Jury To Continue Probe Of Woman's Death After Alleged Beating Of Mate

CLEARWATER, Fla., Aug. 16. (AP)—At 3 o'clock this afternoon a coroner's jury will continue its investigation of circumstances attending the death of Mrs. Avie Bass here late Saturday afternoon, claimed to have been the result of excitement attending an alleged attack by a group of persons on her husband, M. G. Bass, Friday evening.

Victims of the attack deny knowledge of the identity of any of the members of the mob. Nine men and two women are believed to have composed the mob which lured Mr. Bass from his home, blindfolded and handcuffed him and at the point of guns transported him to a woods about three miles distant where they were said to have flogged him.

RYAN GRANDSON IS JAILED AFTER MURDERING MAN FOR REVOLUTION

Alphonse Smith, Relative Of Canadian Railroad Builder, Shoots Deerham For Alleged Attentions Paid To Wife

WHITSBY, England, Aug. 16. (AP)—Approximately 150 men, mobilized for a Mexican revolution under the command of General Enrique Estrada, former Mexican secretary of war, were landed in prison here last night and a large quantity of arms and ammunition seized by American authorities.

Agents of the United States Department of Justice, aided by city, county and other federal agents, captured what was to have been an armed party of invading insurgents, three miles from the Mexican border.

Jesuit is alleged to have been the cause of the trouble. Deerham was the grandson of a noted British army officer, Brigadier General Tyler, holder of the Victoria Cross.

That a fierce struggle had taken place was indicated by the great disorder in the drawing-room.

Mrs. Smith first met Deerham at Herne Bay, where she was then living. Smith was residing in London, but occasionally visited his wife. The friendship of Deerham and Mrs. Smith is said to have ripened when he began giving her lessons in automobile driving.

HASSEE, Fla., Aug. 16.—A detailed report of the party accompanying Tracy into the Everglades, stolen bonds by the former members of the Ashley-Mobley gang, made to the prison bureau, J. W. Mosley.

Following morning Saturday, we left Orlando to Miami, arriving there at 10:30 a.m., where we put Tracy in the county jail for the night. We drove to Homestead, at which Tracy claimed to have been held in custody, and on Sunday, Aug. 1, we left Miami to Homestead and arrived latter city at about

instead. Tracy called on Mosley, and after conferring with him a few moments we went to West Palm Beach, where he had to see a party friend. Upon arrival in West Palm Beach we discovered that he had removed Park at Jacksonville, whereupon we drove on to Orange county, staying overnight, Monday, Aug. 2, at the request of Tracy to a point in the hills of Leesburg, where he had some of the time from the Coleman pottery, located. We worked this point for a period of four hours, and then went to Orlando and again stayed in the county jail of county.

The following morning, Aug. 3, at 1:30 a.m. we drove to Canal Point, where we left Canal Point, which place we had to leave some of the custody of his wife, Mrs. Shackelford. Our arrival at Canal Point, finally, found the parties of Tracy, after conferring in a few moments, told us he would require several weeks to produce the bond we then drove to the jail for the night and on morning, Wednesday, Aug. 5, returned to Canal Point the day with the wife of the man, Shackelford, left to recover the bonds.

"Upon returning to Orlando an examination was made of the package delivered to Tracy by his wife and Shackelford and it was found to contain a quantity of old paper, cancelled checks, etc. On the following day, Saturday, Aug. 7, I left Mr. Jarman, Sheriff Palmer and the deputies still engaged in a search for Tracy while I returned to Raiford, arriving at about 4 p.m."

Florida Realty Board Is Back Of Mayo's Campaign Against Small Farm Sales

ORLANDO, Fla., Aug. 16.—Whole hearted support of the Florida Association of Real Estate Boards is to be given the stand taken by State Agricultural Commissioner Nathan Mayo against the ruthless propaganda of some realty operators in promoting the sale of five and ten acre farms in Florida, according to Paul C. Meredith, executive secretary of the association. The statement of Mr. Meredith followed that of C. M. McClure, president of the association, who wrote Commissioner Mayo a few days ago that the association was determined to co-operate with the agricultural department in every way and that for fear that certain portions of the commissioner's statement on five and ten acres as farm plots had been misconstrued, it was desired that a full text of the statement be forwarded to the association.

Upon the receipt of the text verified by the commissioner, the association went on record as favoring the stand taken by Mr. Mayo, which points out the folly and unfitness of trying to bring farmers here from other states with stories of enormous profits being made on five and ten acre tracts.

The commissioner asserts that while there may be a few long experienced farmers of this state who are making large profits, sufficient to support a family, on five and ten acre farms, as a rule, the income from such size farms will not carry the average family through a season. With the five and ten acre citrus groves, it is shown that at least seven years is required before the crop is such

that the income is large enough on which to live.

The statement of Commissioner Mayo, endorsed by the association, which appeared in the Florida review, published by bureau of immigration department of agriculture at Tallahassee, follows:
