### Spirit Is Need

Court cases involving loyalty oaths — and there have been many in the last two decades — generally center on the interpretation of a few words. Such was the case in this week's decision by the U.S. Supreme Court holding that a loyalty oath drafted a year ago for public school teachers in California is unconstitutional.

The principle of requiring a loyalty oath of teachers was not in question. It remains a prerogative of our school systems to demand from teachers an expression of their loyalty to the principles of government under which we live. No teacher conscious of the profound responsibilities of his profession should object to that requirement.

The Supreme Court has upheld the ruling of a lower court that the California oath was too vague and too broad. Its provisions went beyond a simple pledge to uphold the Constitution and the law — which is required of all public employees — and required a further promise to "promote respect for the flag and respect for law and order and allegiance to the government of the United States of America."

This is exactly what our schools and the teachers in them should be promoting, with and without an oath that binds them to do so.

Several national "Save the Hyphen" committees have been formed, but private groups are limited in the measures they can take their efforts being mainly in the nature of educational campaigns.

It is generally agreed the most effective action would be to formally classify the hyphen as an "imperiled punctuation mark," thus bringing it under the protection of the federal government.

## Domestic Comment: Use North Vietnamese People

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There just possibly may be one way to get Hanoi and the Viet Cong to free 450 American and several thousand South Vietnamese prisoners.

The odds are long, but the cost would be cheap and there would be no risk.

The point to remember is that even in totalitarian North Vietnam, public opinion does count — in the crunch.

The 500,000 parents, wives, children, uncles, aunts and cousins of the 800 North Vietnamese prisoners in the south must be brought into the action, individually, they have no power. But together...

"They're kept in ignorance of those sons and husbands in their leaders, in refusing a prisoner exchange, were keeping their loved ones from coming home."

The pressure of these heart-broken people could be strong. Especially the women.

Conditions are not good in the north. Morale is low. Loneliness and dissatisfaction are creating a dangerous production. People are tired — and hungry for their missing men. Their love for their sons and husbands is intense. Vietnamese are not used to living away from their families. Most men want to live out in Hanoi, rival camps where their parents lived — and die in their own homes. We know from their diaries that the loneliness of the men going south ferments in their stomachs.

In the early days in the north, the Communists were able to recruit young men with the argument that if they joined the VC as guerrillas they would stay in the neighborhood and be with their families at night. If drafted by the government they would go away to fight and die in a "foreign" place.

In Hanoi, rival camps of leaders vie for power. Strong men look for weapons to use in ousting rivals. The frustration of these families with missing men could be a tool in the hands of one rival group or another — as Cambodia was a tool in the hands of another group in the United States.

How then mobilize this North Vietnamese opinion — when Hanoi has total censorship? Perhaps by this simple plan. The idea for which comes from men outside the government with long experience in dealing with the North Vietnamese and steeped in Asian psychology.

Drop leaflets throughout North Vietnam from the Demilitarized Zone in the south to the Chinese border in the north. Millions of leaflets.

In these leaflets, tell every mother, father, husband and child in North Vietnam we are willing, without reservation, to exchange 26,000 prisoners for 800 — that will mean 8,000 North Vietnamese will return home to their families — that only the establishment of their leaders prevents this exchange from taking place — that this exchange will be carried out if they bring enough pressure on their rulers.

Then wait to see what happens. (Newspaper Enterprise Assn.)

## Don Oakley Says: Agnew Analogy

Vice President Spiro Agnew did neither the nation's system of justice nor its system of politics any particular favor by comparing the two in a speech he made the other day in Alabama.

Countering the criticism that he had attempted to divide the nation by his vigorous attacks on Democrats and assorted "radicals" in the last election, and that this was a bad thing, Agnew likened a political campaign to the adversary procedure in a court of law.

"Consider for a minute what the adversary system accomplishes," he said. "Both prosecution and defense fight vigorously for victory. They seek out the facts and witnesses that support their clients' cause and bury their opponents' cause. Then they marshal their arguments with but a single thought in mind: To win.

"To some, this may seem far removed from justice. But remember, the trend toward dehyphenation, but primarily it reflects the Volkswagen influence.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A President barely gets settled in his new White House job when the question arises: Will he run again? And will he be re-elected?

"God, yes," said one aide when asked whether the President would seek re-election.

Whether it's supporting evidence or not, there's also an atmosphere of change and readjustment around the White House.

Nixon aides indicate there will be a great number of shifts at the sub-cabinet level. Many of the new appointments will come after the first of the year, and there will be more departures with the expansion that some officials only planned to stay two years when they signed on.

Such is the case of White House counselor Daniel P. Moynihan, who goes back to Harvard University next month.

Harvard's two year sabbatical limit also is running out for Dr. Henry A. Kissinger, Nixon's national security adviser who must decide whether to return to campus life in February or give up his teaching post.

Kissinger seems at home with his job, and the betting is that he will stay on.

Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler continues to tell news-men that there will be more changes. "We are not going to remain static," he put it at one point.

# Open Christmas Cease-Fire

Saigon (UPI) — U.S. and South Vietnamese forces began a 24-hour cease-fire Christmas Eve. It hours after the Communists started a three-day holiday truce.

Communist forces killed two Americans and wounded three others in an assault on a northern outpost early today less than one hour before they began their cease-fire. U.S. military spokesmen said. At the same time, the weekly casualty toll released today showed U.S. war deaths dropped to their lowest point in more than five years.

Shortly before the 24-hour U.S. and South Vietnamese holiday truce was to begin, only the one incident involving U.S. forces had been reported. But the South Vietnamese command said there had been two violations by the Communists of their unilateral three-day stand-down. One government militia man was killed in the fighting, the officials said.

The 72-hour Communist truce began at 1 a.m. Saigon time (noon EST Wednesday). The cease-fire was the 17th of the Indochina conflict since 1965.

U.S. military spokesmen said South Vietnamese casualties last week were 266 dead and 886 wounded while Communist losses were placed at 1,494 dead.

# Symbol Of Peace To Eight Nations

The Associated Churches of Tamworth, N.H., has sent a sprig of mistletoe to the leaders of eight nations, including those involved in the Middle East and Indochina conflicts.

