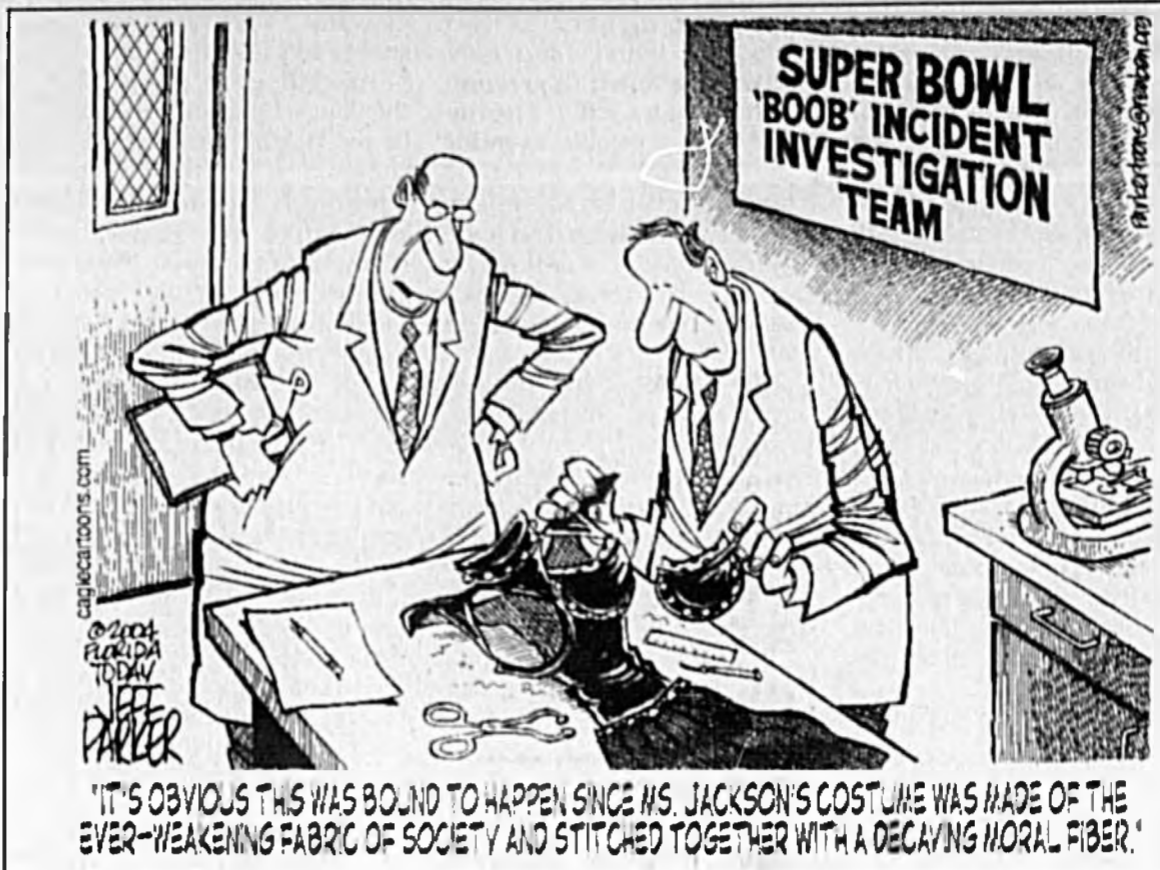
Sanford's schools opened in October with a total attendance of 500, almost 100 more than in the previous year.

With Sanford elections just a few weeks away, no one had filed to run for mayor, alderman or town marshal. Likewise, no one had filed to seek a position which included all of the following positions: city clerk, tax assessor, tax collector, and sanitary inspector. Can you imagine one person filling all those jobs?

In the wanted ads, "Wanted, two good milch cows, C.L. Pell, Osteen." It wasn't a misprint. That's how they identified milk cows back then.

Descriptions of folks in the old papers were quite different than today. One described a woman visitor as "Mrs., aging and feeble, visited" Another described a visitor as "Genial and bulky." Still another said a soap drummer from Tampa, "took dinner from one of our local hotels and enjoyed the meal."

These items are just some of what I encountered browsing through the pages of the 1909 *Sanford Herald*. If you want to read more, the Museum of Seminole County History has back editions on microfilm. Stop by and peruse.

Black voters look out for their own interests

Let's hope the slander of black voters has ended — at least for this season.

Before South Carolina's Democratic primary, several political analysts predicted that Al Sharpton would win a narrow victory with the majority of black votes in the contest. That analysis was a superficial and insulting, based on the broadest of stereotypes — black voters will support any black

candidate, including one whose slicked-back hairdo imitates his role model, soul singer James Brown.

But the actual results of Tuesday's primary tell a very different story: Black voters supported John Edwards and John Kerry by much larger margins than Sharpton. Once and for all, political commentators should have learned the lesson that black voters cast their ballots for those who best represent their interests — just as white voters do.

It's surprising that black Southerners are so poorly understood by other Southerners. One of the prognosticators with a skewed and superficial view of black South Carolinians was Sen. Zell Miller, D-Ga. In the Jan. 5 *Wall Street Journal*, Miller proclaimed: "Conventional wisdom says

native Southerners John Edwards and Wesley Clark and moderate Joe Lieberman will have the edge when the primaries move south. Don't count on it. I'd be willing to bet a steak dinner ... that Al Sharpton will get almost as many votes as Messrs. Edwards, Clark or Lieberman in this supposedly more friendly territory. ... The last time there was an African-American in the primaries, Jesse Jackson blew everyone away, getting 96 percent of the African-American vote in the South. ... So get ready to start counting Rev. Sharpton's delegates."

