FOR THE HOLIDAY SEASON

fact which cannot help but benefit
Sanford.

Enough, But Not Too Much

There can scarcely be found any fault with the
avowed intention of Washington officials to press for a
stronger army and navy to meet any possible challenge
from the dictator nations.

The United States has seen only too clearly what hap-
pens to countries when they are found to be unprepared
to defend themselves against aggression. Ethiopia,
China, and Czechoslovakia furnish object lessons in the
sufficiency of power to make us realize that the only thing
which will keep Hitler and Mussolini off our backs is a
strong army and navy.

But, while we seek to improve our military
we should not be carried away by the slogan of
"let us be prepared." The slogan is good. We
should not, for instance, start building more battleships
than we can man and service in our harbors. A war
fleet without a trained crew and a fleet of obsolete
facilities is of questionable value. We
should not, just for the sake of increasing our
purpose of heart, construct an armory or factory which
we don't have experienced ground troops and
building facilities.

Rather than any spectacular construction
which might serve to inflame the public mind
it might be much better to improve the military
equipment which we now possess. We should
concentrate on efficiency rather than display. The
army should be the best equipped in the world.
It need not be the largest, but it should have the
best fighting machines.

According to admirals in the Navy, an increase of 25
percent in the fleet will be sufficient to meet any
possible demand and they back with disfavor upon any
possible talk from naval officers about building more
and bigger programs which would not possibly be
maintained.

Army officers are equally skeptical of proposals
for expansion of 10,000 planes. A year ago the
army had 10,000 planes. They don't seem to be
any more needed. In the first place, they doubt that
there are anywhere near the 10,000 total of planes
which the army needs. In the second place, they
doubt that the 10,000 figure of planes quoted was
meant to include the 10,000 planes of the
army.

What our military men are anxious to do is to
build our force to a high point of efficiency and to
provide for our defense and the realm of accomplish-
ment. They favor upon practical and unadorned
goals.

U. S. And British Taxes

The impression has been frequently given that
taxation in England is a lot more burdensome than
in the United States, the inference usually being that we can
pay a lot more than they do.

However, facts as shown by the Palm Beach Post
reveal that citizens of Great Britain paid \$10,000,000
for all taxes, while the total local, state and federal taxes
in the United States amounted to \$92 per person for 1937.
From all sources of tax revenue which earned widely
in yield between the two countries, Great Britain
collected \$1,908,110,000, and those of the United States,
with a population a little less than three times as large,
amounted to \$11,838,700,000. In Great Britain, 41
percent of that total came from income taxes. In the
United States, property taxes constituted 38 percent of
the largest source.

The Palm Beach paper points out that besides the
outstanding differences in yields of the various taxes,
there also was a wide difference in the amount of taxes
collected by the national and local governments in the
two countries.

In Great Britain, for example, the national govern-
ment received an estimated 87 percent of the total 1937
tax collections, while the federal government of this
country received about 11 percent. The local authorities in
Great Britain, constituting the only level of government
below the national, received 16.8 percent of the total taxes
entirely from property levies, while here, state, county
and municipal governments raised 59 percent of the total
taxes by various types of levies.

"Combined state and local taxes in the United States
totaled about \$7,000,000,000 in 1937, as compared to
about \$827,000,000 in Great Britain."

