Ray Garcia Believed Son Cuban Leader

ATLANTA, May 8.-Ray Garcia, one of the three Cubans held in Ocala in connection with alleged violation of the neutrality law is a son of Gen. Garcia y Velez, president of the Veterans and l'atriots' Associations of Cuba, it was learned today.

Several days ago when asked a direct question in Ocala if he was the son of the Cuban leader, Garcia declined to talk, unless advised by his attorney, and has since maintained a strict silence. When he was arrested he was said to be receiving instructions in aviation. He is held under a \$3,000 ball and is scheduled for trial on May 16.

TAMPA, May 8 .- S. V. M. Ybor, Cuban consul, today confirmed the report that one of the three Cubans held for trial in Ocala is a son of Gen. Garcia y Velez, leader of the Veterans and Patriots' Association of Cuba. "Three came to me recently and asked to go up in airplanes that they might become accustomed to flying," said Mr. Ybor. "I gave them permission, although I am not head of the company."