I hope the senator knows some good steak restaurants. Sharpton received 17 percent of the African-American vote in South Carolina; Edwards and Kerry polled 37 percent and 34 percent respectively.

Miller knows better. His successful two terms as Georgia's governor owe much to the allegiance of black voters, who were drawn to his then-moderate politics, which included an unsuccessful attempt to change a state flag dominated by the Rebel insignia. It's true that when Miller ran for governor in 1990, he was outpolled among black voters in the Democratic primary by former U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young. (In the general election against a Republican, Miller drew solid black support.) But Sharpton is no Andy Young. The New York activist is intelligent and has broadened his expertise in foreign and domestic issues, but he lacks electoral experience and, more important, credibility.

Forty years after passage of the Voting Rights Act, it should be clear that black voters have grown in political sophistication. While there will always be

a slender margin of black Americans who will vote for any candidate who panders to their basest racial impulses (just as there will always be a minority of white voters who cast their votes based on their prejudices), most black voters support candidates who articulate their highest aspirations.

Just like most white voters, they are concerned about the economy, about health-care costs, about educating their children. They want to be sure that the country is adequately defended. They worry about deficits, about Social Security, about Medicare.

While black voters are often caricatured as blindly loyal to the Democratic Party, their allegiance is hardly blind. It is knowing. African-Americans tend to be conservative on many social issues — they tend to support the death penalty and public prayer in public schools, for example — but they are suspicious of the Republican Party for an obvious reason: Too many Republican politicians have pandered to interests that still resent the civil rights movement. Gov. Sonny Perdue's decision to campaign as defender of the old Georgia flag, with its Confederate insignia, is just one example.

Black American voters are no great mystery, really. Any politician who wishes to draw their support must respect their political sophistication and pledge to represent their interests. Isn't that the same way politicians campaign for white voters' support?

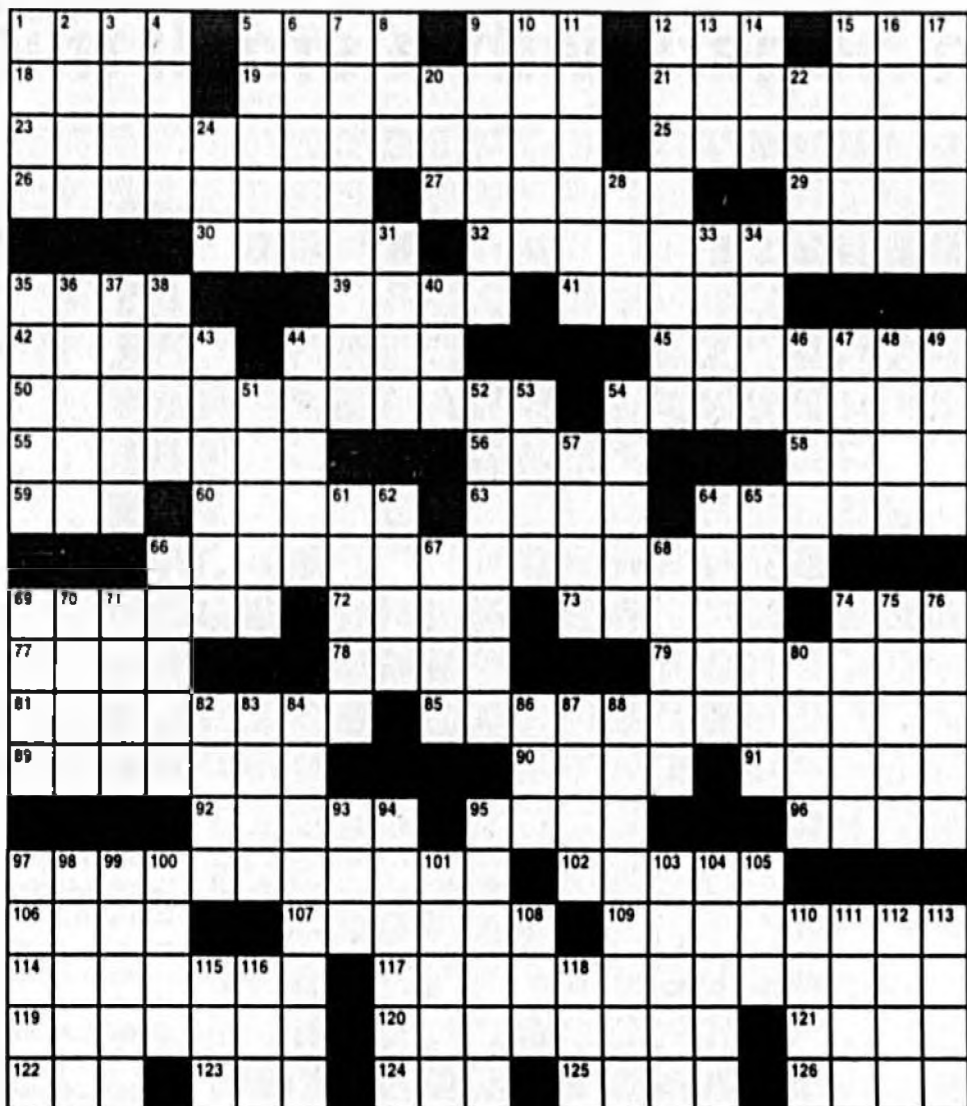

Sanford officer sponsors annual Valentine's ball

SANFORD — Teenagers across Central Florida are readying for the Seventh Annual Seminole County Students and Friends Valentine's Ball.

Cohen advises parents that they need not to fret as he hires four Sanford officers and four school security guards to patrol the function as students are not allowed to go in the parking lot. Other parents also help to chaperone the ball.

All middle school students of Seminole County are invited to attend the ball, although it is not an official Seminole County Public Schools function. Friends of Seminole County students are also invited.

