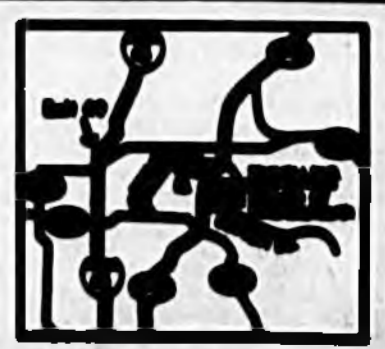

Workshop will discuss SR-46 widening

SANFORD — The Florida Department of Transportation will conduct a public information workshop on the proposed widening of State Road 46, east of Sanford.

The meeting will be held Thursday, April 21 with open house at 6 p.m. and the presentation at 7 p.m. at Midway Elementary School, 2251 Jitway, in the Midway community.

FDOT Spokesman Steve Homan emphasized that this is an "informational" meeting, not an official hearing.

"We want to get public and governmental input on what should be done on SR-46," he said. Initial plans are expected to call for a widening to four lanes. It is hoped land for the widening may be offered by the Sanford Airport Authority, south of a large portion of the area to be widened.

The proposed widening, east 25th Street, would be from U.S. Highway 17-92 to State Road 415. "Actually, it'll be from Mellonville Avenue easterly," Homan said. "25th Street is already wide from 17-92 to Mellonville."

The information workshop will be held to introduce the public to the project, to discuss the improvements that are being considered, and to obtain comments on these proposed improvements to SR-46.

The project has been determined to be necessary to handle increased traffic once the extension of Lake Mary Boulevard is completed to SR-46.

Big Tree sister finally earns a place in history

LONGWOOD — When God delivered the 10 Commandments to Moses, The Senator, a bald cypress in Big Tree Park here was already 100 years old.

About 1,500 years later, a companion tree sprouted 90 feet away and the two trees remain a treasure for Seminole County.

In recent years, however, care for The Senator and its companion lagged. Unsavory characters frequented the park, and lewd acts and drug use marred the atmosphere there.

Families stayed away and facilities fell into disrepair.

Seminole County Commissioner Randy Morris spearheaded an effort to change that, and the companion tree, dubbed "Lady Liberty" was dedicated in a ceremony Thursday that was also part of the National County Government Week celebration.

"God has blessed Seminole County with natural beauty that is really unsurpassed anywhere else," said county Chairman Carlton Henley at the gathering Thursday morning.

Worker found in cement mixer at care center construction site

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is investigating the death of a construction worker who was apparently killed while operating a portable cement mixer, according to an April 14 news release.

The name of the worker is Garvin Gayle, 19, of Orlando.

The accident occurred at the construction site for a new after-school care center, which

is being built next to Wilson Elementary School, which is located at 985 Orange Blvd., west of Sanford.

The incident was reported just before 2 p.m. on Thursday, April 14.

When the Seminole County Fire Department arrived, it found Gayle partially trapped inside the cement mixer. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes

Unit is investigating the circumstances and will be turning its findings over to the Occupational Health and Safety Administration, which is also investigating.

Preliminary information indicates that Gayle was an immigrant from Haiti. His identification lists him as a 19 year old man, who resided in Orlando.

He worked for Phoenix Walls, Inc., which is a subcontractor on the school project.

City eyes interim manager

SANFORD — City officials met with V. Eugene Miller to consider him as the city's interim city manager after Al Grieshaber Jr., resigned from that position April 11.

Mayor Linda Kuhn said she hopes the commission will agree at Monday night's continued City Commission meeting to appoint Miller as interim.

Kuhn, who met with Miller on Wednesday, said she was very impressed.

"His credentials are impeccable," Kuhn said.

Miller, who has more than 41 years of experience in a city manager position, is now retired and helps cities in need of temporary help.

After announcing Grieshaber's resignation at last Monday night's commission meeting, City Attorney Bill Colbert recommended Miller to city officials.

District 4 City Commissioner Kevin Hipes said he met with Miller on Wednesday and thought he was very cordial.

"I feel [he'd] bring a lot of stability to the process and enable us to draw from his experience while we're in this transitional period," Hipes said.

According to Hipes, Seminole County Commissioner Bob

Grieshaber's legal advice upsets Ga. city

SANFORD — Recently resigned City Manager Al Grieshaber Jr. has made headlines in Albany, Ga., where he worked for the city as assistant city attorney and city attorney from 1987 until he took the city manager position in Sanford in August 2003.

The Albany Herald reported that "Albany city commissioners want to know

whether a former city attorney can be held accountable for a legal opinion that will cost the city more than

\$1.7 million by July 2006."

It turns out that the statute of limitations is up for the legal decision he recommended, but Albany city officials will now have to transfer money from the city's general fund to pay for retirement health insurance premiums.