"From pre-Christian times," the Rev. James W. Kellett said in a covering letter, "mistletoe has been considered a symbol of hope and peace. In ancient times, less civilized societies, men looked for weapons to use in ousting rivals. In Denver, two Santa Claus shops, providing free toys for needy business, ran out of stock with some 3,000 persons still holding coupons for toys. A bank and radio station counters he had stockpiled 500 toys, and thousands of cans of food to help the shops back in business.

At Chicago's O'Hare Airport, hundreds of servicemen arrived on leave from Vietnam as part of "Operation Return." Maj. David Norris of Indianapolis, Ind., surprised his wife with a call from Chicago that he would be home for Christmas. Marine Corps Surgeon Arnold of Woodbridge, Ill., dropped his baggage to hug his wife and their 8-month-old son, who he had not seen since the child was a week old.

Traffic was so heavy at the airport that the temperature inside the terminal dropped because the doors were almost constantly open.

And in Hudson, N.Y., Mrs. Virginia O'Hanlon Douglas, whose letter as a child prompted the "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus," editorial, was in fair condition at Columbia Memorial Hospital. Doctors said Mrs. Douglas, now 81, is suffering the problems of advanced age.

# RUSSIA'S RESTLESS EMPIRE

The Kremlin has not had an easy time of it with the dominion established over Eastern Europe after World War II. Poland's riots are only the latest in a series of uprisings that have challenged the Soviets in every country except Bulgaria. It started with Yugoslavia's Tito, who broke with Stalin in 1948. The 1953 uprising of East German workers was crushed by Soviet tanks. Both Poland and Hungary erupted in 1956. Poland's riots, centered in Poznan, were curbed with the return to power of Wladyslaw Gomulka, leader in the last days of the war. Hungary went to open rebellion and bloody suppression. Hard-line Stalinist and Peking ally Albania broke with Moscow in 1961. Rumanian liberation brought Soviet troops into Czechoslovakia in 1968. Although avoiding an open break, Rumania's nationalist-minded leaders have followed independent foreign and trade policies since the mid-1960s.

# Polish Shakeup Greeted By Public

Warsaw (UPI) — Poles hailed today the ouster of Premier Jozef Cyrankiewicz and party chief Wladyslaw Gomulka as a positive outcome of the Baltic Coast riots.

"We have to thank those who sacrificed their lives in Gdynia and Szczecin," a Warsaw woman said. "If only the tragedy could have been avoided."

The government shakeup followed close on the heels of a major reshuffle in the Communist party, helped to restore a Christmas mood burdened by the bitterness of last week's riots.

Piotr Jaruzelski, a former schoolteacher and army general in 1953, assumed the role of premier. Cyrankiewicz, who moved up to the largely honorary position of president, was ousted from the cabinet last Wednesday, following close on the heels of a major reshuffle in the Communist party, helped to restore a Christmas mood burdened by the bitterness of last week's riots.

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# Military Intelligence Control Is Tightened

WASHINGTON (AP) — A major reorganization of military intelligence has been ordered by Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird following charges in Congress and from former Army intelligence agents that military authorities were overzealous in conducting surveillance of persons involved in antiwar activities or leftist political groups.

Laird told Congress earlier this month these activities, instituted during the Johnson Administration when the Army was called on to help quell civilian disturbances, have been drastically curtailed.

But the controversy was renewed last week by Sen. Sam J. Ervin, D-N.C., chairman of the Senate subcommittee on constitutional rights, who disclosed in a report that the Army spied on more than 800 civilians in Illinois alone, including Democratic Sen. Adlai Stevenson III, and other political figures.

In his memo, Laird specifically directed the Joint Chiefs not to re-establish a separate intelligence agency since DIA was created from its control.

Laird pledged a full public report early next year.