"Believe it or not, we had middle school students from Orlando last year," Cohen said.

Doors open at 6 p.m. at the Sanford Civic Center, 401 E. Seminole Blvd., in downtown Sanford. The ball ends at 11:30 p.m.

The Way We Were: Biographies from Central Fla. leaders

Here are the last biographies from the special edition of *The Sanford Herald* dated April 29, 1933.

Lawton was a county educator for 36 years

Born in Oviedo and a resident of Seminole County for most of his life, T.W. Lawton was presently Superintendent of Public Instruction for Seminole County. He had been appointed to that office in 1916 and served continuously since then. (He continued to serve until 1952).

He attended public schools in Oviedo and the Andover Theological Seminary in Andover, Mass. He returned to Florida to attend Rollins College from where he received a bachelor's degree.

Lawton had been a school teacher for five years and had been a merchant for seven years. He was a Mason, Kiwanian and a member of the Oviedo Baptist Church.

He was married to the former Charlotte Lee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Lee of Oviedo. They had three children, T.W. Jr., Robert James and Charlotte.

Lawton's favorite sports were tennis and baseball. His early life had been spent hunting, fishing, swimming and cow punching, all in and around Oviedo.

Soda pop sales spilled over under Brackin's tenure

I.J. Brackin came to Sanford in 1931 to become manager of the local Coca Cola Bottling Company. Under his management, the product had increased greatly in sales.

Brackin was born in Ashford, Ala., and attended public schools in that city. Before coming to Sanford, he had lived in Mims for several years where he had taken an active part in the Junior Order of that city. Locally, he was a member of the Woodmen of the World and First Baptist Church.

He was married to the former Lois Wiggins and they had three children, Windell, Louise and Ernest. They lived at 709 Palmetto Ave.

Brackin was principally interested in his work, although occasionally he attended a baseball game or went fishing.

McMullen was a cut above the rest

W.A. "Lonnie" McMullen had followed the barber trade most of his life, but had entered politics the previous year and had been elected Seminole County Constable.

McMullen had lived in Sanford since 1911 and for a number of years was co-owner of a barbershop on First Street.

He was born in Perry but moved to Lake Thonotosassa

Agricultural program began with a small miracle

On Jan. 24, at the Orlando Marriott - Lake Mary, the Agricultural and Labor Program, Inc. (ALPI), held its annual corporate meeting and luncheon, bringing the vision to reality through empowerment, education and advocacy, celebrating 35 years.

Approximately 475 corporate members, board members, staff and guests attended this historical 35th anniversary of the ALPI.

William Holt, chairman of ALPI Board of Directors presided over the board's closeout meeting with the corporate membership from all four regions, with the annual reports from all committees and all officers. The program overview was given by Deloris Johnson, CEO.

The Agricultural and Labor Program, Inc. is more than just a miracle, a brief look back at the ALPI. A story of a small miracle that took place in the most unholly of places and among the most desolate of people.

In 1969, the Coca Cola Company established the Agricultural and Labor Project to improve the quality of life for farm workers in their Florida citrus operation. The vision took shape and the miracle continued.

In the late 1960s, Sara Harris and Robert F. Allen, co-authored a book, titled "The Quiet Revolution," the story of migrant and fruit workers.

A group of people with low self esteem were willing to work for a change that would make life better for themselves. Having become involved in the program and policies that would make for a great change in their lives and enrich the quality of life in the groves.

Also improving education, housing, medical financial aid, labor benefits, social outlets and most significantly consciousness raising the workers self esteem, they gained independence and became owners of their own destiny.

In 1977, the ALPI opened their new offices with headquarters in Winter Haven. A nonprofit organization with Coca Cola/Minute Maid Company providing more than 30 years of funding and support has enabled ALPI to establish and maintain a centralized administrative structure and a sound financial

management system. Audit reviews held yearly by state and federal monitoring have determined these systems to be in compliance with required

regulations, policies, procedures and practices.

Since 1988, Deloris Johnson has served as chief executive officer. She says she has found her job rewarding and challenging, having witnessed some very significant accomplishments in program expansion, community partnership, client satisfaction, program recognition and professional accreditation.

Johnson continues to work for the success of the 35-year-old ALPI with the help of a dedicated staff, chairman of the board and board of directors selected from the four regional councils. Namely in the northern region is, Grace Miller, Vernon McQueen, Dr. Velma Williams and Marva Hawkins; in the eastern region is William Holt, David Walker, Marjorie Gaskin and Kerry Skurti; in the central region is Patricia Gamble, Emma Hymes, Josephine Howard and Christine Samuel; and in the southern region is Mattie Maloy, Gaye Williams, Lester Roberts, Wilbert McTier, Margaret Porter, Head Start representative, and Arabell Wiggins, board emeritus.

These councils have 18 members each, active in planning and sponsoring activities that generate community involvement and participation.

ALPI places a high focus on partnership and collaborative efforts to maximize the use of limited resources.

As a board member in the northern region, we continue to generate community support, funding, in kind services, facilities, etc.

ALPI serves 23 targeted counties with level and types of funding continuing to be diverse (e.g., United Way, public schools, children services, local councils, federal, state, corporate foundations, etc.)

and a four-person chariot. Riders will enjoy traditional carousel music and the glow of 650 lights as they ride.

