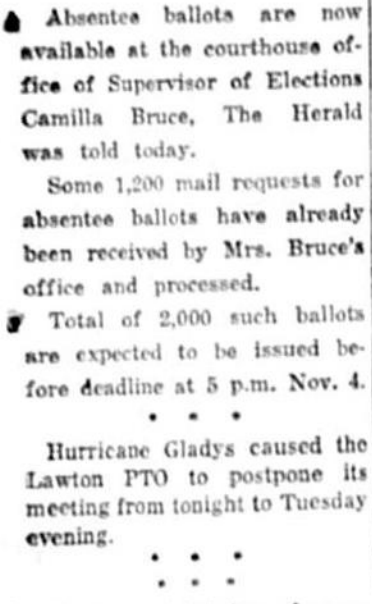

Sen. Plante Top Spender In Campaign

 Top spender in the political campaign being waged locally by Republican Sen. Kenneth Plante, check of October reports of expenditures and contributions filed in the office of Arthur H. Beckwith, Jr., clerk of the circuit court, reveals.

Plante campaigning to retain his seat in the Florida Senate representing Orange and Seminole counties has received some \$11,519.94 in contributions and expended \$10,728.49, the reports show.

In the race between Seminole County's Rep. E. Pope Bassett (R) and Ernest Cowley (D) for a seat in the Florida House, Bassett has taken in \$1,350 and spent \$1,425, while Cowley has received \$815 and spent \$798.82.

Contenders for county and juvenile judge Wallace Hall (R) and Robert Patro (D) have received \$2,478.76 and \$2,104, respectively, and spent \$1,377.87 and \$1,568.66, respectively.

County Clerk of Circuit Court Arthur Beckwith Jr., Democrat, has received contributions of \$1,000, while his Republican opponent, Donald Wilson, has received \$1,438.77. At the same time his Republican opponent John Spisak has received \$1,379 and spent \$1,466.66.

S. O. Dorniney, Democrat, in his first bid for office as tax assessor, has received contributions of \$2,310 and spent \$2,121.68. No October report is on file by his Republican opponent, Donald Wilson.

Contributions and expenses of the sheriff's race showed Peter Millitt (R) \$2,450.50 and Edward Yarborough (D) \$1,967.25 contributions and \$617.56 expenses; Henry Schumacher (R) no October report on file; Robert Toppe (D) \$1,475 contributions and \$430 expenses; W. Lawrence Swafford (D) \$4,497 contributions and \$4,225.65 expenses; Dorothy Meadors (R) \$706 contributions and \$644.20 expenses; and Dan Fulham (D) \$505 contributions and \$415.00 expenses. On County Seat Issue Civic Council For Vote

 South Seminole Civic Council was brought up to date Wednesday night on efforts to take the county commission from building a new courthouse on the proposed site in Sanford and to seek a larger and more central location by Robert Tucker, a plaintiff in the case, and Harlan Tuck, attorney for the group.

Members of the council reaffirmed their support of a more centrally located courthouse and voiced the need for a vote of the people on the location of the county seat.

Cliff Jordan, council chairman, reported that the South Florida Jaycees already have reaffirmed their position and approved a committee to work on the project. The Jaycees favor a vote of the people on any material issue of the county and disapprove of any method taking away this right.

The speakers pointed out that it is not a partisan suit or a regional effort but a county effort. "As long as Sanford continues to get all the county will remain split and there will be bitterness, but a centrally located courthouse would unite the whole county," they stated.

Fagan managed to pull the man into the boat and return to shore where he returned to recover the aluminum boat and motor.

Jowers was reported to have held onto his string of fish all through the near-disaster.

LBJ Waits For Word From Hanoi And Saigon

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson reportedly is awaiting assurances from Hanoi that a halt in U.S. bombing of North Vietnam will result in present new Communist steps toward peace.

Indications are that he is preparing to act quickly if and when the word comes through from Hanoi not only giving the assurances but also spelling out just what steps will be taken. Hope that such word would be based on several weeks of secret exchanges between Washington and Hanoi which by Wednesday had gone so far that South Vietnamese leaders evidently were persuaded an end to the bombing was only hours away.

