## **Comstock** Lode

Two years before his death in New York on September 21, 1915, Anthony Comstock summed up his life's "In the 41 years I have been here,

I have convicted persons enough to fill a passenger train of 61 coaches ... I have destroyed 160 tons of obscene literature." This self-appointed guardian of

the people's thoughts and morals and officially appointed inspector of the U.S. Post Office also boasted that he had driven 15 persons to suicide. Despite such impressive accomplishments, Comstock's name has almost vanished from the public memory. Even the word "comstockery," an epithet coined by George Bernard Shaw, is rarely heard these days. Most of the books and plays and pictures Comstock devoted his life's energy to destroying or suppressing are accepted now as worthwhile literature and art, or else ignored as harmless, if not forgotten en-Aria that and

Yet, 50 years after his death, the spirit of the man lives on. The width and depth of intellect he exhibited in his attack on Shaw-"that Irish smut peddler"-is the same as that of the modern censors and saviors who hound and threaten our school boards, teachers, librarians, theater owners and others as they sniff out obscenity and "un-Americanism" wherever their ultrasensitive noses

Comstockery lives on in other ways as well-in the laws still on the books in nearly every state which, if enforced, would put mil-

lions of decent married couples be-hind bars, and in the hypocrisy which still pays lip service to them. This year, for example, the New York legislature would not touch a bill to repeal the state's law against contraceptives, a law fathered by

Comstock back in 1881. Comstockery lives on in the Puritan type of mind that is more concerned about the shadow of sin than the substance of human degradation. Comstock never bothered himself about the social conditions that pro-duced the thieves, beggars and prostitutes who swarmed in the New York of the latter part of the 19th century. Such people were in visible to him.

But he would travel any distance and use any means to catch and "bring to justice" any author who had offended his personal sense of morality.

In the same way, our present-day extremists, wrapped in the mantle. righteousness or patriotism, ig nore the real menaces to the health and safety of the nation while un-derminative very values and legal processes they profess to defend. It must be remembered that Comstock could not have worked the mischief he did had not society acquiesced in it. Those who opposed him but were too afraid to speak out were a greater support to him than those who actively championed him. The same is true today. Because

it is, comstockery in all its freedom-fearing forms lives on, even though the man who gave us the word is forgotten.
