

You Make Too Much So U. S. Lays On Taxes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—(AP)—You're getting too much money!

That is the official treasury reason for asking Congress to levy between \$4,000,000,000 and \$5,000,000,000 of new taxes next year. One suggested method is a 15 percent on salaries and wages.

Not that the treasury doesn't need the money, but as the philosophy of the new tax proceeds can be gleaned from treasury experts, the more important thing is to "mop up" extra change in people's pockets to prevent inflation. The views that follow are what these experts say are the facts:

1. The treasury does need more money. In spite of a \$3,500,000,000 tax law just passed, the treasury faces a deficit of from \$15,000,000,000 to \$25,000,000,000 in the next year.

2. Because of defense industry, wages and other forms of income will be higher than ever before. The national income next year will probably be about \$150,000,000,000, compared with about \$85,000,000,000 this year.

3. While the people may have \$15,000,000,000 extra spending money, the defense program will permit them fewer things to buy. For instance, the government already has curtailed output of automobiles and refrigerators.

4. The natural thing for people to do is to try to outbid each other for the consumer necessities that can be bought, thus forcing prices up. That's inflation.

5. If prices go skyhigh, most everyone will be impoverished because their money won't buy much. This would hurt especially persons living on fixed incomes such as pensions and annuities. Also, it would hurt the government because it would have to pay more for defense articles.

6. You can hold down prices by passing a law against them. Congress is working on that, too, but the treasury says it isn't enough. For one thing, legally fixed prices might be destroyed by bootlegging.

7. Therefore, the treasury says, the thing to do is to take away from the people in extra taxes the spare money that the people might use in bidding up prices.

8. Furthermore, the treasury says it wouldn't do much good to take this money away in the more usual ways such as an income tax which people have to pay in the following year. By this time, people may have already spent the money without regard to next year's taxes and the damage would be done.

9. Therefore, the treasury believes in taking away the money before the people get a chance to spend it. Hence it is asking Congress to take it out of the weekly pay envelope. In the first place, the social security which already comes out of the paycheck, would be increased. In the second place, there would be a new income tax which employers would be required to deduct from paychecks.

Other devices would be used to collect the tax at the earliest possible moment in other kinds of income.

Vegetable Juice Becomes Popular As Health Drink

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Did you ever drink spinach, celery or lettuce?

Quite a few people are these days, and the temperance folk are delighted. So are dentists and doctors. They say the eating and drinking practices introduced by Southern California food fadists are good for the teeth and the liver, and health in general.

Within the past year, dozens of juice bars have appeared in adjoining cities. In the vegetable line they offer the juices of cucumbers, watercress, beets, parsley and cabbage, among others.

"Carrot juice is our most popular carrot drink," says one proprietor. "Fresh pineapple is second and coconut third." Coconut juice is not the milk but the extract of the nut itself. Favorite mixed drinks is a "Pick-me-up"—equal parts of coconut, pineapple and papaya juice.

One thirsting soul, another proprietor relates, downed a glass of pomegranate juice, made a horrible face, and fled. A week later he was back, complaining it had taken two days of a straight gin diet to straighten up his system. Then he asked for more pomegranate juice.

Multiplying along with the juice bars are the health food stores and vegetarian restaurants—most of them cafeterias. Selling point is their variety of fresh salads. The lambic carrot and raisin combination is a best seller. Salad dressings are made with lemon juice and herb seasonings, with out vinegar.

The health cafes also specialize in such dishes as pine-nut steaks, soy cheese cutlets, breaded eggplant, breaded baked bananas, vegetable souffles, cheese cakes and cheese pies.

Of the more picturesque was established 21 years ago by Dr. John T. Richter, now 77, and his wife, Vera, 57.

"They advocate the eating of 'live foods,' and serve only uncooked vegetables, fruits and nuts—no milk, butter, eggs or other animal products."

The Richters bake their breads, cakes and pie crusts in a solarium.

"They are made of whole-grain meal mixed with dried fruits, crushed nuts, and sweetened with honey," says Mrs. Richter. "and they need only a little sun. On days when there is no sun, we use electric lamps."

Moscow Fights On

Hitler will never take Moscow, in spite of the terrific power of the Nazi drive, and the battle line will remain west of the Soviet capital, Premier Stalin believes, according to United States Lease-Lend Administrator Harry Hopkins, who discusses his interview with the Soviet leader in a signed article in the American Magazine.

After his flight to Moscow for a conference with Stalin as President Roosevelt's personal representative, Hopkins quotes the Russian Premier as follows: "We Russians shall win this war. The battle front will remain west of Moscow. Russia will not fall. Russia is huge, Russia is inexorable. Russia is fighting—for Russia. She will not again be enslaved."

Stalin concluded his prediction with the sentence, "Once we trusted this man," and Hopkins reports that as the Russian dictator referred to Hitler his manner was more eloquent than his words.

"It was only when he mentioned Hitler," Hopkins writes, "that he discarded his suave assurances. Then his body grew tense. He didn't raise his voice; rather it went as cold as his eyes and the mellow harshness of it became grating. Of Hitler he spoke slowly, not measuring his words nor considering his phrasing, but as if he wanted the interpreter he had assigned to me to convey to me every syllable in its implication and direct meaning."