In Saigon U.S. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker met three times Wednesday with South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu. A high Vietnamese official said they discussed a new proposal to halt all bombing of the North, restricted since March 21 to the southern panhandle.

Air strikes against the North continued, however, and more were planned for today. At the same time, Pentagon figures showed that bad weather has reduced sorties over the North by 30 per cent since midsummer. The weather could be expected to drop the level even further in the next six months, a factor that likely would be considered in weighing the risks of a full halt.

Johnson flew to New York Wednesday to appear with the Democratic and Republican presidential candidates at the annual nonpolitical Alfred E. Smith memorial dinner. The White House announced before he left that he would make "no pronouncements."

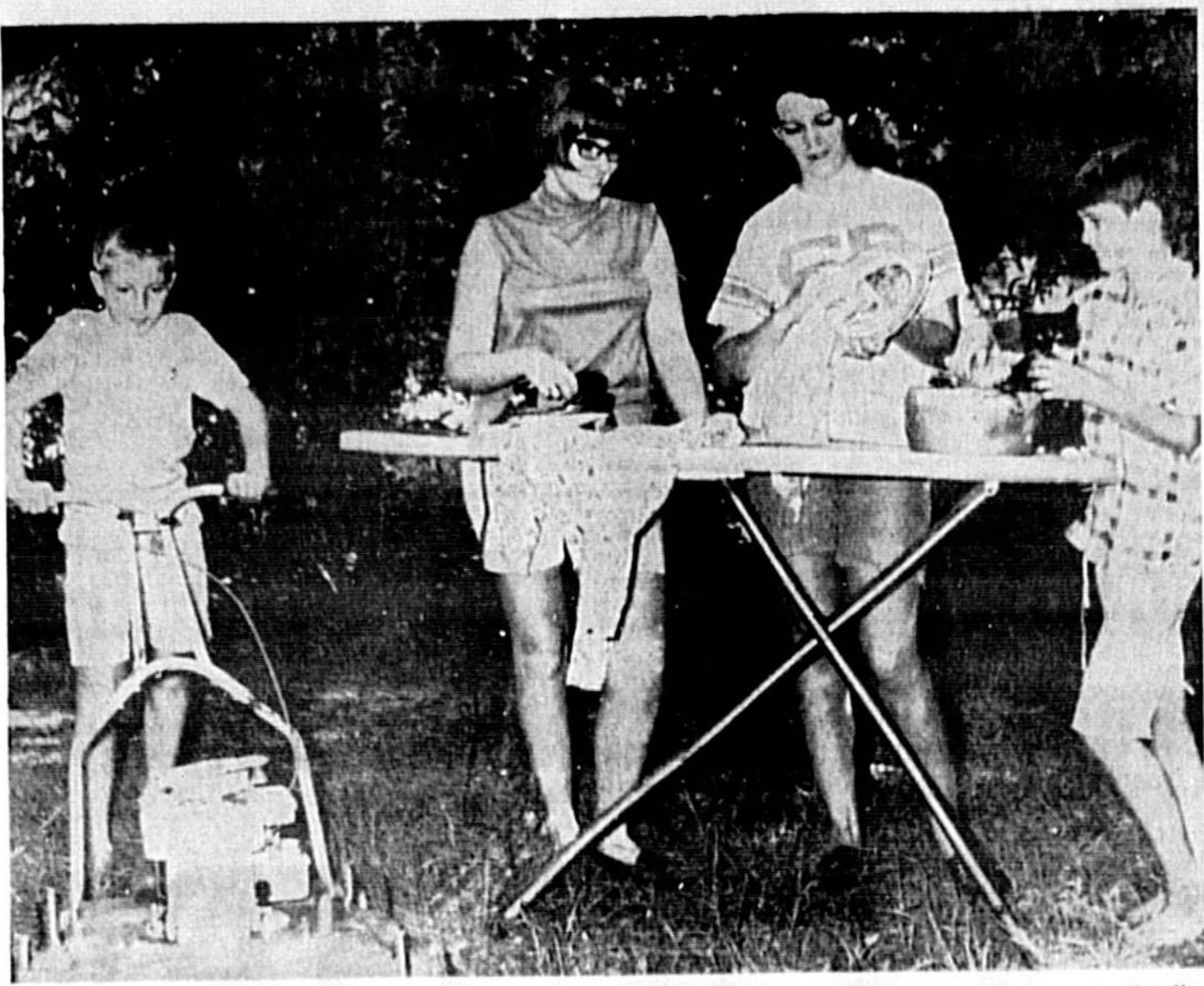

U. S. Bombers Continue Raids Despite Rumors

RAIDON (AP) — American B-52 bombers kept up their attacks on North Vietnam's southern panhandle today and more raids were scheduled for Friday amid recurring reports that the United States is considering a complete halt in the bombing of the North.

U.S. Air Force and Navy warplanes continued attacking bridges and other lines of communication below the 19th parallel, the bombing boundary set by

President Johnson last spring. In raids over the North Wednesday, Air Force and Navy pilots flew through northeast monsoon rains and overcast skies to smash more than 30 enemy supply boats and trucks, military spokesmen said.

Reports of an American proposal to end all air attacks on North Vietnam circulated Wednesday after U.S. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker met twice with South Vietnamese Presi-

dent Nguyen Van Thieu, presumably to sound Thieu out. The U.S. Mission refused to comment on the talks, but a spokesman said Bunker had another meeting with Thieu scheduled today.

