

Unemployment Rate Records Sharpest Drop In 16 Years

WASHINGTON (AP) - Buoyed by February's favorable wholesale price report, the Ford administration looked to the new unemployment figures for additional good economic news.

The nation's unemployment rate fell in January to 7.8 per cent of the work force, down from 8.3 per cent in December. It was the sharpest drop in more than 16 years. The Labor Department releases the February

White House officials have said they expect the downward trend to continue, but they have cautioned that it could level off some months or even increase slightly. The big January drop in unemployment and the slowing of inflation have provided President Ford with fresh ammunition for his election campaign and efforts to sell his go-slow fiscal 1977 budget to Congress.

FCC Rules On Time Sales

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission has ruled that broadcast stations cannot refuse to sell a political candidate or his backers less than five minutes of campaign air time. WCN radio and television rations in Chicago had

refused to sen the President Ford Committee one-minute and 30-second spots in advance of the March 16 Illinois presidential primary. The Ford backers said candidates normally don't buy as much as five minutes. The FCC also ruled that a Miami TV station does not have to give Ronald Reagan equal time to match a series of five six-minute taped interviews with Ford, his op-

ponent in next week's Florida presidential primary.

Senate Leaders To Change

WASHINGTON (AP) - For the first time in more than a decade, the Senate is facing wholesale leadership changes brought on by the forthcoming retirements of Democrat Mike Mansfield and Republican Hugh Scott. Mansfield announced Thursday that he had decided that 34 years in Congress "is time enough." Scott earlier had announced his plans to retire. Mansfield became majority leader in 1961 and held the job longer than anyone in history. Both men say they will leave when their terms

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford, making a pitch for the farm vote in Illinois, might disclose new U.S. grain

As Ford prepared to fly to Illinois today for two days of campaigning, reports circulated here that grain companies might sell as much as four million more tons o wheat and corn to the Soviets to help make up for a small Russian hervest last year.

The announcement could be made when Ford address a farm forum in Springfield, III., in mid-afternoon.



Health Costs Are Target

President Ford's proposal to insure elderly Americans against the costs of catastrophic illness is aimed at commende the most conspicuous inadequacies of the present Medicare program. Illnesses requiring extended treatment or longterm hospitalization can quickly exceed the limits of Medicare benefits and wipe out the private resources of an individual or couple living on a retirement income.

There should be little political dissent in this election year from the administration's goal, Where the storm is brewing is in deciding how to pay for what would amount to an increase of \$1.1 to \$1.4 billion in the cost of the Medicare program.

Mr. Ford appears to be searching for a middle ground, proposing that about half of the cost be added to the federal budget thus to be covered by general tax revenues, while the other half is mot in increasing the amount that Social Security beneficiaries enrolled in Medicare pay toward the cost of their own medical treatment.

Spokesmen for organizations of retired people are shooting from the hip when they condemn this approach as shifting too much of the health care burden to those least able to afford it. But to put the entire burden on the still-active worker and taxpayer, whose shoulders already are bending under the increasing weight of financing the Social Security system, would raise an alternate question of fairness.

There is surely room for philosophical discussion of how much responsibility must be borne collectively by our society for the vicissitudes of life that befall individuals. In terms of elderly Americans, the moral responsibility of children for the welfare of aging parents is gradually yeilding to government programs. The tendency to yield that responsibility to government has been encouraged by the tremendous increase in the cost of medical care in recent years.

It is likely that Mr. Ford's plan, in some form or another, eventually will be enacted regardless of the outcome of the debate over who will pay. A society with the degree of material prosperity that America has achieved will manage somehow to see that the aged receive adequate medical treatment. However, the issue of paying for catastrophic illness must not be divorced from the bedrock issue of checking the runaway increases in the cost of all medical care.

Mr. Ford accompanies his plan with proposals to limit proposed increases in the amount the government will reimburse hospitals and doctors for treating Medicare patients. This form of costcontrol is designed to encourage efficiency. It carries the danger, however, of lowering the quality of care that patients receive. As we drift more toward "socialized medicine" - and the drift is more evident all the time — the need to control costs of health programs inevitably will begin to degrade the quality of medical care, and that is where the real catastrophe lies.