"For Hitler he had more than the anger he would necessarily have for a man who had double-crossed him; it was a personal hatred that I have seldom heard expressed by anyone in authority. The cold, implacable hatred he has for the German was clearly evident. Stalin's huge hands half clenched. I think that Joseph Stalin would have liked nothing better at that moment than to have had Hitler sitting where I sat. His hands seemed to feel for something. Germany would have needed a new chancellor."

Hopkins' description of Moscow's air raid defenses would seem to bear out Stalin's view that the city is impregnable. Explaining that everyone is forced to go to shelters during a raid, or face arrest, he writes:

"Moscow's ring of anti-aircraft defenses and guns make London's puny. Even if they'd let you, you wouldn't watch a raid on Moscow from the roof—not more than once. The downpour of shrapnel from Moscow's 'ack-ack' would mince you."

The Joys Of Friendship

"In reflective mood, I was counting up some of the happier aspects of exactly thirty years as reporter, editor, columnist and odd-job literary man, the other day," writes Charles B. Driscoll in Your Life Magazine. "High among the many pleasant rewards that have come to me along that laborious road stand the privileges of knowing friendly men."

"There have been many of them. They have been residents of many cities. Geography doesn't seem to have anything to do with friendliness, though I must confess that I have noticed the folk of the plains and deserts, of the farms and of the ships, responding more quickly to a friendly word on an anxious query than the people of the great cities. Still, the half of my working life that has been spent in New York has turned up more friendly souls than I have met elsewhere. That may be because there are so many more people to the square mile in the big city, or because my life as a columnist has taken me out among them more actively."

"The friendliest men I have known, without exception, have been unselfish men. They have been people whose greatest pleasure was in doing things for others."

"Many of them have been men of great attainments, outstanding talents, obvious ability. None has been an egotist."

"The friendly men I have known have been scrupulously honest. No man who does not consider his promise as binding as any oath has in him the makings of a friend, according to my limited observation."

Another Petty Racket

That the advent of the winter tourist season is not an unmixing blessing was evidenced this week in the warning issued by the American Legion's Harvey Seeds Post Commander, John M. Marrell, that unauthorized persons have been making telephone solicitations for funds in that organization's name. Obviously the work of members of that little coterie of petty racketeers that in search of "easy pickings" invariably follow our winter visitors south, the Commander would have the public know that under no circumstances does the Legion follow this method of charitable appeal. As a matter of fact it would do well for citizens to remember that ALL deserving charities have representatives that will contact you personally and give indisputable evidence of their authority by producing the proper credentials. So, the next time a wheedling voice on your telephone requests your financial assistance to relieve distress, just say that you only consider such appeals when they are made in person and backed by written documents the authenticity of which can not be questioned.

TUNG OIL — A phenomenal increase in the planting of tung nut trees in the last decade is the most striking feature of a rapid and new production from the 1940 census on Agriculture, which has been released by J. C. Cept, Director of the Census. The earliest tung grove was planted in Florida in 1914 and plantings were still meager by 1935 when only about 361,000 trees were recorded for the United States. Most of the plantings have been made since 1935, consequently, every foot of the trees are in commercial production. The 1940 Census shows 12,500,000 trees for the United States, and since these are principally in three states, Florida has a goodly portion of the total. The tung tree bears a nut from which wood oil is extracted and is used in the manufacture of paint, varnish, lacquer and waterproofing material. Until recent years, domestic production of tung oil was not entirely by importation but now a small part of the supply comes from domestic production. Due to a drastic curtailment of imports from the Orient and because of the heavy demand by domestic industries for all of this type the tung tree is expected to play an increasingly important role in the agriculture of the South.

Brightest stars of the five sophomore class are Howard Plaman, full-back who leads the team in ground gaining and who has averaged 45 yards on his punts. Al Adler and George Gagliardi, two great tackles; and a whole host of sophomores who give Hurricanes capable reserves in every position.

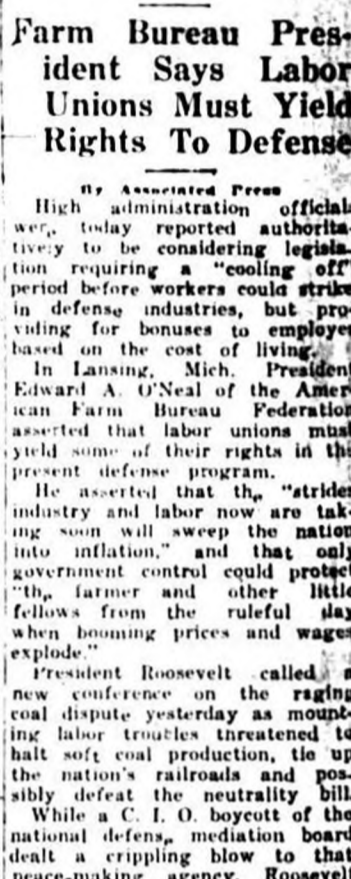
