8-year-old cited by Highway Patrol

Family of girl dragged by speeding motorist may file suit against state agency

LAKE MARY — More than a month after an 8-year-old girl was hit and dragged 64 feet by a speeding motorist, the child — not the driver — received a citation from the Florida Highway Patrol for violation of right-of-way.

On March 5, Rachel Ornstein was attempting to visit a sick friend at 118 Bright Drive in the Chase Crossing Subdivision, said family members. The friend was unable to accept visitors so Rachel hopped on her bicycle to pedal home.

She had nearly crossed the road, approx-

mately three feet shy according to FHP reports, when Amanda Beth Sepp, 20, of Deltona struck her. Rachel suffered a fractured skull, a busted eardrum and severe abrasions to her back. An emergency helicopter airlifted her to Orlando Regional Medical Center.

Last week, Trooper Carl Simpson arrived at the Ornsteins' home to serve the citation. Rachel's father, Steve, is not happy. He's responded by assembling a team of attor-

neys to fight the citation, file a civil suit and possibly take action against FHP.

"First of all, it's suspect because she was cited over a month from the incident," said Longwood attorney William Orth. "I think there are some issues with the initial accident investigation."

The Florida Highway Patrol actually filed two reports pertaining to the incident. The first report, filed shortly after the incident, said Rachel collided almost head on with

the vehicle. The first report also indicated a large bend in Bright View Drive, which isn't there according to neighbors. Several weeks later, another FHP report replaced the first account.

"What we did is we had a homicide investigator go back out and run the numbers," said FHP spokesman Lt. Chuck Williams.

In the second report, Rachel's line of travel across the road was straightened out, as well as the bend in Bright View Drive. A parked car, however, made it's way into the second report, but neighbors also maintain

Pornography ring has ties to Seminole

Colorado law enforcement officials shut down a child pornography ring with connections to Seminole County.

After a month-long investigation by the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office and the Colorado Bureau of Investigation, authorities arrested James Grady, 42, on suspicions of sexual exploitation of a minor. Grady, who was arrested April 5, operated a web site that featured explicit pictures of underage girls.

On Thursday, prosecutors charged Grady with 726 felony counts of sexual exploitation of a child, one count for each photograph taken at his Denver suburb photo studio. A single count is punishable by a four to 12 year prison sentence at the Colorado Department of Corrections, according to authorities.

"We're very much oppose the rezoning of this property," said resident Earl Lord. "We really should preserve this."

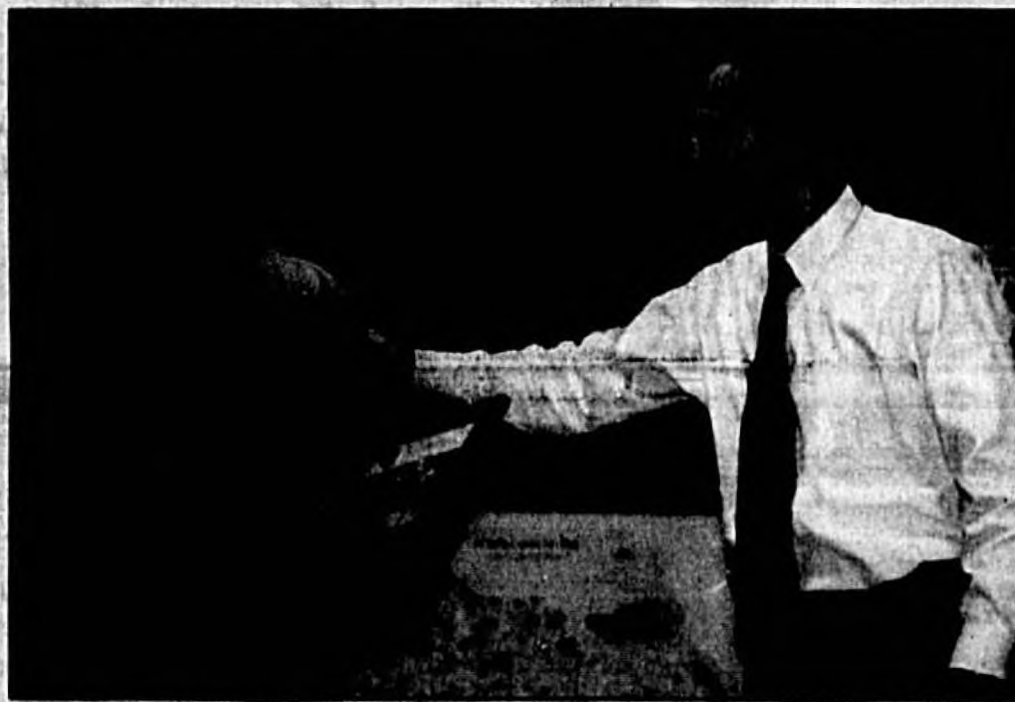

Former chamber director dies at 83

SANFORD — John C. "Jack" Horner, former executive director of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, died Tuesday, April 9, 2002, in Winter Park. He was 81.

Horner's 13-year tenure at the chamber was a time of rapid growth and achievement. Membership topped 1,600 members and the chamber was responsible for creating or sponsoring a number of civic activities like the nationally recognized Golden Age Games.

"Jack was responsible for bringing the Golden Age Games to Sanford," said Wayne Doyle, former publisher of the Sanford Herald. "One of the things he did to bring attention to the Games was he brought in celebrities like Buster Crabbe to open the Games."

Doyle said Horner helped promote major improvements like the State Road 46 overpass and the Douglas Stenstrom Bridge on State Road 415.

"Jack was largely responsible for those things, but he would never take credit for it," Doyle said. "He always believed in giving credit to the volunteers of the different committees."

