May Day Meetings

Police forces were trying to make May Day—international labor day of the Socialists since 1889—pass without a head-on collision and bloodshed.

Meanwhile, in Moscow, roaring Soviet Air Force planes staged their most spectacular peacetime air show over Red Square today with Generalissimo Stalin and more than a million Soviet May Day paraders looking on approvingly.

Big four-engine bombers led the thundering air armada that featured the annual parade in celebration of international labor day. The Russian premier's son, Lt. Gen. Vasily Stalin, led the air parade.

Behind the great bombers roared groups of jet planes sparkling in the cobalt blue sky.

Moscow's citizens, who jammed Red Square for their traditional May Day demonstration, gave Stalin a mighty cheer as he mounted the platform near Lenin's tomb. He was followed by Soviet government and Communist Party leaders.

All eyes were turned on Generalissimo Stalin as he walked nimbly up the steps to the rostrum.

Just before the Kremlin chiming rang out at 10 o'clock, Stalin, dressed in his lawn-colored uniform, led his high-ranking fellow officials to the top of the red marble tomb of Lenin.

Without hesitating, he turned smartly at the top and took his customary place on the tribune.

As Stalin watched from the Rostrum, Gen. M. Shmentenko, chief of the army general staff, reviewed a huge parade of Soviet troops.

Shmentenko then joined Stalin on the rostrum and spoke to the crowd.

Shmentenko warned the "war mongers" that Soviet armies are ready to resist aggressors.

And in Yugoslavia, independent Communist celebration minus the pictures of Stalin featured in the Soviet satellites.

The proclamation by Yugoslavia's Communist Party opened the May Day celebrations in Vienna last night with a torchlight parade around the Ringstrasse which circled the old inner city, which chanted "Austria will never become a people's democracy" as they passed the Soviet headquarters.

Down town Paris was virtually deserted early in the day as the city's transportation systems came to a virtual standstill. Workers were observing their traditional May Day lay-off. Communist planned a parade and anti-Communist followers of Gen. Charles De Gaulle scheduled a festival with music and a speech by the General himself. Theaters closed as did most restaurants, but the sidewalk cafes had their tables out for the first of the fine spring weather.

Communists expected to mobilize about 100,000 at a mass meeting in Copenhagen, Denmark. Their rivals, the Social Democrats, hope to have twice that many at their rally.

Hundreds of thousands of Communist-led troops, workers and youth filed through Prague's Wenceslaus Square for Czechoslovakia's biggest May Day celebration.

Czech Communist President Klement Gottwald spoke from a tribune in the square, declaring that all attempts against the regime by Czech reactionaries, and by the Vatican had failed and will fail in the future.

look into the question of whether it would be cheaper to build a guided missile ship from the keel up, rather than converting a cruiser. Sherman said he believed a conversion would be considerably cheaper.

Meanwhile, in Washington, Senator Tolby (R-Ill.) said today the American Telephone and Telegraph Company hasn't "done a damn thing" to stop high time gamblers from conducting business by long distance telephone.

But the company's attorney, S. Whitney Landon, denied the accusation and said telephone companies do not have the responsibility of policing the gambling world.

Furthermore, he said, it would be "dangerous" for a telephone company "to assume the function of law enforcement."

Landon said the A.T. and T. has already private line service to gamblers and bookmakers and is cooperating in every way possible with local law enforcement agencies to halt illegal use of telephone.

Tolby said the company had taken out single line service "but you haven't done a damn thing to stop these people from making calls."

Earlier, Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.) visited at the hearing and Landon had "not made much of a case of cooperation with local authorities" in shutting off house race news to bookies.

At one point, Tolby asked Landon if the company would do anything to stop service on a telephone being used to solicit business for a red light district.

"I don't think we should do anything," Landon said. "That's not our business."

He added he is sure there are thousands of illegal telephone calls being made. "But I don't believe the public wants us to police it."

At another hearing, Rep. Karsten (D-Mo.) suggested that an inquiry be made to determine whether the Communism charges of Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) constitute "a hoax, a deceit, or a fraud" upon the American people.

Karsten said in a statement that two Republican-controlled house committees more than two years ago investigated "a list of 108 names of persons employed, or who had applied for employment in the state department, on the question of whether or not they were security risks."

He said the committees found the State Department was "handling the situation in a satisfactory manner" and that it appears to him the "majority if not all" of the cases McCarthy has raised were among the 108.