Albany Mayor Pro-Tem Bo Dorough said in a phone interview Thursday that Grieshaber's decision is going to result in the city spending \$1.6 million out of the general fund every year.

"We're researching the issue," Dorough said. "It's a very complicated area of the law."

He said that although some of the commissioners were upset about the legal opinion Grieshaber rendered without sufficiently researching the

issue, the statute of limitations was up on the matter and that the commission would just have to expend the money from other funds to make up the difference.

The legal opinion that Grieshaber offered happened in 1997. Albany commissioners heeded Grieshaber's advice, and agreed to transfer money from the pension fund, which had \$128 million in assets, because the city's general fund was low.

When those assets took a downturn in July 2002, The Albany Herald reported, the commission decided that retirement health insurance premiums would be paid out of the general fund.

The commission would have to transfer money from the general fund by March 1, in the amount of \$251,000 to cover the premiums.

The Albany Herald also wrote that: "Commissioners learned ... that not only can the city no longer pay premiums from the pension fund, but that it must also reimburse the pension fund for health premiums paid from the fund since 2002."

Commissioner Tommie Postell was quoted in the Albany newspaper as saying: "We need to either correct this or table it. We've been advised by the attorney ... that these things are needed. We don't need to make an issue out of it."

Although the statute of limitations has passed, current Albany City Attorney Nathan Davis will study the 2002 decision to ascertain if the commission would have legal recourse. The Albany Herald reported.

Not smart, Art: Anyone with an e-mail address has been the recipient of a list of the annual Darwin Award winners. Created by a Stanford University molecular biologist, the Darwin Awards "salute the improvement of the human genome by honoring those who accidentally kill themselves in really stupid ways."

If they gave out a political Darwin Award, District 1 City Commissioner Art Woodruff would win the 2005 honor hands down. Woodruff won a close election against Bernard Mitchell, but that's the last thing he'll win for quite some time.

Woodruff filed a complaint against Mitchell with the Florida Election Commission for, among other things, an advertisement that ran in The Herald. The ad had several pictures,

including one that featured Mitchell presenting an award to Police Chief Brian Tooley and one that featured Commissioner Randy Jones giving Mitchell an award. Woodruff claims the pictures were an "implied message of endorsement." Tooley disagrees.

The chief did sign an affidavit saying he did not give permission to use his photo in Mitchell's ad. Woodruff, who helps set the police department's budget each year, presented the affidavit to Tooley and asked him to sign it. Tooley did because it was a true statement, but the chief told me point-blank that he didn't have a problem with the picture being in the ad.

Woodruff filed the complaint before the election, which tells me the incumbent was running scared. He denies this and claims his complaint is merely a matter of following the law.

"I knew it would have no bearing on the actual election," Woodruff said. "It was a matter of, I think, the election laws should be followed and enforced."

Woodruff's explanation rings hollow. During the general election Lindsey Oyewale had several large signs that were illegally placed in the rights-of-way. To date, Woodruff has yet to file a complaint against the Oyewale campaign.

I'm not condoning violating the law. It does appear that Mitchell's campaign had two minor technical infractions of the law. But Woodruff in his rush to jump on his high horse has cost himself much needed credibility in the black community. Before the election, Georgetown residents believed Woodruff was more concerned with helping other areas of the city at the expense of their traditionally black neighborhood. That perception — and perception is reality in politics — has increased hundredfold and most believe Woodruff is a sore winner.

Furthermore, Woodruff is not without sin, himself when it comes to technical violations of rules. Local car dealers provide vehicles for city commissioners to ride in during the annual Christmas parade. Prior to last December's parade, Woodruff asked a city staff member to procure an extra vehicle for his church group. Evidently the commissioner was pulling a Van Winkle during the previous five months when a deputy city manager was fined for improperly using a golf cart. By the day of the parade, Woodruff had changed his mind, but the vehicle had already been obtained.

In its endorsement for the District 1 seat, The Herald supported Woodruff because of "his measured responses" to issues facing the city. In this case, Woodruff's response is dead wrong. He needs to publicly make amends with Mitchell, and he needs to do it soon.

Urban in-Phil project: The Central Florida real estate market is red hot. Agents are reporting a serious lack of supply to meet the demand of folks craving to move into the region. To help meet the demand, developers are eyeing Sanford and its downtown as the next new hot spot.

Word Around The Clock is that flamboyant downtown Orlando developer Phil Rampy is quietly — but not so quietly to escape the Clock Keeper's ears — purchasing properties in and around downtown Sanford. Rampy is the founder of **Olde Town Brokers, Inc.**, a real estate company that, according to the company's marketing Web site (www.kofso Orlando.com), specializes in "the redevelopment and sales of urban renewal properties."

