EDITORS NOTE: Jones and another Coast Guardsman are in Fowey Rock Light House eight miles out in the Atlantic and isolated by the increasing storm. The telephone is inoperative. They have only three days' food supply—but they aren't worried.

POWEY ROCK LIGHT, Sept. 21—(AP)—Sixteen foot waves and gusts of wind up to 65 miles an hour beat against the lighthouse today as the hurricane approaches.
A slight rocking motion to steel girders supporting the light, and a ladder against the walls, kept myself and one other Coast Guardsman awake during much of the night.
During the storm last year, 100 mile an hour winds whipped up waves that tore off the lower deck of Fowey Rock. The lower deck is 20 feet above the water line.

Twelve to 16 foot waves have churned the Atlantic since Sept. 15, preventing a boat from bringing in new food stocks. Fred A. Diakos, a machinist mate and myself the only two men on the light have enough canned goods to last for three more days. We ran out of fresh meat and bread few days ago.

If the storm prevents the boat from bringing in provisions, the Navy may be asked to fly food to us, probably in a helicopter.
Normally the station has five men. Due to the shortage in the Coast Guard, it now has only four. Two of these, John E. Davis and Frank A. Johnson, are on leave. Davis is due to come back with food in a 20 foot whale boat but he can't open beach.

The light is about eight miles southeast of Miami but the boat has to travel about 14 miles to tie up at the dock.
Each of us stand a six hour watch. We've seen only one vessel since early yesterday. It headed southward for a while but turned around and started northward.

We opened a sack of flour yesterday to make bread but the flour had bugs in it. Bread and fresh meat is mixed meat. We have a sack of canned beef, peas, corn beef hash, some jello and fruit cocktail. Plenty of coffee and cigarettes. But we hope that's not going to be our regular diet for a long time.
We've been in touch with my wife for some time. She lives in Jacksonville. Diakos is not married.

Radiomen On Pan American Set To Strike

CIO Telephone Union Studies Company Offer Of Wage Hike To Prevent Strike

A threat of a strike by nearly 300 radiomen on Pan American World Airways and a possible settlement of a wage dispute involving some 25,000 telephone workers highlighted the nation's labor picture today.

The 296 radio officers on the Pan American's Atlantic, Latin American and Pacific-Alaskan routes will strike at 9 A.M. tomorrow unless the alleged layoffs of 50 radiomen are cancelled.

R. S. Taylor, secretary of the flight radio officers section of the CIO transport workers union, who announced the threatened strike, said the other air and ground employees of the company might join the walkout.

The American Telephone and Telegraph Company has offered wage increases ranging up to 46 a week for 25,000 telephone workers in 42 states and the District of Columbia. Plant craftsmen would get pay hikes up to 41 and operators and clerical employees of Columbia. Plant craftsmen boosts up to 44, the company said.

Florida's Hurricane

(Continued from page one) Tallott, head of the Tampa Weather Bureau, said at 9:45 A.M. (EST) today.

Sarasota, Bradenton, St. Petersburg, Clearwater and Tampa already have had the highest winds to be expected from this storm, he said.

The peak here was 25 miles an hour with gusts up to 40. Tallott said he did not have complete records from other west coast cities, but the peak should have been slightly higher at Sarasota and Bradenton, which were closer to the center of the storm.

At its closest approach to this area the storm was over Lake Okechobee with its most destructive winds, as usual on the right side of its path, or to the east of the forecast area.

For that reason no very high winds are to be expected in the Lakeland-Winter Haven area, rich citrus territory, Tallott said. Winds there should be only slightly higher than at Tampa, with the peak late this morning.

(Continued from page one) ship may not be permanent that in, the number of owners is likely to drop away if there is an economic slump.

That's what happened during the 1930's, the report said, breaking what otherwise has been a steady increase in the proportion of home ownership since 1900.

The proportion had risen from 37 percent in 1900 to 43 percent by the time 1920 came along bringing hard times over the nation. The ratio dropped away to 41 percent by 1940.

The reserve board's report showed home ownership was greater in the higher income brackets than the lower ones, but even among families with incomes under \$3,000, two out of five owned their places.

At incomes above \$7,500, three out of four did so. The survey also showed: The median rent paid by non-farm families at the beginning of this year was approximately \$30 a month. Median means 'middle,' that is, the number of families paying more than \$30 equalled the number paying less than \$30.

More than one quarter of all renting families had increases in monthly rental payments during 1947. There was no change for about 60 percent and there was a decline for a small group.

