South Seminole Floods Bring Disaster Relief Call

8-Inch Rains Block Roads, Threaten Areas Of Homes

Heavy thunder storms in Seminole County the last two days have resulted in a call for emergency federal flood relief by County Commissioner Lawrence Swofford.

Swofford said the major portion of the southern end of Seminole County is underwater. County Commissioners termed the two-day flood condition "critical" and Commission chairman John Krider has called an emergency meeting with the county drainage committee for 2 p. m. Friday.

As of 11 a. m. today, nearly eight inches of rain had been reported in the south end of the county and six inches in the Sanford area.

The heavy rains have caused floodings, washouts of primary roads and drainage to homes, mostly in the southwest area. "Something must be done about this problem right now," Swofford emphasized.

MIAMI (UPI) — The Weather Bureau at Miami issued the following all-clear tornado report at 11:30 a. m.

"The threat of tornadoes has ended for Central Florida. While showers and thunder storms continue over Central Florida it appears from station reports and radar observations that most of the severe activity has ended. There still exists the possibility of strong winds in the area from Palm Beach to Lake Okechobee to Vero Beach."

Swofford said that every lake in the south end is overflowing and singled out Lake Seminole, Lake Orienta, Bear Lake and Lake Brantley creating special hazards.

He said the downpours have left water which is threatening lake front homes around Lake Seminole and if the rain continues for another day these homes may have to be evacuated. County Engineer Bob Davis has been in the field all morning with work crews.

Davis directed a crew to stop flooding on Orona Road, where barricades were set up, and inspected washed out roads in the southern end of the county.

His office reported that approximately 60 calls were received complaining of flood damage. Rains have flooded and washed out parts of SR 46, SR 436, Orona Road, the Pignetti section, Temple Terrace and Tanglewood and Loch Arbor.

Barricades have been put up in all these areas and road department officials report that if the rain ceases, no evacuation measures will be necessary. The sheriff's office and the Florida Highway Patrol was alerted to breakdown and warn warnings are over the county.

All law enforcement offices were notified to keep men on a standby basis. One of the few county areas to escape any serious threat due to the heavy rains has been the Sanford city area.

Termed "bad" by city officials has been the Goldstone and Georgetown areas where barricades have been set up to protect homes from being flooded. City Manager Warren Knowles said that all city work crews are working around the clock cleaning out drainage gratings and will continue to work full-time until the rain stops.

The Mayfair Golf course has been completely covered with water making play impossible. Only minor interruptions of telephone and electrical service have been reported and only a few accidents have been reported due to the rain.

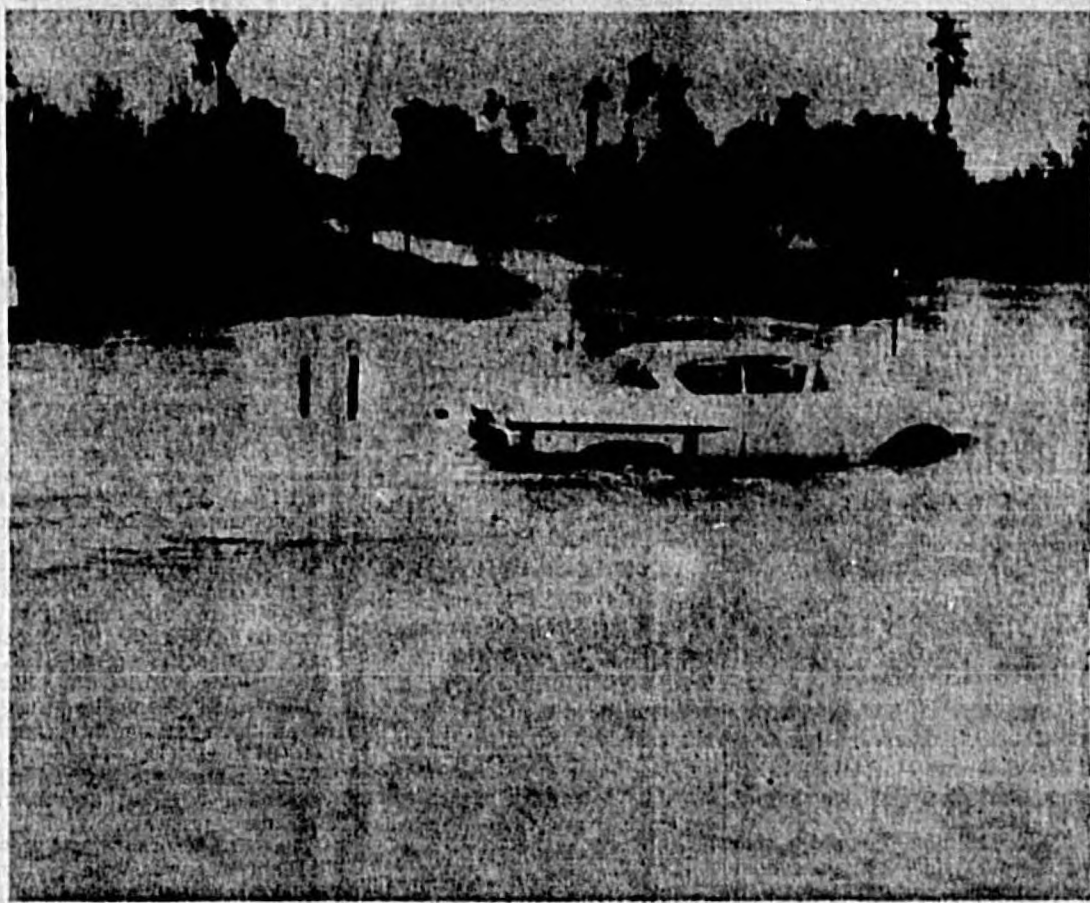
Early this morning a car driven by James Edward Johnson of the Sanford Naval Air Station slammed into a police car driven by Patrolman Earl Bourqueard. No injuries were reported in the accident that occurred at French Ave. and Third St. but damage to the two vehicles was estimated at \$50.