Rampy, who touts himself as "among the nation's leading advocates of new urbanism," revitalized Orlando's Thornton Park neighborhood when he built Thornton Park Central, a multi-story, mixed-use project featuring lofts, condominiums and office and retail space (and a Starbucks!).

Word is Rampy is looking to build a townhouse project at the southwest corner of 3rd Street and Magnolia Avenue. If so, Rampy's project would be a raspberry scone's throw away from a similar project being built by John Giuliani and Sanford's own real estate queen **Maria Shreve** at the northwest corner of 3rd Street and Palmetto.

Work has already begun on Giuliani's project with the demolition of the old Quonset huts.

Dallari, who was a councilman for the city of Oviedo when Miller was interim city manager, spoke highly of Miller.

"He said a lot of good things," Hipes said. In a phone interview Friday, Dallari said: "[Miller] walks with a cane and has two hearing aids, but don't underestimate him. The man is sharp. Very sharp."

Orange City Mayor Ted Erwin said Miller worked on an interim basis there for a little more than two years. Miller came in as a result of the then city manager being fired by the Orange City City Council.

"He walked into a very controversial situation, with a very divided council," Erwin said. "He pulled things together."

Erwin said he had a very good relationship with Miller and that he was "probably the most professional city manager" he had

ever worked with.

According to Erwin, Miller was a taskmaster with his staff, being demanding of them, but that he was also very understanding and respectful.

"I won't say everyone liked him, but they had a lot of respect for him," Erwin said.

Erwin said Miller was very well qualified and he would have no hesitation recommending him to another city.

District 2 City Commissioner Velma Williams agreed with Kuhn saying Miller impressed her at their meeting.

Williams said Miller could bring unity and healing to the commission. Miller told Williams that, if hired, he would focus on directing the city in the right direction.

"I learned that he has an appreciation for accountability, while simultaneously valuing employees,"

Williams said.

According to Williams, she was also impressed with Miller's understanding of respect and trust between city manager and city commissioners. He also conveyed to Williams that he had "a wealth of experience dealing with developers" and setting up strategic planning.

"He seems to be a person who can bring calmness to the agency," Williams said.

Both Kuhn and Williams emphasized the importance that Miller wouldn't have an agenda because he would come in as just an interim city manager.

"He has no intentions of making it a permanent job," Kuhn said.

Two neighboring city officials, Erwin, from Orange City and Oviedo Councilman and Vice Chairman Todd Russell, said they had wanted Miller to stay on with their cities per-

manently.

"We tried to hire him on full time, but that's not his game anymore," Russell said.

Miller worked for the city of Oviedo after its city manager resigned. Russell said Miller came in at a time when the city needed calmness.

"He left a little bit of himself there in all of us," Russell said.

Williams said that the commissioners will discuss their meetings with Miller at their Monday night meeting.

"Hopefully we can reach a consensus that he will be the person," Williams said. "It's time to move on. Sanford is a diamond in the rough that has begun to shine. We need to do what's best for the city of Sanford."

Monday night's continued commission meeting will be held at 7 p.m. at City Hall in the commissioner's chamber room.

County receives security grant

What is Iraq?

We all see television footage of the war in Iraq. We see soldiers and insurgents dashing from building to building with their firearms. We see tanks, Hummers and other vehicles plodding through streets littered with debris from bombings and other attacks. From what we see, it appears that this is a land of ultimate destruction. It is truly a backward country.

Few folks, however, would realize that the cities, especially Baghdad, are quite modern. Baghdad is a major metropolis complete with skyscrapers. It has a population of around 5 million people. (The nation's population is around 24 million). The entire country is considered slightly larger than the State of California in size. Even though there's an occupation by U.S. and other armed forces, residents are still driving to work each day, stopping at service stations to gas up their cars. For food, many pull in at a Burger King or McDonald's, and I've even heard there is a Pizza Hut in Baghdad.

But from where did we get our impressions of Iraq? First of all, we have heard of Aladdin and the flying carpet. From this, our children may consider it an exotic country where everyone walks or flies around wearing a turban.

There was the song "Sheik of Araby" depicting romance in the tents of the Arabs. There was a dramatic movie "Lawrence of Arabia" and a musical movie, "Desert Song", both of which were primarily stories of heroic wars in the desert regions of Iraq.

The country is considered one of the oldest civilizations in the world. One record says it was occupied as far back as 3000 B.C. and became the heart of the Babylonian empire. In early times, it was called Mesopotamia.

Through the years, the land now known as Iraq, has been occupied by Persians, Alexander the Great, Greece, Turkey, Russia, Germany, Italy, Iran, and a number of other nations. While British troops occupied the country as early as 1915, it received its independence in 1932. Although much of the country is barren desert, the population stands at approximately 143 persons per square mile. (Florida has 296 people per square mile).