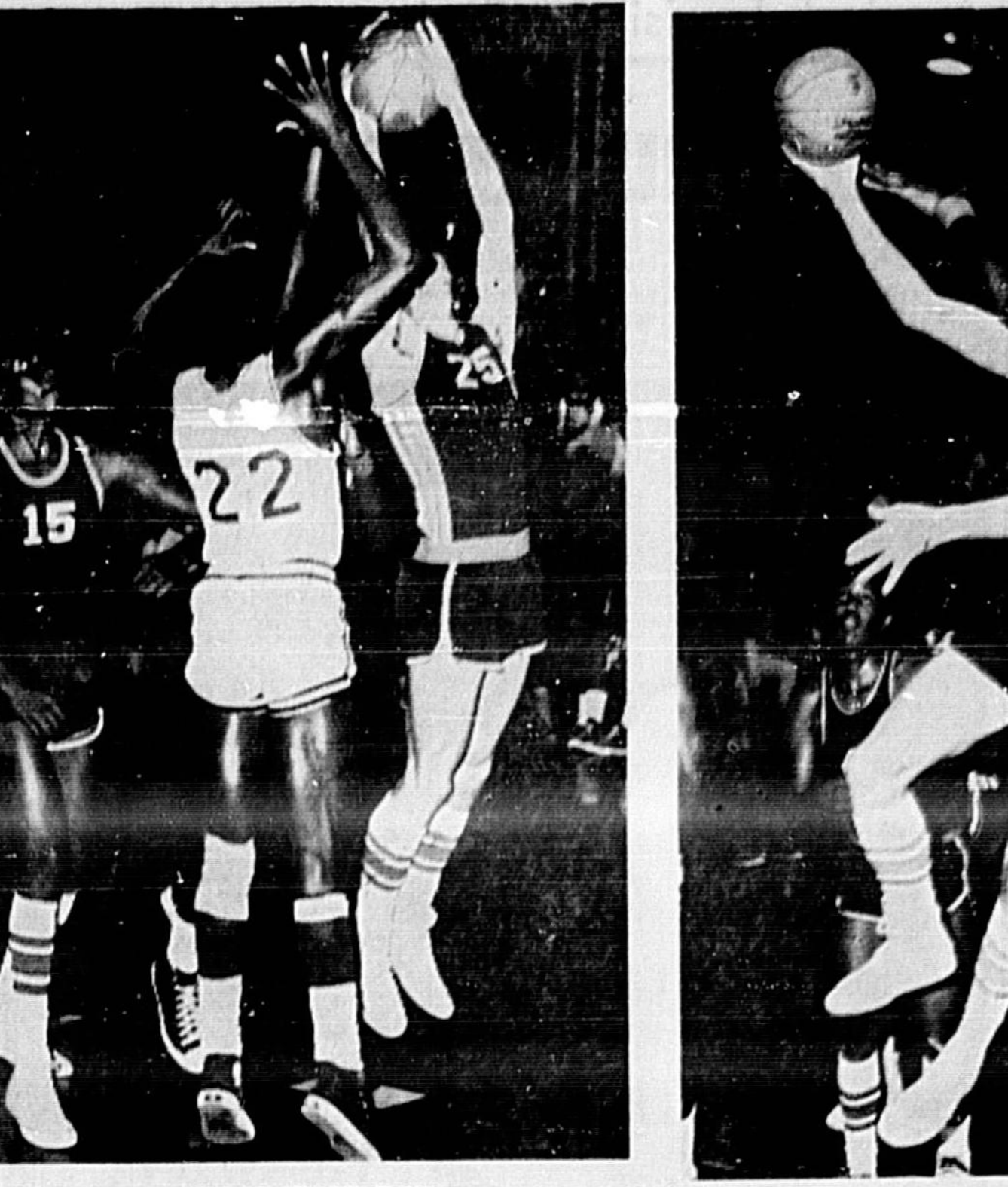

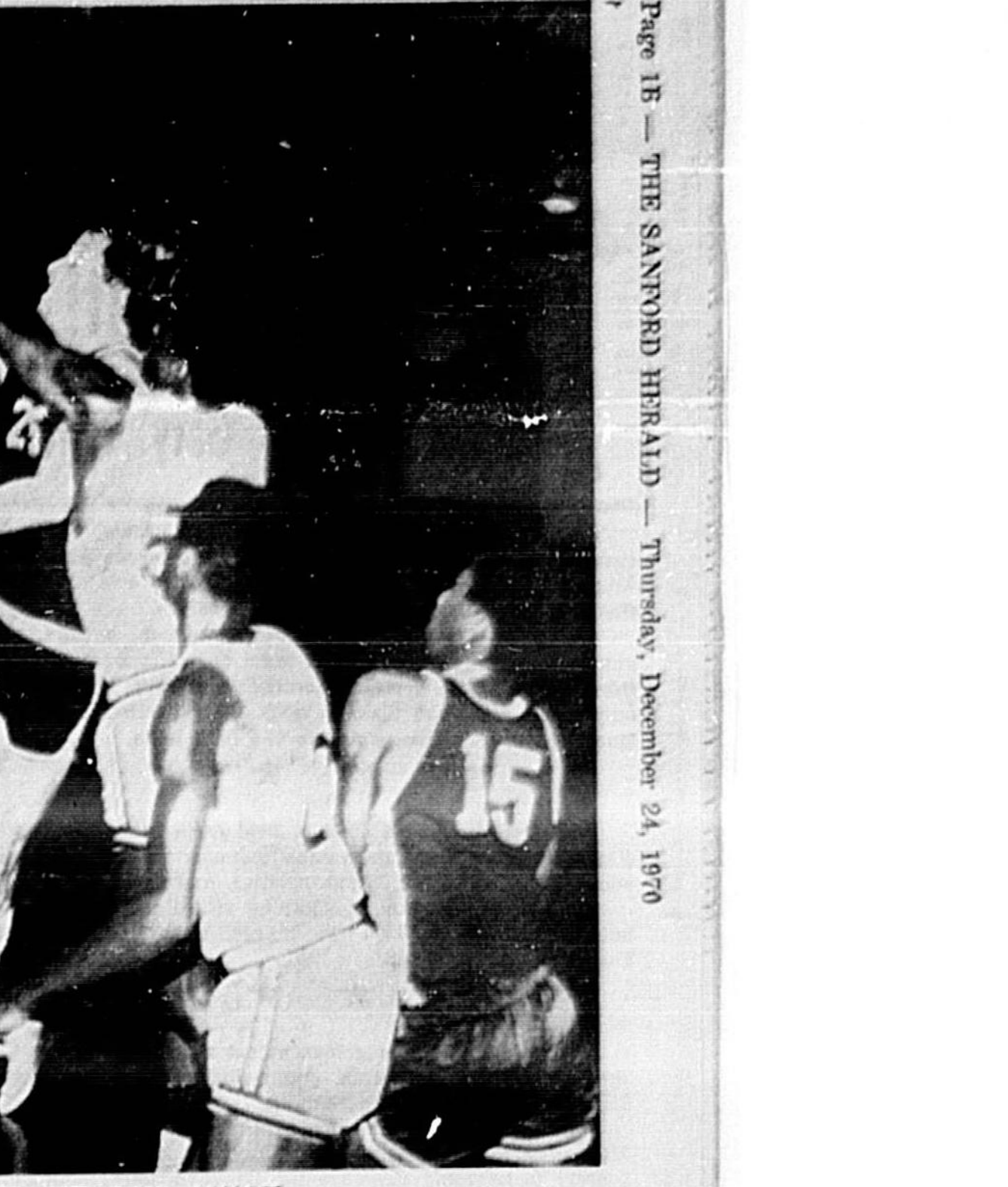

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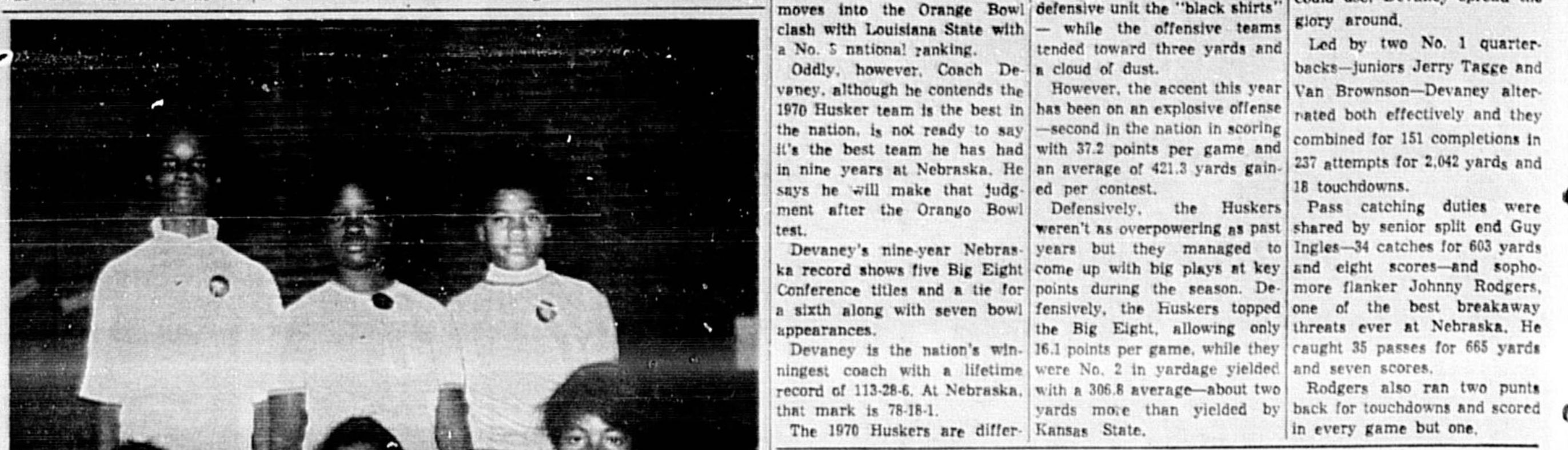

Kansas running back John Riggins is a 230-pound threat who averaged 102 yards a game this season for the Jayhawks.

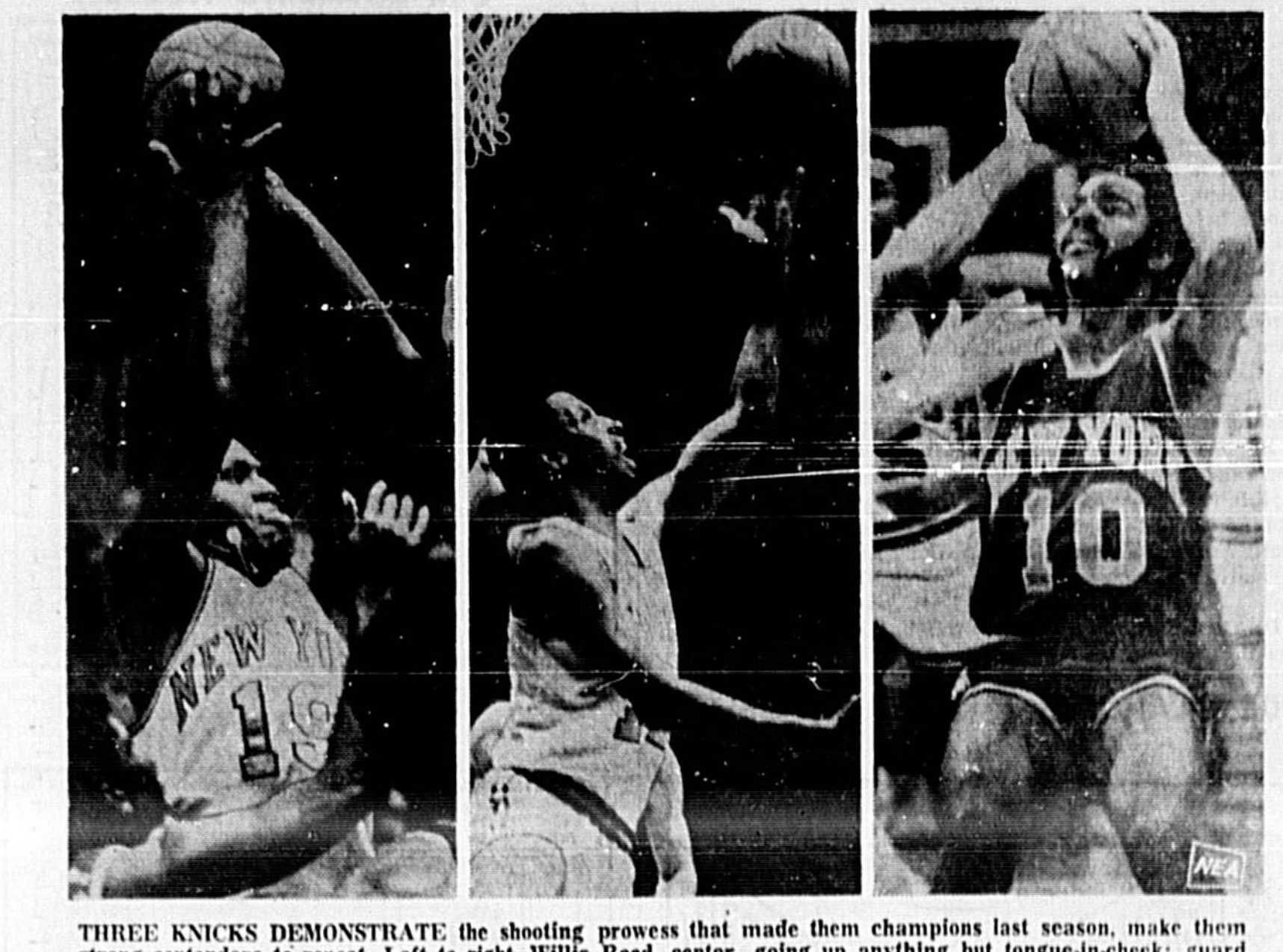

## Manning, Maravich Pace South

By DAVID MOFFIT UPI Sports Writer ATLANTA (UPI) — Two young men — Pete Maravich and Archie Manning — dominated the southern sports scene in 1970.

The lanky Maravich, easily identified by his tumbled hair, floppy socks and basketball wiry, set all-time scoring records at Louisiana State with 44.5 points per game during his senior season and 44.2 ppw during his college career.

And there was more to come. As soon as "Pistol Pete" closed out his college play, he signed a reported \$2 million contract with the Atlanta Hawks.

Although his earliest days as a pro were not as successful as his day as a collegian, Maravich remains a tremendous drawing card and his steady progress indicates it may be only a matter of time before he becomes an outstanding professional basketball player.