"We didn't always agree on things, but he was a big booster of the newspaper," Doyle added. "He was a community leader and booster of the highest caliber."

Ron Rose, former director of the Sanford Chamber, agreed with Doyle's assessment and said Horner was a top-notch chamber director.

"When you think of the heyday of the chamber, it was under his leadership," Rose said.

"Jack was a tremendous help to me when I first started at the chamber," he added. "During my

Mayor avoids censure, sees bright future for city

WINTER SPRINGS — "The good news is I'm still mayor of the city."

That's what Winter Springs Mayor Paul Partyka said as he began a Tuesday presentation to county commissioners. The night before, Winter Springs Commissioners backed down from a proposal to censure the mayor for his personal role in a proposed homeless center in the city.

"Basically the facts were wrong," he said after the county meeting. "Commissioner (Robert) Miller apologized. The unfortunate thing about it is it could have been handled a little bit better."

Despite the turmoil back home,

Partyka was the bearer of good news as he informed county commissioners of several city projects that could lead Winter Springs to a brighter future.

The "premiere" of a commercial promoting the city helped illustrate a few of the city's strengths.

"The whole idea behind it (commercial) is we have never had anything I would call a proactive way to talk about our city," Partyka said. "There was nothing we

really could send out to businesses around the world."

The commercial will be regularly aired on SGTV. In addition to promoting the city, the commercial will also help clear the air about what Winter Springs is all about.

"I always make this point," Partyka said. "You have Winter Garden, Winter Park, Winter Haven and Winter Springs. Of all those four, you have three of those, which everybody probably knows about. Winter Springs nobody knows about. But, the biggest city of the four is Winter Springs."

Topping the city's new proactive approach is the development of the town center, or as it is referred to "a new

## Police seeking suspect wanted for abduction

As the victim approached Winding Ridge Road, she observed a large blue SUV parked across the roadway of Winding Ridge Road. The SUV driver had the passenger door open and was out of the vehicle.

The victim asked if she could clear the intersection, and the driver grabbed the victim and forced her into the passenger. The driver pushed the victim to the floorboard as he drove off and told the victim to "keep down and behave and you won't get hurt."

The SUV was driven down several local roads to a wooded area near the entrance of Garden Lake Estates. The subject had attempted to disrobe the victim, but was unsuccessful. The victim continued to resist her assailant and was pushed from the SUV. The vehicle sped off and the victim summoned aid from residents and other people in the area. The victim suffered minor injuries during the confrontation with her attacker but did not require hospitalization.

Casselberry Police are investigating the incident as a kidnapping, attempted sexual battery and battery on an elderly person. There have been no other reports of a similar nature in Casselberry. 

## Our View

### Do your duty

City Commissioners must demand City Hall become more accountable to the citizens

A representative from the city of St. Petersburg made a presentation to the Sanford City Commission Monday night that focused on St. Pete's innovative neighborhood partnership program. Basically, the program focuses on neighborhood initiatives to revitalize St. Petersburg. Residents are asked to develop an action plan for their community. The city backs those residents up with funding, resources and most importantly follows through with its commitment to change.

Sanford commissioners were impressed with the program, but unless substantial changes are made in the way Sanford does business, don't expect a similar program to occur in the Celery City.

Why? Primarily it has to do with the city's form of government. Susan Ajoc, St. Petersburg's Neighborhood Partnership Director, repeatedly reminded Sanford's commissioners that her city changed its government style. Instead of a city manager, St. Petersburg has a "strong" mayor form of government. Ajoc noted that by electing the city's top manager, city government became more responsive and more accountable to the citizens.

That's not happening in Sanford. One reason may be that few of the city's department directors live in Sanford. Working where you live forces you to be more accountable because the fruits of your labor, or lack thereof, are on display for friends and family to see.

Sanford has qualified professionals leading the city's various departments. What they don't have, in general, is a sense of urgency from those professionals to get the job done. How many great plans has city staff created — 1st Street streetscape, 17/92 beautification, citizens on bike patrols, street lights on 1st Street (or anywhere else in town) — only to be lost in some bureaucratic void?

A more troubling reason City Hall isn't more responsive or more accountable is the lack of leadership by City Manager Tony VanDerworp and the City Commission. VanDerworp, who is charged with leading the day-to-day operations of the city, is not demanding enough from his staff. Worse still, the city commission and the mayor aren't demanding enough of VanDerworp. In case they've forgotten, the city manager works at their discretion. It's ultimately city commission's responsibility to set the agenda for VanDerworp, not the other way around.

Yes, commissioners and the mayor are "part-time" legislators. Three of the four commissioners and the mayor work full-time jobs to support their families. Trouble is, Sanford has full-time problems.

Here's a proposal: Commissioners should require each department to provide a list of projects it is working on. After consulting with their constituents, commissioners should prioritize those lists and include at least one citizen-initiative from each district on one of the lists.

This proposal produces two clear benefits: Commissioners are required to meet with the citizens in their districts to find out what they, not the city manager, believe the priorities should be; and, each department knows exactly what is expected by the citizens and can be held accountable if they fail to produce.

It will take discipline. Commissioners will have to refrain from making every issue a priority. One week it's imperative that traffic be slowed down on Live Oak Boulevard. Next meeting, commissioners are demanding more code enforcement. There must be some flexibility in the prioritized lists for true emergencies or new challenges. However, commissioners should realize that adding a new item to the list demands that another one be pushed back.

Commissioners and the mayor may need to consider changing City Hall from a city manager style of government to one that is led by a strong mayor. Until then, they need to take a more active role in city government. That requires meeting regularly with residents, proposing citizen-based programs and enforcing accountability.

It's a tough job, but that's what we elected them to do.