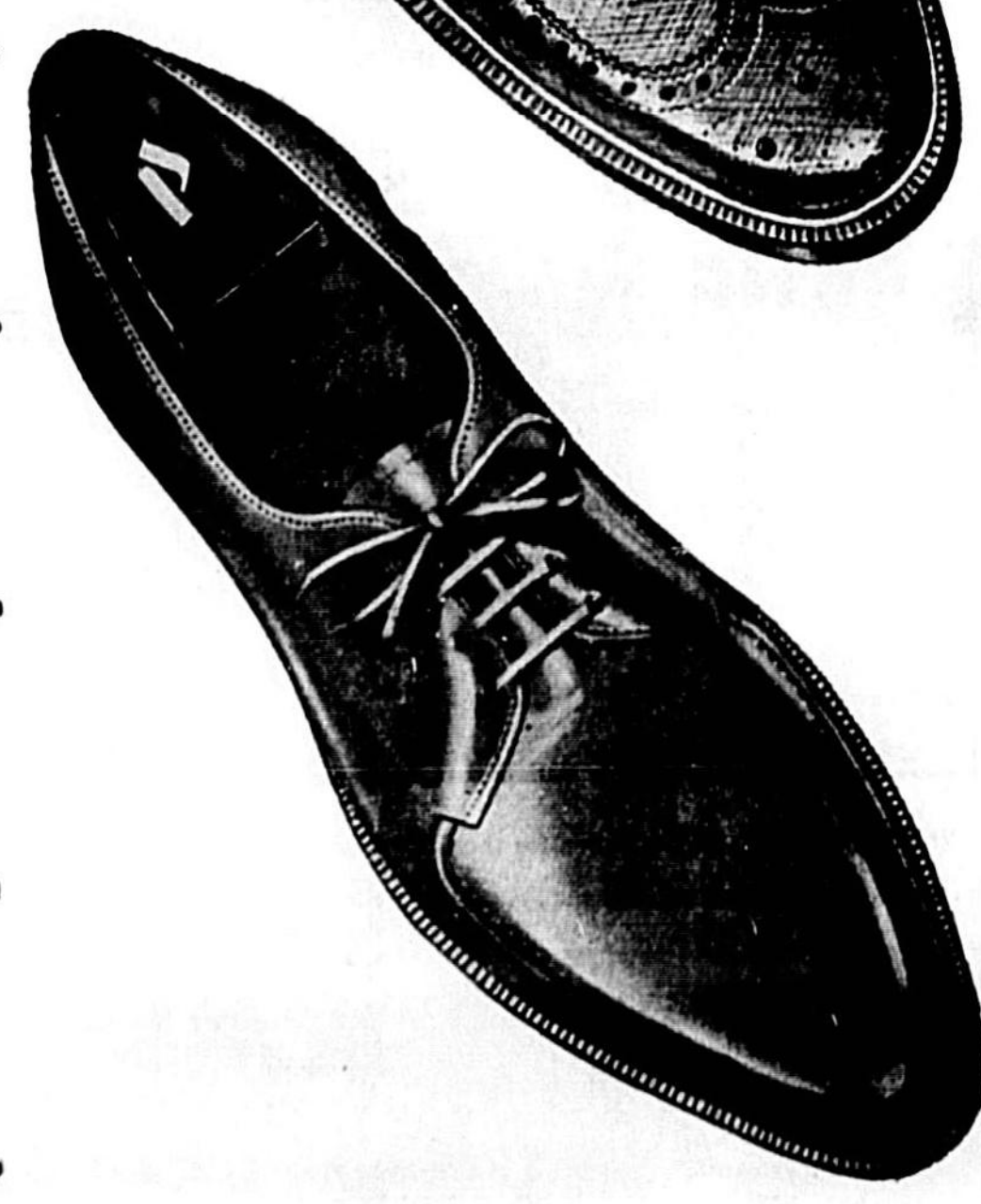

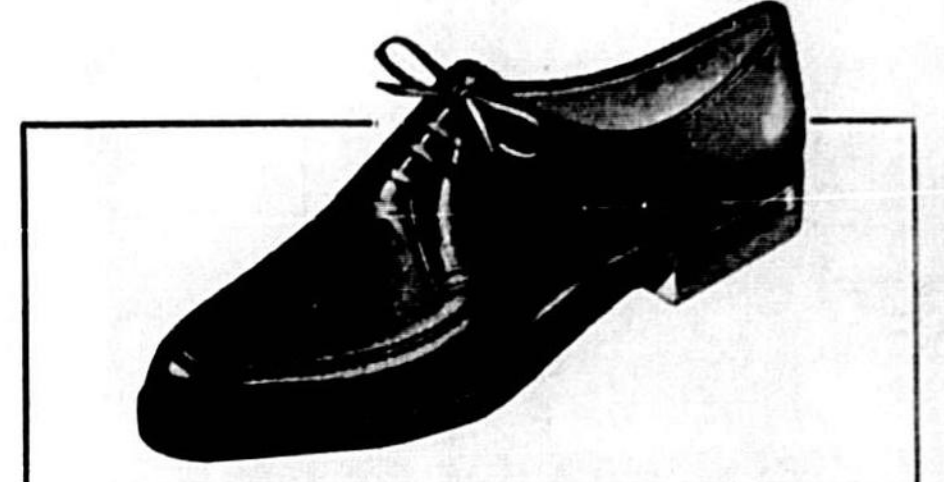

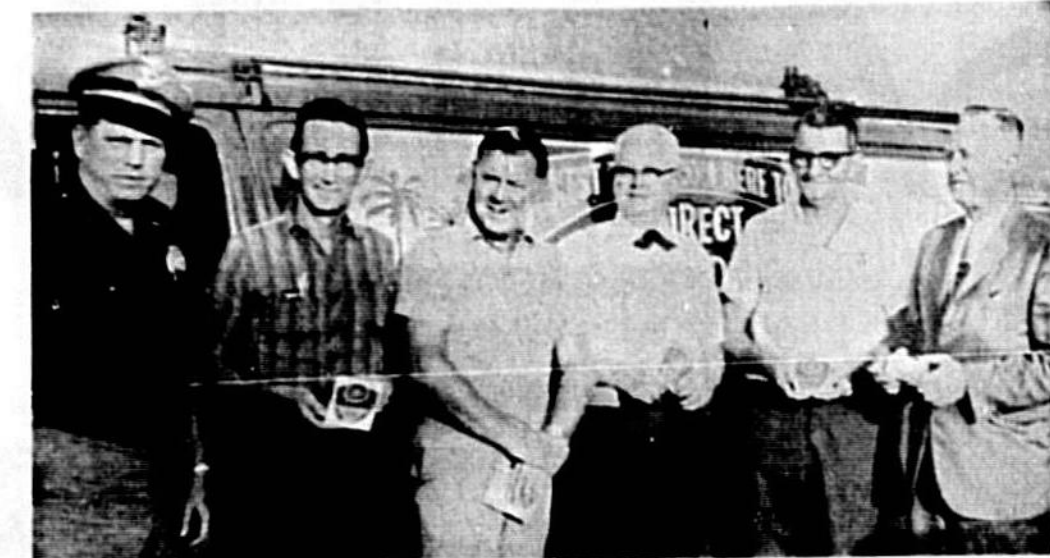

Osteen P. O. Site Approved

Decision by Volusia County's district 5 zoning commission to grant a building permit for the new Osteen Post Office will stand, according to the county board of zoning appeals. In a ruling handed down Tuesday by the appeals board, it was agreed that the new post office, although privately owned, will be a government operation and is exempt from local zoning regulations. Appeal was filed by Louis E. Noel and L. W. Jones, owners of adjacent property in Osteen, on the basis of a commercial building being located in a residential area. In a telephone interview with The Herald this morning, Noel said that news media "has misrepresented the matter all along," citing the fact that he and Jones "never have been against Osteen getting a new post office. "Our only objections have been to the site, which we feel is inadequate to handle future growth in the area expected after we get a new Osteen bridge across the St. Johns River. "News stories refer to the post office property as being located on the 'corner' of New Smyrna Boulevard and Florida Avenue. This is in error. Actually the two-lot site, which is 104 feet wide by 153 feet deep, is separated from Florida Avenue by a 52-foot lot," Noel pointed out. "In addition to the fact that the property was zoned residential, it was our feeling that this site also is too small to allow for future expansion or to adequately handle parking when the building is completed."