Krider said the county's present system of drainage is inadequate for the large volume of water that hit the county the last two days.

"Land that was formerly used for storage areas for water has been cleared and drained for sub-divisions and the water dumped into already inadequate ditches and canals," Krider said.

Krider added that long range plans are now being studied by the drainage committee in an attempt to find a permanent solution, which will undoubtedly require some method of financing other than present county funds.

The special committee has been working on the overall drainage problem for the past three months.

Washout Endangers Tampa

TAMPA (UPI) — Heavy rains early Thursday, threatening to flood a 20,000-acre residential section.

The Hillsborough County sheriff's office warned the thousands of residents to be ready to evacuate if necessary. The area is known as Forest Hills.

It was the latest crisis to face the Central Florida area hard-hit by flooding caused by three days of torrential rain.

Almost at the same time, a tornado was reported east of Tampa at Seffner, but there were no immediate reports of damage.

The dam break occurred at Lake Magdalene on the fringe of the city's northern limits—an area hard-hit by flooding in the summer of 1959.

Heavy equipment — bulldozers and draglines—were ordered into the area to try to plug the gap.

The county called for all available men and trucks and sent prisoners from the county jail to aid in the work. National Guard trucks were sped to the scene.

The spring floods, which drove about 250 persons from their homes in a three-county area of Central Florida, receded today despite a Weather Bureau prediction of more rain.

Some 207 persons spent the night at three Red Cross shelters on the eastern edge of Hillsborough County. At Lakeland in adjoining Polk County, Civil Defense workers moved about a dozen families from inundated homes.

Water endangered several other residences in Lakeland and at Dade City in Pasco County to the north, where an unofficial estimate pegged the 24-hour rain-fall at 21 inches.

Today's forecast for the flooded area was for cloudy skies and occasional locally heavy thunder showers with gusty winds, showers ending tonight.

Heaviest damage in Polk County was to roads. Civil Defense Director Col. Heydon W. Buchanan said 2,500 miles of county roads were damaged. He said the damage would amount to at least \$200,000 and probably more. Water poured over many roads, others were washed out and several bridges collapsed.

A heavy rain and hailstorm at Cocoa today blew down a 170-foot transmission tower of a radio station.

The storm poured hailstones one-quarter inch thick across Cocoa Beach before moving out to sea.

The Red Cross said at Orlando that 40 to 50 homes in a subdivision were flooded with water "covering the floors." It said 150 to 200 homes in the same section will be endangered if the water keeps raining.

A new storm spread snow, rain and ice up the Atlantic seaboard today while the Midwest began cleaning up six-foot drifts left by its worst snowfall of the winter.

Spring was only three days away on the calendar, but the Weather Bureau warned that heavy ice might snarl communications and slicken highways from Virginia through West Virginia into Pennsylvania, New York and southern New England.

Thousands of midwestern travelers were stranded by up to 18 inches of new snow which blanketed Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, southern Wisconsin and southern Michigan Wednesday.

Chicago traffic slowed to a standstill beneath eight inches of snow—the city's worst storm in six years.

Thirty-mile-an-hour winds whipped the snow into heavy drifts and closed hundreds of schools across Nebraska and Kansas to the great lakes.

A foot of new snow fell on southern Appalachian Mountain areas where helicopter crews were hard at work to bring fuel and food to thousands of stranded mountaineers.

United Press International listed at least 31 persons killed in the two storms. Kansas and Texas reported six each, Illinois had five, Indiana and Wisconsin four each, Iowa three, and Nebraska, Arkansas and Florida, one each.