### Secretary of State Powell as 'The Big Fella'

The conversation at a cocktail conclave of Beltway boys and girls — your regular stand-up-as-you-eat-and-drink-with-the-people-you-see-on-television soiree — was all about Secretary of State Colin Powell. He's the man the chattering class all loves, but most of his Bush administration colleagues hate — or at least distrust.

Chris Matthews of "Hardball," who can be a man of few words when the camera is off, summed it all up with three words: "The Big Fella."

Matthews knows his history, Irish history. If you don't, the Big Fella, as they called him, was Michael Collins, the charismatic leader of the irregulars — including terrorists called "The Twelve Apostles" — who more or less drove the British out of southern Ireland in 1921. The son of a farmer from West Cork, he was the most popular man in his cursed country, the hero of the land. In the short version, and there are many long ones, he led the fight for independence, then against his will and all

his instincts, he went to London as the head of the Irish delegation sent to negotiate peace with Prime Minister Lloyd George and a young colonial secretary named Winston Churchill.

He never had a chance, and the people who sent him there, most notably his friend and rival Eamon De Valera, knew that. The treaty was bound to include an enclave in Ulster, the north of the island, for the Irish Protestants determined to stay part of Great Britain. Collins, deciding a divided Ireland was preferable to more war, and believing that it would be only a matter of time before the Catholics controlled all the island, decided to sign. As he did, he said: "I tell you, I have signed my death warrant."

He was right. He became commander in chief of the Irish Republican Army in the new Free State and was shot to death in an ambush at the age of 31 in August 1922 as he traveled in sight of the farm where he was born. It has never been proved who did the

killing, probably Irish Republican Army men who were against the treaty that left Belfast and Ulster part of Britain.

Colin Powell may be the Michael Collins of our day — enormously popular with everyone except the people who count most, the most hawkish of Bush's advisers. Paul Wolfowitz, Richard Perle and others who favor military action in Iraq and beyond see Powell as a softie who just gets in the way. They are not assassins, of course, but they are comfortable, more than comfortable, with the prospect of seeing Powell fail in his shuttle diplomacy. They do not want to see the former chief of staff of America's armed forces succeed in his efforts to get Ariel Sharon and the Israeli army out of Palestinian cities.

And Powell will probably fail. Then he will be the fall guy for the treaty or whatever comes out of this. The hard-liners live for the day that Powell is pushed back into private life. He might have been gone already, but he has been needed since Sept. 11 for missions like this trip, because he is the

American with the most friends and the most credibility around the world. Besides, the U.S. press loves the guy.

There are exceptions to this press-love, notably William Safire of The New York Times. This is what he had to say last Thursday: "A decade ago, television pictures of a bloodied Iraqi army in retreat caused Gen. Colin Powell — ever sensitive to 'world opinion' — to stay America's hand. As a result of our failure to finish that fight, American lives must soon be put at risk to protect us from Saddam Hussein's nuclear blackmail. ... Has our secretary of state learned the lesson of closure? Apparently not; he is now on a mission to stop Israel from winning the war of terror that was launched against it."

Safire speaks for many people at the top of the Bush administration, to say nothing of the Sharon administration in Israel. They are desperate to get Powell out of the way and get on with the war against the axis of evil. Don't forget to duck, Mr. Secretary.

### Homeland security doesn't address our appetite for oil

When we talk about threats to our national security, al-Qaida and the "Axis of Evil" often head the list. Few people talk about the danger associated with SUVs and four-seater pickups.

While calling those vehicles the "axes of evil" might be too much, there's no question that Americans' love affair with low-mileage cars and trucks has increased our dependence on foreign oil. And that, in turn, poses a huge threat to the security of the homeland.

Tom Ridge, the director of the Office of Homeland Security, didn't bring up Americans' fascination with gas-guzzling vehicles in his speech last week to the American Society of Newspaper Editors. He didn't mention the fact that last year, SUVs and pickups outsold automobiles for the first time. He didn't point out the absurdity of selling Humvees — originally built to transport troops in war zones — to executives who

wage their daily battles over lane position in bumper-to-bumper traffic.

Instead, Ridge stuck to the platitudes that have passed for policy since his office was created.

He spoke of border control, increased funding for "first responders" (such as firefighters and paramedics), better planning and coordination among government agencies. He never went near the issue of petroleum consumption.

One of the central failings of the Bush administration is its unwillingness to wean the country from its addiction to petroleum. President Bush refused to support legislation to require greater fuel efficiency from new vehicles, and he is unlikely ever to do so. Bush's history as a Texas oilman has rendered him constitutionally incapable of seeing the consumption of petroleum as a problem.

Yet it is not difficult to connect those dots. The United States main-

tains a close alliance with the unsavory House of Saud — which continues to fund schools that teach Islamist extremism and anti-Semitism — because we need Saudi oil. Just in the last few weeks, oil prices have soared as the tension between Israel and its Palestinian neighbors has flared into outright war.

The first Bush administration missed an opportunity to cut back oil consumption after the Persian Gulf war, a conflict we fought to liberate Kuwait's oil wells and pipelines from Saddam's control. But President Bush the Elder was never willing to concede that fact. Nor was he willing to point out that American soldiers might have to return to the region if we didn't curb our appetite for petroleum.

Since then, American oil consumption has only grown with the increasing popularity of Chevy Blazers, Ford Excursions and Dodge Ram pickup trucks. While Americans constitute only 4.5 percent of the world's population, we consume 26 percent of its petroleum.

The president's answer to America's dependence on foreign oil is to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to drilling, even though that environmentally damaging strategy would render precious little in new reserves. According to a recent report from the Bush-led Energy Department, the United States will have to import 62 percent of its oil by 2020 if we don't drill in ANWR. If we do drill, we will have to import 60 percent.

