TOWN OF MARTIN CENTER OF RICH FARMING SECTION

Marion County Town Derived Name From Early Settlers; Statistics Show That Many Products Sent From Town

Ocala, Fla. Aug. 14. (AP)—The town of Martin located on the Atlantic Coast Line between Ocala and Lowell, is in the center of a rich agricultural section of Marion county. In the opinion of expert agriculturists, it secured its name from early settlers, the majority of whom bore that name. It is now served by four passenger trains and four freight trains daily.

Located in the town is a manufacturing plant, employing 15 people, where crates and hampers for lettuce and beans are made. These products are shipped to points throughout Florida.

According to data gathered by the Marion county chamber of commerce, the dairying industry which is now a well established business in the section, has great prospects for expanding into great proportions. It was also shown that the poultry industry is a growing occupation in the section with already several poultry farms operating in the vicinity of Martin.

Fifty per cent of the farmers of the Martin territory are making their living at home, the chamber report says. Truck and staple crops, dairy farming and poultry raising are said to be now attracting the attention of the people of that section.

During the past season Martin shipped 40 carloads of beans. Additionally there were 200 express shipments of beans. There were also shipments of 25 express carloads of lettuce and 300 miscellaneous vegetables.

LONDON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14. (AP)—One-time "new woman" is now a gentle old grandmother and what was once the "modern girl" is becoming matronly and sedate in appearance. As a result London dramatic critics are asking what the next novelty in femininity will be.

The novelty has been raised in connection with a revival of Ibsen's "Pillars of Society," the play which created a sensation half a century ago chiefly because the heroine was a "new woman" with short hair and a passion for exposing hypocrisy and reforming everybody in sight.

One critic says that profane and bibulous heroines are already striking the theater-going public as rather dull and threatening as modern play goers are all equipped with "shock absorbers."

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—(AP)—
The main price movement in today's
stock market continued upward al-
though an increasing tendency to
take profits and put out short lines
was noted. Buy-z-z orders were
spread over a broad list, heavy
buying of the rails which sent
nearly a dozen issues in that group
to new peak prices during the
morning being followed by a re-
vival of activity in the high priced
industrials with United States
Steel common touching a new high
record at 158.
Widespread predictions of a big
oil market this week, to be based
on the expected decision of the
Standard Oil Company of New
Jersey directors to retire the pre-
ferred stock and increase the di-
vidend on the common were dealt
a staggering blow when only the
regular common dividend was de-
clared and no action taken toward
calling the preferred.

The traditional "selling on the
good news" brought about a break
of 8 points in Dupont on the an-
nouncement that the quarterly di-
vidend had been increased from 2 1/2
to 3 1/2 percent, and a meeting of
stockholders called to vote on a
proposal to increase the author-
ized common stock from 1,500,000

States Steel Corporation do not
hold their next quarterly meeting
until October, Wall Street was
flooded with reports that a 40 per-

Bandit's Break Has The Discharge Of Mosley, Censoring Superintendent Blitch

Were Asked To Envelope Sealed

Dash For Liberty Near St. Cloud As To Visit An Aunt

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Aug. 16 (AP)—Detailed report of the party accompanying Tracy into the Everglades to recover stolen bonds by the former member of the Ashley-Mobley gang, made J. W. ORLANDO, Fla., Aug. 16, (AP)—Whole hearted support of the Florida Association of Real Estate Boards is to be given the stand taken by State Agricultural Commissioner Nathan Mayo against the ruthless propaganda of some realty operators in promoting the sale of five and ten acre farms in Florida, according to Paul C. McClure, president of the association, who wrote Commissioner Mayo a few days ago that the association was desirous of co-operating with the agricultural department in every way and that for fear that certain portions of the commissioner's statement on five and ten acre farms had been misconstrued, it was desired that a full text of the statement be forwarded to the association.

Upon the receipt of the text verified by the commissioner, the association went on record as favoring the stand taken by Mr. Mayo which points out the folly and unfairness of trying to bring farmers here from other states with stories of enormous profits being made on five and ten acre tracts.

The commissioner asserts that while there may be a few long experienced farmers of this state who are making large profits, sufficient to support a family, on five and ten acre farms, as a rule the income from such size farms will not carry the average family through a season.
