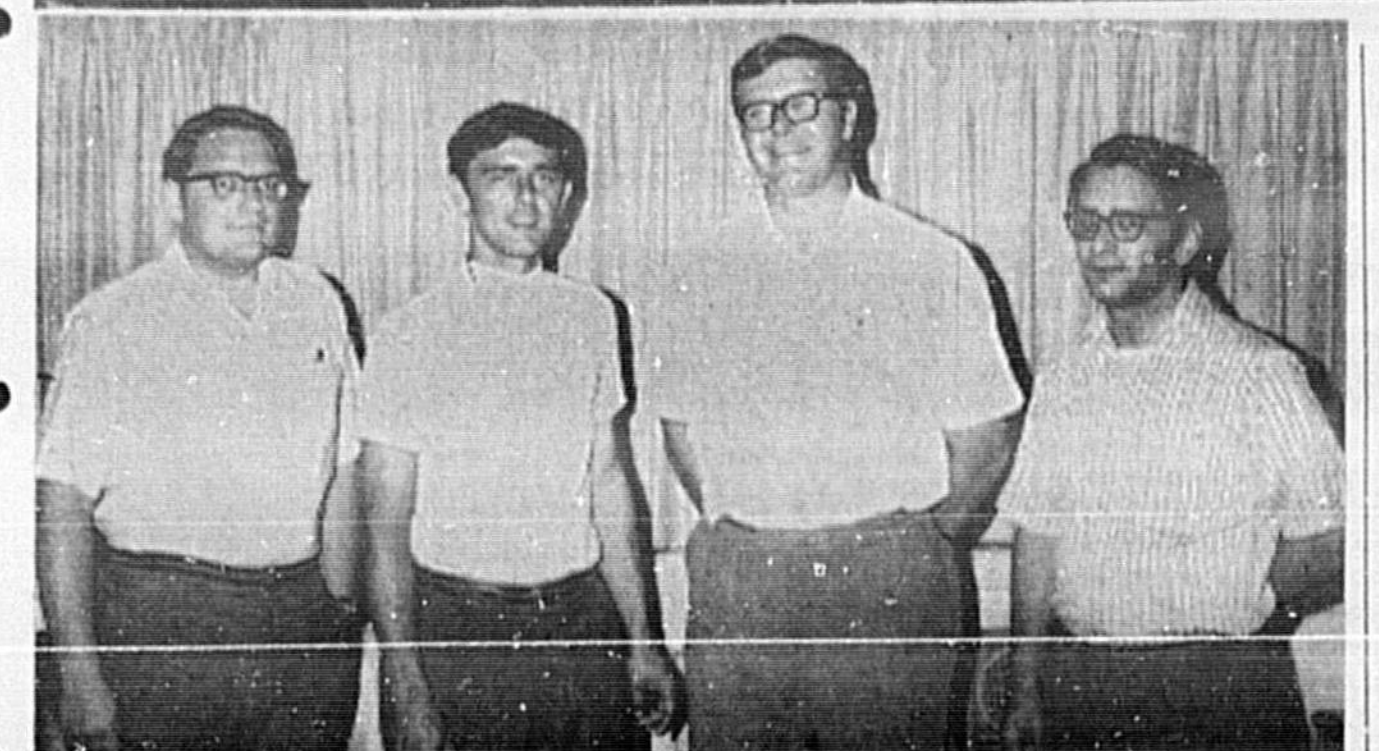

Citrus Figures Upset Growers

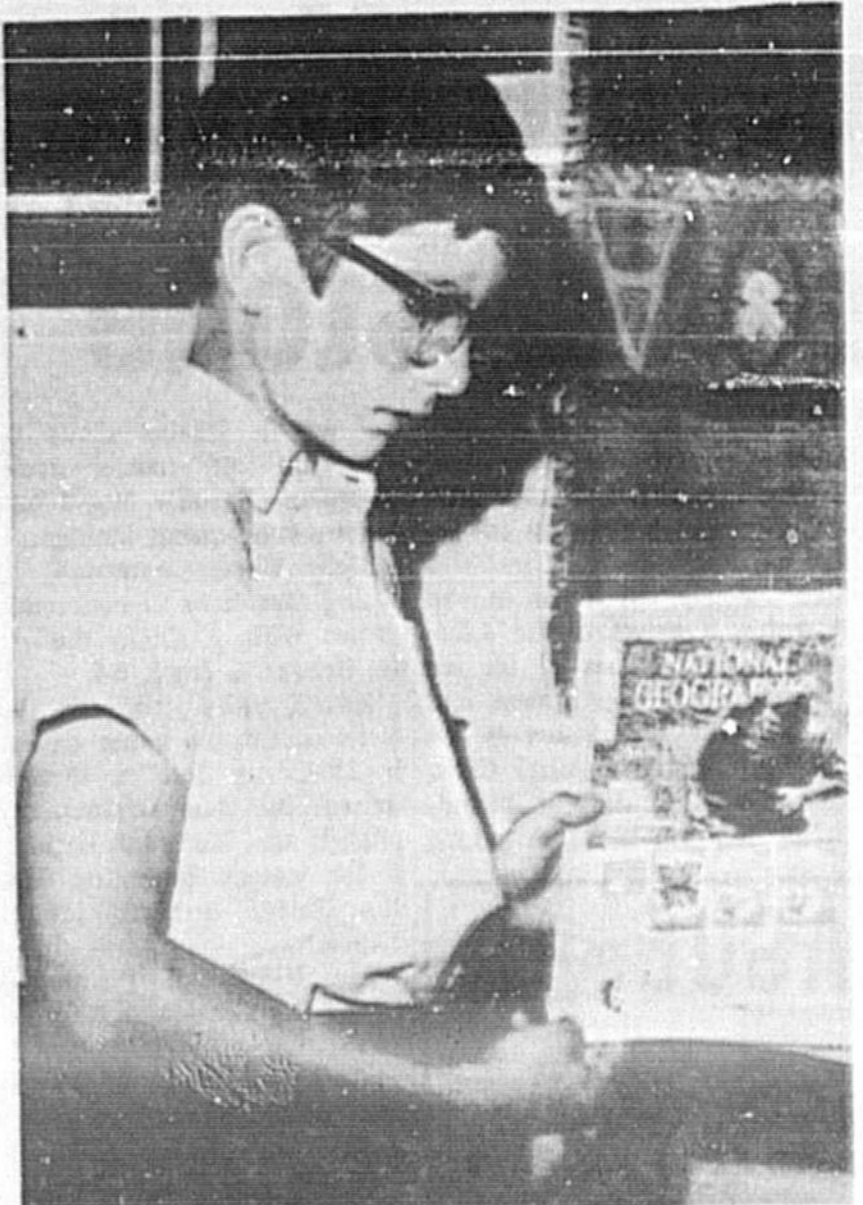

## TEENAGE FIREMEN OF CASSELBERRY

Becoming a fireman is no longer a boyhood dream! It is now a reality for teenage boys living in Casselberry.

A program called the Reserve Fire Force, designed by Fire Chief Herman Joyce was implemented recently to prepare the group to augment the regular volunteer firemen in the event of an all out emergency or major disaster and will supplement the volunteers during the summer season to combat the rash of brush fires.

These young boys ranging from 15 to 18 years of age, undergo weekly training sessions each Saturday night at the Casselberry fire hall under the supervision

instructions of Fireman Andrew R. Kelly. Fire prevention, arson laws, fire chemistry, city government, tools and equipment, rescue, first-aid and hose handling are but a few of the subjects which the Reserve Fireman curriculum calls for. They also support and assist the regular volunteers in fire prevention programs, station maintenance and social functions.

To increase their knowledge and skills in fire fighting the group recently attended a one day formal training session at the U.S. Naval Training Center Fire School in Orlando along with Naval Recruits of Company 5012. The day long instructions included a wild hose demonstration, hand-

ling high pressure hoses, training in the wearing and use of oxygen breathing mask and handling portable fog and foam pumps and equipment.

Capt. Robert Johnson, the Reserve Fire Force officer in charge advises that applications are being accepted from eligible boys who are interested in becoming a Reserve Fireman. Requirements are: Be age 15 to 18, be a resident of the city, have good school grade, obtain parents written consent and possess no police record. Prospective applicants and parents are invited to attend any training session and meet the youth of Casselberry interested in a unique field on any Saturday night.

