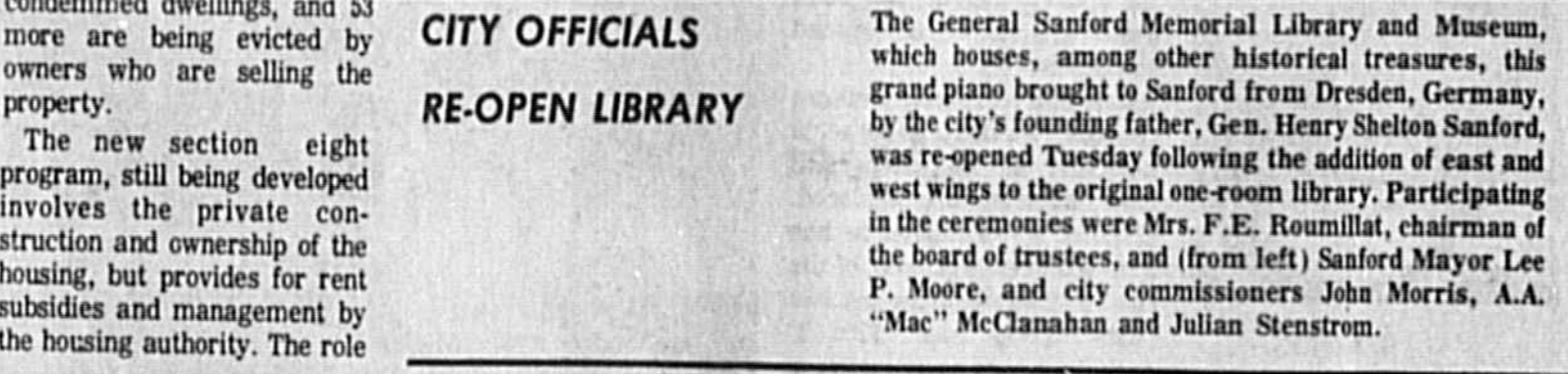

Bankruptcy Rate May Top Record

NEW YORK (AP) — While families have shown recently a tendency to resist purchases of big ticket items and to reduce their debts, many of them still have a heavy burden of bills as the economy drifts into recession.

Most financial analysts still maintain there is no great danger in the big bills owed by households, but there isn't one of them who isn't watching closely the statistics on loan delinquencies.

Fear does exist among some bankers, for example, about the ability of the most overburdened families to pay their creditors, especially as the jobless figures rise and overtime is eliminated.

In the fiscal year that ended June 30, there were 168,787 personal bankruptcy cases. In-
dications are that in the present fiscal year the rate is higher, probably near 1967's record of 191,729.

A check of court records in various large cities by Business Week magazine, showed more cases filed in the first 10 months of this calendar year than in all of last year.

The Morgan Guaranty Trust Co. notes in the current issue of its "Survey" that the amount of consumer debt, including mortgage loans, increased by 42 percent between the end of 1970 and the middle of 1974.

While that figure seems large in itself, the significance is that same period rose by only 37 percent. It commented: "A bigger share than in the past of people's incomes is already committed just to make payments on past purchases."

Much of the American public, it appears, not only attempted to raise their style of living in spite of inflation but, when frustrated in doing so, took out loans to pay the bills.

Now, when repayment ability is weak, these bills are coming due.

Morgan observes that delinquency rates for both installment loans and mortgage loans have risen over the past year.

In mid-1974 about 2.63 percent of installment loans — the kind that are repaid in weekly or monthly installments — were listed as delinquent, or 30 or more days behind in payments. That rate compares with 2 percent a year earlier and is the highest since 1950.

Economist Tells How To Save On Turkey

Baste your turkey at home and save. Turkeys for the holidays may look out of reach price-wise. But one way to cut down on the price per pound is to look for a plain turkey rather than one that is "self-basting."

Actually, basting is usually unnecessary. But if you prefer the basted kind, here's one way it can be done. Place the turkey in a shallow roasting pan and brush with shortening. Lay a piece of cloth, such as cheesecloth, over the turkey breast and legs, and brush with shortening again.

Then put the bird into the oven at 325 degrees and occasionally with the pan drippings that accumulate. If the top begins to brown too much, cover the turkey with a tent of aluminum foil.

