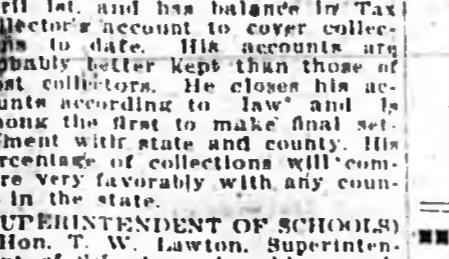

WRESTLING CARD ATTRACTS LOCAL SPORT DEVOTEES

Match Between "Rough House" Ross and "Young" Gotch Is Being Anticipated With Great Interest

A match which is attracting a great deal of attention is that of "Young" Gotch when he meets "Rough House" Ross at the armory Friday night in what is assured to be one of the best wrestling matches which has been offered to fans anywhere in the state during the past few months.

When it comes to real wrestling ability both of these lads, have it. Ross, who is well known here as a boxer, is equally good as a wrestler. His conquests in this line of activity are as many as in his ring battles. In fact Ross prides himself on his wrestling skill.

In his career the North Carolina boy has met some of the best mat men including "Cyclone" Peters, Fritz Hanson, Johnny Klonis, Paul Vallis, Leon Brucher, Joe Turner, and many others equally as good. His record is impressive to say the least. The same craftiness that characterizes Ross as a boxer is true of him as a wrestler. This lad carries a big bag of tricks which enables him to pin the shoulders of his opponents to the mat with but little trouble.

On the other hand in "Young" Gotch, Ross will have an opponent that will be worthy of his mettle. Gotch, trained for a long time under the watchful eye of his uncle, the late Frank Gotch and old "Farmer" Burns, is a skilled performer. His ability along this line secured for him the championship which he held for two years.

Gotch knows all the "ins and outs" of the wrestling game, and his friends and supporters here, who have seen him in action before, are anticipating that he will be returned the victor on Friday night.

Gotch, who is now making his home in this city, has been training for his match and is confident. He has fully recovered from injuries which he received in his recent match with Frank Hookman. Gotch's list of conquests is long and includes some of the best in the game.

A semi-final match between Colle Biggers of Sanford and Bill Hammond of Ocala, will be staged. Biggers is perhaps the best in the city and his match with the Ocala boy is being looked forward to with much anticipation by local fans.

English Athletes Begin Tryouts For The Olympic Games

LONDON, May 8.—Six training grounds for athletes ambitious to participate in the Olympic Games have been established in England-North of the Tweed, the Scots have put all their football fields at the disposal of Olympic aspirants. The British Olympic Association, with \$150,000 in its purse, has provided trainers and coaches for promising youths anxious to make the trip to Paris.

Within a few weeks a long series of elimination matches will begin to weed out the mediocre and find out the real talent in the hundreds of ambitious lads who want to show their stuff at Colombes Stadium in July. First there will be county matches, then district meets, and finally, on June 20-21, the national championships at Stamford Bridge, near London. After this meeting the British team for sports under the control of the Amateur Athletic Association will be selected.

Meanwhile governing bodies in other fields of sport, swimming, boxing, fencing, rowing and so on are eagerly watching the efforts of would-be heroes and heroines of the Olympics. Nothing startling in the nature of speed or strength has yet been reported among the British aspirants, but the weather has been so wet and wintry that no one has expected any record-breaking. The British are particularly hopeful of success in the long distance runs, some of the shorter track events, and in swimming, though, in the water sports, there is some doubt of equalling the experts from America.