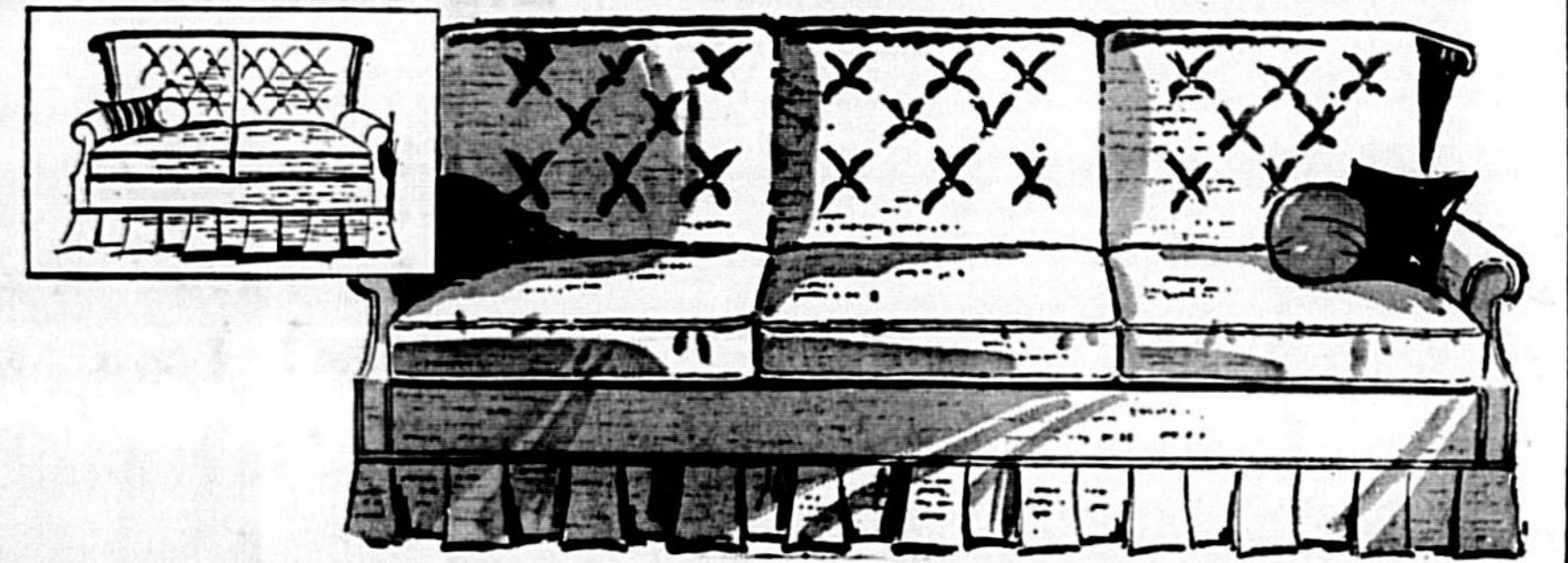

Humphrey Pictures 'Hair Breadth' Win

Democratic Robert F. Kennedy's hair breadth victory got some support earlier in the day from Louis Brandeis, almost the only voting analyst of standing who predicted Truman would win in 1948.

"We'll give you the biggest surprise in many, many years," he said in St. Louis Wednesday.

Humphrey shared the platform with Nixon and President Johnson at a New York dinner Wednesday night and said he takes heart from Harry S. Truman's comeback victory 20 years ago.

"I have to," the Democrat said.

The President and the two men seeking his job made speeches and traded political jokes at the Alfred E. Smith memorial dinner but there was no favor of a Nixon-Humphrey debate.

Humphrey has been pressing for such a debate and he said he was "pleased my friend Mr. Nixon is on the same platform with me, almost within camera range."

Nixon praised Johnson as the hardest working president of this century and one who is devoted to peace and deeply concerned about the welfare of the 300,000 Americans in Vietnam.

Johnson, using a phrase that had come up in third party candidate George C. Wallace's campaign, said the plight of the deprived and minorities cannot be "kicked under a rug or run over by a car."

Humphrey's prediction of a hair breadth victory got some support earlier in the day from Louis Brandeis, almost the only voting analyst of standing who predicted Truman would win in 1948.

Brandis, speaking in Washington, said he calculates Nixon and Humphrey are running about 50-50.

Gurney Edges Collins In Hot Fight

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Florida's free swinging fight over the U.S. Senate is one of the hottest races in the South this year and for the first time in this century the Republican candidate is favored.