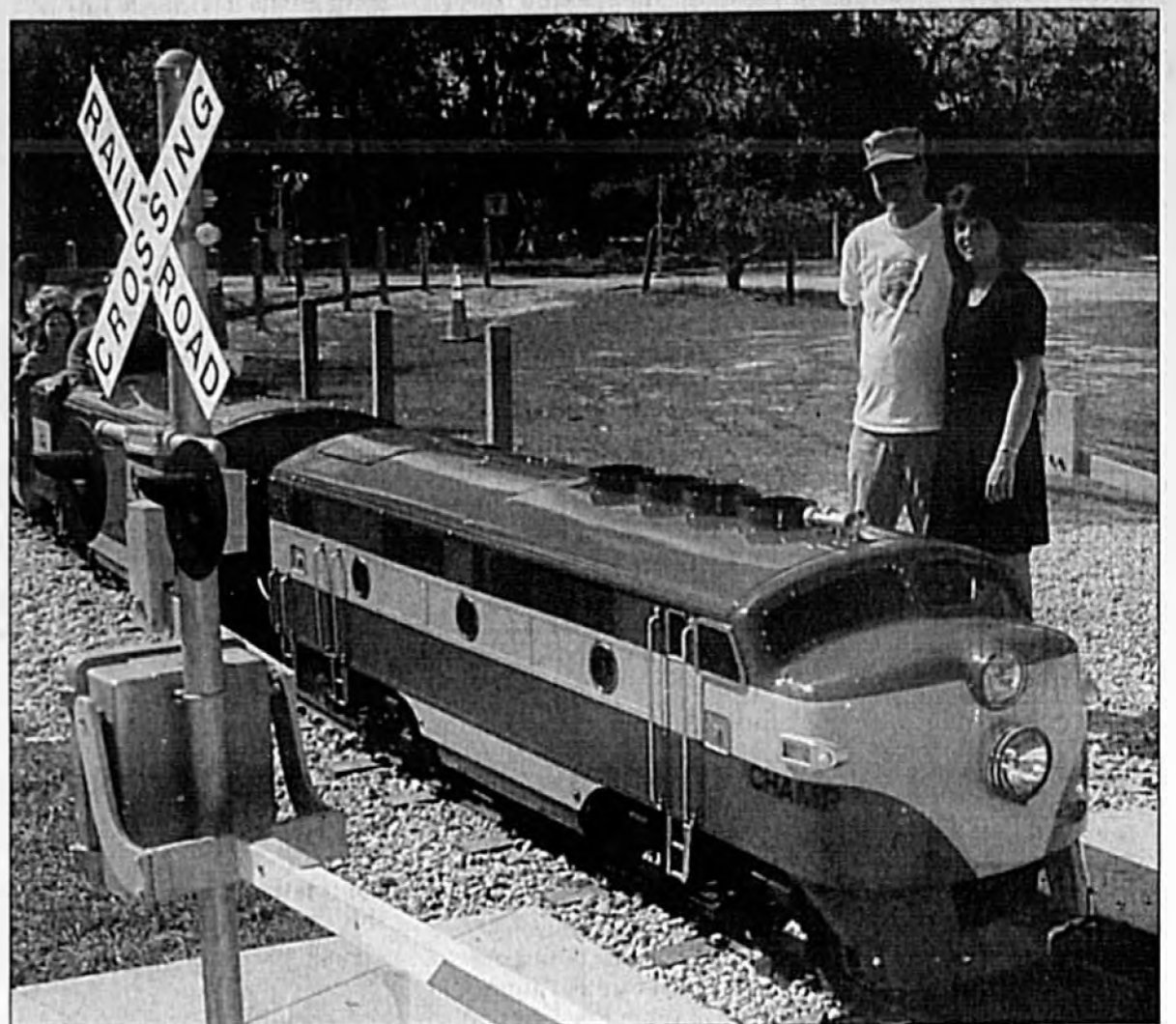
Champ the Train and the Animal Carousel are owned and operated by Walker Shearman, president of Little Florida Coast Line Rail Road, Inc.

Unfortunately one of 1st squad's gunners hurt his shoulder and can't make the trip. I will put my new man with the main element and he will be alright with them. I will be in the forward scout element, two armored humvees. I'm using my seasoned gunners in this group. If we run into a problem or get hit, these gunners have cool heads and can react, think quickly and neutralize any threat before the main element arrives. Also, I can radio the main group and divert them to another route.

We are also taking an AT-4 rocket launcher in the scout element, and I just told Gieger to put it in his vehicle. (Gieger is from Lake City, Fla.) I've basically hand-

selected my scout teams. I'm taking Sgt Bates as one of my team leaders. He is competent and has already mapped out our route. I will also have Sgt. Coe's team with the MK-19 truck for some heavy hitting and will have a team from 1st squad led by Cpl. Sullivan. My B-team, led by Sgt. Coe, will include PFC Horsey (Yes that is his name). He is a mechanic. It pays to carry your own "road service" on trips like this. You might say our mechanic's tool box includes an M-16 as well as wrenches. We are also taking Ali Sedoon as our interpreter and will have PFC Hildebrand as our medic.

In the main element behind us will be SSG

McDavid, SFC Goldberg our platoon sergeant. Due to opsec (operational security) I cannot go into details about times, dates, or routes, but in my next letter I will be reporting a full account following our return from this mission. It is dangerous to some degree, it is a much higher risk than normal. The trip will take about 7 hours round trip on open roads across the desert, south of Baghdad, to link up with the convoy coming up from Kuwait. Once we link-up, we will escort the convoy safely to Baghdad. Please wish us luck on this one as there are a lot of bombings, attacks, and other guerrilla activities on the routes we will be traveling.