Karsten added:

"If so inquiry should be made as to whether or not a hoax, a deceit or a fraud, has been practiced somewhere, by some one, upon the American people."

Asserting that it is "of vital importance that the prestige and dignity of the state department be not improperly impinged," Karsten continued:

"I would have complete contempt for any one who, through deceit or fraud, would seek to influence and hoodwink the American people with the assertion that the State department of their government has harbored or is saturated with Communists."

Crusading Editor, Now 78, Looks Back Over 50 Years' Experience

SALEM, Ore. — (P) — Nobody likes to end up his day's work by getting a fistful of brass knucks in his face. As a young newspaper editor, George Putnam found that this was occasionally the price he had to pay for using his freedom of the press to criticize public officials. After he was attacked for the third time, he put a public notice in his paper: "A closed season on editors is established as of now. Violators will be killed on sight." Putnam then got himself a mail permit, and kept a loaded gun in his desk. After that the threats all came—but no brass knucks. At 78, looking back on more than 50 turbulent years of newspaper work, Putnam today might think of a better philosophy than the one he coined in the early years of the century: "The paper that has no enemies has no friends." Putnam, who learned his craft as secretary for E. W. Scripps, a pioneer exponent of aggressive journalism, is editor and publisher of the Capital Journal here. He is a partly genial veteran who, passing four score years still walks almost two miles to work daily. He opens shop at 7 A.M., writes the headlines for all the day news stories himself, and makes up his own front page. And he still makes up his own mind, too. "The small town editor has a big advantage over the big city editor," he said. "He has more independence. He can tell every-

body he thinks is wrong to go to Hell—and he can run the rest of the paper he wants because he owns it himself." The principle of keeping himself free to tell anybody to go to Hell is very important to Putnam, a bachelor who subscribes to all communities, churches, and towns. He is a devotee of being tied down by friendships. "My philosophy is to advise anything that's good and to support anything that is square and right. I don't mind any difference who it affects, if it's my best friends, I don't care about that." And editor Putnam, a slim blue-eyed, white-haired man of gentle appearance, has never backed away from a fight. "We've had more than 100 suits filed against us, worse than have gotten more often—than any paper in Oregon," he said proudly. "For every libel suit against me, so far as I can remember, I've had one brought by the Klu Klux Klan, the prohibitionists,

Business Mirror

NEW YORK, May 1. — (AP) — More and more businessmen are getting on good days ahead. Executives are backing their bets with forward orders. Many who were buying on a 30 to 60 day basis are switching over to 60 to 90 day buying.

This inventory boom is in direct contrast to the inventory reaction which the same businessmen were staging just a year ago. Then industry all the way from the factory to the store was busy cutting back stocks of goods and raw materials on hand.

During the year corporate inventories dropped by \$4.7 billion to \$48.8 billion. Now they appear to be on their way up again. But production and sales are on the way up, too. And some companies are producing at a much faster rate than they had expected. As a result, they find their stocks of raw material dwindling and rush to replenish what they are keeping going full blast for at least 90 days ahead.

New order placed with manufacturers in March hit a post-war high, the Department of Commerce reports. They were 14 percent higher than in February, and also 14 percent higher than last year. The largest gain in new orders was in durable goods, with others exceeding sales.

Manufacturers' sales in May were the highest in 15 months. Highest sales were reported in lumber, furniture, general machinery, motor vehicles and non-ferrous metals industries.

In spite of sales so good that inventories in durable goods rose only slightly in March.

Moreover, the Business Survey Committee of the National Association of Purchasing Agents in its April report published today sees little chance of a runaway inventory boom. In most companies it finds cautious buying policies continuing. The fact that "with few exceptions, industrial materials can be obtained in the time required" helps the cautious buyer to keep from getting caught short.

But the production department in many companies is under more pressure on the purchasing agent. The NAPA finds that increased production in the first weeks of the year was cutting into stocks a little faster than there were being replaced. Since many production departments expect this high level of output to continue for some time, they are inducing the purchasing departments to go in for a little inventory-building to meet the requirements.

That, says NAPA, is why more buying programs have switched over to the 60 to 90 day policy. Rising prices of some materials like the non-ferrous metals, apparently has played only a small part so far in spurring orders.