Of course, if he serves two terms as president, George W. would be leaving office just about the time the ANWR oil wells started pumping. And by then, it would be up to some other president to explain why, even after wrecking the wildlife refuge, we were still addicted to foreign oil, and why we still had to prop up foreign kings and dictators to keep the oil flowing from overseas.

And maybe — just maybe — that new president would get serious about energy policy.

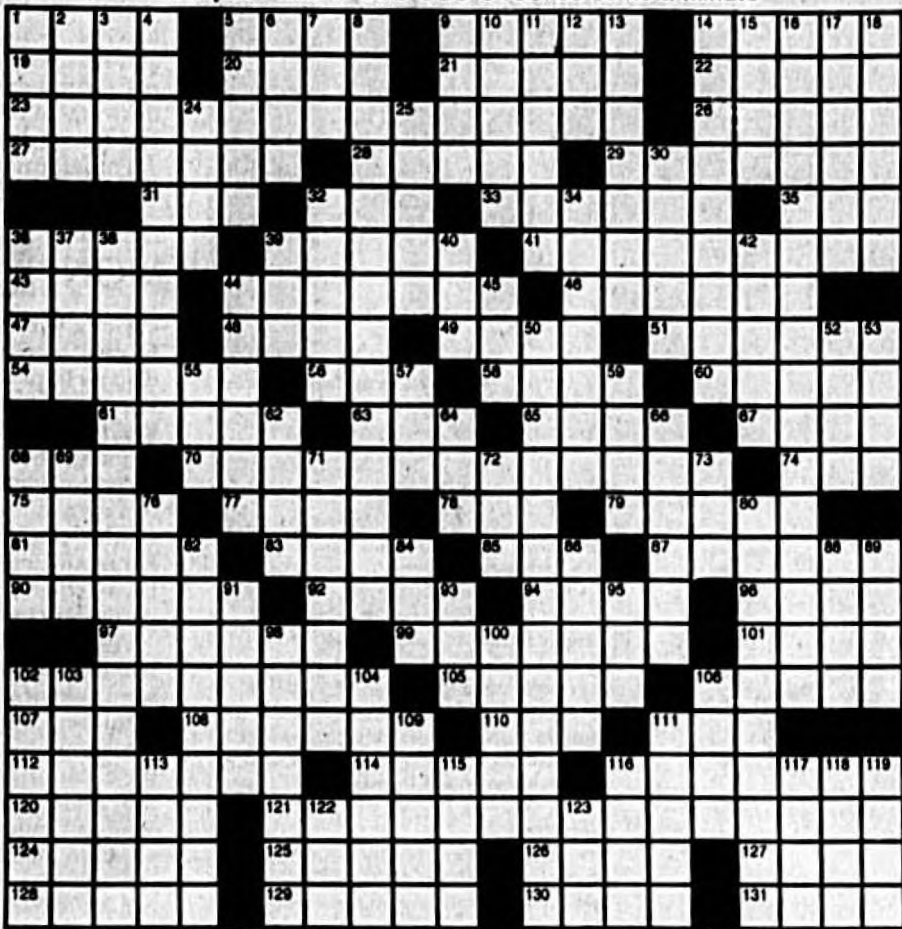

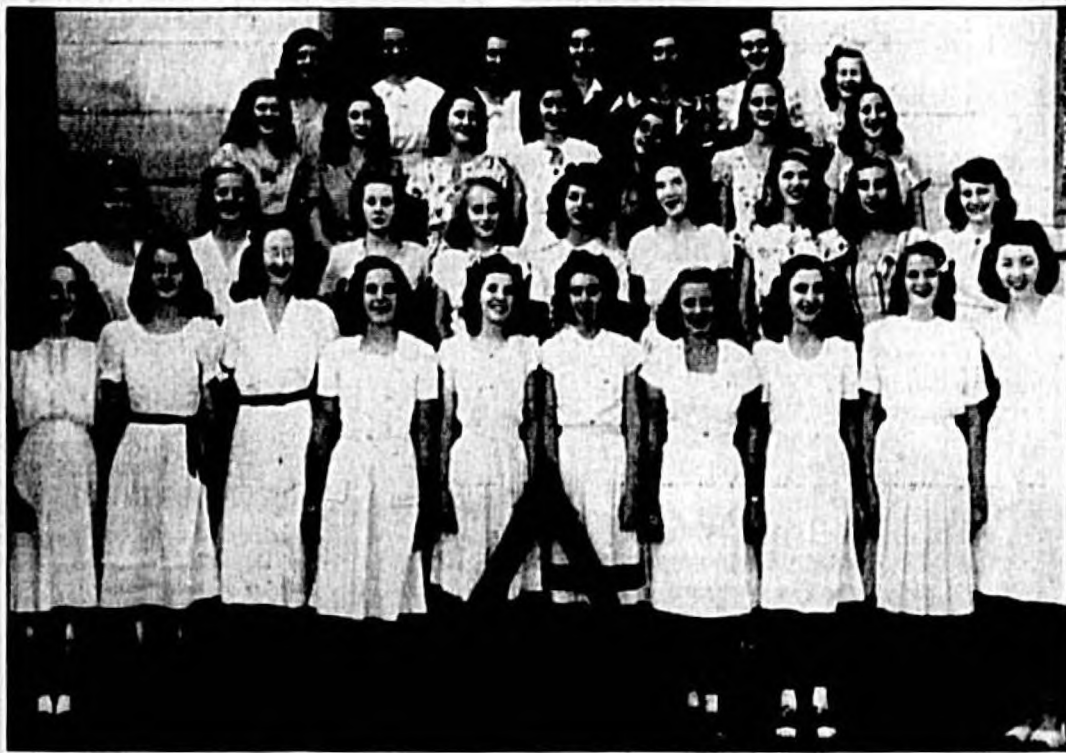

that opinion until Tuesday's meeting. Staff decided to support the project after the applicant agreed to several concessions including limiting the project to 2.5 homes per acre. The project still must be reviewed by the state and approved by commissioners again this summer.  
Residents are concerned about