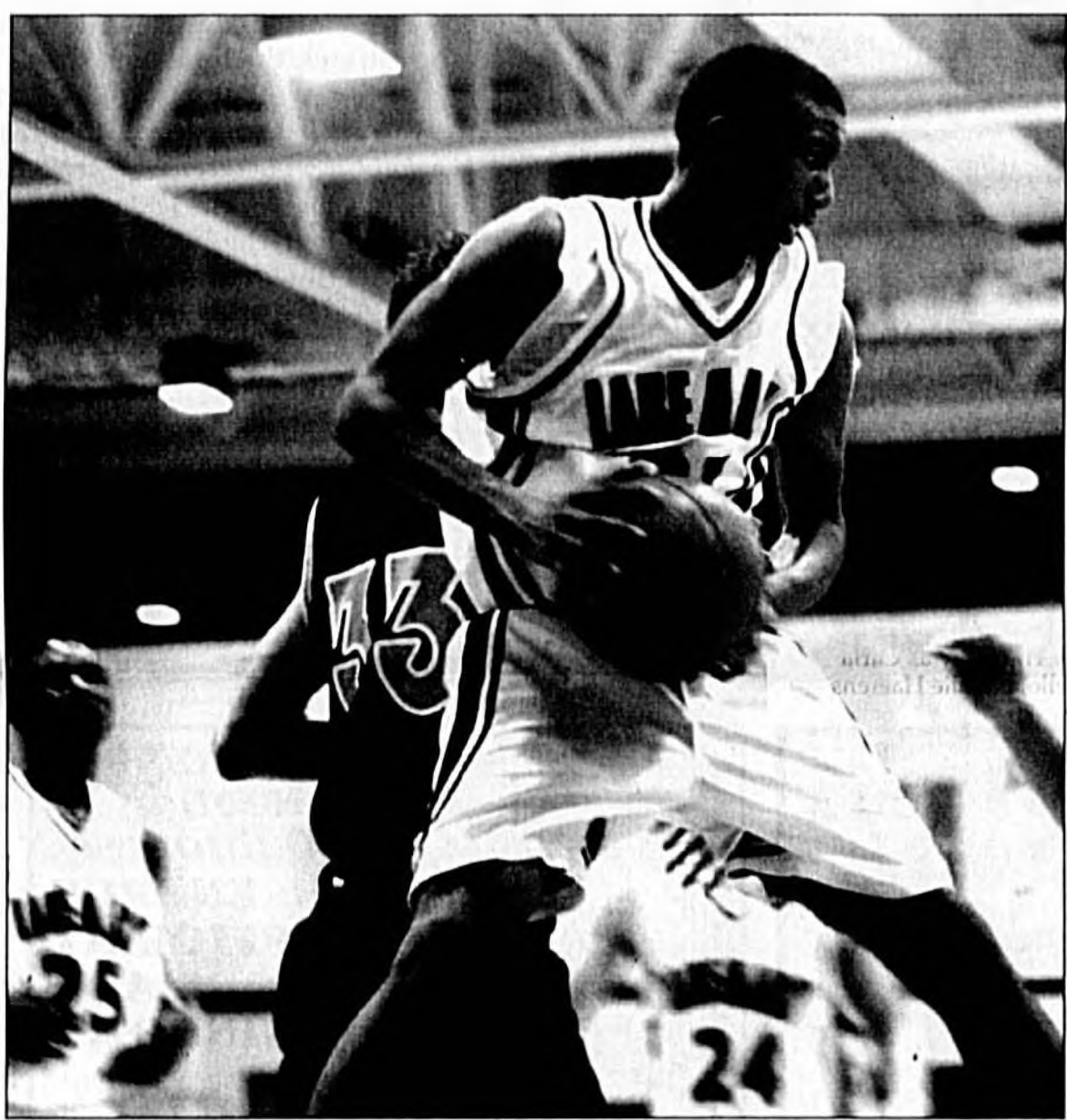

But coach Kym Gaudreau's charges pulled off the comeback with star Darryl Merthie saddled with severe foul trouble.

