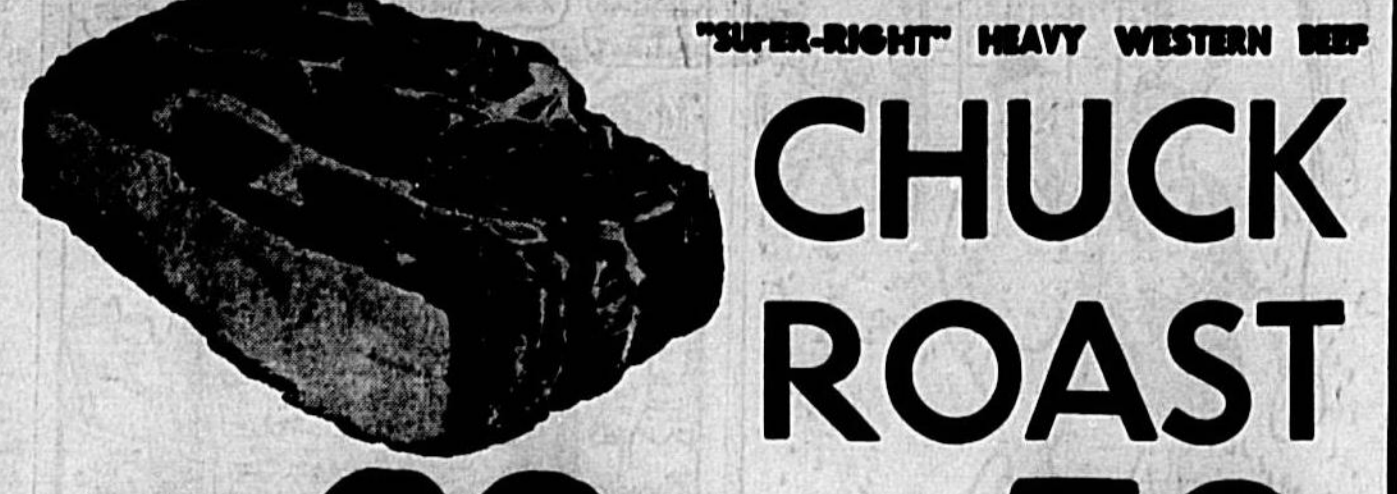

## Twins, 19, Lose Legs In Combat

Richard and Ronald Sanoria, identical 19-year-old twins who enlisted in the Marines last year and were sent to Vietnam, will be reunited next week at Tripler General Hospital.

Each lost his left leg above the knee as the result of exploding Viet Cong mines.

The Sanoria twins are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lucie Sanoria, plantation workers in the village of Pahoa on the island of Hawaii. They joined the Marines Jan. 15, 1968, and went to Vietnam on Aug. 27.

Although they were assigned to separate units in the Da Nang area, the young Marines saw each other frequently until Feb. 19 when Richard, a private first class, was wounded by a mine while on patrol. He was evacuated to Tripler March 16 and his leg was removed.

Ronald, a lance corporal, was hit by a mine explosion June 11 while on patrol near Da Nang. He was wounded in the back and legs, and later shot in the stomach by a sniper before he could be evacuated. He had returned to duty previously after being shot in the arm.

Richard currently is at Clark Air Force Base in the Philippines, but is scheduled to join Richard at Tripler about June 25.

Marines at Pacific headquarters here have begun a fund-raising campaign to bring Mr. and Mrs. Sanoria to Honolulu for a reunion with their wounded twins.

