





About Crime News

With some people who find a special interest in criticizing newspapers a favorite focus of their comments is the amount of crime news they present. They speak out of special prejudices and ignorance, easily apparent to anyone who bothers to check the statistics on crime in a given newspaper's circulation area. Such a check will reveal that where crime rates are high, and everywhere they are on the increase, those reported other than as statistics are few in relation to the number committed.

Surprisingly, the American Bar Association is among those most prominently guilty in protesting against newspaper stories on crime. Yet, its members should, better than most, know how little there is in relation to the number of crimes. Newspaper coverage of crime is necessarily limited, when you think of a year in which 12,000 felonies are committed in New York City in one year with only 41 per cent of them covered in the columns of The New York Daily News, a publication certainly not reputed to be averse to the sensational.

Reading the Washington Post would not even faintly convey the full nature of crime there. Even if the paper tried it could spatially cover only so much, but the FBI statistics indicate it for those who are interested. So, according to population, and circulation, newspapers can only present what space, and a proper balancing of the news of the day permits.

Viewed in this realistic, proper way, the critics of too much crime news are, to be generous with them, just plain uninformed and silly. Perhaps the thing to worry about is the inability to get over to the people the full details of crime in the United States, for if it were possible there might be a public demand powerful enough to Global Comment force action to restore law and order in this land. were not blind to the realties, and seeking to dictate to the press what it can publish-Lynchburg (Va.)
