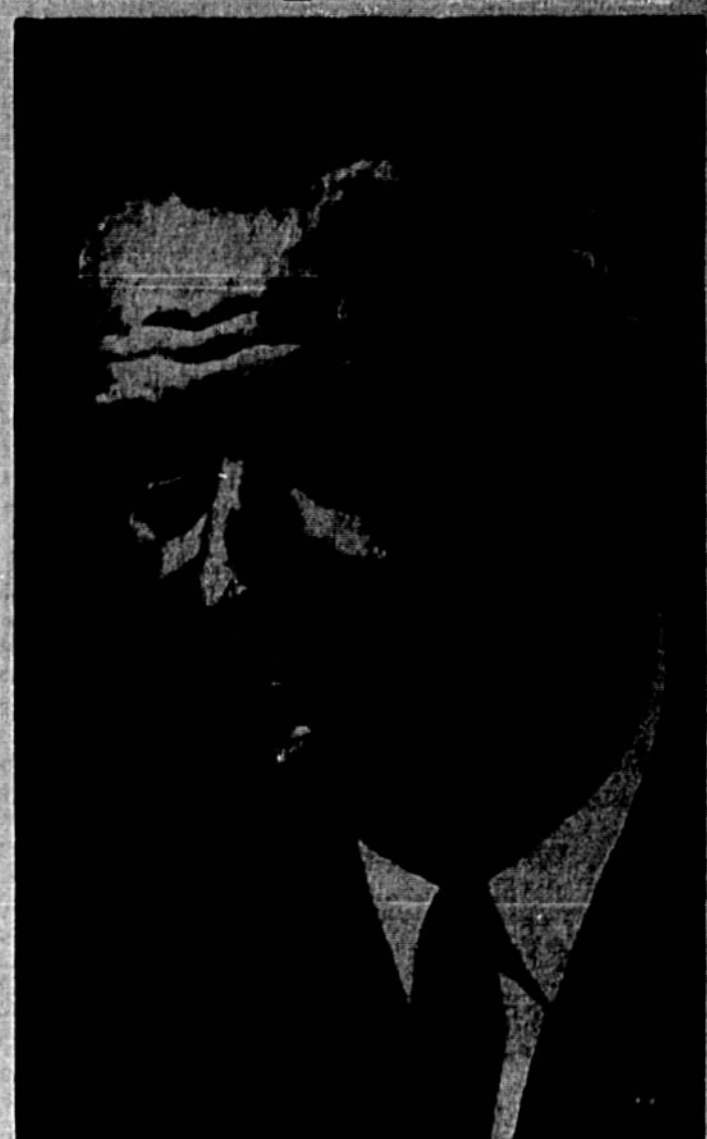

Arson Is Suspected In Fire Near Oviedo

Arson is suspected by Florida Forestry Service officials to be the cause of a forest fire which destroyed over 100 acres of pasture and woodland Friday afternoon on SR 520 south of Oviedo. The fire started in a pasture owned by D. D. Dunlap and spread to nearby woods.

Forestry Service trucks from Seminole and Orange Counties answered the call with the aid of the Oviedo Volunteer Fire Department and battled the blaze for over four hours. Nine smaller fires accounted for the remaining acreage burned. Four fires were reported near Glensville, three near Oviedo and two in Forest City.

All losses to the Seminole County Forestry Service were cancelled over a week ago by the District Forestry Service Office in Ocala and are expected to remain cancelled until the situation is relieved by some rain. Forest Rangers have been working seven days a week and are on call 24 hours a day. Officials from the Forestry Service remind the public that it is against the law to allow a fire to get out of control and that they will enforce the law to the fullest in an attempt to lessen the acreage destroyed by fire in the county.

