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Celerymen Bow Out Of 1947 Season Tonight In Orlando

Attempt To Schedule Morning Centest With Islets Killed; Stanton To Hurl

The Sanford Celery Feds, playing near sensational ball in the past few days in a feverish effort to win a berth in the 1947 Broughness playoff series, had all hopes of playing the extra game that would have given them the fourth slot on the ladder washed away last night after the Feds had drubbed the Orlando Senators in a 4 to 2 contest at the Municipal Park yesterday afternoon.

Manager John Krider, President George Rines and Florida State League President Sidney Herlong, joined to Daytona Beach last night in a final attempt to set a contest between the Feds and the Daytona Beach Islets, but the trip was to no avail.

If the locals could have played one more game and won it then could have trimmed the Senators at Tinker Field tonight, they would have needed the Senators out of the first division by .0007 of a point, percentage points reward.

A more brilliant drive for the first division by a club that was rated no better than sixth place at the first of the season, could never have been displayed by any aggregation.

It is true that the Feds did not finish the season in second place as they did last year, it is also true that no one expected the aggregation to have a striking change at the big ring.

Friday night at the Municipal Park the Feds put on a show of fielding ability that has hitherto been unshown in Florida State League this year. Outfielders made catches and infielders made plays that were nothing short of sensational. The Celerymen were forced to go 11 innings with the St. Augustine Saints to gain the 1 to 0 victory. Bill Stanton won the route and gained credit for the victory.

Yesterday evening the Feds invaded the Ancient City and dropped a costly 5 to 3 battle to the Saints.

Tonight the Kridermen bow out of the 1947 Florida State League baseball season at Tinker Field in Orlando in a single contest with the Senators. It is likely that Manager John Krider will send Bill Stanton to the hill to face the Bolons.

Yesterday Huddy Laks went the route for the Feds against the Senators and was the master of the situation all the way.

Joe Jones, stringbean right-hander of the Senators, opened on the mound for the Bevilmen, but was sent in early shower by the hard fighting Huddy Laks. Davis took over at the hill assignment for the visitors in the third frame and limited the locals to one run during his tour.

BEAR MOUNTAIN, N.Y. Sept. 1 (AP)—For the benefit of football fans who spent last season discussing the greatness of the Army football team, here's what's likely to happen when a good part of that squad turns out for the Eastern All-star tussle with the New York Giants next week.

Arnold Tucker, Glenn Davis and Doc Blanchard likely will be in the starting backfield but won't play more than half the game except under extraordinary conditions.

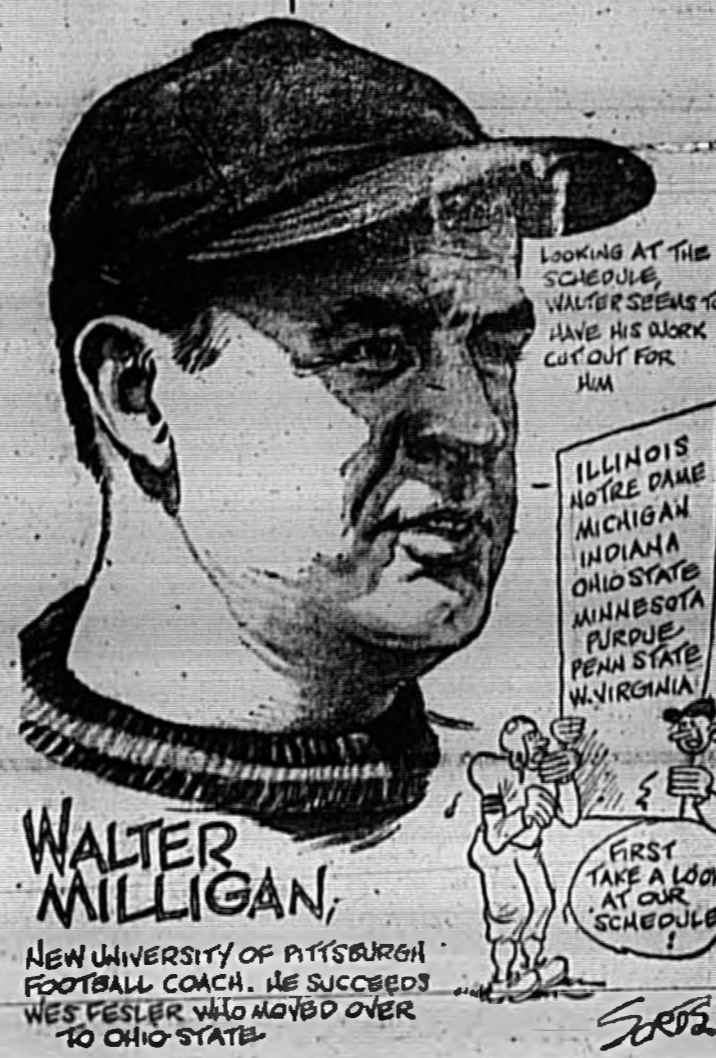
Bill West, Blanchard's sub, will be fullback in the alternate backfield. Center Jim Enos is a 50-50 starting choice with Lou Dukas as Cornell, Shelton Miles is a possible starting tackle although Penn State's Red Moore seems likely to get the call while Alf Tavel is running behind Yale's Rhuler for the other tackle position. End Tom Hayes has a sprained ankle while Barney Poole didn't show up. He returned to Mississippi this fall. Off that lineup, as presented by Head Coach Tuss McLaughry, they don't lack a bunch of world beaters, but it must have been a right good football team to produce so many all-star candidates.