flooding that would result if the subdivision is built. They describe the Myrtle Street area as extremely marshy and believe the recent addition of the Hester Avenue subdivision Autumn Chase only compounded the problem.  
The applicant considers the property to be 30 to 50 percent wetlands. Neighbors disagreed

estimating the property was 80 percent wetlands. After visiting the site, county staff also disagreed stating in their report to commissioners that "there may be as much as 60 percent" wetlands. A final wetlands count will come from the St. Johns Water Management District.  
"Autumn Chase should have never been able to be developed,"

said Myrtle Street resident Nancy Jasmin. "It's lowlands and it always will be."  
Bj Simons, who lives across Myrtle Street from the proposed Lake Jesup Woods project, said he fears water run-off will only increase if the subdivision is approved. He said he noticed a "tremendous increase" in standing water on his 12.5-acre property after Autumn Chase was constructed.

"I ask all of you to consider how this is going to effect the neighbors," Simons said to commissioners.  
Commissioner Grant Maloy said he would vote in favor of the project, but when it returns for another approval "it needs to have the wetland deviation" plan completed.

Although commissioners approved the Lake Jesup Woods comprehensive plan amendment, they delayed rezoning actions on two other Myrtle Street parcels farther east. Commissioners agreed a comprehensive study of the area is needed before any more developments are considered in the area.

time I repeatedly ran into people who remembered Jack and thought very highly of him."  
Horner retired from the U.S. Navy after 20 years of service, including tours in the Pacific Theater in World War II. After retiring from the Navy, Horner and his family moved to Sanford. From 1960 to 1973, he worked for Martin Marietta Corp. in Orlando where he was responsible for employee services and coordinating the company's activities with the region's civic service groups. He became president and chief executive of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce in 1973, a position he remained in until 1986.

Downtown businessman Don Knight, of Knight's Shoe Store, remembers Horner as a dedicated community leader who loved Sanford.

"Jack was 110 percent chamber," Knight said. "He and his wife, Peggy, were well liked in the community. Jack was always a hard-charger when it came to the chamber and the city of Sanford. He was all for Sanford."

"I did not know Jack Horner personally, but I got to know him through his grandson Mike, who is the director of the Kissimmee Chamber," said Angella Gordon director of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce. "He was a well-respected man in Sanford. During his tenure as chamber director there were more than 1,600 members, which says a lot about him."

Mike Horner remembers his grandfather's service at the chamber.

"He retired from the chamber about the time I was in high school," Horner said. "A lot of people in town knew me because of Gramps. I was always proud to share his name."

Horner said his grandfather's experiences helped influence his own career decisions.

"Gramps enjoyed serving the community and being the chamber director," Horner said. "At the time when I began to look for what my next stage in life would be, a chamber position came open in Apopka. I didn't have any formal experience as a chamber director, but I had watched

Gramps during his time. I went and sought his advice, and he suggested I do it. I've been in this business now for seven years.

"I couldn't think of better footsteps to follow in," he added. "In fact, I followed Gramps's footsteps in more ways than one. In addition to serving as a chamber director, we were both legislative assistants."

Jack Horner worked for former Florida Senate President John Vogt. Bud Garner replaced Vogt as senator and Mike Horner worked as Garner's legislative

assistant.  
"Gramps was my ultimate role model," Horner said. "I learned from his example about the proper way to conduct yourself in business, in your friendships and in your family. He was a man who had a whole lot of love and was passionate about the things he believed."

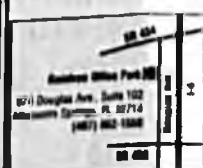

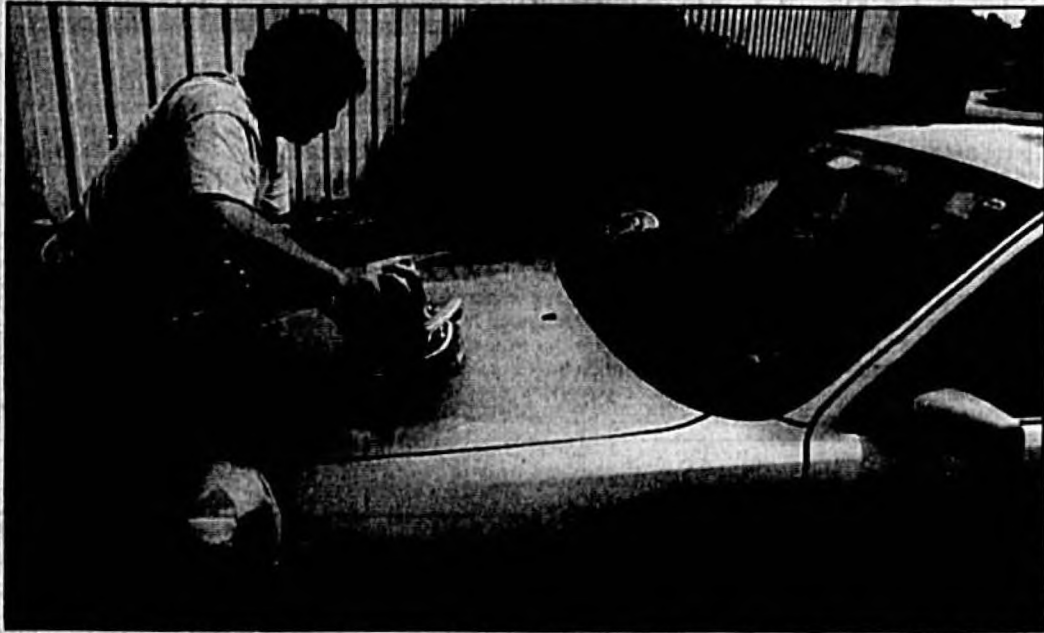

 downtown in the suburbs." Nestled near the corner of State Road 434 and Tuskawilla Road, the city is attempting to build a new downtown area similar to Winter Park's successful venture on Park Avenue.

