

Ace Parker Going Back To Majors For Third Tryout

PORTSMOUTH, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Clarence (Ace) Parker is going back to the major league this month with the idea of finding out for himself just how much there is to that old axiom that "the third time is the charm."

This time, the Ace, who has long been an old hand at hitting a football around in the professional ranks, is trying his baseball luck with the Chicago Cubs of the National League.

Parker, who played with the Philadelphia Athletics after his graduation from Duke University and later did a short-lived hitch with the Pittsburgh Pirates, has a lot of confidence that he can make the Cubs a good shortstop—even at 37.

"For a guy my age, it's a long throw from shortstop over to first base, but I'm going to give it a try," says Ace.

When Parker joins the Cubs for this whirl at the big show, he won't even have a rookie's contract. He'll be on purely a trial basis, on the word of General Manager Weaver, of the Philadelphia Phillies, who has a lot of confidence that the Ace will make you a good shortstop.

"I guess I'll have to do just like I did the past football season," Parker laughed. "Last year I couldn't get together with the New York Yankees. I signed a dollar a year contract. The Yankees wouldn't pay me what I thought I was worth, and I wouldn't play for what they offered."

"Some kind of a contract had to be in the office before the season started, so I signed one for a dollar. There I was with 10 years in the pro ranks and in the same boat with a rookie. Of course, I got together with the Yankees later, and I'm glad I signed that contract because it was Parker and Portsmouth Owner Lawrence, for whom the Ace had the Piedmont League in falling last year with a .331 average for 92 games, told the Cubs to "take him; try him; you can't pay a later."

Arizona Five Led By Cager With One Eye

TUCSON, Ariz.—One reason why the University of Arizona's basketball team is so good is that it has a one-eyed star shooting forward, Morris Udall.

Aiming with one good eye and one made of glass, this six-foot-four Army officer scored 127 points in 13 games for a neat 10.5 average.

When Udall was six years old there was a fever that even chance he would never see again, let alone serve with the air corps or be a high-scoring basketball player.

Udall and his closest pal were playing in the parlor of his father's home in Udall, Ariz., when a young Morris held a heavy rope taut, as his playmate cut through the bottom with a knife. As the blade went through the rope it shot upward and the point cut deeply into Udall's right eye.

At that point the infection spread to the other eye and it was feared Udall might become totally and permanently blind.

But he recovered and made the basketball team at St. Johns High. Some of the kids on other teams tried to capitalize on his blind side, attempting to run up on his blind side and steal the ball. They taught him a lot.

How he got in the Army with a glass eye is his secret, but he served overseas in the Pacific theatre for three years.

He warmed up for this basketball season by playing in a Tucson league. In one game he scored 60 points.

When Arizona defeated Michigan State and Wayne of Detroit on a court trip the chances were good for the opponents realized that Udall had a high point man for a game, was half blind.

"They tell me having one eye cuts down width of vision 40 per cent, but I certainly don't notice it," Udall explains. "The biggest drawback is the reflection in the eye, depth of focus. But I'm actually accustomed to it."

