### WORLD IN BRIEF

#### **Scotland Yard Continues** Dialogue With Gunmen

LONDON (UPI)- Britain recalled its ambassador to Iran Saturday to help deal with Iranian-Arab gunmen threatening to kill about 20 hostages in the besieged Iranian Embassy in London.

The Foreign Office said it would be Sir John Graham's third trip home in recent weeks for consultations on the Iran situation. Scotland Yard cautiously and patiently continued its

dialogue with up to five Iranian-Arab gunmen who seized the embassy Wednesday noon and have threatened to kill about 20 hostages held inside. The gunmen, seeking self-rule for their native oilrich province of Khurzestan, said they would blow up the embassy and all inside it unless Ayatollah Ruhollah Khoemini's regime frees 91 Khurzestan prisoners.

But Scotland Yard settled in for a drawn-out siege. One police source said Yard psychological experts have become convinced "the terrorists are not there to resort to murder" but are staging "an elaborate and grimly enforced international propaganda exercise."

#### Iran May Fly Out Bodies

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)- Greek Catholic Archbishop Hilarion Capucci says the bodies of the eight U. S. servicemen killed in the aborted mission to rescue the American hostages could be flown to Europe Sunday or

Iran, meanwhile, announced Friday a long-delayed second round of elections for the Islamic Parliament, which Ayatollah Khomeini has said will decide the fate of the hostages, will be held May 9.

Sources have said the bodies would be turned over the International Red Cross in Switzerland, The archbisop, a supporter of the Palestinian cause once jailed by Israel for gun running, dismissed a political dispute between Bani-Sadr and Iran's powerful clerical faction said to have delayed the

return of the bodies, saying the only remaining

problems were "medical." Western diplomats have said Tehran's morgue, where the bodies were being held, does not have the facilities to prepare the remains for transport by air.

#### Israelis React To Attack

SALEM (UPI) - Combat-ready Israeli troops fanned out today through the occupied West Bank town of Hebron in response to a well-planned Palestinian guerrilla attack in which five Jewish students were killed and 16 others wounded.

The ambush, the military command called "a murderous attack against a group of worshippers,'
cast a dark shadow over current talks on Palestinian

Authorities said the guerrillas waited until the students had their backs to them before firing automatic weapons and lobbing grenades into the group of about 50 people trapped in a narrow alleyway. The attack at the beginning of the Sabbath Friday evening was the bloodiest assault in the occupied West Bank in 13 years of Israeli rule.

#### Superintendent Of Schools Candidate

### Hughes Emphasizes Community Input

Bob Hughes wants more people to have input into school policy. That's why he's a candidate for superintendent of Seminole County schools.

"We have some of the most talented people in the county here in so many diversified fields," Hughes said. "All we need is an open mind to invite them and make them feel we're sincerely interested in their views - before decisions are Hughes, principal of Sabal Point Elementary School in

Longwood since 1973, said he is concerned that the current school administration does not really provide for community Under the current system, he said, the school board listens to

Because of this, Hughes said, if he is elected superintendent e will form an advisory board that will be consulted before the school board staff makes its recommendations. This board and other advisory committees will be used to

elp iron out problems beforehand, thus their ideas will be etter received, he said. Volunteers to serve in advisory capacities would come from

all walks of life, he said, from public safety to real estate. Hughes reflected on the recent parent uproar over elementary school rezoning in South Seminole County. Parents, particularly those with children attending Woodlands Elementary School, protested the recent rezoning because they said their children would be moved again when a new school is built. Hughes agreed.

"Before any decision of rezoning, a decision should have made as to where a new school would be built." Hughes, so far the only announced candidate for the superintendent's post, said his candidacy stems from "a strong, burning desire to have the best educational system possible" in Seminole County, and his frustration as a school administrator under the present system.

Hughes will run for the non-partisan post hoping to replace superintendent William P. Layer, Layer has been elected whether he will run again when the current term expires.

One of Hughes' major complaints is lack of cooperation

"We need a more harmonious working relationship between the superintendent and the school board," he said. The school system also needs a better means of com-

municating with the public, he said. "It's not the school administration's goal at present." he said, "but it should be. Now, it's just his and miss." Hughes also feels the school board members themselves suffer from a lack of information that should be provided to

them from the superintendent. Again, stressing community input, Hughes said an acceptable sex education program could be developed with a good advisory group. "With doctors, nurses, ministers, parents, teachers and

retired persons, you could develop something to be presented to students, with parental permission, that would not be too controversial." Commenting on recent athletic "recruitment" charges that have taken up much of the school board's time; Hughes said he

thinks it was "overreaction to some misunderstandings and some poor communication." Hughes said as superintendent he would leave it up to the principals to decide whether or not a transfer student should be given a waiver to participate in sports.