GOP Rep. Edward Gurney is given a slight edge over former Gov. LeRoy Collins in a campaign in which Vietnam has been the main issue but much of the speech time has been devoted to the candidates' past political bedfellows.

And Collins has attempted to shake Gurney to Florida's flamboyant GOP Gov. Claude Kirk, whose popularity dipped after an aborted drive for second spot on the Republican national ticket.

There is widespread animosity in Florida against the Johnson administration, Gurney says, and it will hurt his opponent because "Collins was a key member of the chain during his time in Washington and he supported LBJ all the way."

Collins resigned as president of the National Association of Broadcasters at President Johnson's request in 1964 to become the first head of the Community Relations Service. The next year, Johnson named Collins as secretary of commerce.

The silver-haired former governor has replied that he served wherever he was asked, but that he remains his own man. And usually he counters with a charge that Gurney "is in the same political bed" with Kirk, who has been called the "Go-Go governor."

Her permit to stay in India has expired, the reports said.

The northernmost area of the United States is Point Barrow, Alaska, while the southernmost is South Cape, Hawaii.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Disagreement between "hawks" and "doves" in Hanoi may be delaying a response to ending the bombing of North Vietnam, diplomatic authorities here believe.

These authorities suggest a debate has been going on within the North Vietnamese leadership over the issue of giving assurances of limiting the war on the Communist side if President Johnson halts attacks on the North.

The Paris press reports that the U.S. proposals were made on Oct. 15. U.S. officials said the South Vietnamese government has been thoroughly covered in consultations with governments allied in the war, including the South Vietnamese government.