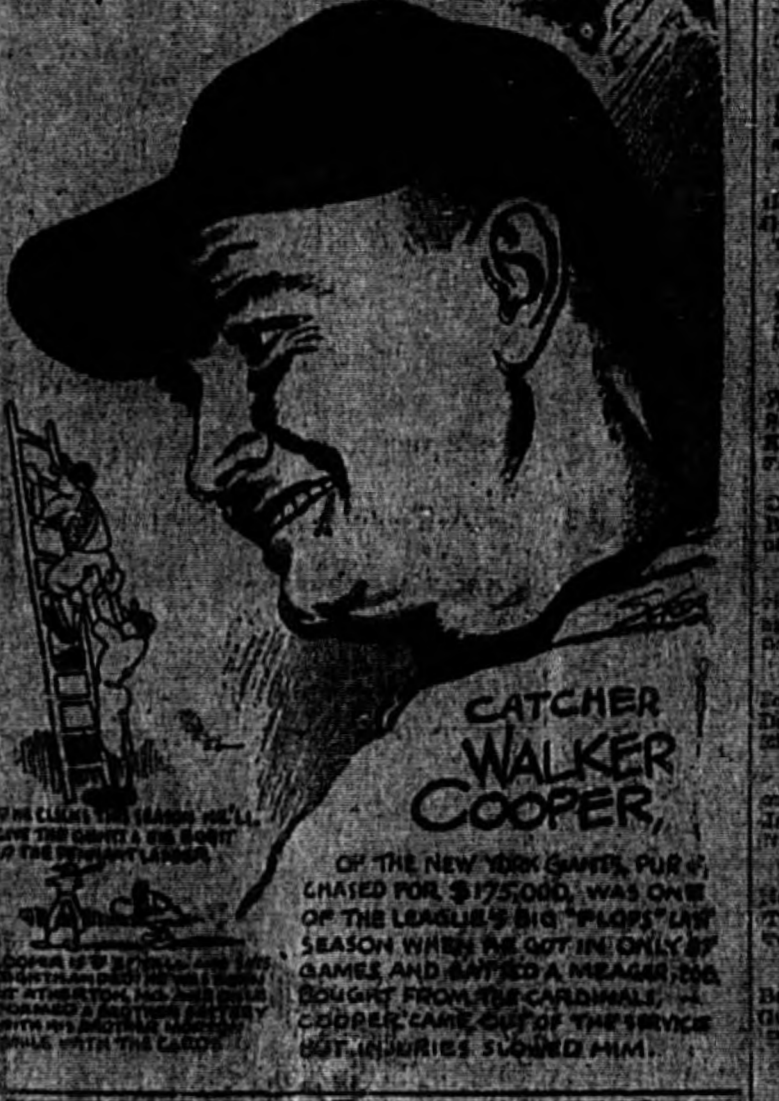

Drive Begun To Get Talmadge Out Of Party

Citizens Of Twenty-Two Counties Are Organized To Oust Herman As 'Bolter'

ATLANTA, Feb. 26, (AP)—A Georgia group today launched an attempt to purge Herman Talmadge and his political faction from the Democratic Party.

The executive committee of the Aroused Citizens of Georgia discussed plans for the attempted ouster at a meeting in Atlanta today. Representatives from 22 Georgia counties attended the meeting.

Speakers charged that the Talmadge forces long ago abandoned the traditional principles of the Democratic Party.

The co-chairman of the organization, Mayor Harvey Kennedy of Marietta, said the Georgia party dominated by the late Eugene Talmadge consistently fought the late President Roosevelt and his program.

Another speaker proposed the name of the Cracker Party for the Talmadge group. The Cracker Party held the upper hall in Augusta until overthrown by an independent group.

The group also proposed that those opposed to Talmadge should maintain themselves as the True Democratic Party, and that "Talmadge should be tagged as a bolter."

Meanwhile, a committee of the Georgia senate recommended passage of two labor bills already approved by the House of Representatives.

Companion bills were introduced in both branches of the Georgia Assembly. The senate last week passed its bills, and sent them to the House, but the measures bogged down in a house committee. Meanwhile, the House passed its own bills, and sent them to the senate.

The upper chamber gave first reading to the measures today, after the bills were recommended by the senate industrial relations committee. The bills are expected to get second reading tomorrow, and be in for enactment Monday.

The bills would prohibit the union closed shop, and ban mass picketing and voluntary dues checkoff in Georgia.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26, (AP)—The President of the AFL, William Green, told the House Labor Committee today that he is not opposed to a new law making unions give public reports of their finances. Neither, said Green, is he against having unions registered.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24, (AP)—The House Labor Committee heard AFL President William Green lash out today against most of the legislation now before Congress, charging that the real purpose of these measures is to destroy unions and wreck collective bargaining.

Green contended that not one of the pending bills deals with the cause of industrial unrest. The main cause, he insisted, is inflation.