The Miwestern storm weakened as it crossed the Great Lakes to merge with Eastern snows.

San Pittsburgh, Pa., and Rochester, N. Y., reported three inches of new snow during the night and Brookville and Williamsport, Pa., had two inches.

Gina Mad At Italy
ROME (UPI) — Gina Lolobridi, her temper matching her dyed red hair, said today she is leaving Italy to live in Canada because Italian authorities refused to grant her husband and son Italian citizenship.

Price Called Factor
PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The U. S. Steel Corp. report criticizing the high cost of labor is "an attempt to justify future price increases," U. S. Steelworkers President David J. McDonald charged today.

Volcano Erupts
PORT MORSBY, New Guinea (UPI) — The volcano on Manus Island, nine miles northeast of New Guinea, erupted with a shattering roar today. There was no immediate information on the fate of the 4,000 native residents of the six-mile long island.

Two Ships Collide
NORFOLK, Va. (UPI) — An American tanker and a Norwegian motor vessel collided in the darkness of the Hampton Roads harbor channel early today, spilling 150,000 gallons of gasoline from a hole in the tanker's bow. There were no injuries.

Census Aid Asked
WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower has called on all Americans over 18 years of age to cooperate fully with the national census that gets underway April 1. In a special proclamation Wednesday, he reminded all citizens that it is their duty under federal law to answer all questions applying to their families when the census taker calls.

France Planning Atomic Explosion
PARIS (UPI) — France plans to explode its second nuclear device at its Sahara Desert testing ground shortly after daylight next Tuesday, an authoritative source said today.

That is the day before Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev will arrive here on a state visit. The source said that if weather conditions were not suitable for an atomic explosion at that hour the test would be carried over until the same time the next morning.

Rights Plan Falling Apart

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A plan carefully worked out by House leaders to push the administration's voting referee proposal through Congress showed some signs today of falling apart. The plan was agreed to last weekend by Democratic and Republican leaders with some concessions being made to Southerners in an effort to head off delaying tactics.

But Southern Democrats are making a stronger bid than expected to water down the proposal which would authorize federal courts to appoint referees to guarantee Negro voting rights.

There were indications that the Southerners would pick up some GOP support for a proposed amendment to limit the plan to elections for federal officials. It now would apply also to state and municipal elections.

The Southerners had a series of other amendments in reserve. There were grumblings in the GOP camp about floor maneuvers that resulted in putting a Democratic

instead of a Republican, name on the pending administration proposal. The squabble over the referee amendment washed out chances that the House could pass the civil rights bill today and send it to the Senate. Leaders hoped for a final House vote Friday.

Southern Democrats were obviously irked by adoption Wednesday

of an amendment, worked out by civil rights backers in both parties, to stiffen the referee plan. The amendment, approved by a vote of 188-120, reinstates some authority that was stricken from the proposal as a concession to the Southerners. The amendment would require referees to act promptly on Negro applications for voting rights.

Whites, Negroes Battle In Georgia; Troops Called

SAVANNAH, Ga. (UPI) — Scattered fighting between whites and Negroes broke out in Savannah today and state troopers sought to stifle the potentially explosive situation.

The troopers had been rushed to Savannah this morning by Gov. Ernest Vandiver after Savannah Police Chief Sidney Barnes said he feared trouble. A group of Negroes began throwing rocks at a car at one point. At another, a fist fight broke out between a white boy and a Negro but it was quickly broken up by police.

Groups of whites and Negroes, numbering about 100 each, lined up on opposite sides of a street. There was a report they were throwing stones at each other.

The tension was heightened by the fact that an unusually large number of people had gathered in downtown Savannah for a St. Patrick's Day parade.

In addition, all schools and the city's several colleges were closed for the parade, a tradition in the seaport city.

The holiday atmosphere threatened to turn into an ugly situation shortly after the parade ended.

Both whites and Negroes apparently were tense because of Negro attempts Wednesday to integrate lunch counters at seven stores.

Six blocks of the downtown area were virtually under martial law. Police and state troopers were posted every few feet along Broughton Street, the city's main thoroughfare.

Barnes said police were concentrating their efforts on keeping the crowds moving and off the streets. Troopers and police all were armed with billy clubs. By noon the situation appeared to be under control.

No arrests were reported immediately and the presence of fire trucks at one downtown section helped police in efforts to disperse the crowds.

A group of Negro teenagers attacked a car driven by a white man, Peter L. Hoxie. Hoxie told police the Negroes threw rocks at his car, tore holes in the top and dented the sides. He said that when he got out of his automobile, the youths threatened him.

A call for tear gas was received at the police department and some was dispatched to the area but there were no reports that it was used.

Mrs. Reynolds To Seek Office

Mrs. Kathleen Reynolds qualified Tuesday to run for county supervisor of registration.