American Corporations as a whole have more cash on hand to back these orders than at any other time in history. The Securities and Exchange Commission reports that the average corporation at the start of this year had 78 cents of working capital in cash or government securities for every dollar of current liabilities. The total working capital for U. S. corporations, excluding banks and insurance companies, was \$67.7 billion, a gain of \$2.9 billion in the year. The manufacturing companies did even better as a group, and had more than a dollar in the bank for every dollar

Future Price Of Gas Is Big Issue In New Kerr Bill

By CLARK BEACH

WASHINGTON—The big issue behind the many arguments over the Kerr bill, amending the Natural Gas Act, was the future price of natural gas.

The bill was signed to clarify the Natural Gas Act of 1938 by definitely stating that the Federal Power Commission (FPC) has authority to regulate the prices of "independent" natural gas producers—those who do not own pipelines. The independents supply from 80 to 85 per cent of all the gas produced.

This would bring a quick rise in the price of natural gas, according to opponents of the bill.

No one has been quite sure that only the question of the gas prices. Opponents said whether the FPC had authority to commission would attempt price setting has kept producers from raising their prices closer to those

of coal or fuel oil.

If the natural gas price rose until it was just under that of coal or fuel oil for equivalent heat values, said the opponents, then the additional cost to home and industrial consumers could reach almost \$500,000,000 a year.

Well, said Rep. Hallett (R-Iud) if gas production should come under FPC control, "The government then might go on to control the price of coal, oil and other industries."

No, said Senator Douglas (D Ill.), a noted economist, who spearheaded the opposition. Gas should be regulated. If a coal or oil producer hikes his price too much, the buyer is free to take his trucks or move his trains elsewhere to buy where the price is lower. But the pipeline company must accept whatever price the producer chooses to exact.

"The expense of tearing up a pipeline and laying a new one prevents a buyer from taking advantage of a lower price in a different field," Douglas said.

Already, the bill's opponents pointed out, the price which pro-

ducers receive for natural gas has risen considerably. The average price of gas in the southeast in 1938 was 2.5 cents per thousand cubic feet. By 1947 it had risen to 3.75 cents. New contracts drawn between 1946 and 1948, said the FPC, provide a price of five to six cents, with clauses permitting periodic renegotiations and price boosts.

The price of natural gas to consumers, the bills advocates pointed out, however, fell 12 per cent between 1938 and 1947—from 68 cents per thousand to 60 cents. At the same time the price of anthracite coal rose 6 per cent and fuel was caused entirely by the FPC's oil 75 per cent.

Those against the bill say this "whittling the profits of the pipeline companies and the distributors. The commission found that as the companies increased the volume of their business, they could sell for less and still make a reasonable profit about 6 per cent of their costs.

Senator Kerr (R-Okla.), a wealthy oil man and chief sponsor of the legislation, warned that if price regulation were adopted the industry would lose the incentive to expand. The gas industry, he said, is a speculative mining operation. If profit possibilities are restricted, the producers will put their money into safer enterprises.

To discover new oil and gas reserves, he said, large sums must be risked, and many of the wells are sunk in dry wells. It would be sensible, he said, for producers to take chances where they could get only 4 per cent on successful drilling and no returns whatever for holes that proved dry.

The independent producers, he said, are the only ones bringing in large new oil resources. They have drilled 65,000 wildcat wells in the past 10 years. On the other hand, the controlled, regulated pipeline companies, which own their own gas lands have drilled only 100 wells in the same time. They lacked incentive, he said.

Crackpots Taking Over In Case Of Dr. H. N. Sander

MANCHESTER, N. H., May 1.—(AP)—Annoying telephone calls were dismissed as the work of a "nut" or a "crank" today by principal figures in the case of Dr. Hermann N. Sander.

Dr. Benjamin P. Burpee, a mem-

ber of the State Board of Registration in medicine, and prosecution figures in the case of the young physician reported over the weekend they have received heckling calls and critical letters.

Dr. Burpee said that only last Thursday a male caller told his wife he "could see a boy putting something under your porch and it looks to me like a bomb."

Attorney General William L. Phipney, County Solicitor William H. Craig and Medical Referee Dr. Robert E. Hiron also said they

received calls and letters from "cranks."

Police Chief James W. O'Neil, former national commander of the American Legion, said in a statement he has ordered an investigation. He is attending a conference of Legion officials at national headquarters.

Dr. Sander said at his Cambridge home the calls and letters are "very unfortunate and horrible" and he hopes they stop "immediately."

The 41-year-old physician was

acquitted of a murder charge in the death of a cancer patient, but was barred from practicing in New Hampshire by the State Board of Registration in medicine. He may apply for reinstatement on June 19.