Deer Believes He's Horse

CLIWISTON (AP)—A white tall deer ate the show among the horses in Joe Hilliard's ranch pasture. That's "Princess," who thinks he's a horse. "Princess" pointed little hooves in the paths of his pasture buddies. He eats their feed—a mixture of oats, corn and molasses. And "Princess" steals their thunder. When motorists stop on nearby U.S. Highway 27 to watch the strange scene, "Princess" looks at the fence and nuzzles the tourists. He munches the cigarettes and cigars they offer along with cookies and fruit, never taking alick. "Half of the kids in this county come to that fence," said Joe Hilliard, 58, untanned owner of the ranch which is scattered over much of Hendry County near Lake Okechobee. "We feed him there. He doesn't ever go away; he's usually right there every day," Hilliard said. The deer, accustomed to people but untrained and relationally frisky with his antlers, he sheds them for the season, sometimes scuttles through the low back ranch into the privacy of nearby forest. But he always has come back since Hilliard got him three years ago. "And then there's hunting season," said Hilliard, turning grim. "He's been there three hunting seasons and no one's got him yet. I worry about the best one." Two earlier deer have been slaughtered in the fields by ranch hands from nearby towns, Hilliard said. Hilliard has obtained a doe called Princess which runs the pastures with "Princess" occasionally. But Princess is more delicate—she eats calf feed along with five pounds of apples and four pounds of bananas each week.

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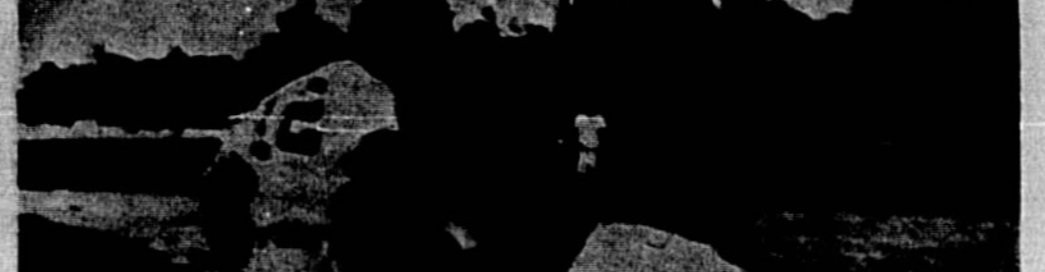

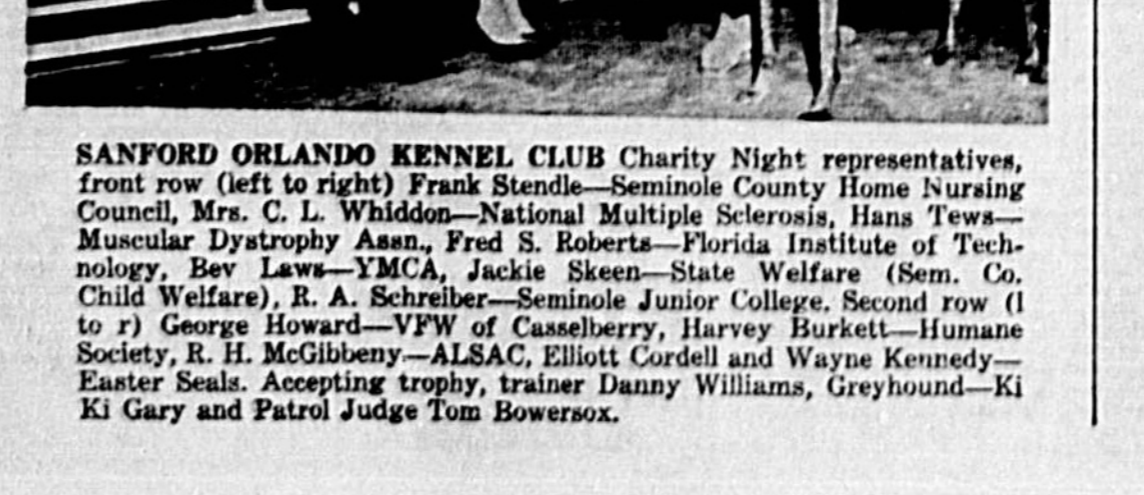

April Fool's Day Is Almost Moribund

"The first of April, some do say
Is the best apart for all Fools' Day;
That why the people want it
Is 'cause I, nor they themselves
do know."

"But on this day are people sent
"On purpose for pure merriment."

For unknown centuries, the first of April, until now, has been consecrated to practical jokes.

Explanations of the day's origin and real purpose are much disputed.

Some people claim it's all Noah's fault. They reason that, having spent much time in the Ark, he was anxiously waiting for the flood to subside. When he thought that had finally happened, he opened the window and sent out the dove. But it was a fool's errand. Unable to find any land, the bird returned to the boat.

The trip took place on a Hebrew date which is said to correspond to April 1. Ever since, this day has been appointed as All Fools' Day, the all being a corruption of the word "silly."