As Iraq is located between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers, there have even been stories told that it was at the junction of these two rivers that Adam and Eve lived in the Garden of Eden.

Looking at other vital statistics about Iraq, the percentage of citizens over age 10 with no formal education is 52.8 percent. Only 4.1 percent of the population has graduated from what we would consider at a high school level.

As for temperature, summer time is hot in Iraq. In Baghdad, the average temperature in July is 110 degrees. This month, April, the average daytime temperature

is 85. But the desert areas, which is most of the land area, can be as much as 20 to 30 degrees hotter. And there is virtually little rainfall. The average total for the entire month of April is one-half inch.

Several years before the U.S. arrived in Iraq, the average household income was estimated at \$2,000 per year. The present average was not available. The average household in Iraq consists of 8.9 persons, compared to 2.7 persons per household in the United States.

Yes, there is still danger to our troops stationed in Iraq. At least two servicemen, one who has recently returned and another still in Iraq (my grandson), say they are being shot at practically every day when they travel through the streets in various convoys. There are still vehicles driven by our troops that have no armor, and even walking can be dangerous for Americans.

But hopefully, things will begin to calm down during the upcoming months and our troops will be in less danger. The country and its cities may be relatively modern in some areas, but the effort to get the country back on its own feet is continuing, and eventually there will be a need for a massive rebuilding.

One of the major economies listed in the World Almanac for 1997 says Iraq receives the largest portion of its income from tourism, an estimated \$13 million each year. It may be sometime before they are able to return to that position again.

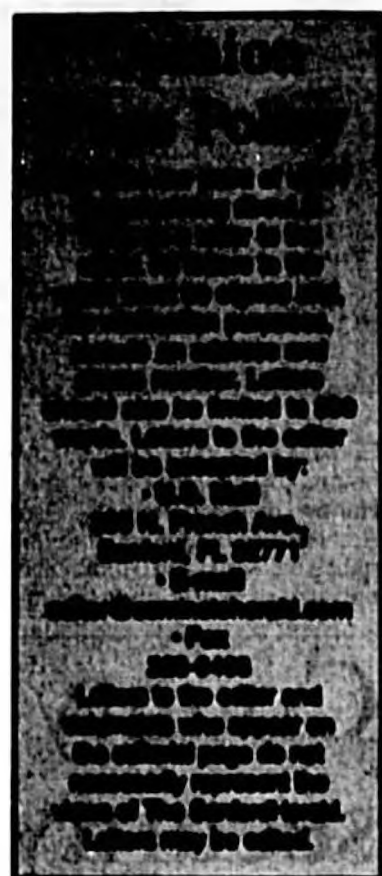

The Way We Were:

Sanford—3,200 phones in 1952

Today we will look at some items found in the 1952 Sanford city directory. These names will probably be more familiar to you than those in the 1917 city directory.

Statistical Review

Form of Government - Commission, Manager; population, 1950 census, 11,935; area 5.2 square miles.

Telephones in service - 3,201; 12 parks; three banks; 16 churches; four hotels with a total of 500 rooms; one daily and one weekly newspaper; one hospital with 25 beds; one public library.

Industry - Chief business of city and surrounding area - agriculture and allied industry and railroad shops.

Amusements - Largest auditorium in city (Seminole High School) seats 850 persons. One moving picture theater and one drive-in theater. Golf, swimming, boating, hunting, tennis and shuffleboard.

City statistics - Total street mileage, 256 with 60 miles paved. Fire Department has 14 men with one station and six pieces of motor equipment. Police Department has 14 men with one station and four pieces of motor equipment.

There were several more grocery stores than in 1917 but quite a few continued to be small independent stores.

Those I recognize as chains are A&P at 202 Magnolia Ave., and Piggly Wiggly at 300 E. Third St. Others you might recognize are Mrs. Caroline Ceresoli, 212 S. Sanford Ave.; Folds Curb Market at 210 E. Third; Levy's Community Grocery, 919 W. First St.; Lodge and Son, 305 E. Second; Lovett's, 419 E. First St.; Palmetto Grocery at 317 Palmetto Ave.; Paramore at 1210 French Ave.; Penley's at 606 W. 11th; People's Super Market at 1206 W. 13th St.; William C. Phagan at 1600 Southwest Road; Price's at 2484 Sanford Ave.; Stempier Brothers at 1102 W. 13th St.; Tip Top Super Market at 329 Sanford Ave.; Wade's at 509 E. Seventh St.; and West Side Grocery at 515 Elm Ave.

I recall shopping with my mother at the A&P, managed by Earl Evans. It was probably the most modern. She also traded at Price's Grocery which was nearby, across from McReynold's Drug Store. I also remember Moran's Meat Market, next to McReynold's, but couldn't find it in any directory. It was probably there in the early 1940s and we have no directories from that era.