Manning went into the 1970 season as one of the most talked-about college football performers of all time. His New Year's Day performance against Arkansas in the Sugar Bowl and the "Archie Who" records, buttons and sweat-shirts made the Ole Miss quarterback the leading candidate for the Heisman Trophy.

But misfortune dogged Archie this past season. Off to a sensational start, he passed and ran for 11 touchdowns in his first four games. But Manning suffered his first groin injury and then in the third period of a Nov. 7 game against Houston—he broke his left arm.

This turn of events cut off many post-season honors although he did wind up as co-quarterback on the UPI All-Southeastern Conference team along with Auburn's Pat Sullivan—a junior who led the nation in total offense with an average of 255.6 yards per game.

The two wound up in a dead heat in balloting by sportswriters and sportscasters in the seven-state region but a more conclusive comparison will be made Jan. 2 when Manning and Sullivan square off in the Georgia Bowl.

The team of the year in the South was the Jacksonville, Fla. University basketball team. Virtually unknown at the start of the season, the Dolphins, led by 7-foot-2 national rebounding champ Artis Gilmore, went all the way to the NCAA finals after losing to UCLA.

The Dolphins, who wound up with a 27-2 record, became the first team in major college basketball history to average better than 100 points per game.

The South's top college football team was 4th-ranked Texas Tech, which posted a 10-1 record for the nation's youngest head coach, 28-year-old Bill Battle. Battle became the NCAA coach by beating the Vol. Don Dickey made a surprise switch to Florida.

# 1970 Was 'Oddball' Year For Major League Baseball

Baseball in 1970 could be called oddball.

The third baseman was popular Brooks Robinson who helped hit and field Ernie Banks' Baltimore Orioles in their second straight American League pennant and a victory over the hard-hitting Cincinnati Reds in a five-game World Series.

The pitcher was Curt Flood, who refused to play in Philadelphia and sued baseball because it's a reserve clause tied a player for life.

At season's end he signed the same kind of contract to play for Washington in 1971.

The pitcher was Detroit's Denny McLain, a controversial right-hander. Commissioner Bowie Kuhn suspended McLain until July 1 for what Kuhn called "intimidation" in 1967 bookmaking activities.

Cincinnati catcher John Rosebush was voted player of the year in 1970 for his hitting and his defense. He batted .293 and led the National League with 45 home runs and 148 runs batted in, winning easily his league's most valuable player honors.

All-American Dan Ibaez, averaging 33.9 ppw, led Kentucky to its 25th straight basketball championship in 38 years and to No. 1 ranking in the UPI college coaches poll.

Over all, 1970 was a good sports year in Dixie.

Richard Petty won 18 of 40 starts on the stock car circuit, placing in the top five 27 times and earning almost \$199,000.

New Orleans Saints' place kicker Tom Dempsey, born with part of his kicking foot missing, kicked a 62-yard field goal against the Detroit Lions.

Knuckelbender Hoyt Wilhelm of the Atlanta Braves became the first man ever to pitch in 1,000 major league baseball games.

# Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY: As a wife, I want to pass on a few tips concerning the care of records and hope they will help Carol. Store them in a dry place to prevent warping. Do not leave records on the turntable overnight or the heat will curl the edges. If you have an automatic changer (where the records drop automatically) do not store over-night on the changer post or they may sag. Do not place records in direct sunlight. — TIM

DEAR POLLY: I have a record owners—a record manufacturer suggests the following treatment for warped records. Put a stack of records on a flat board in a LOW (150 degree) oven and leave for 30 or 40 minutes WITH THE DOOR OPEN. Remove from oven, leave records stacked on the board and place another heavy board on top of the stack. Let cool in this position for about 24 hours. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY: I hope someone can help me before I lose all my baby's nice clothes. I keep a large diaper pail by the baby's crib. When I am changing his clothes his good outfits are put in the pail but wet things, such as diapers, undershirts, etc., are put in the bathroom. (Polly's note—Cheselous is often recommended. This is a circular motion going one way to prevent friction and scratching. I stack them vertically rather than horizontally.) — ANOTHER CAROL

### Oldest Christian Church Looks Like a Fortress

## Settlers Celebrated In Own Way

During the early 17th century any formal observance of Christmas was ruled out by the rigid code of Puritanism. Yule festivity was forbidden as emanating from the Devil. And the Devil was very much a personage in those days. This rule persisted until 1681 when it was repealed. Probably the influence of the Dutch and German settlers had prevailed, and



their customs of Christmas feasting and gaiety softened the hearts of the strict Puritans.

The plenty of the new land provided abundant foodstuffs for the holiday table. And the woods' greens, boughs and assorted cones were used for decorative trim.

In 1804 the explorers Meriwether Lewis and William

Clark rested from their journey westward to celebrate Christmas Day somewhere in the vicinity of what is now Bismarck, North Dakota. Captain Clark wrote in his journal, "We enjoyed a merry Christmas during a day & evening until nine.

In northwestern Wyoming it was rumored that one of a pioneer's Christmas trees had a calming influence on a wounded Sioux Indian who burst into a widow's cabin seeking help and food. She was decorating a small tree for her two children. Its beauty aroused the Indian's curiosity and through sign language, the woman was able to explain in part some of the tree's significance. She fed and cared for the Indian and was able to take him back to his tribe. It is part of the legend that he, having learned the spirit of Christmas, rewarded her with many gifts.