The 72-year-old union chief declared that 80 out of every 100 workers who went on strike since V-day did so simply because they were caught in what Green calls the economic vice of rising prices and declining postwar income.

WASHINGTON—It may take some time to develop, but one of the stiffest international legal fights ultimately will be waged over conflicting claims to the millions of square miles of ice-capped lands being explored by a dozen nations.

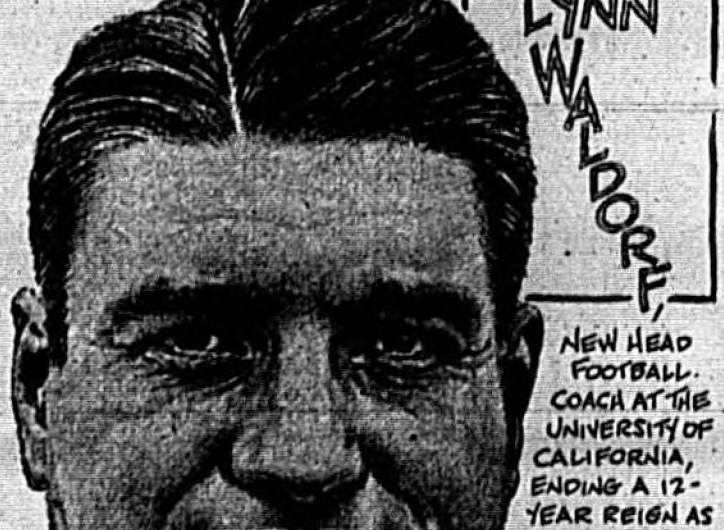

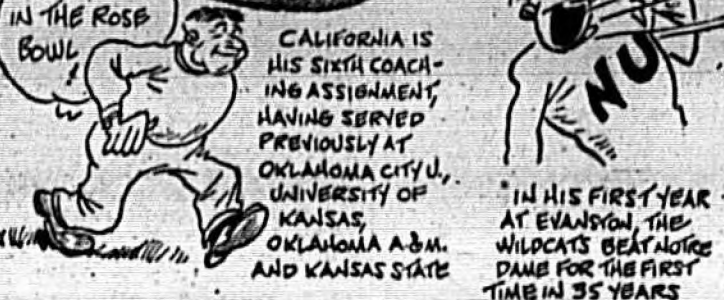

New Instrument Warns Pilots Of Imminent Stall

Flashes Light, Sounds Buzzer; Insurance Cost Will Be Cut

NEW YORK CITY, Feb. 26—(AP)—A new aircraft instrument which under all conditions warns a pilot of the approach of a stall, the cause annually of more than half the fatal accidents in private flying, was demonstrated publicly Monday for the first time at La Guardia Field.

The device shines a red light on the instrument board before a pilot and also sounds a buzzer when a stall is imminent, regardless of the plane's altitude, its load or the type of maneuver being performed. It was developed by the Civil Aeronautics Authority through use of a method proposed by Dr. Leonard W. Greene of New York City, a consulting engineer for Grumman Aircraft.

A stall takes place when the flow of air across the top of a wing becomes turbulent instead of smooth due to pilot error or other causes, and the wings lifting power is destroyed. Involuntary stalls at low altitudes often have been followed by tail spins and chases which took place before a pilot could regain control.

Several aircraft insurance companies have reduced the cost of crash insurance on aircraft equipped with the new stall warning indicator. It was learned last night. Crop-dusting planes, which must operate at speeds of marginal safety, now can be insured if equipped with the stall warning device.

Unlike previous indicators actuated by variations in air speed, the new instrument is adjusted so that the warning of an impending stall goes off at a point approximately 10 percent above the critical speed at which an aircraft might stall and spin, regardless of the circumstances. In one type of light airplane, for example, it sounds a warning at fifty-four miles an hour to alert the pilot to the probability of a stall arising from a mistake in handling on a straight course.