Some fundamentalists believe that the days is a reminder of the unfortunate circumstances of Noah's time and that it perpetuates the memory of man's delinquency from the flood.

Other historians state that April Fool's Day is a relic of the festivities associated with the vernal equinox, the time when the sun moving northward

crosses the celestial equator. The date, which occurs on or about March 21, signals the beginning of spring and the rebirth of nature. Laughter and joy marked the universal celebrations held from March 25, Old New Year's Day, until April 1. In ancient India, on the last day of the feast of Holi (March 31) held to cement the spring colic, unsuspecting persons were sent on silly errands.

The most popular attribution for April 1 dates back to 16th century France and involves a combination of New Year's festivities, a change of calendars, and some people's forgetfulness. It had been an old Roman custom, later adopted by other European nations, to visit friends on the New Year and take them gifts. New Year's then fell on March 25, but the fact that this date frequently coincided with Easter Week caused the merriment to be postponed until April 1.

In 1564, Charles IX of France adopted the Gregorian calendar, which set January 1 as New Year's Day instead of April 1. Since news of the calendar change traveled slowly, many Frenchmen continued to observe the holiday in the spring. Eventually this evolved into a joke.

The French had a name for the dullards who hadn't noticed the change—a pun on the word "April" or "April Fool." The name referred to the old French belief which claimed that in the spring there is an increase in the number of young fish in the streams, who were more easily hooked than the wiser, older fish.

Because April Fool's Day in France was a well-known joke, many Frenchmen hesitated to begin anything on that day. This didn't favor Napoleon, who married his second wife on April 1, 1810.

The holiday was also used to advantage by the Duke and Duchess of Lorraine. Prisoners at Nantes, they dressed up as peasants and passed through the prison gates. When informers told the guards their prisoners were escaping, the guards laughed it off as an April Fool's joke. By the time the superintendent of the guards decided to investigate, the prisoners had made good their escape.

April Fool's Day didn't come to the conservative English and ultimately to America until the middle of the 18th century, when the English adopted the new calendar and with it All Fools' Day. The holiday went over particularly well with the Scottish people, who call April fools "April gowks" or "cuckoos."

A popular joke in Scotland involved sending a victim with a message to another joker, who dispatched the messenger still further. Each prankster denied he is the person being sought until the rube caught on to the scheme or was informed of the wild goose chase.

Although the English were "Johnny Come Lately" to April 1 pranks, they are credited with falling for the most notorious joke in April Fool's Day history. In 1865, many Londoners re-

ceived a formal invitation to the Tower of London. The invitation read in part: "Admiral Beavor and Friend to the Yearly Washing of the White Lion. Admitted only at White Gate. It is particu-

Harriman Tapped For Peace Mission

WASHINGTON (AP) — W. Averell Harriman, the sophisticated millionaire who held several jobs under President Harry S. Truman and three under President John F. Kennedy, has been tapped for another presidential mission with a familiar goal: Peace.

Harriman is 78 years old and if North Vietnam's representatives show up at the negotiating table, as President Johnson expressed hope Sunday night they will, they are destined to deal with a U.S. diplomat of almost unparalleled experience.

John said in his nationwide address that Harriman and Soviet Ambassador Lovell Thompson will be ready to go to Geneva "or any other suitable place—just as soon as Hanoi agrees to a conference."

Harriman first came to Washington when Franklin D. Roosevelt was in the White House, working in key domestic agencies.

The action of one of America's great railroad families—he once ran the Union Pacific Railroad—was to secure peace talks.

Harriman is in the White House, working in key domestic agencies.

He held the Moscow job for three years, dealing with Premier Joseph Stalin through the end of the war and the dawn of a new era—a world divided between Communism and non-Communism.

In April 1946, Truman named him ambassador to Great Britain but Harriman held that job

only six months before the President called him home to be secretary of commerce in a nation undergoing postwar economic convulsions.

Two years later Harriman was back in Europe with the rank of ambassador, working to revitalize Europe through the Marshall Plan. Other missions under Truman included working with the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and heading the Mutual Security Administration.

Proving himself more than a successful appointee, he later took advantage of the enforced idleness of the presidential years of Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower to run for and win the governorship of New York, serving a four-year term.

When Kennedy was elected, he quickly summoned Harriman to Washington as an ambassador-at-large and later in 1961 named him assistant secretary of state for Far Eastern affairs. In this post he did crucial work in Laos successfully aimed at preventing a major outbreak of hostilities there.