And of course, we traded with Semper Brothers in Goldsboro. These were my uncles Jack and Bill Semper, my mother's brothers. Bill later went into insurance and real estate but Jack continued with the store for several more years.

We would pass the Palmetto Grocery while walking to town from junior high school and occasionally stop in.

I was in the West Side Grocery several times, as it was owned by Mr. J.C. Owen, father of my friend Martha Owen. And Wade's Grocery was owned by Mr. Ben Wade, father of another friend, Jimmy Wade. Jimmy later owned and operated the store.

There were 29 restaurants listed; several had © by their name indicating they were owned by African-American or "colored" people. Some of these were Busy Bee Café at 1013 W. 13th St.; the Eat Inn, at 1236 W. 13th St.; Lucky Star Café at 423 E. Ninth St.; and Standard Lunch at 816 W. 13th St.

Those restaurants most familiar to most of us would be Angel's Eat Shack, Pig'n Whistle, Lormann's at 2750 Orlando Drive, Twilight Bar and Grill on Orlando Drive, Eddie's Restaurant in the Valdez Hotel Building, and Motor's Inn on West Seminole Boulevard.

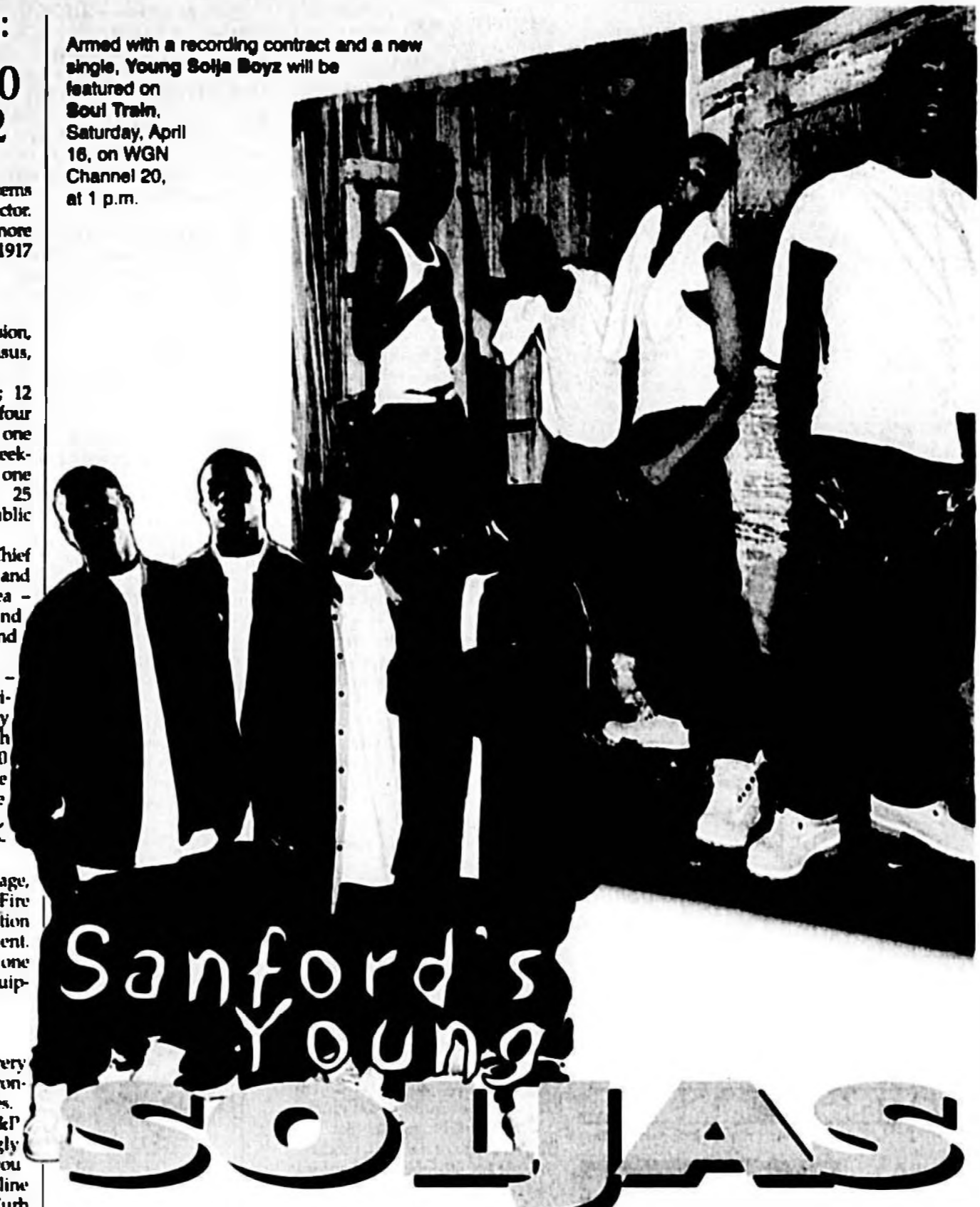
Some of the others were Celery City Grill at 215 Magnolia Ave., Day and Night Grill at 701 French, Homer's Grill at 324 E. First St., and Palmer's Café at 1300 French Ave.