On the average, families who paid rent spent about 12 percent of their total income on it—less than half the 25 percent traditionally assigned for rent in the standard home budget.

Differences were substantial among income groups, however. Families with incomes under \$2,000 used 21 percent for rent while those with incomes of \$5,000 and more an average of only 9 percent.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22—(AP)—If you're paying the traditional week's wages for one month's rent, then it's costing you twice the average rent payer's outlay, a government report shows.

Some 17,000,000 Americans were paying out an average of 12 percent of their monthly income for rent at the start of the year, the Federal Reserve board said. The median rent was \$30—which means half the nation's renters paid more than that, the other half less.

MANILA, Sept. 22—(AP)—Responsibility for the murders of president Elpidio Quirino's wife and three of their children was among 58 charges filed today against Lt. Gen. Shigeno Yokoyama.

Yokoyama was Japanese commander in Manila shortly before its liberation in February, 1945. He is the general to be tried by the Philippines War Crimes Commission. He will be arraigned next month.

Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 22, (AP)—A short busy, the plaintive whistles of a distant train, a cough's cough and a gallow's clatter are a few of thousands of odd noises that are the daily concern of movie sound men. The noises, recorded on the sound tracks of standard movie film, come out of key, sound men merely dub in one of hundreds on file in the library. MGM's collection is typical. Sounds from airplanes to zippers are carefully catalogued and stored in fireproof vaults. This "library" consists of four walk-in vaults, each holding 2,000 cans of film. Under airplanes, for example, are listed sounds for planes idling, taxiing, taking off, landing and flying, as heard from both inside the craft and on the ground. One card even reads: "old bi-plane, fairly hot, circling." Most animals found in zoos, and many that aren't have had their vocalizing immortalized on celluloid. On hand are a bull elephant's bellow, the chatter of a squirrel and the unmistakable warnings of rattlesnakes and bumblebees. Camels are classified as barking, whining or crying. Dogs are listed by breed. There may be as many as 40 or 50 subclasses under a general heading. Thus the sounds of auto engines are recorded by make and model back to the Maxwell, Stanley Steamer and the Deon (an old English make). Bicycles are classified as "long," "short," "man's," "boy's," "through a handkerchief" and numerous other ways. The sounds of a tea shooter, a candle being blown out, a spittoon being hit, a skull crushed are there. Bells chime and bells are catalogued geographically. Baby's cries are listed by age and whether the infant is happy or fretful. "Our sounds are 90 per cent authentic," says Mike Steinhore, in charge of the library. "It's easier to record the real thing than it is to invent a substitute." MGM has been adding to its files since 1926. Occasionally a film will require a noise that calls for the mixing skill of an expert chef. The "Green Dolphin Street" scene called for an avalanche. By blending the sound of thunder with the crash of falling trees, tearing timber and falling glass—done inside a glass greenhouse for greater resonance—an avalanche was achieved. For the atomic bomb explosion in "The Beginning or the End" the sound men simply amplified and extended their biggest explosion, a 16 inch cannon blast. "Often it's the simplest sounds that are the hardest to record," Steinhore says. "Getting Lassie to give out with a remarkable bark is as hard as anything." His toughest assignments, Steinhore says, were duplicating the din of the earthquake in "San Francisco" and the rattle of millions of locusts for the plague in "Good Earth."

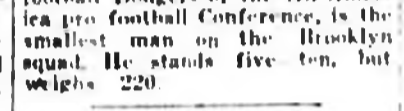

NEW YORK, Sept. 22, (AP)—Henry A. Wallace says "Russia has made mistakes—many mistakes—but the men of the bipartisan have started the cold war."

Wallace also said that "the cold war has expanded on all fronts," Wallace said. "We must make clear where the responsibility lies."

The United States bipartisan foreign policy, Wallace declared, "has developed an approach which, if permitted to come to full fruition, will destroy completely the civilization of the past 2,000 years and may destroy all human life on this planet."

Declaring the death of President Roosevelt "gave the greedy men he had held in check their opportunity," Wallace declared:

"They successfully engineered a right-about-face in our policy, without a mandate from the people. They had to think up a means of deceiving and controlling the people. They did it, stirring up one crisis after another."

To reverse our foreign policy, both Republicans and Democrats had to break down the memory of F.D.R. But they are doing more than vilify Roosevelt. They are re-Nazifying Germany. They are moving in, as they did after World War I, to take over the war plants in Germany. And this time they are doing it on a scale that makes others out of those who once called out billions to build up Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy."