On the same airplane the indicator sounds at as much as ninety-five miles an hour in a steep turn, should the pilot's actions make a stall imminent. Its stall warning instrument, which weighs less than a pound, is based on the aerodynamic fact that an airplane wing cuts the air so that part passes above the wing and the other part below. Tests have proven that in normal flight this point of division is just below the extreme forward part of the wing's leading edge.

Part of instrument on wing consists of a thin tub of metal protruding from the leading edge of the wing. This is situated in such a way that in normal flight the air flow keeps the tub in a position to make an electric circuit stay open.

As an airplane approaches a stall, the division point of air moves downward below the tub, causing it to flip up and close the electric circuit. When this happens the red light flashes and the buzzer sounds.

Installation of the instrument requires a hole only one and three-eighths inches in the leading edge of either wing and simple wiring. The instrument has been designed so that it cannot be left shut off. It is being manufactured by the Safe Pitch Instrument Corporation of White Plains.

Eve Currie Currently Publishes Newspaper

NEW YORK—Eve Currie, chic, dark-haired daughter of the radio crooners of radium, has arrived in America for her first post-war visit with a new feather in her cap. She has become a newspaper publisher in Paris.

Mina Currie, in partnership with Philippe Barre, son of the French author Maurice Barres, has been serving as publisher, editor and sometimes special writer for Paris-Press, an afternoon paper with a circulation of 400,000—second largest in France.

In doing so, she enters a new phase of a career that has seen her in the guises of concert pianist, music critic, play adaptor, lecturer on French problems, war correspondent, member of the Fighting French forces and author of a biography of her famous mother.

"Paris-Press is completely independent," she exclaimed in an interview. "We are not tied to any political party. We have no big bank behind us."

The French press, she said, starts from zero after the liberation.

The old newspapers had been destroyed through collaboration. It was possible to establish a newspaper without needing "an enormous amount of capital." By a cooperative arrangement, publishers became "clients" of the printers' cooperative. They were able to use the old newspaper plants without great initial outlay.

Although there still is governmental licensing and control of press-print, Miss Currie said this is due to scarcity. She believes the controls will vanish with increased supply.

She said, as far as she could observe, the government has not used this power to suppress opinion.

"There are papers of all shades of political opinion in France now, completely without censorship. They do not hesitate to say what they like about the government."