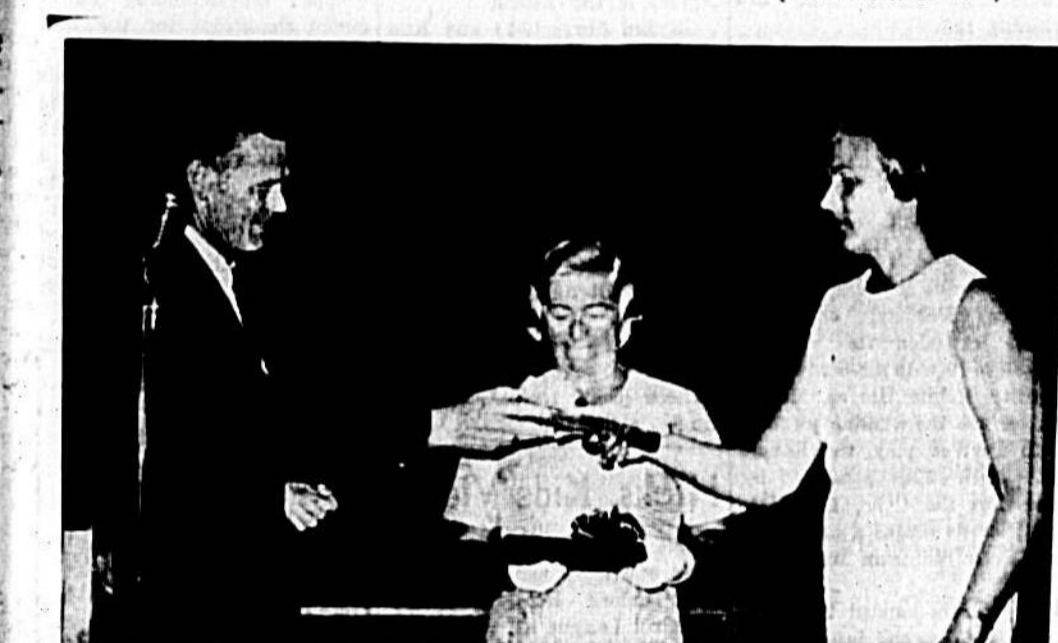

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Shortly after a new teletype system was installed to link the Food and Drug Administration's Washington headquarters with its 18 district offices, the first experimental message came chugging from an anonymous Boston staffer: "WHAT HATH GODDARD WROUGHT?"

Efforts are directed toward inspection and regulation of food, food additives, cosmetics and potentially hazardous household items, such as cleaning fluids. In the past, a food inspector finding filth in a plant would warn the manager and perhaps return a few months later to see what had been done.

Within the agency, the energetic Goddard is just as controversial. Armed with the necessary authority from Health Education and Welfare Secretary John Gardner to re-organize the agency, Goddard was quick to encourage deadwood to get out.

As this year began, the FDA staff was staggering under a mountainous backlog of applications for testing and marketing drugs. Since adoption of the Kefauver amendments to the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act in 1962, the agency was responsible not only for making sure that drugs were safe, but also for certifying that they were effective.

Pork and corn have a flavor affinity that's very appealing. You'll wonder why you didn't think of combining pork steaks with a corn stuffing long before this!

Arm steaks come from the shoulder section of pork, says meat authority Bob Blaggs, and they're frequently marketed in the one-half inch thickness. To make them suitable for stuffing the round bone is removed from them with a small paring knife. Spread with stuffing, they're then rolled and fastened with a skewer or tied with string before baking.

**Golden Filled Pork Bells**  
8 pork arm steaks, cut 1/2 inch thick  
Salt  
Pepper  
1 can (16 ounces) cream-style corn  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3 eggs, beaten  
3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine  
1/2 cup chopped green pepper  
5 tablespoons chopped onion  
4 cups soft bread crumbs  
1/2 teaspoon dry basil  
1/2 teaspoon sage

Remove bones from pork steaks. Season with salt and pepper. Combine remaining ingredients, mix lightly and spread on steaks. Roll each steak as a jelly roll and fasten with a skewer or tie with a string. Place rolls in a moderate oven (350 F.) 1 hour, or overnight.

## You May Have Won

The Kremlin, which has budget troubles just like any capitalistic government, is going to raffle off two per cent of an entire year's output of cars in the Soviet Union.

Only amounts to 4,000 cars, but the lottery, beginning July 1, is expected to rake in millions of rubles which will be used to finance intensified military training for civilians.

Though it may sound like an unrealistic tactic, state-owned lotteries are routinely used to raise supplementary revenue in the U.S.S.R. Seldom has there been such a glamorous one, however.

Waiting lists for new and used cars, filled up for the next two years, were closed indefinitely last February. New plants, which will raise production from the present level of 200,000 cars a year to 800,000, won't be in full operation until 1970.