Mrs. Reynolds has lived in Sanford since May, 1951. She attended Birmingham Southern College, Birmingham, Ala., and is a member of the First Baptist Church, Seminole Chapter No. 2, O.E.S., the Pincrest P.T.A. and has been mother adviser of the Rainbow Girls since 1953.

Mrs. Reynolds lives with her husband and two children at 2426 Willow Ave.

Mrs. Reynolds said, "I have watched the growth of Seminole County in the past few years and I am vitally interested in its continued development. If I am elected, I will run the office of supervisor of registration in an efficient manner so that at all times there will be an accurate and up-to-date roll of qualified voters, in which I feel the citizens of Seminole County are entitled."

DeBary Firemen Stop Flooding

The DeBary Fire Department responded to an emergency call during Tuesday's heavy rains after water had backed up the plumbing and flooded a home at 180 DeBary Dr. Sixteen men responded to the call, the flooding was stopped and the water was swept out the doors. Damage was confined to the rug and floors.

Longwood To Get Tax Franchise

The Florida Power Corp. will present Longwood with a tax return franchise at the April 7 town council meeting, Longwood Mayor A. B. Lormann said today.

The power corporation will also give new electric rates for town power, Lormann said. The tax return franchise will mean that Florida Power Corp. will periodically return to Longwood a certain amount of the money it gains from serving the town with power. The return will probably start with two per cent and work up to four per cent, the mayor said.

Vote Registration Shows Increase

Voters in Seminole County were reported "flocking" to registration places to get on the rolls in vote in the May 3 Democratic primary.

Only 14 days remain for registering before the rolls close April 2. Supervisor of Registration Camilla Bruce pointed out today.

Mrs. Bruce said at noon that 1,040 new names have been added to the voting roll in areas outside Sanford since the books have been taken down for registrations.

"It looks as if the total may go beyond 13,000 before the books close," she said.

The registration office in the Chamber of Commerce is open from Monday through Friday from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. and Saturday from 9 a. m. to noon.

Side Yard Can Be Front If You Look At It Right

The Sanford Board of Adjustments and Robert Bedenbaugh may not look at front yards and side yards exactly the same way, but both agreed Wednesday that Bedenbaugh could have a Florida room in his front yard.

It seems Bedenbaugh uses his Cedar Ave. front yard as a side yard and his Fourth St. side yard as a front yard. Putting a Florida room in his legal front yard would only leave 7 1/2 feet to the unpaved street instead of the required 20 feet.

But then there's always the fact that Bedenbaugh's Fourth St. side yard looks like a front yard. So Bedenbaugh will have a Florida room in his front yard, which looks like a side yard, while leaving his side yard like a front yard.

But he said Eisenhower probably would not be keynote of the Chicago convention. "He's the President of the United States; he doesn't need any special handle or slot," Morton told a reporter.

Eisenhower told his news conference Wednesday he had not been invited to deliver the keynote address next July but would participate in the convention and the autumn election campaign if asked.

At the same time, the President abandoned his ill-concealed neutrality and made clear that his personal choice for the Republican presidential nomination is Vice President Richard M. Nixon. Morton, a Kentucky senator, heads the arrangements committee which makes recommendations for the keynote and other convention officials, and for the convention program.

The GOP chairman said it was likely a day would be set aside in the convention program to honor Eisenhower, the greatest war-gatherer in Republican history. Morton said it was too early to say how much of a campaign burden the President would be asked to take on next fall because plans would not be set until August.

The society aims at helping children and adults. Though children often benefit the most from rehabilitation, such treatment can also help put handicapped adults on the road to recovery, Dr. Parker said.

Parker, who is on the society's advisory staff, said that the rehabilitation group uses a broad interpretation of "crippled" and applies it to anyone who has kept from carrying out a normal life. Whether such persons need special chairs, tools, instruments or even schooling, the society will try to help them. It underwrote care of more than 254 crippled county residents last year, he said.

Therapy treatment is given by trained therapist Donald Saterice every Monday from 8 a. m. until 1 p. m. The treatment is given at the Simon Laboratory, 240 San Marcos Ave.

The Crippled Children's Society also helps transport handicapped youngsters to the Forrest Park School in Orlando. Therapy treatment there includes instruction in braille reading for blind children, lip reading for the deaf, and aid to palsied youngsters to help them perform daily functions normally.

Dr. Parker said the Sanford Pilot Club has helped get money for rehabilitation work in the county and has also helped getting Easter Seals to the public. Of the funds collected by the county society, 10 percent goes to the National Association for Crippled Children and Adults, 37 percent goes to the state crippled children's association and 73 percent stays here for county rehabilitation work.

Until 1959, when the present county society was formed, Mrs. Harold Appleby "carried the bag" for work with crippled children and adults, Dr. Parker said.