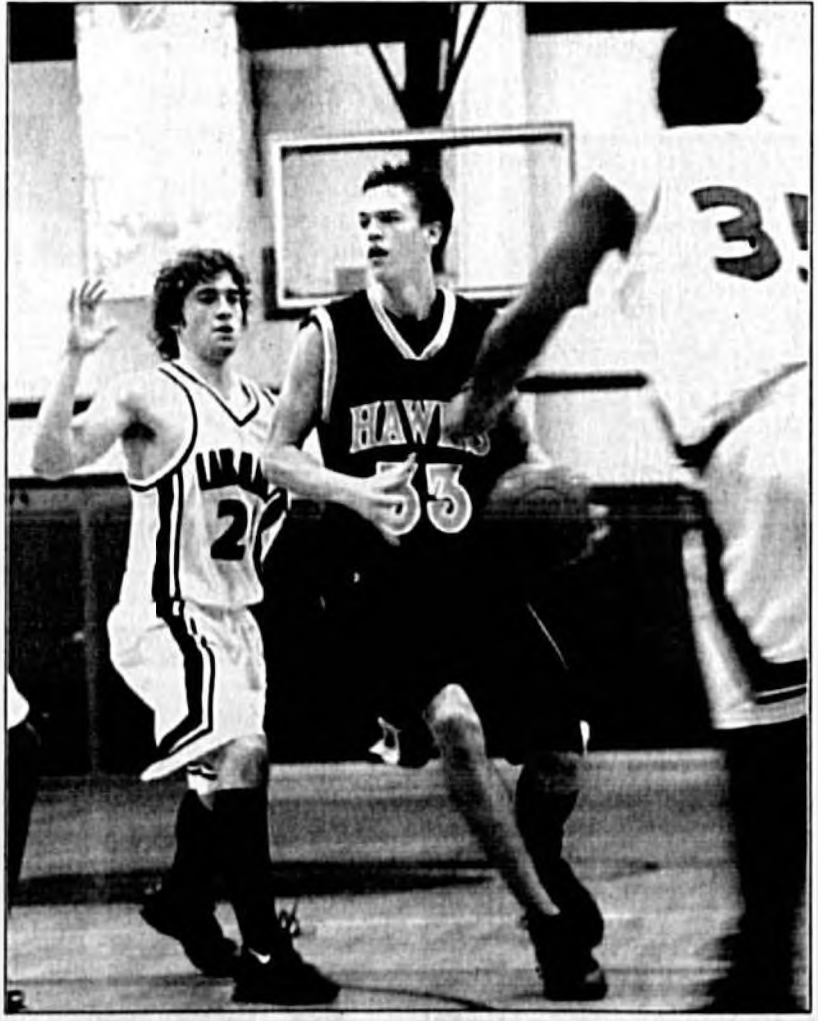

But he was not the only former Ram of Coach Greg Stanton to ink an NCAA Division I scholarship as linemen Randy Jackson and Taylor Tremel will be attending the University of South Florida and Clemson University, respectively.

The other three signees will be headed to 'cold country' to play at NCAA Division I-AA powers.

Defensive Back Cameron Bateman is headed to Illinois State University, defensive end/linebacker R.J. Meyers is on his way to Eastern Illinois University, and Matt Pirkowski will be taking the term 'student/athlete' to a new level as he heads to the Ivy League to play at Yale University.