Those listed here are Orville Barke, Edwin Epstein, Wade H. Garner, Thomas F. McDaniel, John M. Morgan, Leonard Maroon, Charles L. Park, Sr., William V. Roberts, Guy Salzman, Harry Sibley, James A. Smith, George H. Starke and Julian H. Toles.

James A. Smith was our family doctor. He was very tall, large older man with white hair. I recall going to his office on the second floor of the Brunley-Frankston Building. He also made many house calls as I was prone to serious bouts of the flu and also had asthma. He would hold and pull up our state with his black bag.

Dr. Smith advised about the time I was a high school senior in 1948, as I went to Dr. Charles Park, a family friend, for my college physical.

Stetson's Corner

Not your typical Florida Spring Break

Welcome to Stetson's Corner, where weekly we hope to share a bit of what is good about the Village of Geneva. This column is dedicated to a man who did the same - Deputy Sheriff Gene "Stetson" Gregory, who was killed in the line of duty July 8, 1998, in the place he was sworn to protect, but which could not protect him. Geneva will never be the same because of Deputy Gregory... it will be better.

The Church of the Nazarene in Geneva is small, with only 15 to 20 members in the congregation on a given Sunday. Sunday April 10, however, found their numbers swelled to double that amount. That was because church members from Mt. Olive and Wrightsville, Ga., had come to visit, to work, and to worship. Though small in terms of people, the local church has about 9.5 acres of property, with a chapel, gymnasium/fellowship hall and a parsonage. That property took a direct hit during last year's hurricanes. Geneva's Pastor Carl Owens was grateful that none of the buildings was damaged, but with many trees downed by the storms, there was quite a mess left for the tiny congregation. "During Charley we were right in the path of an F-2 that came through," Owens said. "Between that and three hurricanes we had nearly 40 trees down and not enough people to clean it all up." Connections and word of mouth being what they are in a religious community, Nazarene church members in Georgia found out about Geneva's dilemma and began making plans to make a "Work and Witness" mission trip to the area. "This was something that we all felt

would help us as well as Amanda Falligan, who is planning a future in mission work," offered Georgia congregation member Judy Thigpen. "When we started out we didn't have a dime. Then we started fundraising back in the fall and the Lord started blessing us." They ended up blessed with two van loads of 14 youth and 11 adults who came from Central Georgia Thursday and worked through Saturday clearing mountains of debris from the twisted landscape. "We think the world of them!" exclaimed Geneva member Nancy Wise, who was herself working Saturday at the front of the property located on State Road 46. Pastor Owens agreed: "Thursday we moved close to eight tons of debris." Added Thigpen: "I think we've done a lot. The Lord has really shined on us." Some of that shine was reflecting off much needed heavy equipment, including a backhoe that Graham Brother's Construction loaned the group free of charge. The Dunlap family, members of the congregation, brought in other equipment as well. Focal Point Landscaping - a neighbor to the church - provided new landscape plants for the project. Perhaps the most important equipment of all, however, came in the form of youthful enthusiasm. "We have 25 people sleeping in the fellowship hall and showering at a member's home, but they are full of energy and fun," said Georgia member Tina Falligan. "The girls have painted the gymnasium walls. We've raked and mowed and cleared trees. But mostly, we have learned how blessed we really are. We are blessed to have the people we have who are willing to come here and work like this. "We've also gained a lot. We're taking back a group of kids who are now much closer than they were when we left." The teens, part of a group of about 30 in all, often help the elderly in their

home congregation with yard work too. This work was a bit more intense - in more ways than one. Said Ben: "I've cut down trees and cleaned up limbs, worked on the gym and had fun, I guess. We're helping people on the path of God. At home I'd just be hanging out with my friends. If they ask me to come again, I'll be here." Jonathan, who noted that the group's side trip to Universal Studios "did not compare" to the work at the church, added: "There was a large tree limb down in the front yard. I was able to clean it up on my own and contribute to the cause. God has given us much to work with." For Joni, who took time off work to come, the work was its own reward. "I love working witness," she said. "I've been on two other missions to Puerto Rico. It is very rewarding. The hard work doesn't bother me. I love it. I'd rather do this than go on vacation. It's my passion." "The opportunity to help out is a blessing," said Josh. "You always get back more than you give. I've enjoyed the