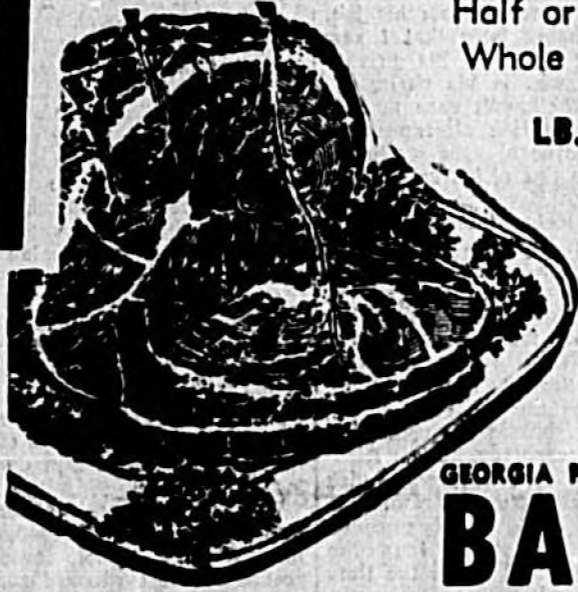

WORRY CLINIC by Dr. G. W. Crane

Tom's case should warn all of you wives whose maies are approaching 40. When husbands begin to drink to excess, or gamble, or drive their cars recklessly, or essentially criticize you wives and even tell you they never did love you, even at the time of the wedding, such symptoms usually cover up a growing placental condition. Recognize the case and the following:

CASE #1 — 404: Tom R., aged 40, presents a typical story. "Dr. Crane," he began in embarrassment, "my marriage has been entirely platonic for the past two years.

"My wife thinks my failure to show her physical affection is due to my chronic alcoholism."

"For I stay at a tavern each night till I am staggered drunk."

"But that is to divert her attention and protect my ego, for I hate to admit to her that I am sexually no good."

"Sometimes I have even deleted putting a bullet through my brain, but I am such a coward, I haven't got up the nerve."

"Do you suppose there is any hope for me?"

During early marriage, the usual husband is much more glib than his wife.

You Bible students may recall that patriarchal Jacob thus had four wives — Leah, Rachel and their maids.

It is thus assumed that the normal male-to-female sex ratio is 4:1 during the first year of marriage, then you can see why husbands get so peckish after the age of 40.

For sex is the basis of both production as well as reproduction. And men past 40 are loaded with executive responsibilities on the job.

They also have financial obligations at home concerning mortgages and other payments.

A young man of 25 is more a clock-watcher on the job. And when he punches the time clock at the quitting hour, he is care-free and not loaded down with financial or family worries.

The 45-year-old husband, however, still has mental and physical burdens that cause worry and strain during the remaining hours till bedtime.

His wife seldom realizes the dangerous mental state into which he has fallen, for even a 1:1 ratio is entirely satisfactory to the normal wife.

The worried husband soon throws himself into a completely platonic state, for fretting is a mental function. It involves the brain.

But you can't "cerebrate" and also "emote" for very long before one or the other process must decline.

And "cerebrating" means you are thinking. Thus, your emotions decline. That's why fear is the chief cause of male impotence; not a lack of hormones, emanating illness or metallic poisons.

The latter occasionally are the cause of impotence, but the chief factor is an inferiority complex.

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Bishop's Last Letter Reads Like Ann Frank Diary

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—They have isolated me as if I were a contagious leper.

"They are trying to tear the faith out of the hearts of priests and faithful."

Thus did Roman Catholic Bishop Simon Tsu describe his last, hard years in Communist China—years that brought increasing persecution, house arrest and finally death at the age of 91.

The two telling sentences were contained in letters smuggled from the churchman's closely guarded residence near Nanking. The Vatican released the entire correspondence Tuesday, more than a year after the last letter was received, saying it came from the pen of a "martyr."

Tsu, ordained by Pope Pius XI in 1926 as one of the first Chinese bishops, refused until the last to kneel under his country's new Communist masters.

He rejected attempts to persuade him to join the "patriots"—a pseudo-religious organization designed to replace loyal Roman Catholic churches with those faithful to the Communist Party. Even when the Communists "re-joined" him in 1950, he refused to surrender the cross and ring which were symbols of his office under the Pope.

In many ways Bishop Tsu's letters read like the diary of Anne Frank, the Jewish girl who was forced to live with her family in an attic to escape Nazi persecution and who finally died in a concentration camp in the last days of World War II.

Some excerpts: "Since Sept. 9, 1950 I have been denied all liberty. Guarded and confined to my room. Repeated pressure is being put on me to join the patriots. . . I have obstinately refused. For a month and a half. . . under the strict surveillance of an armed guard in my house. I had to undergo interrogations each day. They reviled me. . ."