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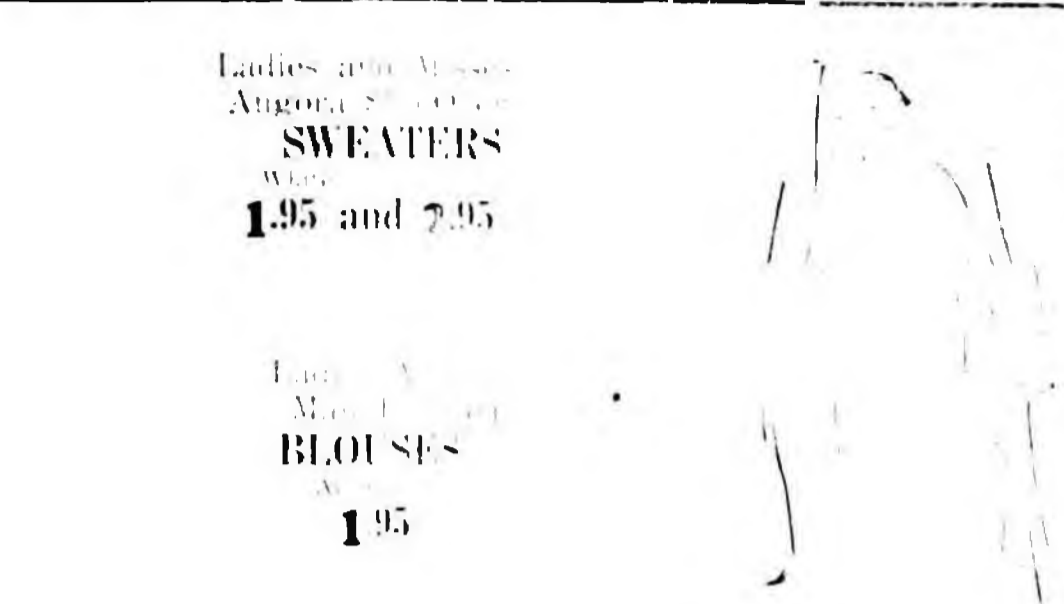

HOLLYWOOD SHOPS

Huge Debt Is Big Obstacle To French Progress

Daladier Hopes New Plan Will End Long Flight Of Capital

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—If you can spell out the most insistent crisis in France with a four-letter word everybody knows—D-E-B-T!

If France could whip her debt problem, she could go a long way toward whipping her every other problem—internal and external.

For that reason Washington observers of the world scene are picking up their ears over Premier Eduard Daladier's three-year plan for economic mobilization of the nation. They think it is far more significant than the exciting strike news or the Italian hub-bub for colonies.

The experts read into M. Daladier's plan a scheme to entice capital to France. For if France can guarantee a three-year period of labor peace and internal stability, a steady flow of capital might be lured, and the Bank of France once more could face the world with bulging coffers of gold.

These same experts have their doubts, however, that the three-year plan will be easy of achievement. For the acute demand of French labor is high, and already Daladier is being called a deflator.

The experts summarize the situation like this: France presents a picture of changing cabinets each of which since 1927 has lacked either the courage or the ability to try a long term solution of the financial problem created by a series of post-war drains.

The experts cite you, Charles Rist, the noted French economist who insists some such financial facing of the facts as Daladier's three-year plan must be attempted if France is to avoid not only disaster, internal disaster might invite aggressive dictators to dismember the French colonial empire while the mother country is busy at home.

France is spending each year on government one-third more money than she collects in taxes and the spread is increasing all the time. She has often resorted to inflation, including the big inflation of 1928, without pulling herself out of the hole.

The depression brought the world's attention to the persistent state of French financial crisis. In 1931 it became apparent that France was on a financial toboggan, despite her then heavy reserves of gold.

In that year, the national income of 250 billion francs hit the skids. It has melted persistently despite watering of national money. Now it stands at 100 billions.

Tax collections fell off with income. The deficit was 4 billion francs in 1934. In 1938 it was double that. Gold moved out. The French government borrowed money in the open market until interest rates got too high for comfort.