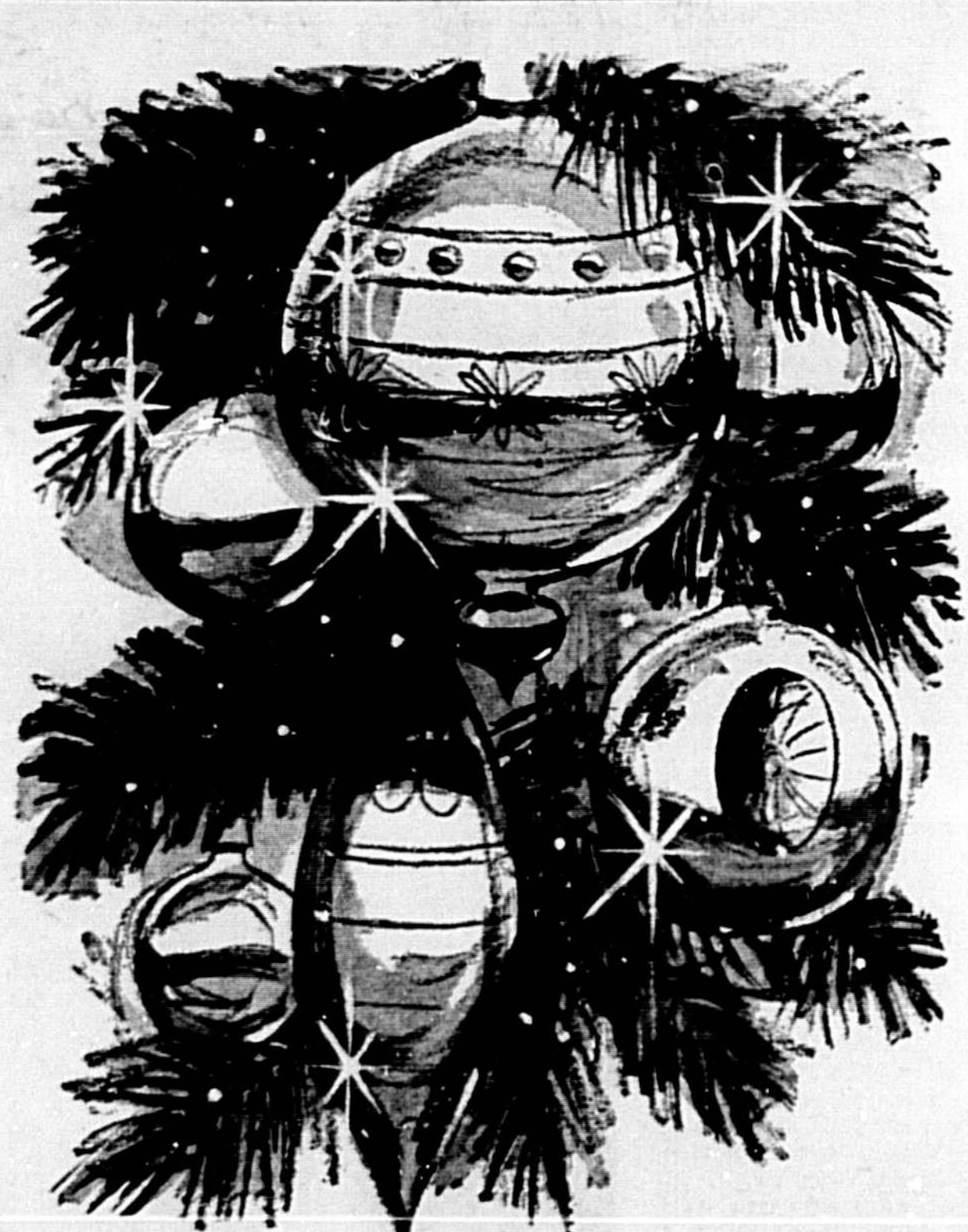

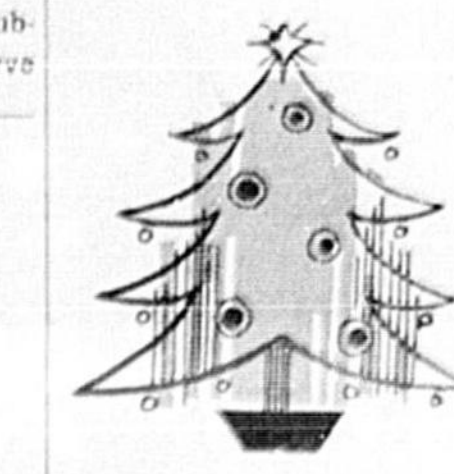

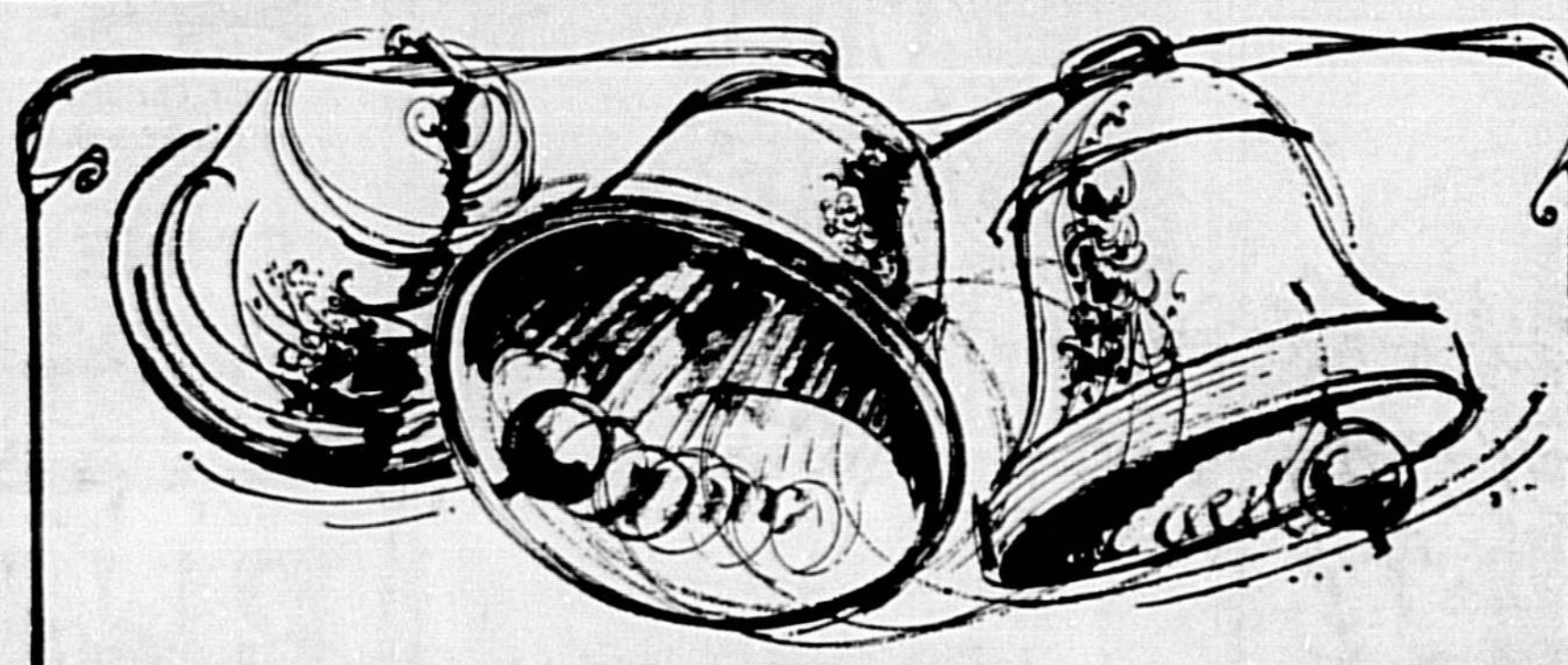
**FACTS AND FANCIES THAT HAVE GROWN WITH THE FESTIVE TREE**

One of the most joyous elements of the Christmas season is the Evergreen tree. Yet it is a fact that they were first brought into homes at a time of fear. And primitive man thought that they harbored beneficent spirits.

In the North, primitive man watched with mounting terror the decline of the life-giving sun. Lengthening winter nights carried the threat of unending cold, darkness and hunger. Frozen fields held no promise of another harvest. Fruit trees stood bare, apparently lifeless, deserted by the spirits.

Alone in the bitter cold and gloom, the evergreens stood as a document of faith in the revival of the sun god and the return of light and life to the frozen world. Living conifers in tubs were brought indoors to prop the householders' courage and to shelter the sylvan spirits. These earliest trees of the winter solstice ritual were not ornamented. They were a testament of life, not mere decoration.

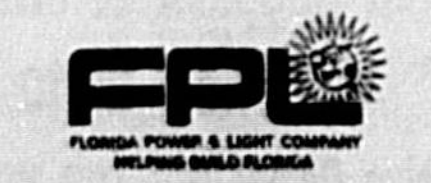
The frivolous elements in the social observance of the Christmas holidays came not from the North but from the Mediterranean countries. In Rome, the celebration of the winter solstice was an imagined return to the simplicity and brotherly goodwill of the Golden Age. During the week of the Saturnalia which began on Dec. 17, all class distinctions and rules of decorum were suspended. No official business was transacted, children were released from school and troops were imposed on battalions. Houses and public buildings were garlanded with flowers and evergreens. Gifts were exchanged, feasts were rampant and masks and mummers roamed the cobbled streets.



Modern man is apt to take holly for granted, although it is much admired, and used, during the Christmas Season. Yet even before the coming of the Christchild, holly had a niche unique in the history of men's relationship with plants.

Writings of the Greeks and Romans record the giving of holly branches and wreaths on happy occasions. Wedding guests brought holly to the newly married couple as an expression of their good wishes, and boughs were frequently given as gifts to friends to signify good-will. Its lustrous leaves and glossy berries entwined pagan revels throughout Europe, most notably the notorious Roman festival of Saturnalia.

Householders from the frozen North to the Mediterranean Isles brought holly into their dwellings to protect themselves from evil spirits. They believed it a haven for friendly fairies of the forest during the winter's cold, dark days. Branches were put in the barns, too, because its cheery brightness was believed to make the cattle thrive despite the bleak weather.