Dec. 5, 1951: "I still have eight priests in prison. . . one died. . . All the sisters are very courageous. . . pray for us and have many others pray. . ."

March 2, 1952: "Certain of my associates have been hypnotized by our friends. . ."

June 2, 1952: "I am still alive despite the continuous attacks and vexations. . . it is due to my age that I am not in prison. But I am equivalently guarded and spied upon. . ."

Sept. 2, 1952: "I am condemned as a political reactionary because I have disapproved of the attacks against the Pope. . . they have isolated me as if I were a contagious leper. . . My priests are stopped from seeing and consulting me. . . I am kept in solitary confinement. I beg you to help me by your prayers. . . That the hour of deliverance may be hastened. . ."

Jan. 18, 1953: "Pray and have others pray much for the Catholic religion in China. The future is very disturbing. They are trying to tear the faith out of the hearts of priests. . . I am still in quarantine in Haimen and the isolation is almost total. . ."

That was the final letter from Bishop Tsu. Recently word arrived that his "hour of deliverance" had come.

He was dead.

Queen Elizabeth On Paper Money

LONDON (UPI)—New pound notes bearing the portrait of Queen Elizabeth went into circulation the first time in British history that paper money has carried the likeness of a reigning monarch.

The new pounds—worth \$2.00—will join the billion-plus already in circulation and gradually replace them. The average life for one of the notes is 18 months.

The Queen's picture appears in an oval frame. It was drawn from a three-quarter angle. All British coins struck during a monarch's reign bear his likeness, and the Queen's portrait on shillings and pennies has been familiar for years. The paper money has carried only figures and decorations.

Russian Movie Coming To U. S.

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Olga Petrov, the Russian clown whose comedy on the high wire won him a gold medal at the International Circus Festival in Warsaw, will soon come to the United States.

The film, "Circus Stars," is one of the Russian-made films being distributed in this country under the U. S.-Soviet exchange agreement. Paramount Pictures is handling the distribution.

Also featured in the picture will be many Russian animal acts, acrobats and jugglers.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Part one of Arthur Murray's all-star pie-throwing at Bob Hope was a tame affair.

The Hope roast, Jr. unalike, featured a number of personalities—such as Jayne Mansfield, Jane Russell, Dorothy Lamour, Alan King, Cliff Arquette and Rocky Graziano.

Hope is donating his \$100,000 fee for the two-part party to an eye research fund. Another way the show serves humanity is in causing some changes to be made in the usual format of the Arthur Murray show. What I mean is it is helping to keep Kathryn off-camera. It's costing Hope \$100,000 but think of the good he's doing.

A show that sets out to roast someone should contain steady bits of irreverency and stimulating, though harmless, stunts, unfortunately, while many, many jokes were used up Tuesday night, most of them could have been aimed at any public figure. They weren't personalized enough. Only when Misses Lamour and Mansfield delivered some special song material did the roast begin to sizzle a little.

The show really came alive, ironically, when Hope delivered his rebuttal. "I was wondering when the entertainment was going to start," said Hope. He said he felt "like Sen. Kennedy at a Nixon rally," and, in general, unloaded a fine stream of laugh lines with his exceptional skill. If the rest of the gang had Hope's approach, the roast would have been a rare comedy treat. It turned out to be too much like "This is Your Life," without the Kleener.

Arrests, Fights Mark Racial Demonstrations

New arrests, fist fights, rock throwing and court convictions marked the close today of the seventh week of an all-out Negro campaign against southern segregation customs.
Officials of a South Carolina Negro college announced stiff disciplinary measures for any students taking part in off-campus demonstrations. Officials responded to the Negro campaign with swift police action in Georgia, Florida and North Carolina but differed among themselves on its legality.
City Judge John A. Rudd of Tallahassee sentenced 11 Negro demonstrators to fines of \$300 each or 90 days in jail, ruled that protests against lunch counter segregation in drug, dime and department stores boils down to an attack on the property rights of private businessmen rather than an integration campaign.
Florida Gov. LeRoy Collins said it was possible to hold legal demonstrations, but action of Negroes in giving advance notice in communities where they know "deep resentments will develop" constitutes an illegal act.
South Carolina Atty. Gen. Daniel R. McLeod met privately Thursday night with the state's 14 circuit solicitors, Gov. Ernest F. Hollings, and the head of a state committee charged with maintaining segregation.
McLeod said the demonstrations raised legal problems that had to be resolved, but he would not say what they are.
Students from South Carolina State College at Orangeburg, S. C., among 400 arrested Tuesday, were roundly criticized by officials of the Negro college.
The chairman of the board of trustees said no further demonstrations would be tolerated, and any students participating in off-campus demonstrations "will be summarily expelled."
New violence broke out Thursday.
Three men were arrested at Savannah, Ga., by local police and highway patrolmen raised there by Gov. Ernest Vandiver. Whites and Negroes threw rocks and fists after a St. Patrick's Day parade.
At St. Augustine white men attacked a group of Negro college students who staged a lunch counter sit-down. Police broke it up without making any arrests.
Between 20 and 30 Negro high school students were arrested for a similar demonstration at New Bern, N. C., and were released under \$50 bonds on trespass charges.

