Twas the night before Christmas and through the house" Capt. Billy Lyons of the Salvation Army was trying to squeeze 19 families with no place to stay into the small antiquated Sanford headquarters on Second Street, Up until 1 a.m. he was still trying to make impromptu sleeping arrangements in the chapel, the store and in upstairs offices.

With Salvation Army facilities filled to more than capacity in Orlando, there was nothing to do but make emergency arrangements to house the hapless families for the night as they began to come in. Who could turn them out into the street, especially on Christmas Eve?

Certainly not Captain Lyons, who, though handicapped by a limited budget and limited facilities, manages through an unlimited supply of faith and love to reach out to those in need with a helping hand not only at Christmas time but all

Bare Necessities

During the past four months he has had daily visits from one to 40 families needing bare necessities of food, clothing and furniture. They include local and transient families. During this time more rents, utilities and transportation have been paid for by the local corps than any time over the past five year period.

"If it had not been for Christmas donations we could not have made it," Captain Lyons commented. "We spent \$14,000 over Christmas. Over 300 food baskets were distributed, plus 76 dinner tickets. Over 1,600 new toys were given to needy children, with an equal amount of used toys and 6,000 gift articles, many of them donated, given to patients in convalescent homes."

Social Services Grow

Nearly \$13,000 was contributed over the holidays to the Salvation Army's work in Seminole County, making it possible to break even after paying off

Social services must grow to meet growth in population, Captain Lyons pointed out. "The SA facility in Seminole has the poorest construction and is the oldest in the state. The SA moved into the building in 1929 and it was old then, having served as a funeral home and before that as an A&P," he


"Soup, soap and salvation" was the motto of William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army, and the same theory holds for today's operation as Captain Lyons and his wife, Capt. Rosella Lyons, believe in giving those who are down and out food and then helping them get cleaned up and on their feet, while not neglecting their spiritual welfare. In addition to personal counseling, regular church services are held each Sunday and Bible study.

Youth Activities

Youth activities are handicapped by the size and location of the building as they have to go elsewhere for outdoor recreation.

Currently underway is the building campaign which would provide a modern community center where the SA's activities can be expanded to better serve the troubled and distressed of every race and creed and provide a center for youth activities.

The community needs the Salvation Army and it needs support of the community if this dream is to be realized. Captain Lyons has faith God will bring this about.