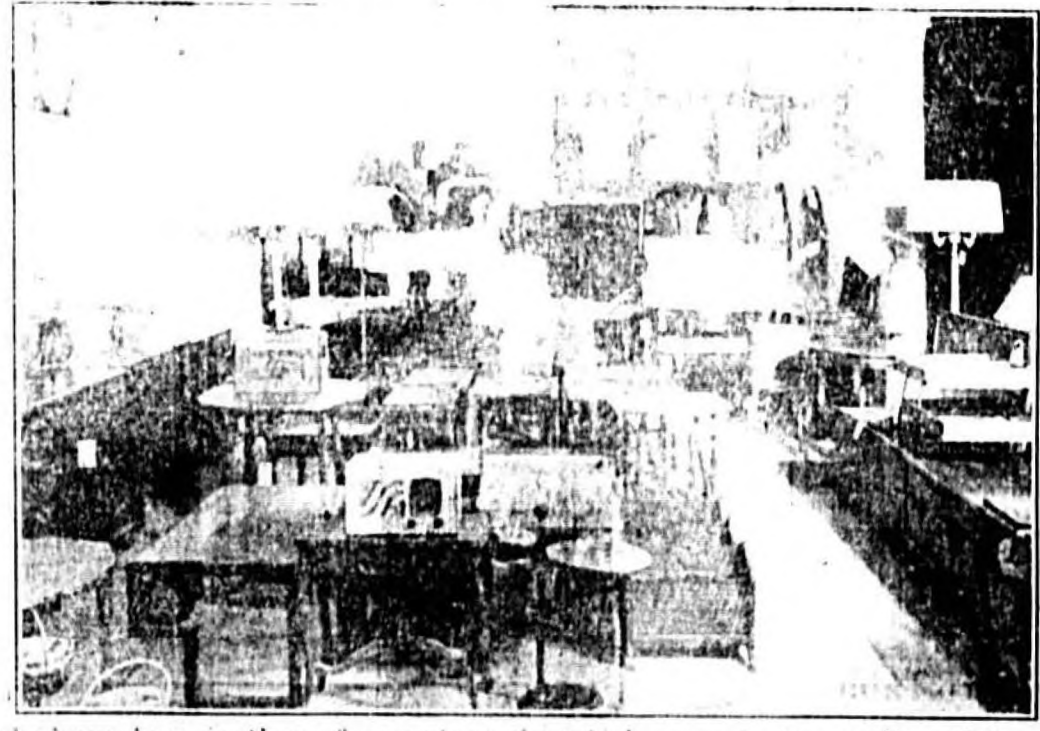

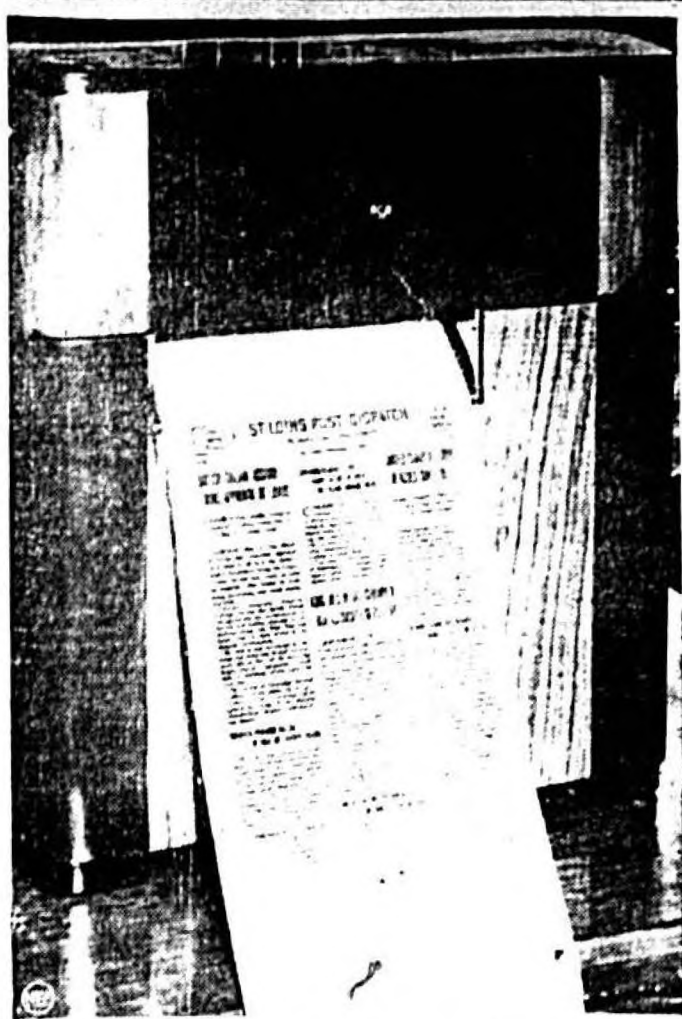

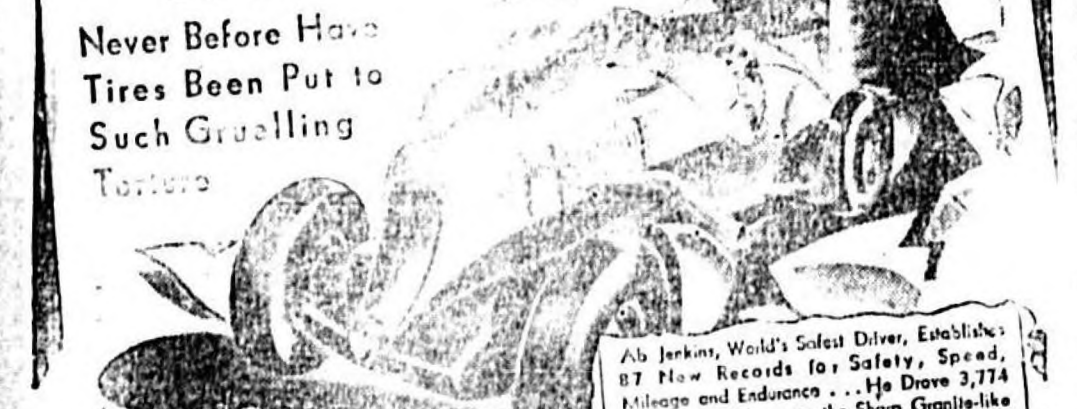

DeLand Bartender Held As Author Of Extortion Notes

ORLANDO, Dec. 14.—Earl Ferguson, 45, DeLand bartender, was held in Orange County here last night under \$10,000 bond charged with sending extortion notes thru the mails.

Ferguson was arrested in DeLand yesterday by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents who accused him of demanding payment of \$5,000 from Richard Colvin, wealthy Chicago resident who spends his winters in DeLand, Daley said.

Ferguson, according to federal authorities who secured a warrant for the arrest of the bartender, said he sent Colvin a note on Dec. 10 demanding payment of the \$5,000 which the Chicago man was ordered to place in a package and deliver to a designated point within the city limits of DeLand to avoid being kidnaped.

Daley set Dec. 20 as time for a preliminary hearing of the case after Ferguson was arraigned and entered a not guilty plea.

Last Summer, Colvin launched a travel magazine published in DeLand and has been active in various other business ventures in the Florida city.

Sheriff S. E. Stone of Volusia County said last night he had his deputies worked on the case under direction of Department of Justice agents, called into the community to work under cover in an attempt to bring to earth the sender of the kidnap-threat note.

Holt Advocates Humanization In Instruction

Rollins Head States Students Benefit Most From Closer Unity With Faculty

Speaking on the relationship between students and instructors in the nation's institutions of higher learning, Dr. Hamilton Holt, president of Rollins College in Winter Park, in an address to the Kwanan Club today advocated humanization in the system of instruction.

Declaring that his most important contacts were those he made with his older pupils on the editorial staff of a weekly periodical after receiving his college degree at Yale, Dr. Holt asserted that he had learned more from these men who made an attempt to teach him than from the lectures of his college professors because of his personal contacts with them.