FBI Probes Plane Disaster

TELL CITY, Ind. (UPI)—Deep mystery today cloaked the explosion of a Northwest Airlines passenger plane which sent 63 persons plunging 18,000 feet to a fiery death and turned a southern Indiana soybean field into a wasteland of horror.
FBI agents and Civil Aeronautics Board experts said they would check on all possibilities for the cause of the crash including bomb sabotage.
The chance that the \$2,400,000 turbojet Electra may have been destroyed by a bomb was raised after a man telephoned Chicago police that "there's a bomb on a plane at Midway" airport. The call came a few hours after the doomed plane took off from Chicago's Midway Airport Thursday on a flight to Miami.
However, a police investigation turned up nothing. The mystery remained unsolved.
Authorities were checking on sales of insurance to passengers on the plane.

The doomed flight originated at Minneapolis and made one stop at Chicago to pick up passengers. It took off from Chicago at 2:30 p. m. It crashed east of here at 4:20 p. m. The weather was good.
The stricken four-engine plane—which carried 57 passengers and a crew of 6—came down in pieces. Wreckage was strewn for five miles. Federal investigators were confronted with a baffling problem.
Indiana state police Supt. Howard S. Zela ordered National Guardsmen to block off a 20 square mile area around the crash scene to keep away hundreds of spectators converging on the area.
Zela said six helicopters would fly over the rugged countryside to search out every piece of wreckage.
The crash site was a picture out of a book of horrors.
Flesh and scattered pieces of clothing hung from trees. A rescuer picked up a pair of shoes with the laces still tied but no feet in them.

Among the litter was a Roman Catholic prayer book opened to the Many "Lord have mercy on us . . . Christ have mercy on us."
The fuselage of the plane plunged through a 13-inch snow blanket and dug a 25 foot crater in the rich Indiana bottomland. Smoke curled from the crater during the night. Floodlights cast a yellow glow over the scene.
Cranes and large earth moving equipment were called in to remove the wreckage and to recover any bodies that might be imbedded in the ground.
"The plane is so deep in the ground it's almost out of sight," a coroner's official said.
The dead included five children. Most were from Minneapolis and Chicago.

Rogers Moves To Prevent GOP, Dixie Rights Block

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers intervened in the civil rights fight today in an effort to prevent House Republicans from joining a Southern Democratic drive to restrict the administration's voting referee plan.
In a letter to Rep. William M. McCulloch (R-Ohio), Rogers said the administration "strongly opposed" a Southern amendment to limit the proposed Negro voting safeguards to federal elections and exempt state or local elections.
The Southern Democrats prepared to offer their amendment as the House began its seventh day of debate on the civil rights bill. Because of the slow pace, leaders said a final House vote would not come this week as they hoped.
The administration plan would authorize federal judges to appoint voting referees to hear complaints that Negroes were denied their right to cast ballots. When necessary, the referees could issue certificates entitling the Negroes to vote.
Hard-core Southern Democrats, angered by the civil rights stand of 14 of their Northern colleagues, threatened a revolt that could swing control to the GOP even if the Democrats retained the House in the November election.
Rep. Jamie L. Whitten (D-Miss.), announced that 20 Southern Democrats had agreed to meet after the election to map strategy. But Northern Democrats professed unconcern. They said such a rebellion would cost Southerners seniority leading to committee chairmanships.

STARVED ROCK STATE PARK, Ill. (UPI)—Police crisscrossed the state today chasing down even remotely possible suspects in the state park sex killing of three prominent Chicago area matrons.
Within six hours, police had picked up, questioned, and released:—A local man with severe face scratches. His girl friend admitted scratching him.
—An acne-plagued young man connected with earlier sex crimes.
—Three Pontiac, Ill., laborers, one of whom had a bloodstained jacket collar.
Residents near Starved Rock State Park slapped on self-imposed curfews in fear of a psychopathic killer or killers who beat to death, then defiled the three women.
The killer or killers apparently cornered the women in a remote, cliff-straddling path out.
Killed were:
—Mrs. Frances Murphy, 47, wife of R. W. Murphy, vice president and general counsel of Borg-Warner Corp. in Chicago.
—Mrs. Mildred Lindquist, wife of Robert Lindquist, vice president of the Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Chicago.
—Mrs. Lillian Oetting, 50, wife of George Oetting, general superintendent of internal audit in the accounting department of Illinois Bell Telephone Co.