fellowship. We're helping people we might never see again. Six months from now we'll be able to still look back and smile about these experiences." The give and take also took the form of the youth giving a ministerial performance at the Sunday worship service, and one local member cooking breakfast for the entire crew. Both congregations hope the back and forth will mean keeping in touch as time goes by. The Georgia group is already planning another mission trip for next year. "We want people to know that the Lord is alive," Thigpen said. "He is real and He changes lives. He's making a difference in our lives through this effort." That difference can be seen and felt by the congregation in Geneva. We need you to tell us what you know that is good about Geneva! He vowed a renewed commitment to preserve and protect the trees and the park for future generations.

Henley introduced Morris as the person most responsible for protecting the trees.

Morris said the park has become "not comfortable" to visit with certain elements coming into the park. There were no places to sit and the trees were gated off by aluminum fencing.

He began to wonder about a name for the companion tree. The Senator has had its name for decades since being visited by President Calvin Coolidge in 1929.

Students from Geneva Elementary School were on hand to sing and help dedicate historical markers for the two

trees. Megan Dudley and Crystal Urban of Amanda Schmitt's fifth-grade class at the school gave the name of Lady Liberty to the tree.

They said the tree stands tall like the Statue of Liberty. Lady Liberty also appears brave as she faces hardships like hurricanes, they said. The girls both received trophies for their accomplishment.

Morris said the trees and grounds will be protected by attracting more people to the park. A Seminole County Sheriff's Office substation now occupies its own spot in the park.

Trails crossing Seminole County and the Cross Florida Trail will connect the park, and Morris said that will be a key to

protecting it from the criminal activities of the past.

"Bringing the trail here will be huge," he said. "As we repopulate the park and people rediscover the park, those kinds of [unsavory] activities will disappear."

New fencing around the trees will protect the roots from the trampling of admirers.

Bob Finley is a certified arborist from Walt Disney World. He lives near the park and has scaled The Senator's 138-foot height. Finley kept a close watch on the tree during last summer's hurricanes.

He said The Senator with its 47-foot circumference is actually hollow inside. Experts repelled into the tree and connected a lightning rod inside to protect

it. Finley said the tree has about a foot of wood all around the tree.

Lightening and weather have trimmed the tree over the years, according to Seminole County written information. It was once 165 feet tall.

Lady Liberty stands 61 feet tall with a circumference of 33.5 feet.

"Lady Liberty is the perfect name for this tree," Morris said in a news release.

"This companion tree is 2000 years old. Generations of families have been able to enjoy her and it's time she had a name. She stands tall as a symbol of patriotism and represents the freedom we all enjoy here in America."

The Lions looked like they would take control from the outset of the game as they scored a run and had the bases loaded in the top of the first.