"The town center is a huge undertaking by the city," said city manager Ronald McLemore. The project is heading full steam ahead. Partyka announced to county commissioners that the developer has upped the number buildings planned in the first phase from six to 10. The first building, a Publix grocery store, is already under the construction and is planning to have its grand opening in December. The first wave of buildings are contained within a 30 acre section.

The new town center looks to incorporate shops, city hall, Winter Springs High School, apartments, town houses, post office and businesses into one basic place where the needs of

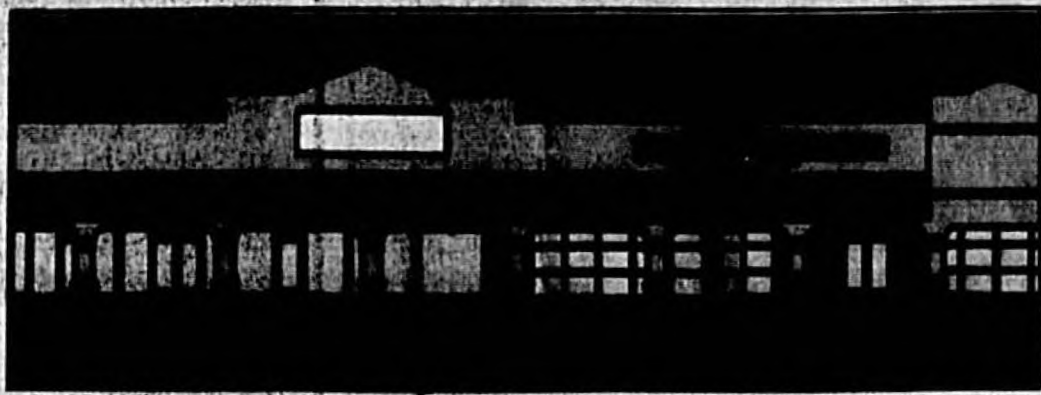
citizens are conveniently and tightly focused. The city has set aside approximately 200 acres to allow the town center to develop and grow.

"We have all kinds of (business) interest on 434," Partyka said. "There is a lot of things going on right now."

Another feature of the town center will be the existing Cross Seminole Trail, which will be repositioned to offer maximum pedestrian and bicycle paths into the town center around its boundaries. Central Winds Park will also be a trait of the town center along with additional green spaces. The city received approximately \$5 million in state grants to acquire the green spaces. The city also received a federal grant in 1998 to fund a State Road 434 pedestrian bridge crossing.

"It's going to be all the things downtowns used to be in the 30s and 40s," said Charles Carrington, Winter Springs community development director.

 "What happened was he was taking the photographs and live cams from our jurisdiction," said Arapahoe County Undersheriff Grayson Robinson.

The 726 photographs identified eight victims. Robinson said police still have a large amount of evidence to sift through and additional counts are likely. Grady is being held on a \$1 million bond.

The young girls, which investigators believe range between the ages of 13 to 17, reportedly agreed to pose for photographs in hopes of jump starting their modeling careers. A local Seminole County juvenile is one of 60 suspected young girls photographed by Grady.

Colorado authorities contacted us. We talked to her Tuesday night, and we talked to her again Wednesday," said Steve Olson, Seminole County Sheriff's Office spokesman.

The web site, identified as "trueteenbabes," featured teenaged girls posing in bathing suits and lingerie, as well as in various stages of sexually explicit nudity, according to police. Receiving a court order two days after Grady's arrest, Arapahoe County deputies shut down the site after it was traced to a server in Dallas.

Young girls were "recruited" through Internet message boards and chatrooms, Robinson said. The Seminole County juvenile, which authorities refuse to release information about, reportedly flew to Colorado to be photographed by Grady, Robinson said.

Originally, authorities believed Grady operated a second photo studio in Las Vegas, but Robinson said Thursday that turned out to be just a mail drop. The Seminole County juvenile is thought to be the only victim in Florida, he added.

 The house Rachel was leaving from is the fifth house on the right from the entrance of the neighborhood. Orth estimates the collision was approximately 250 to 350 feet from the entrance. There was also no indication from neighbors of hearing skidding or horn sounds at the time of impact, Orth said.

"That indicates to me that you have to get up and get going to get to that speed," Orth said about the driver's speed in relation to the subdivision entrance. "This appears this occurred without any reduction in speed."

Orth filed a notice of appearance and request for a hearing to fight Rachel's citation. He anticipates a hearing date to be scheduled in May. Meanwhile, Rachel is still fighting the injuries she sustained from the accident. A partial hearing loss she suffered could be permanent, said Steve Orstein.

"It's unfortunate. The emphasis should be on her recovery," said Victor Petris whose Winter Park attorney office is handling the Orsteins civil case. "Her recovery is the most important thing."

The trooper's late arrival didn't bother him so much, it was his refusal to hear eyewitnesses' testimonies, he said. Orstein's attorneys are also questioning why there was no citation for careless driving. According to FHP records, the driver was cited for traveling 33 mph in the 25-mph residential zone. The two reports, however, indicate the driver was on the wrong side of the road at the point of impact.

