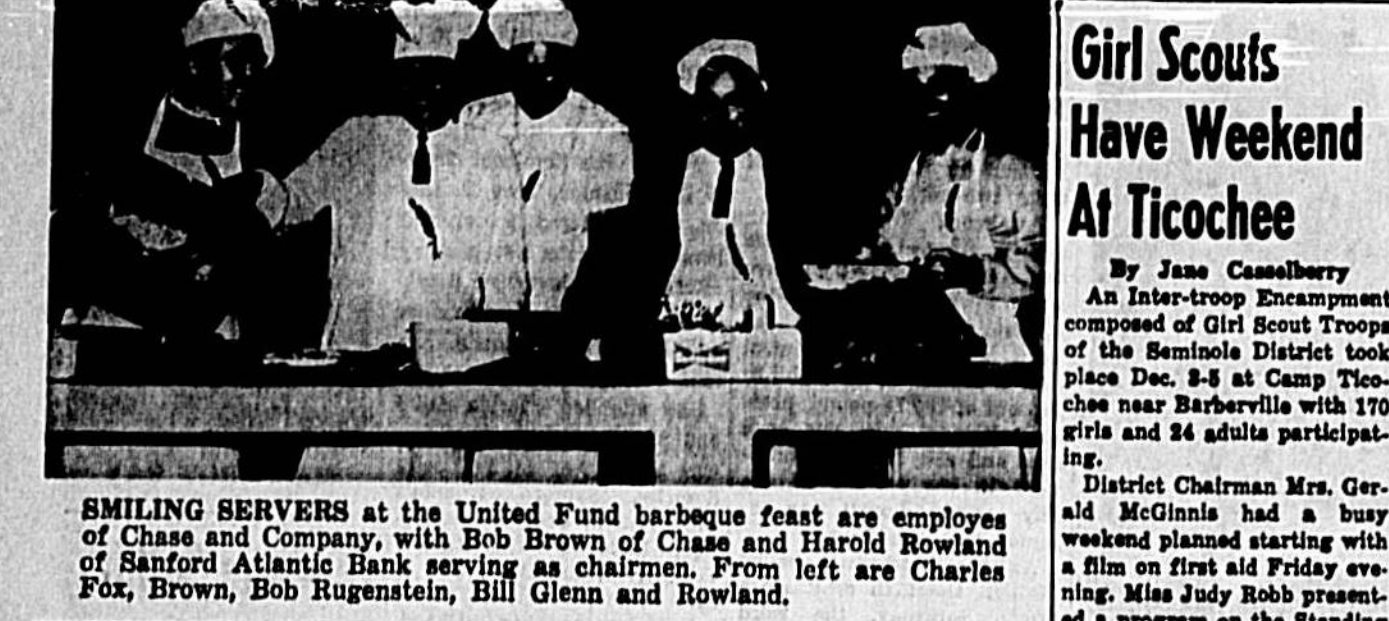

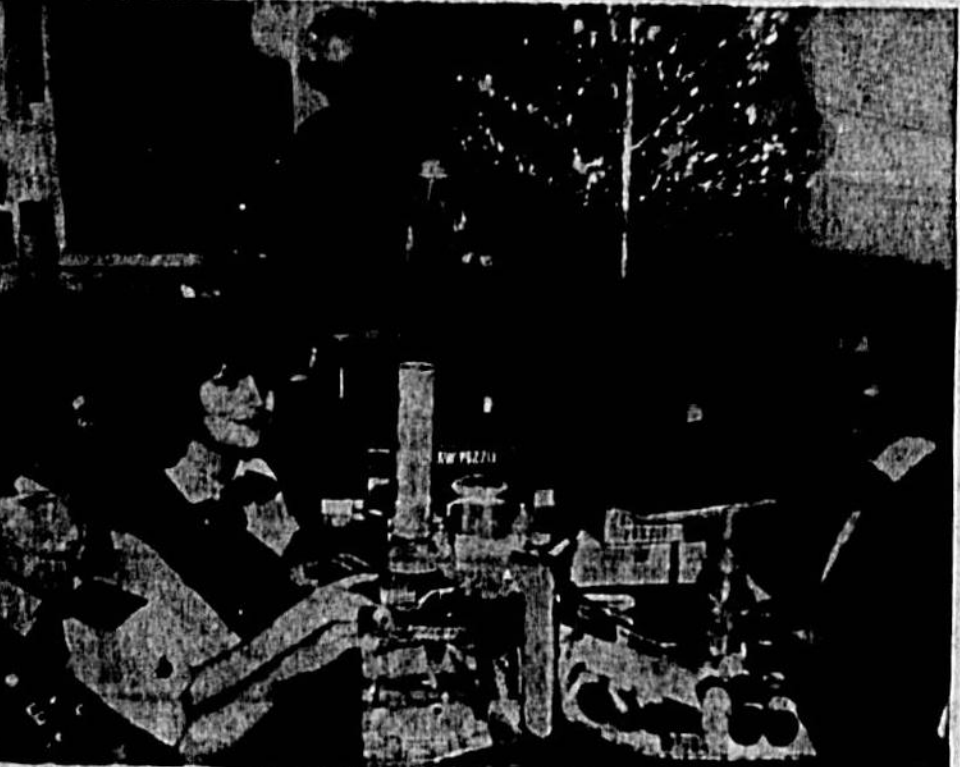
Christmas Sing Slated Dec. 17 By Girl Scouts