## Politicians: Watch Out

MIDDLETOWN, Pa. (UPI) — Mrs. Theresa Keefe says she had a good memory for how Pennsylvania lawmakers vote when it comes to state spending.

The 26-year-old mother of four is head of a group called the Citizens' Association of Voters. It is affiliated on the state level with the Pennsylvania Association of Taxpayers and nationally with the Voice of the People.

"Let me tell you, any legislator who promotes or votes for an income tax after the election this fall will not be forgotten when his name comes up the next time," Mrs. Keefe vowed.

"If legislators knew what our membership was their hair would stand on end," she continued. Members of the group, now three years old, are circulating petitions calling for a halt to new taxes, coupled with "immediate spending reform."

Dr. Fenlon achieved her present status in the medical world over the objections of her father, also a doctor, who disapproved of women in medicine.

But she persevered and was graduated from the University of Iowa Medical School, served her internship at San Francisco General Hospital and her residency at the University of

California Medical School. She entered private practice in internal medicine in San Francisco in 1945.

In 1960, Dr. Fenlon became the first woman president of the San Francisco Medical Society and the following year was chosen Medical Woman of the year by the American Medical Woman's Association.

In 1964, she was the first woman elected to the council of the California Medical Association and the first woman to chair local convention arrangements for the American Medical Association.