Osso bucco does take hours to cook, but what your guests will never know is that preparing the entire meal takes less than thirty minutes. The rest of

## Braised Veal Shanks (Osso Bucco)

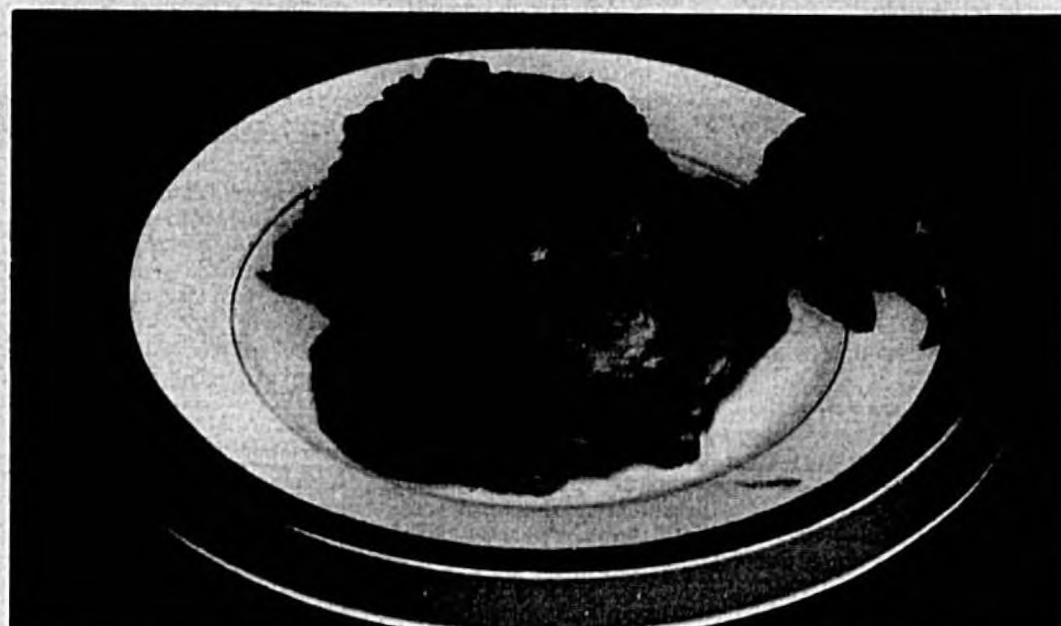
4 veal shanks  
4 carrots  
1 large onion  
4 celery stalks  
1 bay leaf  
4 sprigs of thyme  
One tsp minced rosemary  
Salt and pepper to taste  
36 ounces of beef stock (the kind in the red carton is good)  
(if canned get low sodium)

4 TB olive oil  
One fourth of a cup white wine  
1 tsp cornstarch in a little cold water (slurry) to thicken sauce, if necessary

1. Chop onion, carrot and celery into medium dice  
2. Salt and pepper shanks generously. Heat 2 of the 4 TB olive oil in large pot over medium high heat. Sear shanks on both sides and remove to a plate.

3. Add other 2 TB olive oil and saute vegetables until onion is translucent.

4. Remove vegetables to a bowl.

5. Pour white wine into pot to deglaze.

6. Put vegetables back in pot with veal shanks on top.

7. Pour stock over shanks and add bay leaf

8. Bring up to a simmer and cover, allowing to simmer for two to three hours, occasionally turning over shanks.

(You may do all this a day ahead and store the entire pot in the refrigerator.)

The day you are serving, heat back up (slowly) to a simmer. Simmer until shanks are reheated through. Remove shanks and reduce, reduce, reduce the sauce down by 75%. Add slurry if needed and bring sauce to a boil to thicken.

Serves 4-6. (I could not finish one shank by myself)

## Basil and Rice Stuffed Tomatoes

One fourth of a cup fresh basil leaves  
1 cup rice (dry)  
1 medium onion, finely

minced  
One half cup parmesan cheese  
2-3 large tomatoes  
Salt and pepper to taste.  
2 TB olive oil  
2 cups chicken stock, heated.

1. Cut the tomatoes in half along the diameter. Using a tablespoon scoop out the insides (You can save this for sauce some other time.) Sprinkle a little salt in each one and turn upside down on a cookie sheet to drain.

2. Mince onion and saute in olive oil over medium heat in a two quart saucepan. When onion is translucent, add dry rice and saute for a minute to soak up the flavors. Add heated chicken stock, salt and pepper to taste, turn heat to low and cover until rice is fully cooked.

3. Take rice off heat when done and let cool for a few minutes. Then add the parmesan. Cut the basil into small strips, (chiffonade) and add to rice.

4. Fill up the tomato halves with the cooled rice mixture. Add a little extra parmesan on top, if desired.

5. Bake filled tomatoes in a casserole dish (put a little water in the bottom of the dish to help steam them) at 350 degrees Fahrenheit for about twenty minutes, or until tomatoes are heated but not falling apart.

You may do the first four steps the day before and simply bake them right before your guests arrive.

Serves 4-6

**Tiramisu**

(You may purchase eggs that

are separated and pasteurized if you wish.)

Three large eggs, separated.  
8 oz mascarpone cheese  
1 tb instant coffee

A few drops of imitation Kahlua extract (optional)  
One eighth of a cup of cocoa

One half of a cup of sugar  
Two bags of Pepperidge Farm Milano Cookies

1 cup of prepared coffee in a small bowl  
One 12 x 12 baking dish

1. In the bowl with the egg yolks, add the sugar and mix with a wooden spoon until creamy. Add cheese, coffee, and Kahlua extract and mix until incorporated.

2. Whip egg whites with a pinch of sugar until stiff peaks form.

3. Fold the egg whites into the cheese mixture. Set aside.

4. Dip each Milano cookie in the prepared coffee (for just a second) and cover bottom of baking dish with a layer of the cookies.

5. Put half the cheese/egg white mixture over the cookies. Sprinkle entire dish with cocoa powder. Make another layer of the coffee soaked cookies. Cover cookies with remaining cheese/egg white mixture. Sprinkle entire top with cocoa powder. Chill for at least an hour. Serves 4-6. (You can easily make this a day ahead.)