## Crop Rotation

Men have been cultivating the good earth for at least 10,000 years, yet we continue to learn new things about this most fundamental and necessary of all occupations.

Back in 1877, Urban Pittman, a Canadian agriculturist, researcher in Alberta, noticed something peculiar about wheat. Crops planted in rows running north and south always matured up to a week earlier than wheat planted in east-west rows. Examining the roots of a test row, he found them aligned in a generally north-south direction.

After ruling out every other possible cause, he realized that the plants must be responding to an outside force, which could only be the earth's magnetic field.

Later, he discovered he could speed up germination by exposing wheat seeds to an ordinary magnet. Corn and beans responded much the same way.

Alberta farmers are now applying some of this new knowledge by planting winter wheat by the "compass crop" principle. Some of them claim it yields a four to seven-bushel increase in dry years.

American scientists recently applied another "outside force" to seeds. At Pacific Northwest Laboratory at Richland, Wash., operated by the Battelle Memorial Institute for the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, the successful production of two crops of potatoes in one growing season was achieved for the first time. It was done by irradiating

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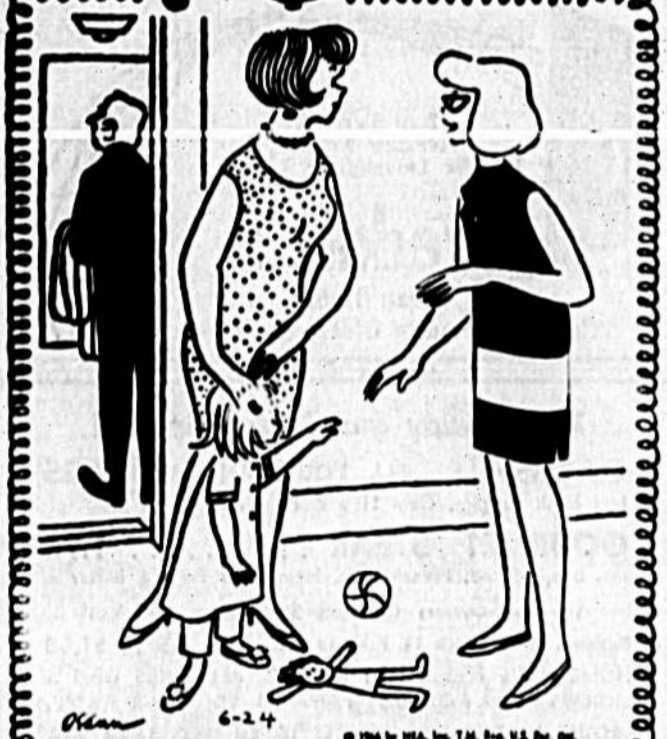

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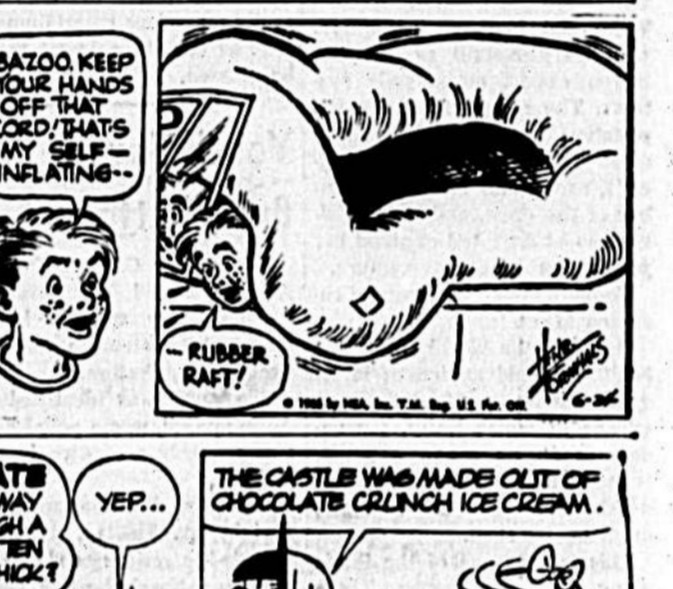