Volunteers Fight Rising Waters In Central Florida

TAMPA (UPI)—Volunteer workers fought rising waters made worse by continuing rains today as Central Florida reeled under three days of flooding.
Overcast skies dumped a down-pour on Tampa, Orlando, Dade City and smaller towns early today after a brief slackening late Thursday.
National Guardsmen and Civil Defense workers aided in the evacuation of about 900 persons from their homes in Hillsborough, Pinellas, Pasco and Polk counties.
Volunteers and county prisoners operated bulldozers and sand trucks in an effort to plug the hole in a dike at Lake Magdelene just outside Tampa, where water rushed through to inundate a large portion of a section one mile wide and about four miles long.
Power lines were down and roads were washed out in many areas. In Dade City, the sheriff's department reported only one road still open.
"Many of the flooded-out families were taken to private homes. Others were housed and fed in emergency shelters set up in schools, meeting halls and municipal buildings."
The Weather Bureau forecast held a faint hope for already weary workers. It predicted the heavy showers and severe thunder showers that have hit the area since late Tuesday would cease later today.
Although rain was expected to cease in the hardest-hit areas, runoff from high ground will cause the water to rise for at least another day.
At Tampa, disaster headquarters reported 63 families were evacuated Thursday night and others were being moved out this morning.
Water rose about 15 inches in the flooded area during the night and was still rising. Engineers said the flood crest will come Saturday morning if the rain stops.
Drinking water in the flooded area of Orlando was polluted and health officials warned the displaced residents to get typhoid shots.

Guard Alerted, Plan Discussed

The National Guard unit of Seminole County was alerted today to stand by in case of any flood emergency as rains continued to plague the county for the third straight day, adding the further threat of pollution to county drinking waters.
Co. B of the National Guard advised County Commission Chairman John Krider Thursday night it is ready to stand by in any emergency.
Krider told the unit commander, Capt. John Keeling, to alert his men and if the rains continue they may be called on to offer assistance in evacuating families from homes in the south end of the county.
As a result of high water conditions in South Seminole Thursday, Commissioner Lawrence Swofford asked the County Commission to meet to ask federal flood relief aid for the county.
The board, meeting this afternoon, is expected to discuss federal aid along with a drainage plan and recommendations by the county drainage committee.
County Sanitarian Val Robbins said today that rain could create a serious health hazard to some areas in the county.
He singled out the Midway area and South Seminole as the critical areas. However, he added that there will not be any mass inoculation at this time.
"The biggest hazard is from drinking water and there are many septic tanks in the south end of the county not operating properly, causing water to seep through the tanks and onto the ground," Robbins said.
He said the Midway section could turn into a serious problem because of the shallow wells in that area.
Robbins and his health unit staff are making an inspection tour of county areas.
County Engineer Robert Davis said this morning that the worst flooding problem is in the Lake Maithe vicinity.
"If the rains continue many of these homes will have to be evacuated," he said.
Other critical areas according to Davis are Lake Orlena, Lake Roy, Temple Terrace, Tanglewood, and Loch Arbor.
Davis said his crews are working around the clock in an effort to keep culverts open in the high water areas.
He also agreed with Robbins that pollution was becoming a dangerous threat in the south end and urged all parents to keep their children from playing near any septic tanks.
A total of 12 inches of rain had fallen in South Seminole and nine in the Sanford area up until the middle of this morning.
Davis said barricades are up on SR 486, SR 48, Onora Road and some washed-out county roads in South Seminole.
Water overflowed some drainage lines temporarily and stood in streets in some places in Sanford, but city streets escaped serious damage. Barricades were put up on the Goldsboro and Georgetown sections as a preventive measure.
Sanford residential areas appeared to be safe from accumulation of waters. Drainage facilities kept threatening waters from the Pinecrest homes section.
Supt. of Schools H. T. Milwee said that all buses have run on schedule and no schools have been closed.
He added that attendance has been "pretty good considering all the rain we have been having."
If the rain holds off for six or seven hours, Longwood won't suffer too badly from flooded conditions, Mayor A. H. Lormann said.
Lormann said that houses on Sanlando Springs Rd. in the southwest part of town were having drainage trouble because drainage ditches were at capacity. Houses in this area have drainage ditches that empty into Fairy Lake. These and other town ditches have not been able to take off the water as fast as it has fallen.
Lormann said that only one family in Longwood was seriously threatened by flood waters as far as he knew. The family lives on Highland Rd. and their home is completely surrounded by water. A town bulldozer was sent to dig drainage ditches around the house today.
If the rain doesn't let up some of the paving on Wildmire may be lost, Lormann said.
Conditions were better in Caselberry, where the worst flooding was on the road between the two Lake Triplets. Councilman Ben Evans said about three inches of water covered the road there.
The town's worst trouble is where heavy drainage has cut ditches in clay roads, Evans said.