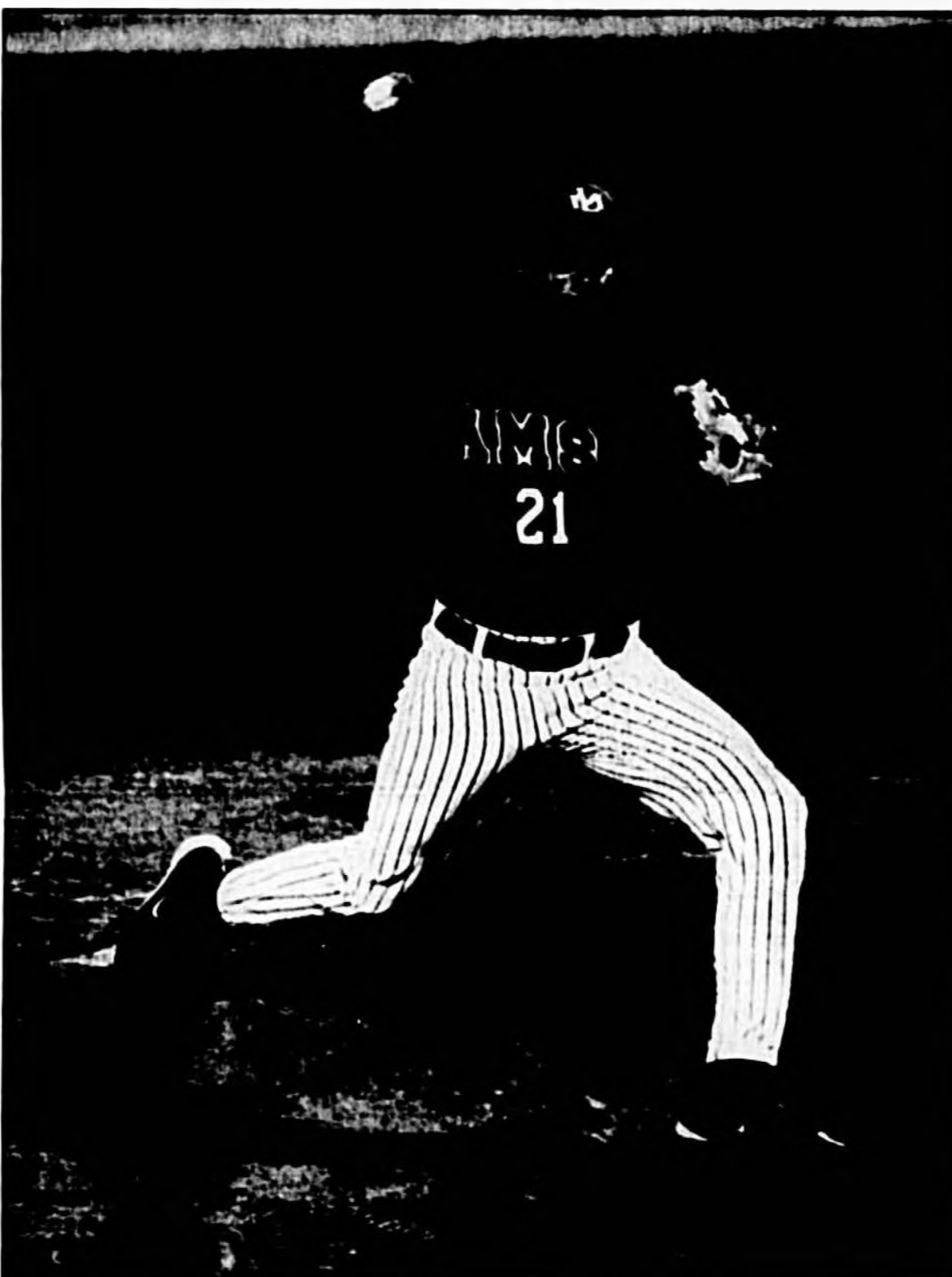

FWC to update listing process of imperiled species

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) gave its staff the nod today (Thursday) to proceed with updating the state's imperiled species listing process.

After conducting a final public hearing on the proposal, during the first day of their two-day in Tallahassee, Commissioners voted to adopt updated criteria developed by the highly respected

International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN). In addition, the Commission will ask IUCN experts to train FWC scientists in how to apply the criteria.

Commissioners expressed their confidence in the updated process, but in acknowledgement of many stakeholders' concerns about how it might impact certain species they pledged to review the listing process if unforeseen problems arise during its implementation.

"We believe our actions today will make Florida's process one of the most effective, science-based, recovery-oriented processes in the world, but we recognize the process may not be perfect," FWC Chairman Herky Huffman said. "That's why we directed staff to provide us with updates about how the process is working and recommend further refinements as needed."

This decision by the FWC does not immediately affect the listing status of any of the 118 animal species classified as

endangered, threatened or species of special concern in the state list. It also will not affect the status of species on the federal list, which revolves around different criteria.

FWC executive director Ken Haddad said the ultimate goal with each imperiled species is to help them recover to the point where they come off the list completely. He said the FWC has devoted the past 2.5 years to gathering public input and fine-tuning the listing process.

In 1999, FWC assembled a well-balanced citizen panel which recommended implementation of a more scientific and internationally proven process. FWC staff has since reconvened that panel to address perceived flaws in the listing process. The panel created a list of enhancements that all agreed would strengthen any listing process. Those enhancements form the basis of the proposed updates to the listing process.

Since 1999, the IUCN has refined its global criteria and created guidelines to apply them at a regional level. FWC biologists say adopting those changes will enhance the agency's ability to preserve and protect Florida's ecological diversity.

"This will give us a better measuring stick," said FWC endangered species coordinator, Dan Sullivan. "We'll be better equipped to identify which species are in danger, monitor their progress and determine whether the correc-

five actions we're taking are working."

Sullivan said how those corrective actions will be identified and put in place is another key strength of the proposed process. Whenever the agency considers listing, reclassifying or delisting a species, FWC staff will develop a management plan tailored to that individual species' needs. The plan will outline species-specific protections, replacing less-effective blanket prohibitions of the past, which were tied to categories rather than species' individual needs.

"A number of groups have expressed concern about the possibility of a species shifting from

endangered to threatened and then losing protections, but that's the beauty of the proposed process," Haddad said. "If a species improves and shifts categories, its management plan will outline the protections needed to keep that species' recovery moving in the right direction."

Updates also will strengthen the process by involving a biological review panel throughout the evaluation process and requiring an additional peer review of that panel's assessment.

Commissioners also voted to lift the moratorium on considering classification of listed species.