Persia's followers of Zoroaster believed the holly tree casts no shadow. They made a tea of holly leaves for use in religious ceremonies. In Germany, holly was called Christ-dorn, for it was thought that the crucifixion wreath was made of holly. In England, he who trod on holly berries was cursed with bad luck, for the robin who loves these berries was said to have plucked the thorns from Christ's brow. This was how he got his red breast, according to ancient legend.

**U.S. Freedom Christmas Gift December 1776**

Our religious freedoms are sometimes lightly regarded by certain Americans today, but back in the days when our country was very young, the freedom to worship as we pleased was one of the most precious victories of the Revolution.

The foundation for the preservation of the freedom to celebrate such beliefs as Christmas — this was the gift to our country on that very day in December 1776.

It happened when George Washington and his men won the battle at Trenton . . .

Apple (or orange) relays. Spinning platter to win a kiss. Bon-bon jousting tourney.

**EVERYBODY HAD A GOOD TIME**

THE EVES OR VIGILS of the different ecclesiastical festivals in the year are, in accordance with strict canonical rules, times of fasting and of penance. But in several instances, custom has appropriated them to very different purposes, and made them seasons of mirth and jollity." a 19th Century European social historian wrote, "Such is the case with All Saints' Eve, and more so with Christmas Eve. The whole of the latter season is still a jovial one, abounding in entertainments and merry-makings of all sorts, but is much changed from what it used to be with our ancestors . . . to whom it was an almost uninterrupted round of feasting and games."

A significant development toward democracy appeared on these occasions. Young and old joined in the games and entertainments (even those principally for children silhouetted above). Tradespeople and artisans were privileged callers at mansions, to share fully in dancing and feasting. Servants were partners of the heads of households in reels, waltzes, polkas, for erasures of prevalent social lines during traditional twelve days of Christmas.

Significantly, a favorite in 18th Century England was called "Hot cooties," something like "blind-man's bluff." The blindfolded player received a slap, and had to guess from the feel who gave it.

**Artists Who Gave Spirit to Merry Christmas**

CHARLES DICKENS' "A Christmas Carol" and C.C. Moore's "A Visit from St. Nicholas" ("Twas the Night Before Christmas") have been credited with doing the most to give the favored modern concept of Yuletide joyous spirit. Both men—and in fact, most memorable contributors to popular Christmas-time literature—have owed much to imagery provided by artists.

Moore's verses gained impact from drawings by Thomas Nast which enlivened and expanded earlier visualizations. Dickens' Cratchits, Scrooge, Fenwick, and other characters in "Christmas Carol" are remembered best as John Leech drew them in original editions.