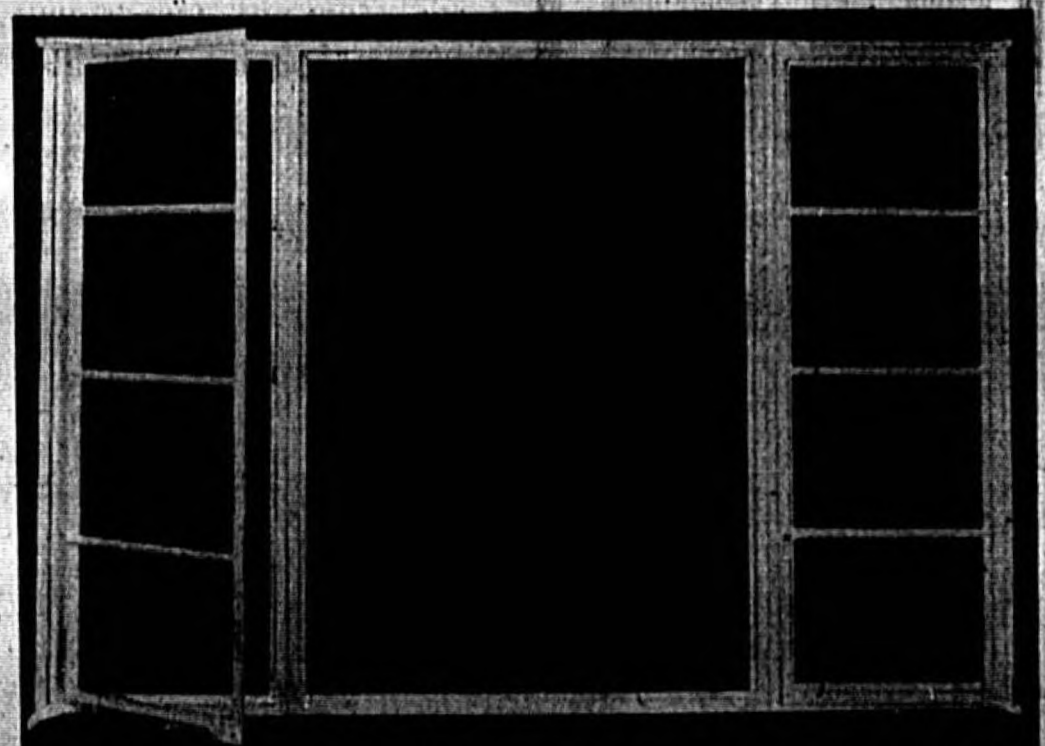

Union Leader States Labor Outlook Bright

Trainmen President Feels Prospects For Peaceful Settlements Are Good

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27, (AP)—The President of the Railroad Trainmen, A. F. Whitney, seemed hopeful about Labor-management peace when he told newsmen after a conference of railroad union men and industry leaders today that prospects appeared brighter than ever.

Representatives of 22 railway brotherhoods met with the executives of 30 eastern railroads. Whitney would not elaborate on why he thought the outlook for industrial peace seems bright. But he told a newsmen that the conference was bringing about a constructive discussion.

It was Whitney's unions and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers that staged the historic nationwide railroad strike last May. Only recently, Whitney said that the issues then never had been settled.

The head of the switchmen, T. C. Cashen, who is also chairman of the Railway Labor Executives' Association said "We're meeting here in Washington in an effort to illustrate to Congress that Labor and management can sit down and discuss their mutual problems without need for congressional guidance." Cashen said wages aren't being discussed.

The president of CIO United Electrical Workers' Union said today that all pending labor legislation is harmful to employees. Albert Fitzgerald also denounced what he called powerful employer interests in testimony before the Senate Labor Committee. He said these so-called interests have been attempting to weaken Labor's bargaining power.

Fitzgerald termed a pending Labor bill by Republican Senator Joseph Hall another legislative effort to stack the cards against workers. He said the Minnesota legislator's proposed measure can only result in industrial chaos.

Fitzgerald concluded his prepared statement by saying unions have been labeled communistic ever since they first were organized. But he said the attack against the United Electrical Workers have been particularly heavy. He attributed the so-called labeling of his union to the fact that electrical workers have been able to win better wages.

\$4,000 Donated To Local Hospital Fund

Approximately \$4,000, or less than one-sixth of the \$25,000 set as a goal in the current membership drive of the Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital Association has been received so far, according to A. H. Peterson, chairman of the campaign. Peterson said that if each of the 25,000 people in the County gave but one dollar each, the goal would soon be reached.

The people who have already given toward the fund have been most generous, he said, but there have not been enough of them.

Walter M. McWhorter and Francis McWhorter have ordered an organ for the hospital, Mr. Peterson announced.