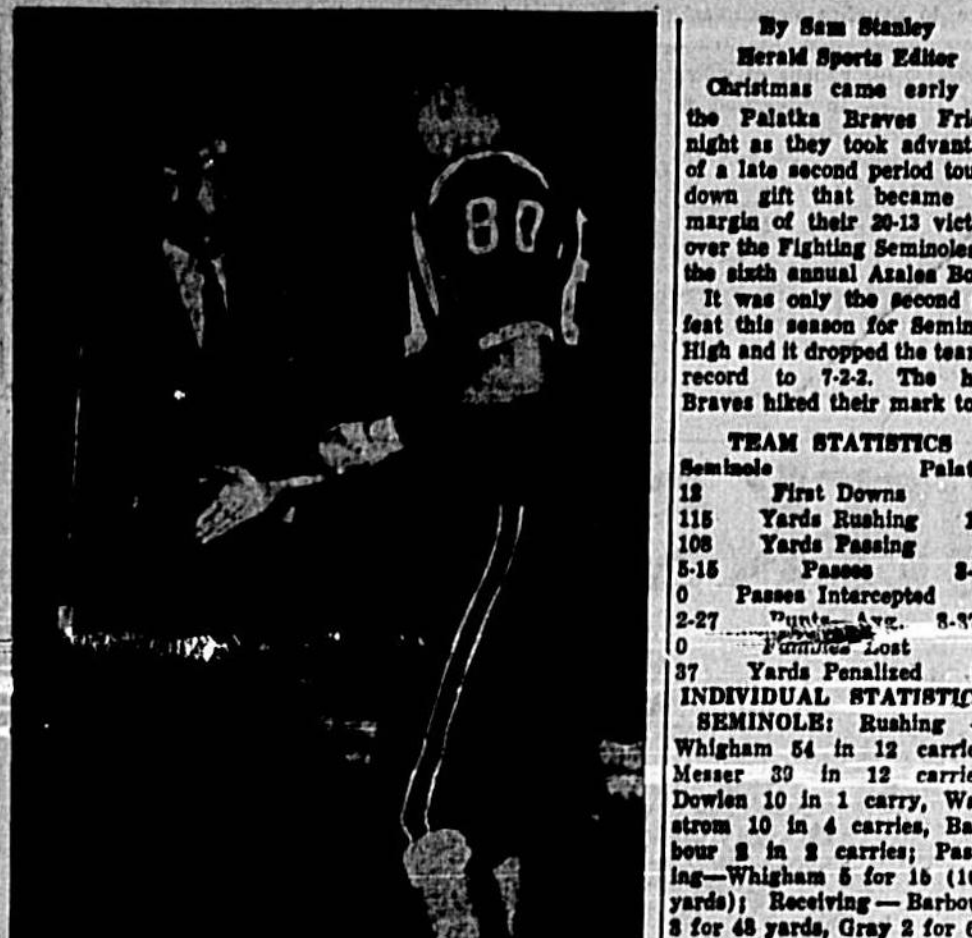
Hunger - Part 1 World Population Rising Faster Than Food Supply

EDITOR'S NOTE: They laughed back in 1796 when British economist Thomas Malthus predicted that the end of the world would come about because the population would increase so much faster than the food supply that starvation would wipe out mankind.

Palatka Ground Game Stops Seminoles, 20-13

Christmas came early for the Palatka Braves Friday night as they took advantage of a late second period touchdown gift that became the margin of their 20-13 victory over the Fighting Seminoles in the sixth annual Azalea Bowl. It was only the second defeat this season for Seminoles High and it dropped the team's record to 7-2. The host Braves killed their mark to 9-0.

Palatka has won all six Azalea Bowl games, including an earlier 7-0 victory over Seminoles in the first contest in 1960.

Friday night's contest began with an estimated 2,000 as a hard fought affair, with the crushing ground game of the Braves being the big difference. Leading the way for Palatka were halfbacks Bobby Pope and Eugene Carter who accounted for all three Palatka touchdowns and 126 of the Braves' 196 rushing yards.

It was Pope, voted the game's outstanding back, who caught a 20-yard touchdown pass with 15 seconds left in the first half that broke a 6-6 tie and sent the Braves on their victory path.

The touchdowns were set up when the Seminoles attempted to punt out of trouble from their own 25 with 16 seconds left in the second quarter. But the Seminoles' punter, Mike Kenna, kicked the extra point.
