ANDERSON SAYS HE NOW IS SATISFIED

(Continued from page 1.) There would be no further revolutions, he asserted. The German regime of the past 20 years as run by international freebooters and pitiless politicians he declared Hitler generations would exact the accomplishments of the Nazi movement as the "German miracle."

Then he turned to the recent plottings, and stated:

"If Germany imagine the 4,000,000 'Hitler' voters constituted a dangerous opposition, they are privileged to smile, x x x Our next attack will demolish the opposition."

Hitler reiterated that Germany, while insisting on her own rights wanted peace and friendship with other nations, saying he was convinced that if the 'Hitler' voters wanted war but only small cliques of mischief-makers and profiteers.

Referring to the recent "purgings" Hitler said he was sure the people would not blame him for stamping out what had to be stamped out.

Next he took up the subject of religion, saying:

"We have endeavored to reconcile the religious confessions with the new state. As far as the Protestants are concerned, we are determined to weld them all into one great evangelical Reich Church."

"If Martin Luther were among us, he would pray not for different state churches but for a Reich Church."

Concerning the Roman Catholic Church, he added:

"Despite lapses of both sides, we shall arrive at a sincere and honorable understanding."

Triion, Ga., Is Scene Of 1st Bloodshed In Big Textile Strike

(Continued from page one) was operating yesterday with a skeleton force. Some 3000 workers were on strike. A group of 18 strike sympathizers, most of them members of the Iron Molders Union, came in from Rome, Ga., to help close the mill.

Deputy Sheriff Parish said the group came up to Deputy Hall, on guard at the mill door, and asked him to surrender his gun. When he refused, they dragged him to a corner of the mill. Hall jerked out his gun and started shooting, wounding Max Hart and Harvey Barpat, the latter critically.

The Ball ran into the mill. The group of Rome men were granted permission to go in and search for him by Chief of Police Bloodworth. They pushed into the mill office where Bloodworth, Deputy Hicks and Deputy Young were standing.

Deputy Parish said the strikers rushed Hicks and he started shooting in self defense. W. E. Hawkins, one of the only two members of the Rome party not wounded, changed the office started firing without provocation.

Reports spread that Bloodworth and Deputy Young ran from the office as Deputy Hicks opened fire. Hicks fell mortally wounded. A rifle shot from the door of the office fell Hicks. Both Hicks and Bloodworth died in a hospital later.

A wild crowd gathered quickly about the mill but dispersed with out further gunfire.

The group of Rome strike sympathizers returned home late in the day, carrying ten wounded with them.

Mayor Murphy, vice president of the Triion mills, refused to discuss the rioting with newspapermen. His request to Governor Talmadge for National Guard protection was refused Tuesday. The governor, making a campaign speech for reelection at Columbus yesterday, referred another request for troops to Adjutant-General Camp.

Patrolman Walter Beard was felled by a brick in a brief battle at Augusta. Strikers picketing the Enterprise mill there allegedly jumped on him and beat him severely. During the melee, several shots rang out, wounding four
