Heavy thunder storms in Seminole County the last two days have resulted in a call for emergency federal flood relief by County Commissioner Lawrence

Swofford. Swotford said the major portion of the southern end of Seminole County is underwater.

County Commissioners termed me two-day flood condition "critical" and Commission chairman John Krider has called an emergency meeting with the county drainage committee for 2 p. m.

As of 11 a. m. today, nearly eight inches of rain had been reported in the south end of the county and six inches in the Banford area.

The heavy rains have caused floodings, washouts of primary roads and drainage to homes, mostly in the southwest area. "Something must be done about this problem right now," Swotford emphasized.

MIAMI (UPI) - The Weather Bureau at Miami issued the following all-clear tornado report at 11:30 a. m.:

"The threat of tornadoes has ended for Central Florida. While showers and thunder storms con-tinue over Control Florida it sppears from station reports and radar observations that most of the severe activity has ended. There still exists the possibility of strong winds in the area from Paim Beach to Lake Cheeche-bee to Vero Beach."

Alarming Increase Of Crime Reported

By J. EDGAR HOOVER

Director of FBI WASHINGTON (UPI) — Almost daily, newspaper headlines blare forth tales of brutal violence; mass killings, the slaughter of entire families, the battering of children into lifeless pulps.

These atrocities are not confined to any one section of this nation.

They occur with tragic frequency throughout the country. A feeling of terror is inculcated in the hearts

of many citizens.

The most recent FBI statistics concerning crime point up the growing seriousness of these violations. Crimes of violence continued to spiral upward in 1959. Aggravate ed assaults jumped 7 per cent over 1958; murder 5 per cent; rapes, 4 per cent. In cities between 500,000 and 750,000 in population, murders increased by a shocking 21 per

These vicious crimes present a grave challenge to the nation te-day. Law enforcement must have the wholehearted cooperation of

every citizen.

Vigorous action must be understaken by all elements of society.

To ignore the threat of these crimes of violence can only lead to disaster. Here is a summary of the pre-

liminary 1959 FBI crime report, issued Wednesday night, on which Hoover based his plea:

As a whole, major crimes went up 1 per cent over 1958. Robberies and burglaries declined.

Violent crimes against individuais jumped by 7 per cent. In this category, aggravated assaults were up 7 per cent, murders 5 per cent and rapes 4 per cent.