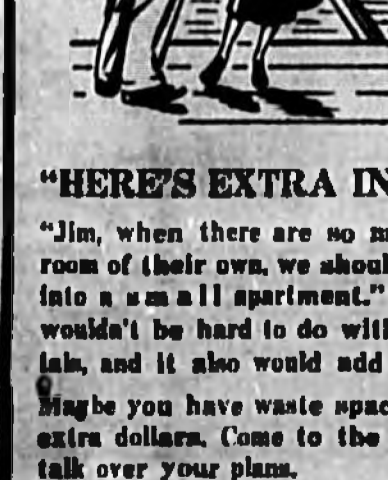

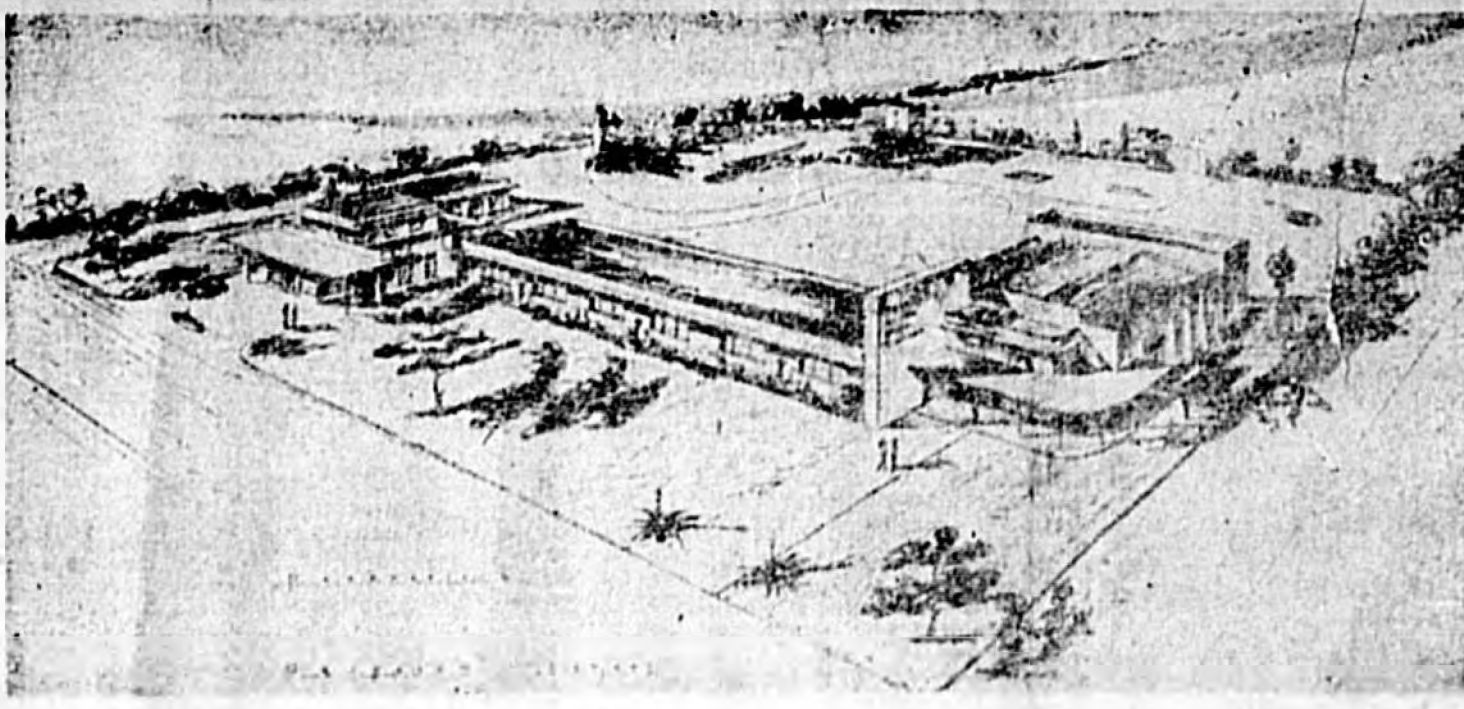

In a very interesting talk at the recent Florida Citrus Institute, Citriculturist Fred Lawrence of the Extension Service gave the growers some food for thought along that line.

From the peel comes marmalade, candied peel for fruit cakes, feed for cattle, and vitamin P to reduce blood pressure.

And everyone is familiar with canned citrus sections fruit salad. Also from the "inside" of citrus comes whole juice, single strength juice, frozen and powdered concentrate, wine, and a distilled oil used in perfume and soap.
