



DIGEST POLL ON PROHIBITION HAS BEEN LAUNCHED

Sanford's Allotment Of Ballots Already In Mail, Is Report

NEW YORK, Mar. 4.—Twenty million voters throughout the United States are ready to be polled by their opinions on Prohibition by the Literary Digest poll, which has accurately predicted the outcome of the last three presidential campaigns through "straw" votes, according to William Sever Woods, editor-in-chief of the magazine.

Sanford's allotment of ballots has already been mailed from the poll's headquarters in New York City and should be distributed to the local post office here within a few days, according to Woods.

The first tabulated returns of the nation-wide polling will be published about the middle of May, it is stated.

Distribution of the printed ballots which are used in the "straw" referendum have been mailed widely throughout the United States already.

Each ballot is used to indicate by secret and repeat no preference and entails no obligation on the part of the voter. The poll has three questions of which the first is asked to answer the main issue in figures:

- Do you favor the continuation and total enforcement of the Prohibition Amendment and Volstead Law?
- Do you favor a modification of the Volstead Law to prohibit the sale of beer?
- Do you favor a repeal of the Prohibition Amendment?