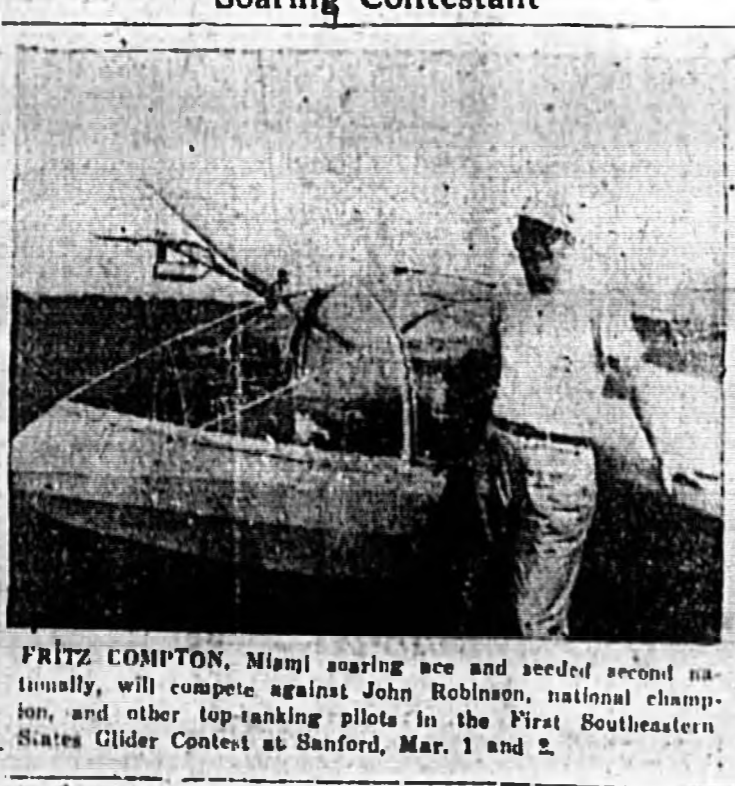

Detectives say they plan to question her further in an effort to get a description of the assailant. It is believed that Miss Stang was tossed out of a car, and then rolled down the embankment from the road.

Men From Byrd Expedition Head For New Zealand

200 Transfer To Mt. Olympus At Sea; Anticipate Leave

ABOARD THE MOUNT OLYMPUS, Feb. 27, (AP)—The Antarctic Task Force Chief, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, today described the Byrd Expedition as a great success, both in discoveries and polar training. As his flagship, the Mount Olympus, started toward home, Admiral Cruzan said that Navy personnel on the expedition had obtained a real insight into the problems met in polar regions and in aviation exploration.

ABOARD THE USS MOUNT OLYMPUS, Feb. 27, (AP)—The ice-breaker "Burton Island" made a rendezvous with the Mount Olympus in Antarctica today, bringing back "stranded" air operations in Little America.

Some 200 men were transferred from the ice breaker to the headquarters vessel after an unexpected easy trip through the Ross ice barrier. The crew of the "Burton Island" said that during the three-day run through the barrier, only a few areas were seen where the ice was packed into impenetrable masses. The two ships will sail tonight for Wellington, New Zealand, where everybody will get shore leave. Another ice breaker, "The North Wind" is expected to join the convoy on the way.

Bevin Says Big Four To Discuss Pact To Prevent Aggression

LONDON, Feb. 27, (AP)—A preview of what will be talked about at the forthcoming Moscow conference was given today by British Foreign Secretary Bevin when he said that he and the other ministers of the Big Four will discuss a four-power pact to prevent any new aggression in Europe. The type of treaty, Bevin mentioned would go beyond the American proposal offered last May that the big powers keep Germany demilitarized for 25 years.

Lava From Mt. Etna Is Bypassing Village

ROME, Feb. 27, (AP)—Catania dispatch to the Italian News Agency indicated today that molten lava from Mount Etna may flow by the village of Passi Ficarini which earlier was believed threatened with destruction. The dispatch said an Italian observation plane from Bari flew over the volcano area today. The pilot said that the flow of lava was cutting off to the left of the village and for the time being, at least, the village appeared to be out of danger.

3 Killed In Explosion

BRISTOL, Tenn., Feb. 27, (AP)—Three persons are known to have been killed in the explosion of gas tanks at a service station in downtown Bristol today. It took flames nearly two hours to bring under control the flames which followed the blast. A fourth person was found to be dead in the wreckage left by the explosion which burned the area and shattered windows in adjacent buildings. The dead were identified as the operator of the station, Frank Robinson, 48; a station employee, Frank Robinson, 21; and a customer, J. B. Smith, of Palm Springs, Va.

Light Display Friday Opens Glider Meet

Planes To Simulate Attack On Airport; Students To Make Parachute Jumps

Mrs. Virginia Bennis, gliding instructor, will speak on the flying feats of Paul Tully, land, celebrated glider pilot, over radio station WDBO on Sunday, at 3:00 o'clock Friday afternoon.