Eight months before his death, Kennedy made Harriman under secretary of state for political affairs.

Yanks Halt Attacks On N. Viet

SAIGON (AP) — American bombers and warships halted their attacks on most of North Vietnam today, one day after strikes close to Hanoi, Haiphong and the Chinese border.

The cutoff in the bombing ordered by President Johnson was the 10th curtailment in the air war against the Communist North since it began on Feb. 7, 1965.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland's headquarters said the reduction in the bombing was in effect by the time the President began his television statement announcing it, at 10 a.m. Saigon time.

The U.S. Command said American fighter bombers confined their attacks on North Vietnam today to the area just above the demilitarized zone, hitting enemy storage complexes, truck convoys and gun positions.

Only a few hours before, the U.S. Command announced that American planes on Sunday attacked the Cat Bi airfield four miles southeast of the center of Haiphong, the radio communications station 10 miles south of the city, a chemical plant 19 miles northeast of Haiphong, the Cam Pha coal area, 14 miles east-northeast of Haiphong, and the Lang Gai rail yard, 18 miles below the Chinese border.

Johnson said his de-escalation order applied to "most of North Vietnam's territory and an area containing almost 90 per cent of its population. This includes the Hanoi-Haiphong industrial heartland and the vital northeast and northwest rail-road lines between Hanoi and Communist China."

The President said the bombing would continue "in the area north of the demilitarized zone where the continuing enemy buildup directly threatens Allied forward positions and where movements of troops and supplies are clearly related to that threat."

Westmoreland's headquarters said the area just above the demilitarized zone, which extends north to the city of Vinh, about 120 miles above the demilitarized zone.

Most of the air strikes in this area have been against truck convoys believed headed southward with war materials for the 40,000 North Vietnamese troops who are believed manning the U.S. Marines at Khe Sanh, Con Thien, Gio Linh, Dong Ha and other Allied posts just below the DMZ.

The area from the DMZ to Vinh was excluded from the last bombing pause, at the end of January for Tet, the lunar new year festival.

It was learned that U.S. planes also will continue reconnaissance and aerial photographic missions all over North Vietnam, including the Red River Valley area from Hanoi to the Chinese border.

The President made no reference to the bombing of the Ho Chi Minh Trail through Laos, over which thousands of tons of war material and thousands of troops move into South Vietnam.