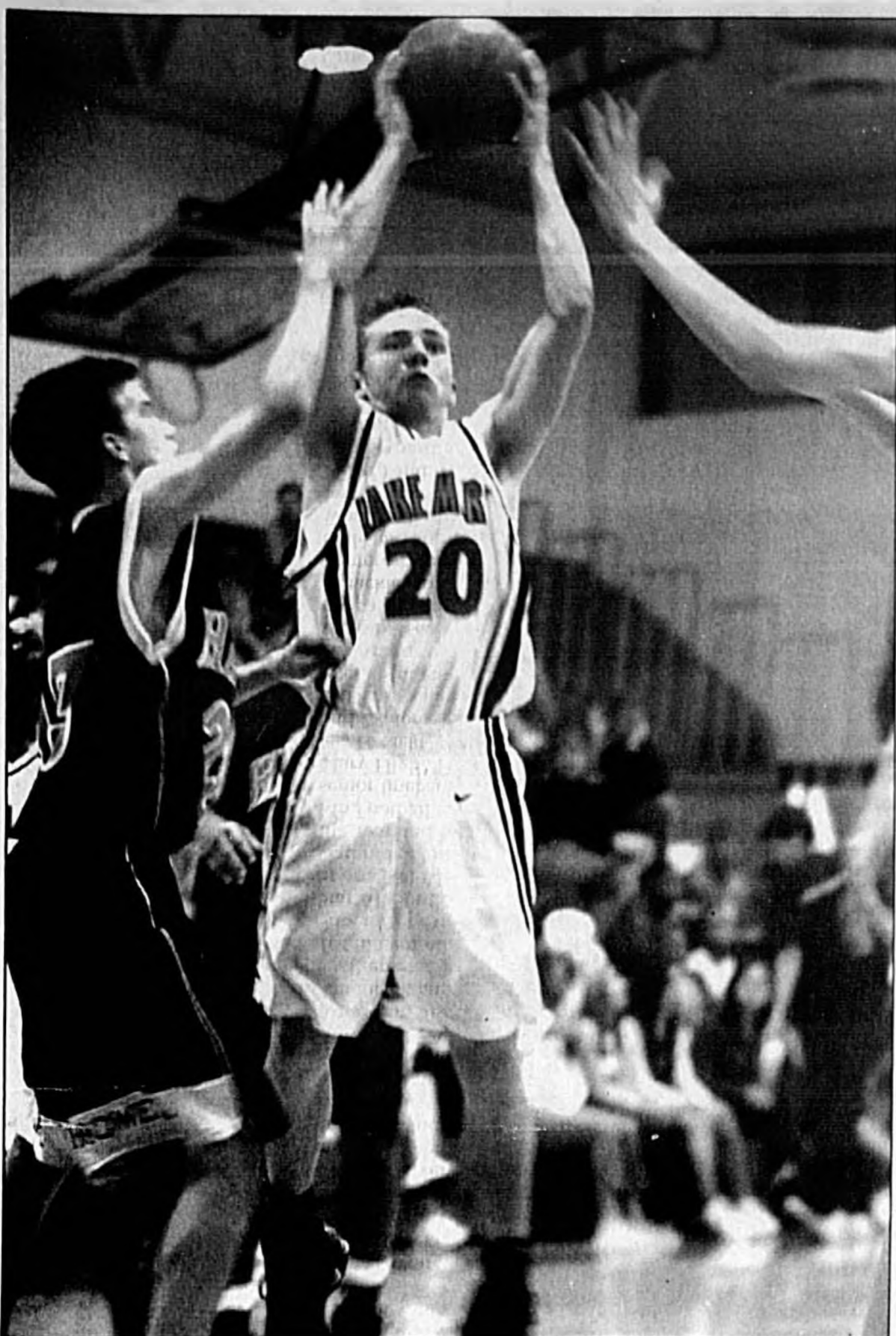

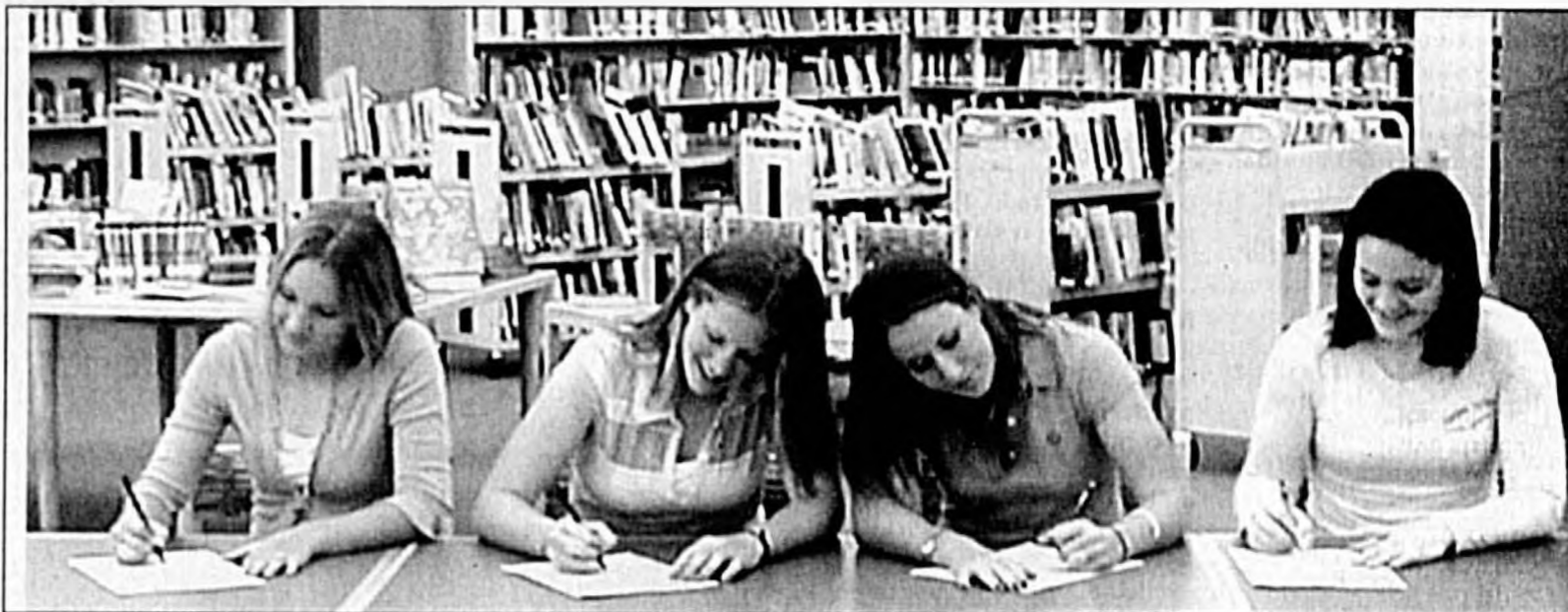

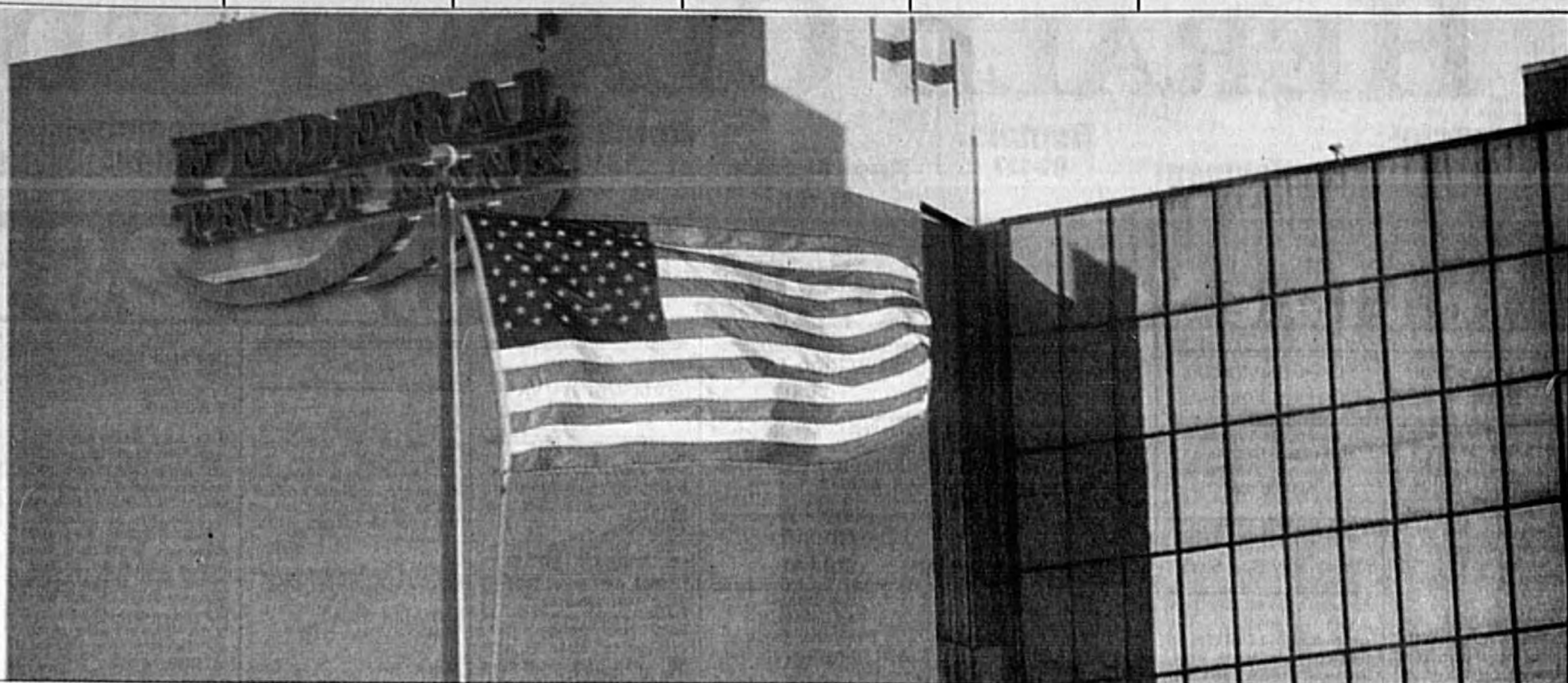

City unveils tool to curb prostitution, drugs

SANFORD — City commissioners approved a first reading of an ordinance that will give officers a new tool to fight prostitution and drug dealing in problem areas of the city.

