Ella Heading North

MIAMI (UPI) — Tropical storm Ella, skirting the Florida Coast, turned to a more northerly direction today but still kept the U. S. south Atlantic seaboard within range of its 70 mile an hour winds.

The Weather Bureau said the storm showed signs of zig-zagging and warned coastal residents from Cape Canaveral, Fla., northward to Cape Hatteras, N. C., to keep in touch with advisories.

The direction change brought an all-clear report for the east Florida Coast south of Cape Canaveral.

At 11 a. m. the Weather Bureau located the storm's center about 300 miles east of Melbourne, near latitude 23.0 north, longitude 75.6 west. It was moving on a north-northwest track at about six m.p.h.

Ella should pick up speed slightly on the new course during the day, the Weather Bureau said, but "another temporary turn toward the west-northwest or northwest is possible on Thursday."

"Winds and seas will gradually increase along the south Atlantic Coast from Cape Hatteras to Cape Canaveral during the next 24 hours and small craft from Cape Hatteras to Palm Beach should remain inside," the 11 a. m. advisory said.

Forecasters had predicted Ella would grow to hurricane strength today but at mid morning it had shown little change in size or intensity. The only change noted was that stronger winds began appearing on the south side of the center. Gales extended outward 350 miles to the north of the center and 175 miles in the southern semicircle.

Lease Talks Discussed By Hunt Officials

Officials from the Hunt Oil Co., Dallas, owners of the ILLH Products plant currently building now on the 600 acre site southeast of Sanford, were in town Tuesday to confer with city officials and John Krider, manager of the Chamber of Commerce about the construction of a group of industrial buildings for lease to potential tenants.

Those making the trip were Murray Hey, director of real estate for the Hunt empire; George McVay, director of industrial development; Ralph Kelch, company engineer; and J. L. Williams, president J. L. Williams Co., Dallas.

Krider said his organization receives many queries from small companies that would like to come to Sanford if there were industrial space available for them to lease, but they go elsewhere when informed there is none.

"Now" says Krider, "with the Hunt people willing to build such buildings, one of them a large 50,000 square foot structure, which can be divided up between a number of tenants, the problem of the small industrialist will be solved for us and for him."

The oil company will put up the buildings and then modify to suit the tenant's needs, Krider said. He added, "this will open the door for a number of small companies to come into the area that we previously had to turn away. We are through giving tickets to other cities in the area."

Keep Economy "Well Balanced" -- Conner

Agricultural Commissioner Doyle Conner urged Seminole farm leaders Tuesday night to keep their economy "well balanced" and maintain a strong agriculture to match the area's booming tourism and industrial growth.

Speaking before some 200 members of the farm bureau, Conner stressed a well diversified economy with agriculture in the forefront, "it's the backbone of this county and the entire state."

He cited figures in which agriculture was "big business" in Seminole County with a "400 percent increase in 20 years and an annual value of \$14 million with citrus, vegetables and livestock leading the way."

He called on farmers to start learning better business techniques to keep up with "downtown and industry."

"With new concepts in merchandising we must assume the leadership bridging the gap between our producers and markets in the north," he added.

Conner touched on a variety of subjects ranging from the farm bureau as the "voice of agriculture" and the need for an active program.

He discussed briefly the new agricultural emblem of the state, "Sun Flower," and said this state had no equal as far as citrus production was concerned.

Prior to Conner's speech, an election of farm bureau directors was held.

City Orders 'Alert' For Storm Threat

Winds up to 40 miles per hour accompanied by heavy rains are expected to hit the Central Florida area today, the weather bureau reported.

Standby alerts were ordered by City Manager W. E. Knowles and Red Cross Disaster Chairman, A. E. Peterson Jr., who said that the following sites have been designated as shelters, in case of emergency.

Main shelters — National Guard Armory and Grooms Academy. In case they are needed these shelters will be opened: for all south of 12th St., Seminole High School, Lake Mary School, Monroe School, South Seminole Junior High School, Longwood School, Geneva School, Chulavita Community House and the Orinda church.

A. E. Peterson Sr., Civil Defense Director said that all Civil Defense personnel are notified and are on a standby basis.

Persons taking refuge in shelters are asked to take blankets and pillows with them, also special diets or baby formulas as early emergency rations will be provided. Pets cannot be admitted, but food and water should be left for them at home.

Peterson warned residents to follow the usual hurricane precautions, collecting all loose objects outdoors, closing windows and shutters, checking lamps and flashlight batteries, filling containers with water, and laying in a supply of canned foods, in case electric service, water and gas are cut off.

Keep a window or door open on the side of your house that is away from the wind. If the wind changes close it and open on the other side.

After the storm, be cautious, Peterson warned, do not touch fallen or low hanging wires, avoid puddles, report hazards and watch out for fire.