Dr. Fenlon said she wasn't surprised about policy decisions made at the last CMA convention. One included advocating health insurance for all persons and lifting all restrictions on abortions.

"Medicine didn't raise its voice about anything in the past, but we've been working on these things right along," she said.

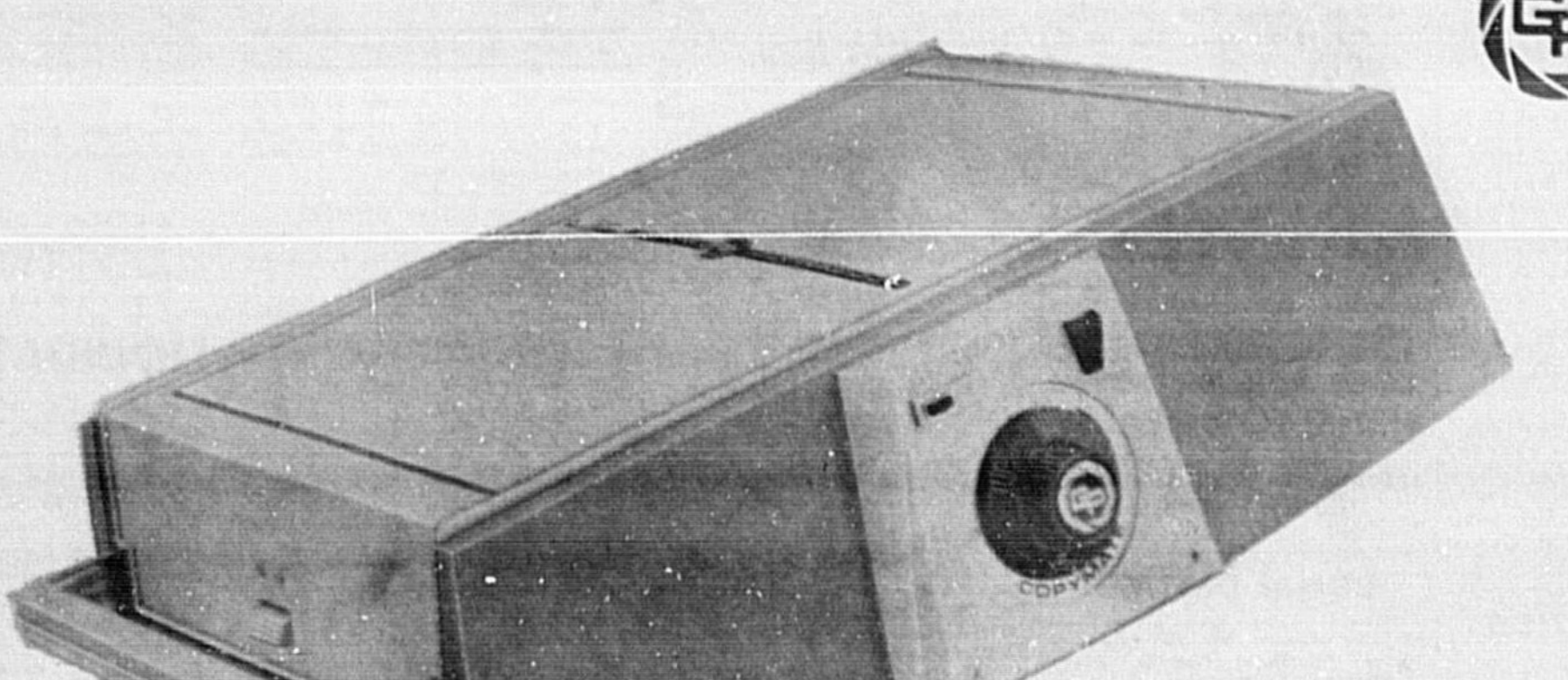

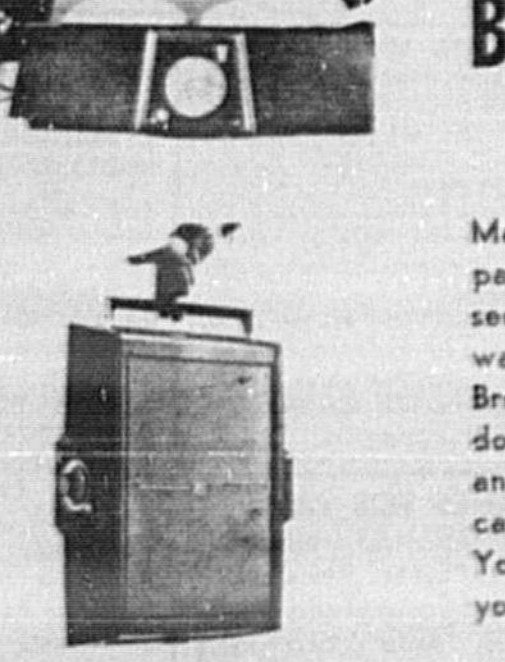