The ordinance would create an exclusionary zone that would bar repeat offenders from returning to the neighborhoods where there is a "significantly higher incidence of criminal conduct

associated with prostitution, soliciting prostitution, trafficking in illegal drugs and narcotics" than in other parts of Sanford. Those convicted of prostitution or drug related crimes could be re-arrested for simply being seen within the exclusionary zone. "That person's mere presence in those areas consti-

tutes trespassing under this new ordinance," said Police Chief Brian Tooley.

This is not the first time the city of Sanford has explored the use of exclusionary zones. The city created the zones in certain portions of the Goldsboro community in conjunction with the State's Attorney office

and local judges. Problems arose under the old plan because a warrant had to be issued before an arrest could be made for violating the exclusionary zone.

"Upon review by our city attorney, we were advised that the city needed to create its own ordinance to deal with this," Tooley said. "The

way this ordinance is written, once an officer sees an individual in a certain neighborhood, they can arrest them immediately."

There are some exceptions to the zones. Those restricted from the area would be allowed to return to:

- Attend a scheduled meeting with an attorney
- Attend a scheduled initial meeting with a social service provider.
- Comply with court or

County shows plan for Celery Ave. land

SANFORD — The Seminole County school board and government are one step closer to realizing plans for the abandoned University of Florida agricultural test site on Celery Avenue.

About three years ago, county officials started trying to wrestle the 63-acre site, located north and south of Celery Avenue between Brissan and Sipes avenues, away from the state to quell drainage issues in the Midway community. Seminole County unveiled a conceptual plan Tuesday that would not only work in solving drainage in the 275-acre basin, but also provide land for a new elementary school for the growing area.

The university exited the Sanford agricultural test center sometime in the 1970s. It was used to test new types of pesticides, different strains of celery and other agricultural needs. The state is ready to hand the land over to Seminole County, but several roadblocks have remained over the years, said Thomas Radzai, senior engineer in the county's road operations and stormwater division.

He said the university and Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) have each been balking at which entity should clean up the site. The site is reportedly contaminated with arsenic left over from pesticide testing.

"Even the levels that are there don't impose an immediate health hazard," Radzai said.

Several buildings also remain on the property, which are estimated to cost between \$200,000 and \$300,000 to demolish.

"Once they've been off the site it's hard to get them back out there," said Mark Flomerfelt, road operations and stormwater division manager, referring to the university.

After three years in negotiations, the county may be inching closer to leasing the Celery Avenue land from the state as they recently picked up a new partner in the endeavor.

The Seminole County School Board has jumped aboard as the county has proposed to allow them to construct an \$11 million, two-story elementary school on the property near 20th Street.

Diane Kramer, Seminole Public Schools deputy superintendent, said together the county and school board could have more leverage against the state "to make this project work."

The school board has actively been seeking property to satisfy its rapidly growing northeast cluster, she said.

"The city of Sanford continues to annex along Celery Avenue," said Commission Chairman Daryl McLain. "Currently, there are 1,200 to 1,500 homes planned for out there."

Iraqi Diary: Mission accomplished

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

29 Jan. 2004 We accomplished our long range convoy escort mission down south and are safely back at Camp Marlboro.

Our mission began at 0600 with preparing our vehicles, and we pulled out of Camp Marlboro at 0730 with me and my scout trucks [humvees] in the lead ten minutes ahead of the main escort element. We were headed for CSC Scania. CSC stands for Convoy Support Center, where we were to link up with the convoy of new replacements coming up from Kuwait. CSCs are spaced out along the main supply route from Kuwait to

Baghdad, they serve as safe havens en route for convoys and a place for rest and repairs.

We moved out south from Baghdad, but only after getting into a traffic jam on Route Predators. From there we proceeded southward until we hit Route Jackson. On a civilian map "Route Predator" is Highway 5 and "Jackson" is Highway 8 and Highway 1 is "Route Tampa."

We got into some very heavy fog on Route Jackson and the temperature was getting colder by the minute. The fog was so thick that we could not have seen the enemy if he was sitting on the hood of our vehicle. Finally the sun peeked out of the clouds and we turned

onto Route Tampa. The fog began lifting and it started warming up. We were now crossing the desert.

Along Route Tampa there is a whole lot of nothing. After a while we began seeing some small dwellings with date palms off in the distance. Route Tampa can be compared to an interstate highway with a median down the middle. Since it is a main supply route, we would occasionally pass a supply convoy moving north. We passed by two large, slow moving British military vehicles on our side of the road. It was determined that they were sweeping for IEDs [roadside

Commuter rail to be discussed in Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — The Florida Department of Transportation is hosting a public workshop Feb. 18 at the Lake Mary Community Building to gauge interest in a commuter rail.

Debated for several years, a commuter rail is similar to an Amtrak train, said Bob Cone, transit project manager assisting FDOT.

"We would have two to three cars at the most and it would run along the CSX corridor and serve the various locations along the line," he said.

Beginning in Volusia County, the north portion of the commuter rail project is proposed to be built first. The estimated \$155 million project would run from DeBary to Orlando with stops along the way in Sanford, Lake Mary, Altamonte Springs, Maitland and Winter Park.

"The current operating plan has five to six trains running in the morning, and then some trains running every two hours during the day," he said.

The concept of a commuter rail is primarily to help people go to work, Cone said. It would