## Juniors learn about polymers and bugs

Our life is full of polymers. CD's, plastics ... And when you make your own, they feel "icky." At least, that's what the Junior Girl Scouts said at the "Making It Matter" workshop Monday evening.

Using a formula that included glue, borax and water, the girls made their own polymer. They then tried the formula and added cornmeal, which gave it a gritty texture. They tried to come up with different uses for their polymer. The most popular was to gross their moms out.

The troops also learned about current and connectivity by making their own alarm system. Using a 9 volt battery, a buzzer, wire, aluminum foil, mat board and straws, the girls made a "bedroom bug."

When placed on the floor

properly, an unsuspecting brother can step on the trigger mechanism and cause the alarm to go off. A couple of girls thought the buzzer should be louder, but the parents who were picking the girls up after the workshop thought softer would have been better!

During the workshop the girls also learned about chemicals. They looked at some common household products and read the labels. They learned that some cleaning products are flammable and that most are toxic.

## Oleander: The tropical Rose Bay

The oleander is a shrub native to the Mediterranean regions of southern Europe and southwest Asia. It has been cultivated in Florida since 1565 and has gained popularity in recent years. It is often planted near road sides, edges of woods, lawns, and gardens.

Oleander is related to the Confederate Jasmine, Madagascar Periwinkle, Allamanda, Mandevilla, and Natal Plum. Oleander is also known as the Rose of France.

### Botanical Notes

Oleander is an ornamental shrub or small tree, 3 to 30 feet tall, with many branches with a vertically upright growth. Leaves grow on short petioles at each node numbering two or three. The foliage is evergreen, leathery, and narrow, 4 to 12 inches long with a prominent midrib. Flowers develop in clusters at the tip of the branches, about 2 inches across, with red, salmon, yellow or white flowers.

Fruits are rare, but when present it is a long narrow pod with many tufted seeds. Landscape

### Use

Oleander is one of the most versatile landscape plants for sunny locations. They tolerate poor soil conditions and have a fast growth. Oleanders are available for use as small trees, shrubs, ground covers, large fencing or screen shrubs, and as potted patio plants.

Dwarf forms are available and can be used to fit your landscape needs.

### Culture

Full sun is best for flowering and for rapid development. It will grow lanky and produce few flowers in the shade. It can tolerate most soil types and conditions, and grows well in sandy dry areas. Its pH range is between 5.0 and 8.3.

Oleanders transplant easily, plant container-grown plants during early summer when in active growth. Mulch to a depth of 3 inches. Newly planted oleanders should be watered regularly for the first few months until established. Oleander is very drought tolerant once established. Fertilize lightly 3 times a year with a complete fertilizer.

Organic source and slow-release fertilizers should provide for longer periods of time. Use a rate of 1 pound nitrogen per 1000 square foot of plant bed.

### Propagation

Oleander plants can be easily propagated by means of tip cuttings. Cuttings root easily when taken in early summer.

The use of rooting hormones increases root production of the cuttings. Air layers can also be used to propagate this plant.

Seeds are less frequently used for propagation.

### Pruning

A little pruning generally increases flowering in oleander. Avoid heavy pruning that may lead to excessive vegetative growth, basal sprouting, and fewer flower clusters.

### Toxicity

All parts of the oleander

plant are poisonous. Plants should be located in the garden in a restricted location, away from direct contact with people. The plant contains two toxic glycosides known as, oleandroside and nerioside.

Action of the poisons in oleander is similar to the action of the heart drugs known as digitalis.

The symptoms can be severe gastroenteritis, diarrhea, abdominal pain, sweating and weakness. Cardiac irregularities are common, usually as increased heart rate.

### Pests

The oleander caterpillar is the most important insect pest of oleanders. The adult female moth lays between 25 to 75 eggs on the underside of the terminal leaves.

The orange-colored and black haired caterpillars will eat the entire blade of the leaves in a very short time. The insect pupates when it is about 2 inches long.

The adult insect is a bluish moth with white dots on the wings and a red tip at the end of the abdomen. The moth is known as the Polka Dot Moth or Oleander Moth. The life cycle is about 60 days and can produce two to three generations per year.

The oleander scale, the oleander aphid, and the long-tailed mealy bug, are other insect pests that affect oleander plants.

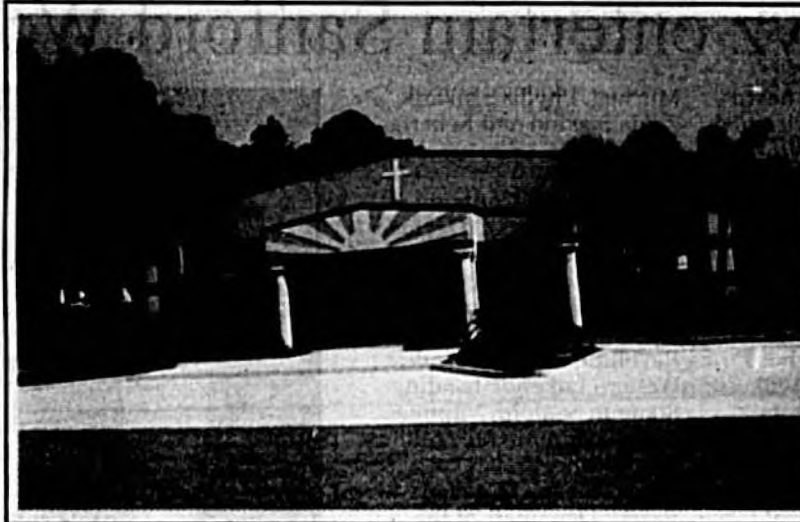