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED

McLaughry tells this one to illustrate the value of a cool quarterback like Tucker to any football team. In scrimmages the other day, the squad's regulars couldn't gain on dive tackle plays because the defensive guards were ranging wild. Tuss outlined the situation before sending Tucker in and Arnold replied, "Don't worry coach, I'll take care of that." On the first play he called for a quarterback sneak, which caught the guards out of position and gained a country mile.

Doc Blanchard, who wore no 35 on his jersey though his college career had to settle for 35-a as an All-star. Seems the original number was retired for good after Marlyn Cobdill's great performance a few years ago. Bill Schuler is the only Giant player who'll be opposing his own team next Wednesday. Bill doesn't mind because he plays football for fun instead of the money and plans to be a pro only one season. Steve Cline of St. Bonaventure is the squad's tension-reliever and is so popular that the boys pick him as "captain" in photographs. Defensive tactics were outlined by the head coach's son John McLaughry, who is coach at Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., a post formerly held by Mel Hein.

Baptists Denounce Truman Letter To Pope Pius XII

ROME, Sept. 1 (AP)—Spokesmen for a group of 44 American Baptists touring Europe asserted today that the recent exchange of letters between President Truman and Pope Pius XII implied that the United States government is an ally of clerical totalitarianism.

Their statement declared the President's action "associated with the Vatican in a crusade apparently against Communism," and said such procedure "violates our cherished American doctrine of separating church and state."

President Truman himself is a Baptist.

The statement described as "unwarranted" the return of Myron C. Taylor as presidential representative at the Vatican, and said: "We believe this action is as closely connected with the presidential elections next year as it is connected with the events in Europe."

Asked for comment, a Vatican source who declined more specific identification said only that "the one on a matter which presents an either/or, the Vatican is not going to comment on President Truman's motives."

The spokesman for the Baptist were Dr. Duke McCall, executive secretary of the executive committee of the Southern Baptist Convention at Nashville, Tenn., and Dr. Frank K. Means, educational secretary of the convention's foreign missions board at Richmond, Va. Dr. Ernest F. Campbell, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Alexandria, Va., was with them as they made their comment.

The spokesmen said they group sent to Europe two months ago to study Baptist relief work, returned a "pregnant" message to the Southern Baptist Convention but the northern convention.

They said: "On behalf of group here, representing both northern and southern Baptist convention, we feel that the recent exchange of letters between President Truman and the Pope, in which President Truman associated the American government with the Vatican in a crusade against Communism, violates our cherished American doctrine of separating church and state."

Rural Common Sense

SCIENTISTS ARE NOW BREEDING CROPS THAT WILL RESIST INSECTS

A new chapter is being written in the story of man's battle against insects—a never-ending struggle that seems to grow more intense from year to year. The new chapter deals with the development of crop varieties that possess resistance to certain crop pests, a step greatly desired by everyone who has had to struggle against pests to produce crops.