From this experience, he said, his greatest aim when made president of Rollins College was to obtain a closer unity of the instructors between the faculty and students. When taking over at Rollins about 13 years ago, he said the principal question in his mind was "Why can't we give students the same relationship with the faculty that I had with my colleagues?"

In attempting to achieve his goal, Dr. Holt said that a three-point program has been placed in operation at Rollins so that the student may get the utmost from this collegiate training.

One of the points, he said is direct contact with the pupils through small classes. In this regard the college president alluded to the fact that he did not advocate lectures and utilizing the sole means of instruction but rather student conferences where the professor merely presides.

He also favored the classification of students according to achievement rather than by time. He said that at Rollins students are divided into the upper and lower divisions and that an attempt is made to teach "something of everything" in the upper division.

His third point referred to financial arrangements in which students pay the operation cost of the room only with special provisions for assistance for a part of the student body which is unable to pay in full.

The speaker at today's luncheon was introduced by Dr. J. B. Root, chairman of the program committee. Dr. Holt was accompanied by F. T. Brown, secretary and treasurer of Rollins.

Two new members were inducted into the club at its meeting which was presided over by President Sidney J. Nix. They were Dr. W. P. Burham, and Frank Shames. The usual induction ritual was performed by the Rev. F. J. Kellegban.

Victors at today's meeting besides Dr. Holt and Mr. Brown were: County Commissioner D. L. Thrasher, Superintendent of Schools T. W. Lawton, and G. E. McKay, principal of Seminole High School.