Because roasting time varies with the size of the turkey, it's best to look at a time chart on the turkey wrapping or in your cookbook.

If you prefer the convenience of self-basting turkey and are willing to pay the price, you should read the label on the bird. The label will tell you what the basting solution is made of. The ingredients-and-flavor-of these solutions can vary widely, and may make a difference in your family's enjoyment of the roasted bird.

Balloonists High On Hobby

BRUSSELS (AP) — For most people air travel means nesting cozily in a plush seat, sipping a cocktail and watching a movie. For a rugged few the only decent way to rise above the earth is standing in a basket.

For Albert Van den Benden, ballooning is a family tradition. His father and two brothers were, like himself, addicts of the hydrogen-filled balloon. There is something of the wind-jammer spirit in their hobby.

Instead of gazing down from the clouds to the tune of roaring jet engines or the monotonous drone of a piston motor, Van den Benden elects to do it as often as he can to the sound of the slipstream whizzing around the ropes of his creaking wickerwork nacelle, the hiss of hydrogen escaping from the huge sphere that sustains him in a web of ropes.

He is one of the relatively few aeronauts who still believe in the balloon, one of the earliest means designed by man in his quest to imitate birds.

"It's difficult to say what actually makes me like balloons," says Van den Benden, a lean 56-year-old businessman. "It was in the family, but still I suppose it's the splendid isolation, the silence and the lust to conquer the elements in getting where I want to be."

Once the owner of three balloons, Van den Benden owns only one now, a black beauty he has christened "Valentine." Like the others, "Valentine" was made by Van den Benden himself in his garage.

"It really isn't all that difficult," explained the Belgian delegate to the International Aeronautics Federation. "I draw a pattern and from that I cut tapered pieces of synthetic rubber cloth and glue them together. Balloons used to have a service life of about five years when they were made of rubber-impregnated Egyptian cotton," Van den Benden went on. "Now that we use synthetics like neoprene and hypalon, they are virtually immortal."

Van den Benden is one of the three gas balloonists remaining in Belgium. The main reason for the decline is probably the cost. Ballooning isn't all that expensive if you compare it to big-time yachting or hunting, but the \$6,500 price tag on an average balloon doesn't exactly put it in the popular range. On top of that, an average ascension costs around \$500. And that is just the price of the 500 cubic meters of hydrogen needed to inflate the balloon.

The hydrogen, a highly flammable gas, is perhaps the only remnant of the past, with the basket-like nacelle. "The reason it's still being used here is the price. It costs about 60 cents for 1.3 cubic yards. Helium, which is safe, costs five times as much," Van den Benden said, pointing out that helium is compulsory in North America.

After several oil and steel wool treatments skillet will be useful without it. After washing my skillet I always place it on a low flame so it dries thoroughly before being put away. Pains In Chest Need Attention

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am a white male, age 64, weight 190, and height six feet two. I have been active in sports all my life particularly the contact sports. My present occupation is football and lacrosse coach. I can honestly say that I am in pretty good health, particularly in reference to diet. I will say, however, I am not very careful in reference to rain, cold and snow, having spent some bad days playing, officiating and coaching. I seldom wear a hat.

For the past three or four weeks I have been pestered with a nagging burning sensation, at times right in the middle of my chest. This sensation seems to originate just below the breastbone and work right up to my throat where it seems to linger a few seconds and then passes away. This sensation at times will cause my upper chest to become sort of tight and sore, sometimes it will go straight through to the back. This sensation will come on at any time, while cutting the lawn, reading or watching TV. I do not smoke cigarettes. I do, however, smoke three or four pipes each night. I never smoke during the day. I drink an occasional highball before dinner.

I have a yearly physical each September. It includes an X ray, ECG (heart tracing) and other tests. So far all have been normal. At times I become terribly depressed and don't seem to pay attention to what some people say, particularly my wife. Would you say old age is finally catching up with me? I would appreciate your comments.

DEAR READER — There is no way to be certain what you have from your history alone. BUT, you and anyone who has chest pain should seek medical attention at once. I don't mean in a day or two or a week or two, but right when it happens. Call the doctor when you have the pain. If you can't find the doctor go to the nearest hospital emergency room. Get someone to drive you, if possible.