While new and more powerful insecticides are still coming on the scene, giving fresh succor to those who are engaged in controlling pests, the discovery and development of varieties of different crops that have high resistance to pests is indeed exciting. Department of Agriculture plant breeders recently reported on the subject.

Winter wheat resistant to Hessian fly they think is probably the most effective job so far done along that line. But progress is being made in developing corn which will be little affected by chinch bugs, stored grain insects, the European corn borer and the earworm.

Although work with other crops has been less extensive than that with wheat and corn, the Department men report striking results already in breeding sorghums resistant to chinch bug, barley resistant to pea aphid and potato leafhopper, sugarcane resistant to the sugarcane borer, sunflower resistant to seed weevil, and even locust trees resistant to the locust borer.

They find records of resistance in nearly 100 different plants involving more than 100 different insect pests. No doubt the group will include plants of economic importance in Florida if the breeding for resistance is carried on with such a large variety of plants. But the scientists tell us it is a slow process, even with plants that yield more than one crop a year.

Anyway, Florida growers hope that they will succeed before many years and thus help to reduce a large annual pest control bill.

Ultraviolet Light Reducing Disease

NEW YORK—A six-year study at St. Luke's Hospital has shown a marked decrease in respiratory diseases through use of ultraviolet lights throughout an entire convalescent building for children.

Reporting the study in the New York State Journal of Medicine, Drs. Gertrude M. Hyde and Reginald A. Higgonas said they believed it was the first time such a building was covered completely for air sterilization.

Ceiling Lights

The lights, hung from the ceiling, irradiated only the upper half of the rooms with ultraviolet light. It is the ultraviolet in sunlight that tans the skin. Burning night and day, the lights gave every cubic foot of air in the entire building a sterilizing effect equivalent to 100 complete changes of air every hour, they said.

At night the lights gave a faint glow resembling moonlight, but the youngsters had no trouble sleeping. The usual night lights were made unnecessary.

The study covered three years without the lights, and three years with them. The figures "indicate a reduction of 35 per cent in the actual number of children feverish from respiratory diseases for the treated years as against the untreated years."

Disease Checked

The lights also appeared helpful, the physicians said, in limiting the spread of outbreaks of contagious diseases.

Some of the adult attendants also had fewer respiratory infections. The odor usually found in children's institutions disappeared, the report added.

Ordinary house plants, however, died within a short period of time in the rooms with the "moonlight" light.

The experience showed, Dr. Hyde and Dr. Higgonas said, that the lights should be used in summer as well as winter. They said maintenance cost about \$500 a year to keep 50 lights going, with original installation costing about \$2,000.

Red Commander Of Berlin Hits Western Powers For Stalling

By RICHARD KASISCKE BERLIN, Sept. 1. (Special)—General Alexander Kotkov, Soviet commander of Berlin, charged the western powers Saturday with anti-democratic actions and stalling tactics in postponing the adoption of a law to socialize Berlin's major industries.

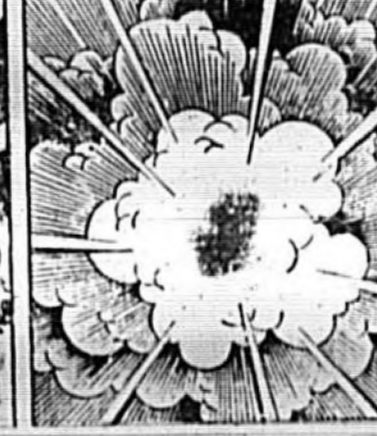

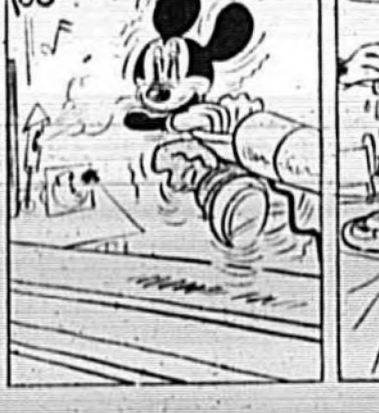