A night display of giant five-foot 800,000,000 candle power anti-aircraft search lights will inaugurate the first southeastern states soaring contests Friday evening at the Sanford Municipal Airport where there will be many glider contestants and crews making ships ready for the events Saturday and Sunday.

The giant lights are from Col. D. B. Heron's 916 Base Unit and have a range of 40 miles and by use of colored screens, fiery beams of light can penetrate the sky. Forty millimeter and ninety millimeter anti-aircraft batteries will man their guns. A P-51, the fastest jet fighter plane, and a B-29, the largest bomber are expected to be here on display for the opening preview.

Climaxing the preview will be a night parachute jump by two students of the Sanford School of Aviation, Richard Showell and Eddie Bergida who served in the paratrooper and who have had 468 jumps to their credit. Plans will endeavor to simulate an attack by approaching the field out of range of the search lights. The parajumpers will try to land unspotted and land without being spotted in the light beams.

The public is invited to see these events of the preview from the light deck and to meet contestants who will seek to beat their own records in the soaring events, and longer talk will be of new world records.

Field lights will be on for the benefit of visiting pilots, Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

Don Stremmel, air air organizer, will keep the spectators informed of developments and give those uninitiated in air and glider activity the technical features highlighting the program.

Among the writers who have come here to cover the event is Alexis Dawydoff, technical editor of Air Trails magazine, and he is here in a dual capacity since soaring is one of his favorite pastimes and he will participate in the meet. He is also a director of the Soaring Society under whose sanction the contests are being held. He spoke of the benefits of gliding to young, education and sport to the Sanford Kiwanis Club yesterday.

Mr. Dawydoff lost part of the use of one leg as the result of a crack-up but has never lost interest in gliding. He has praised the efforts of Stephen Bennis, operations manager, and Paul Tuelland, contest director.

National soaring champion John Robinson of Elmira, N. Y., has arrived here also. Many waters who are placed in the national contest is expected. Fritz Compton, Miami, is another entry and George Tabery of Elmira is here.

Virginia Bennis, wife of Stephen Bennis and holder of the National Woman's Distance Record will be a leading contender, said Mr. Dawydoff. He also predicted success in the meet for Miss Maseky Daugherty of Orlando and Miss Milkey Browning of Sanford.

Ships Answer SOS Of Sinking Fishing Boat

NEW YORK, Feb. 27, (AP)—A fishing schooner radioed this morning that she was fighting a losing battle against heavy seas 80 miles southeast of Cape May, N. J. She is the Captain L. Brown and the Coast Guard said the schooner's crew was working knee-deep in water. The water was rising faster than the crew could pump it out.

Former Guerrilla Upholds Greeks Claim At Probe

ALBANIA, Yugoslavia Involved In Testimony Of Witness

SALONIKA, GREECE, Feb. 27 (AP)—A Greek who once fought with the Leftist Guerrillas was given a hearing today by the United Nations Commission investigating the Partisan warfare in Greece. This witness said he trained as a general in Yugoslavia, and that he had been on raids into Greece which were staged from Albania.

That is what the Greek government has charged in its complaint to the United Nations. Greece says the guerrillas have been inspired by her neighbors, Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria. But all three nations have denied it.

The witness testified in support of the Greek charge is Fotios Koutopoulos. He told the UN Commission that he fled from Greece in 1945, and began training in Yugoslavia. Then, the witness said, he took part in several raids on Greek army and guerrilla posts operating out of Albania. Koutopoulos stated that casualties and desertions reduced his band, and that he finally gave himself up.

Teachers Strike In Delaware Is Ended

DOVER, Feb. 27, (AP)—The one-day teachers' strike in Delaware is over and 1,500 teachers went back to their desks today. A state-wide committee has been elected to plan the Delaware teachers' next move. They protested that a wage increase granted them is insufficient.

Half of the teaching force in the state of Delaware went out on a protest holiday yesterday and 25 public schools were forced to close their doors as a result. The teachers were playing hooky from class because they considered a wage increase bill inadequate. About 200 instructors in four high schools in Wilmington started it all and they were joined by several hundred others from outlying districts who staged a motorcade to the Delaware capitol.