He said he supports any kind of rezoning that provides for students to go to the schools closest to their homes. But he said he feels the "trauma" of rezoning is often felt more by parents than the children involved. Often you have a case, he explained, where parents have

joined a PTA and worked hard to raise money to buy playground equipment for the school. Then they find their hildren transferred to another school. But Hughes said some of the rezoning problem would be mnecessary if the school administration would start planning

for new schools ahead of time. "You don't have to wait for the students to actually be there," he said. "It's projected."



### Castro Badgers Enemies Through Switch In Policy

United Press International

Fidel Castro opened the way for disgruntled Cubans to leave their island nation just before Easter as a way to badger his two most irksome opponents, the United States and Peru. The master of the political nose-tweek now is using Washington's reluctance to accept the refugees for a dig at critics

of Cuba's own stiff emigration laws. Castro has said Cuba will allow anyone - not just those who took refuge in Peruvian Embassy in Havana last month - to leave the communist Caribbean island if they wish. Cubans have been fleeing the Caribbean island since Castro came to power in 1959. But traffic from the island the past two

Many Cubans began their exodus from the grounds of Havana's Peruvian Embassy. Countless others simply made their way to the port of Mariel, west of Havana, and boarded one of the boats waiting to ferry them across the Florida

The flow began as a trickle in December. Over a threemonth period. 19 Cubans burst into the Peruvian Embassy. according to diplomatic sources.

Cubans also dodged police gunfire to enter the Venezuelan Embassy, diplomats said, and in one attempt two were killed at the gates. . On April 1, while the two South American nations tried to

obtain safe passage for the refugees, a bus carrying six Cubans rammed the wire fence of the Peruvian compound. Castro's government charged one guard was shot to death by the would-be refugees in the daring daylight move. Peruvian officials said the refugees fired no shots and the guard apparently had been hit by a bullet from another guard's gun, but the incident seemed to set Castro on his course. Two days later the Cuban leader charged both embassies with "inciting Cubans to seek asylum, thus creating a climate of violence." He withdrew police protection from the Peruvian

The move triggered the refugee's Easter stampede. In less than 72 hours more than 10,000 Cubans jammed the Peruvian

With the crisis in its 12th day, Castro allowed commercial planes to began ferrying the first groups of refugees to Costa

The United States said it would take 3,500. Argentina Ecuador, Venezuela, Canada and Belgium offered homes to another 1.500. Castro, possibly as an afterthought, also decided to allow thousands of other Cubans including some imprisoned

### Paddling's Bad, But This, Too?

We're not convinced that paddling unruly students as punishment for their offenses in the schools is ineffective and totally useless, although the issue can be argued with merit from opposing points of view. However, the latest turn of events coming out of Tallahassee have us a little worried Seems there's a Florida legislator — a retired school teacher and principal who boasts of paddling students during his 28-year career — who wants to change the law to permit teachers to paddle students without first consulting a school

This is a dangerous precedent. It sets up a situation legal minds have for years worked to avoid: permitting someone complaining of another's actions to become judge, jury and the one who issues the punishment. That's just what a teacher would become if permitted to determine a student's actions warrant punishment by paddling, then be allowed to do the paddling.

The legislator who proposes the new law is Sam Mitchell, D-Chipley, who argues paddling is effective and teachers need to be permitted to do so without consulting the school principal, because that principal may have banned paddling as a

As it stands now, a teacher who considers a student's actions worthy of paddling must report that student to the principal or the principal's designated administrator who assesses the matter and rules on whether a paddling should be

By state law and school district policy, the only time a teacher now can use physical force against a student is to prevent that student from hitting another student or teacher.

Of more concern, should Mitchell's bill become margins exceeding 70 percent in the unruly student may react emotionally from the frustration of being unable to control that student. Unless there is a cooling-off period to give the teacher time to collect himself, the paddling may not only be unjustified, it might be administered with considerably more force by a teacher still angered over the student's behavior.