I don't mean to be an alarmist, but unexplained chest pain can be the first sign of a heart attack. These are so common in our society that you have to regard it this way. Also, the best chance you have of surviving a heart attack is by getting early attention. That means you can't sit around home wondering if it is indigestion or a heart attack. Call your doctor or get to the

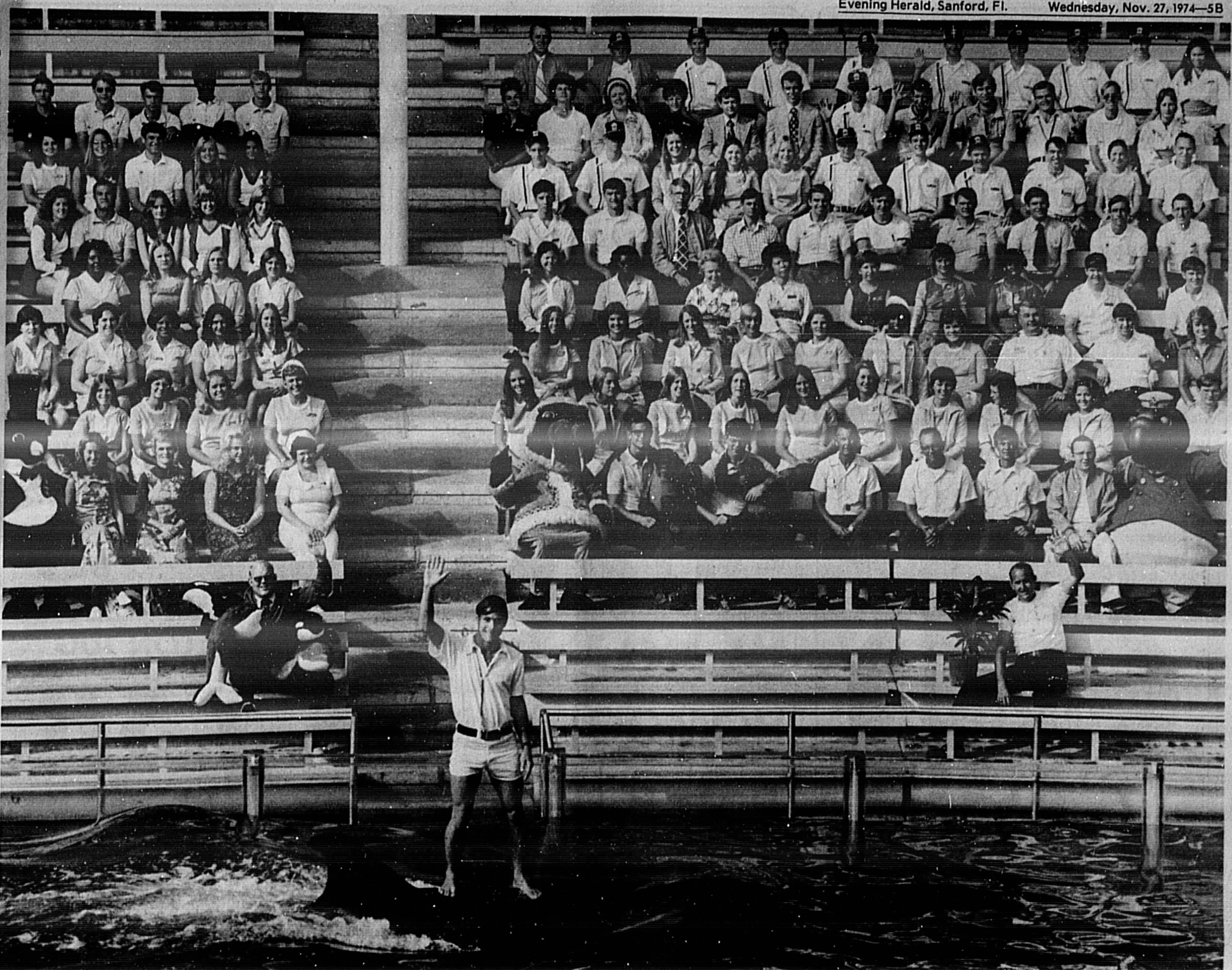