While the teachers were away 200 students at the Wilmington high school began a demonstration. The police had to be called out when the youngsters went through the school corridors trying to get other pupils to join them.

The teacher's cavalcade to the capitol was to end up in a mass meeting to protest the salary bill now awaiting the signature of Governor Walter Bacon. The measure provides increases of from \$200 to \$300. But the local American Federation of Teachers is seeking a flat \$1,000 annual wage hike. Other spokesmen said they would support a bill offered by the council for Delaware education which calls for a 20 percent boost.

House Group Probes Soviet Lend Lease

Sub-committee Begins Investigation Of Ships Sent Russia; To Study Letters

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27, (AP)—The chairman of the House Merchant Marine Committee suspended temporarily today the serving of a subpoena against Secretary of State Marshall which had been ordered by a Merchant Marine sub-committee. Representative Bradley, who heads the full House group called it off at the last minute. He said that Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson had promised him by telephone to appear in his office this afternoon with copies of State Department correspondence with Russia concerning Lend Lease ships.

Originally the issuance of the subpoena was designed to get Marshall before the group tomorrow with the documents concerning that deal. Up to now, the subcommittee had been refused a peek at the correspondence which the State Department had with Moscow on the subject. The group was told that the Russians had been asked to return the vessels and that they apply had been uncooperative.

Bradley in calling off the subpoena told newsmen "General Marshall will be asked other things on his mind more important than these ships."

Bradley said he was sorry the subcommittee issued the subpoena because Marshall doesn't know anything about the matter.

There was a White House conference today on what Marshall will have to deal with at the Moscow conference. President Truman, diplomatic advisors and congressional leaders were in a huddle for nearly an hour talking about the European problems Marshall faces.

Proceedings Begun To Evict Reds From New York Property

NEW YORK, Feb. 27, (AP)—Proceedings to evict a long-time fire insurance company from a building in New York City which has been the headquarters of the Communist Party and its school and other activities, began today in a New York City court. A New York judge ordered the eviction of the Communist Party from the premises.

The proceedings were begun after the Department of Housing and Buildings and the building violated the safety standards of the multiple dwelling law. The Russian groups at the least include children of diplomats and consular officials.

A motion picture depicting the now in the hands of the Secretary of State George Marshall is between the Communist Party and the Soviet Purge. It was the first of a series of films to be shown at the school and other Communist activities.

The Morgan property includes 400 acres. It was leased by the Soviet Purchasing Commission in 1945 at \$15,000 a year. Things were quiet for a while, and then in the summer of 1946, the neighbors began to complain. They said the Russians were holding wild bathing parties and that they were generally littering up the territory.

The Russians are now claiming diplomatic immunity, according to Jacob Kramer, on the ground that the Purchasing Commission's work was ended Jan. 1 by a government order that applied to all purchasing agencies of foreign governments. But the attorney for the Russians says they haven't claimed immunity. He says the Kramer's offered to let the Russians cancel the lease for \$10,000 and that later the amount was reduced to \$7,500. That, he says, was to give them a complete release from rent and damages. Kramer maintains that the offer to settle for \$10,000 was for the exact amount due and didn't include damages.

Now the Russians are planning to move from the Morgan estate and to use another estate they've bought nearby. Counsel for both sides have agreed to that.

Property At Airport Classified Yesterday

Classification of property at the Sanford Municipal Airport was today outlined at a meeting of the City Commission and War Assets Administration officials, H. N. Szyk, city manager, said today.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Edward Higgins who attended the meeting stated this morning that the property formerly occupied by the Navy was classified into the airport property including the hangar and several buildings. The property is to be devoted to educational use, hospital use, and surplus property upon which the city holds a priority for purchase.

The hospital, controlled by the Fernald-Laughton Memorial Hospital Association, and educational institutions such as Fellowship College will, after approval by the WAA, be able to purchase property at institutional rates with discounts as high as 95 percent, said Mr. Higgins.

VFW MEET TOLD