Rep. Bobby Brantley is opposed to Mitchell's proposal dalthough the House Education Committee voted 8 to 4 to turn it over to the full House. If the bill gets on the calendar and goes before the full House, we urge the legislator to paddle it right back to Mr. Mitchell.

### Fitting Punishment

When the House Ethics Committee voted to recommend the censure of Rep. Charles H. Wilson, D-Hawthorne, for financial misconduct, it left his constituents to exact a fuller measure of retribution — expulsion from office.

Wilson's misdeeds were flagrant, even by congressional standards. He was convicted by the committee of three counts of accepting kickbacks totaling \$10,500 to influence legislation from his position as chairman of a postal subcommittee. and five counts of converting \$24,000 in campaign contributions to his personal use. He escaped conviction on seven other charges.

Censure must yet be voted upon the full House, before which Wilson will be entitled to speak in his own defense. And while it is the most severe penalty the House can levy upon its members, short of expulsion, censure is merely a public expression of disapproval — a slap on the wrist. More significant was the committee's further recommendation that Wilson be stripped of his subcommittee chairmanship, a serious diminution of his power.

Even this step is a minor infliction upon an elected representative who is shown to have banked \$200,000 in income with no known source during his nine terms in Congress. The only fitting punishment for boodling on this scale is expulsion from office. Inasmuch as the ethics panel could not steel itself to perform this public service, the voters in his 31st District in Los Angeles should do so in the June primary or, that failing, in the November general election.

#### For Desegregation Busing

tudents swarmed through the streets and massed outside a federal courthouse Saturday to protest a court-ordered school desegregation plan calling for busing thousands of pupils at an estimated cost of \$31

Demonstrators circled the downtown courthouse and chanted "Hell no, we won't go!" Protesters carried signs reading, "Desegregation plan stinks, do it right" and "Teach us to read not ride."

The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on March 3 ordered St. Louis public schools desegregated by this The desegregation plan presented Friday calls for

consolidating some schools and for 7,612 students to be bused for integration. Under the plan, all white students but fewer than a third of black students would be in racially integrated schools. Blacks make up more than 76 percent of the 65,000 students in city public schools. Some civil rights groups

contend the only way desegregation can be accomplished is to bring in the predominantly white suburban school districts in St. Louis County.

#### City Hopes To Halt Strike

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio (UPI) - Hoping to halt a strike that has stripped Youngstown of police and fire protection, choked off municipal services and forced the dumping of raw sewage into a local river, city officials decided to go to court.





### Horse Tracks Near The Wire

Florida's horse racing industry is an endangered species and "Without regulatory and tax relief, the future of the industry (in Florida) is highly uncertain," stated Killingsworth, who has conducted similar studies and forecasts of horse racing in New York, Pennsylvania, Chio, Illinois and Colorado. His most recent report involves a set of detailed studies

called, "The Future of the Horse Racing and Breeding Industry in Florida," and "The Economic Contribution of the Thoroughbred, Quarter-Horse and Harness Horse Industries in the State of Florida." The 1980 report showed in Florida horse racing costs are

increasing at 10 to 12 percent per year, while revenues are growing at only 5 to 7 percent. It also stated that the Florida horse industry has an annual economic impact of \$900 million

"The current status of horse racing in Florida is very troubling, and the outlook for the next few years is bleak. Tracks are operating at a very low profit, purses are below competing tracks in other states by \$1,000 to \$1,500 per race, and Florida breeder awards are below breeding programs in major competing states by one and two million dollars per 1978 to 1979. Allowing for the secondary and tertiary



### WOMEN **Working Wives Boost Housing**

Special to the Herald Salaries earned by working wives continue to have a major impact on home buying trends, especially among those tering the housing market for the first time, according to national survey by the Family Housing bureau, a public formation service of Chicago Title Insurance. In its fourth annual home buyer survey, the Family Housing Bureau reports that in 1979, 82.8 percent of those surveye were married. Among these couples, 49.1 percent of the wome

were employed.

While these figures are down slightly from a year earlie when 86.9 percent of those surveyed were married and 56. percent of the women were employed, there's no doubt that the second income is making it possible for many couples to ent and move up in the housing market.

Among first-time buyers, those families in which the wif was employed accounted for 64.1 percent of the total, and 53. percent of working wives were employed full time. Among repeat home buyers, 41 percent of the wives were mployed but only 22.9 percent were employed full time.