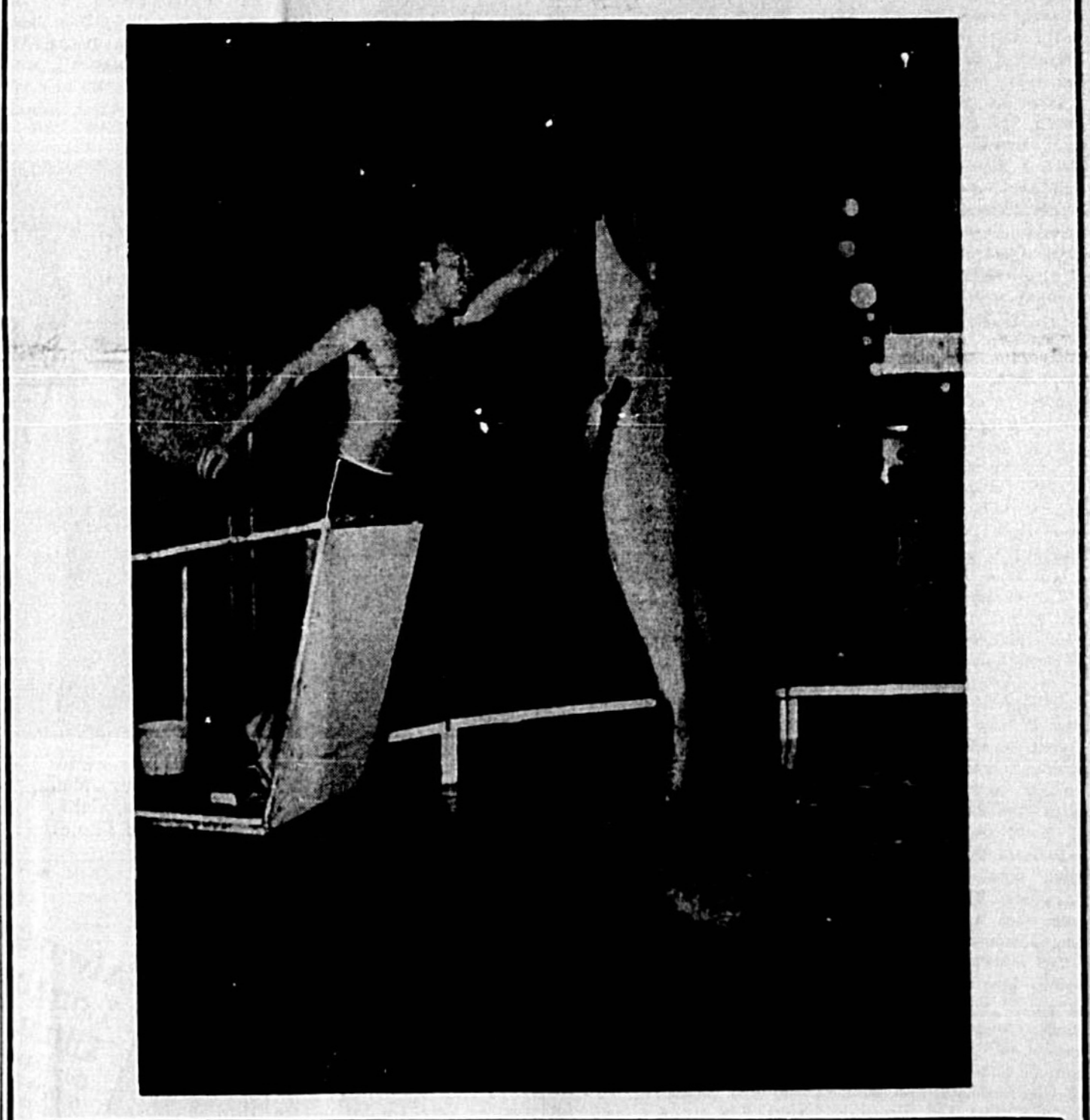

Clash Over Milk, Beer

ORLANDO (AP) — The Florida dairy industry Thursday took sharp issue with a St. Petersburg juvenile court judge who advocated allowing 15-year-olds in the state to legally drink beer.

A dairy industry spokesman said the milk men were not worried about the morality of Judge Robert Halvorsen's proposal. Nor were they complaining out of fear that it would cut into milk sales. It's a question of nutrition.

"To have a poorly nourished citizenry at a time when the United States carries such heavy world responsibilities could have grave consequences," the spokesman said.

Dealing With Pressure

SALINA, Kan. (AP) — More than 200 teachers in Salina and Saline County are involved in a continuing study of how to cope with "pressures in the classroom."

The study is sponsored by this Saline County Mental Health Association and will involve both students and their teachers.

Dr. Greenwood said that pressure is necessary for growth, both for the teacher and the student, but each must learn how to cope with the pressures. He urged the teachers to recognize that they enjoy helping some children more, because they are able to do them, and then to resist this tendency.

AMRITSAR, India (AP) — The family of an 18-year-old village girl broke off plans for an arranged marriage, on grounds that she had been raped.

The girl and her family sent away the prospective groom and his party after they learned the "groom was not 22 years old, but nearer 36, toothless and lame."

Groom Gets Jail Term

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — A Canadian has been sentenced to 12 years in state prison for pushing his wife off a cliff during their honeymoon.

Stepheno D'Ninio, 38, was convicted of murder by Judge Ernesto Hernandez Avila, who also ordered the sentence.

D'Ninio was charged in the death of his wife of about one month, Margaret Currie D'Ninio, 48. Her body was found Jan. 15, 1967, at the bottom of a 90-foot cliff south of Tijuana.

The D'Ninios had arrived in Tijuana two days earlier from Toronto, Canada, where they were married Dec. 18.

D'Ninio allegedly argued with his wife over his attentions to a Mexican woman, with whom he was arrested Jan. 28 by immigration authorities in Los Angeles. Accessory charges against the companion, Sabina Sanchez Perez, 25, were dismissed.

Learn Lessons

HONOLULU (AP) — A secret telen of A. Duane Black, a member of the School Advisory Council, has been revealed.

Black arrived late for a State Board of Education meeting and found all of the doors to the building locked. He shouted and pounded on doors for 45 minutes, but school officials, gathered on the fourth floor, heard nothing.