The survey showed that as a group, first-time buyers had a median household income of \$24,070 and paid a median price of \$50,000 for their homes. However, those with full-time workin wives had a median income of \$27,720, and paid \$51,200. Median income dropped to \$22,718 among first-time buye when the wife was not employed, and the median price for

house purchased was \$51,250. In the first-time buyer group, when the wife was employ part-time, the median family income was \$17,850 and the median house price was \$46,000. However, this categor represented a statistically small 10.3 percent of the total. The Family Housing Bureau noted that among repeat buyers in the 1979 survey, those with working wives had a clightihigher medien income but aevertheless paid less for their

The medien income for repeat buyers with full-time working wives was \$27,610. When the wife was employed part time the median income dipped to \$27,200, and for families in which the wife was not employed the median income was \$25,140.

#### George Drew:

# Cabin -

Herald Staff Writer

From the chance finding of an old rowboat, a career at sea was born which lasted more than 50 years for a retired Lake Mary man

When George Drew was 13-years-old, he found an abandoned rowboat near his home in Mayport, Fla. at the mouth of the St. Johns River. After plugging the leaks with tar, he used the boat to explore the intercoastal waterway and for fishing and camping on the sandy islands found there. Saturday's catch of fish was usually sold at a local

fish market for 10 or 15 cents a pound. The year was 1917 and a large sailing ship lay anchored in port, awaiting clearance before unloading



her cargo. The young teen, a sharp businessman as well as a good fisherman, thought the ship might be a good market for his fresh fish. Risking a heavy outgoing tide, Drew rowed his boat

out to the ship and managed to catch hold of the anchor chain just before being swept out to sea. The five-masted sailing vessel was French, but I

#### George Drew, left, who retired in 1970 began sailing the high seas at age 13: Although he is a seventh grade dropout, Drew is proud of his accomplishments. captain spoke excellent English, Drew recalled, and after a long voyage from Africa, fresh fish would certainly be a welcome change in their diet. Not having American currency, the French captain paid Drew with a couple of French notes. Back home, he asked his parents what he was going to do with the strange money. They suggested he take it to a banker and see what it was worth.

In American currency, he found the francs were worth twelve dollars. "I thought I had a gold mine."

He returned to the ship and asked if they would like any fresh vegetables. "I took them a case of cabbage, a bag of potatoes and any fresh vegetables I could find," . The young American made friends with the captain and before the ship left port, the captain told him he needed a cabin boy and asked Drew if he would like the

Drew had never been to sea before and asked what -his duties would be and how much it paid. The captain told him he would have to clean the officer's quarters, help the cook and wash the dishes. The pay was 25

francs a month, about \$15. Drew asked his parents if he could go. "My mother shed a few tears and my dad wasn't too happy, but they let me go," he said. With a cargo of cross ties and lumber, plus a 13-year-old cabin boy, the French sailing vessel left Florida bound for South Africa. Later, Drew sailed up the coast of Africa, stopping in Mombasa, Kenya, then through the Suez Canal into the Mediterranean to France. From there they took a load of general cargo to Adelaide, Australia.

"We went around Cape Horn," Drew said. "I never had such a trip in my life. Up and down the masts like a

For several years Drew remained on the French ship, speaking the language and wearing the French uniform. In a cafe in LeHarve, France be was approached by four American seamen from the tanker "John D. Archibald." They thought he was a French sailor who could direct them to the port's night life.

top savers and coupon clippers and have found it to be a fun as well as a profitable activity. Sharon Driskell and Diana Rogers, both of Geneva, explained that each year manufacturers put out qualifiers, or coupons, that can be redemined for cash or gifts when mailed to the company with the required number of box tops, end seals, or other proof of purchase of their products.

Sometimes it is only half a dollar while others are worth several dollars or more, they said, but most require the special refund form as well as the proof of purchase. The forms are often on display with the products or or specially marked boxes. "Sometimes they are kept at the desk if the sales rep didn't have many," explained Mrs. Rogers. Some stores post them on bulletin boards.

"And some refunders will rip off half a pad," added Mrs While the refunders are searching the markets, drugstores and magazines for refund forms, they are busy saving the boxes and wrappers from almost everything they buy. They will save until a refund offer comes along. Sooner or later most major brands will offer a refund, they claim. "