Works of other English artists—William Hogarth, Thomas Rowlandson, George Cruikshank, Randolph Caldecott, John Tenniel, the pseudonymic "Alfred Crowquill," among them—would be adornments of walls in a gallery of great Christmas illustrations, as would be paintings of Norman Rockwell, lithographs of Currier & Ives, drawings by A. B. Frost, Nell Brinkley, Grace Drayton in the United States; W. Ralston in Australia; Jan Steen, the Brueghels, Ludwig Richter, Robin Jacques, Josef Keilner, and more in Europe who made Scandinavian, German, French, annual albums of Christmas sentiment cherished internationally.



**Snow Fun? Yes!**  
 Wintry months were hot times in Good Old Days

The snowmobile that bounces over snowbanks, like the beach buggy does sand dunes in summer, is just a contrivance to enable a softer, less adaptive modern generation to rediscover winter excitement and satisfactions as their long-gone great-grandparents (or much more remote ancestors) did. It may be surprising news to many, if not most, persons today that a majority of adults in northern parts of Europe and North America—also some corresponding geographical and climatical regions in other continents—enjoyed more frolic in sports or recreations in cold months than in the warm seasons.

Summer were generally times for work necessary to survival and prosperity; few persons could afford then to indulge in play or non-supporting activities. On the other hand, cold months, with sleet, ice, snow, tended to force cessation of various kinds of normal activities outdoors. But they also provided frozen ponds, lakes, rivers, roads, for enjoyment of skating, sleighing, or sliding with sails.

Commerce, or any kind of transportation, was broadened and expedited in cold months, paradoxically. In all zones where freezing occurred, the sled, became a popular vehicle for travel or simple enjoyment as an adventurous pastime. For before the second half of the 19th century in general, highways for public coaches or private carriages were too few, bone-baking or slow for ordinary folk to enjoy. Whereas a sleigh or sled was a vehicle almost any farmer or woodsman could build and, assuming he had a horse, mule, or even ox or bullock, his family could travel as freely, comfortably and as fast in winter as his most affluent neighbor. 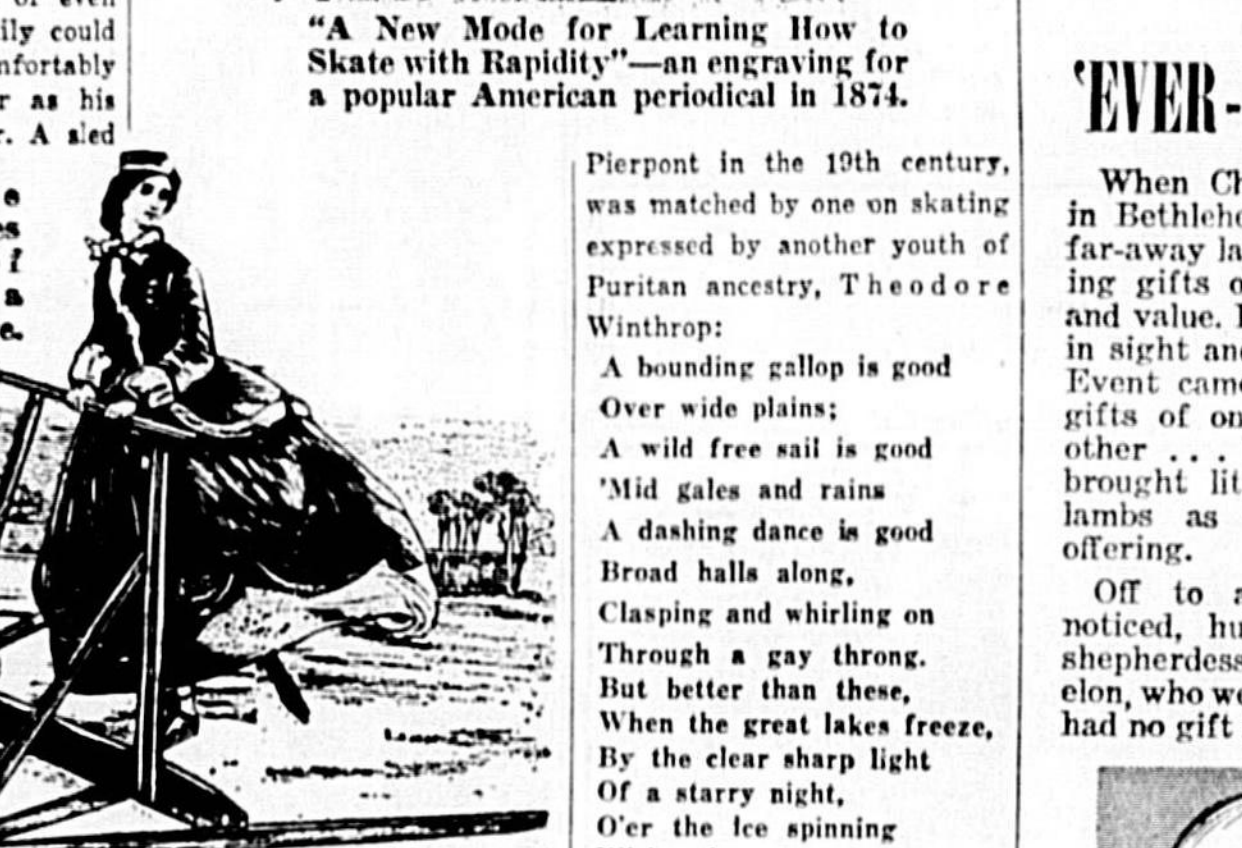

**Make Your Own Tree Ornaments**

This year make ornaments that the Christmas tree can wear now and you can wear later as jewelry when the tree is long gone. You'll be right in the swim of the Soviets... giving vent to self expression. And it's a project for the entire family, from youngest to oldest. For even the cruddiest renditions will have that "new" flavor.

Here's how to proceed: First you make a clay which is composed of two of your house-hold staples... baking soda and corn starch. Combine thoroughly in a saucepan two cups of the baking soda and one cup of the corn starch; then add 1 1/2 cups cold water. Mix until smooth. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cook a minute longer or until mixture resembles moist mashed potatoes (over-cooking makes clay crumbly). Remove from heat immediately, transfer to plate and cover with a damp cloth until cool enough to handle. Knead a little and store all but what you're about to use in a closed plastic bag.

Roll out clay on waxed paper to one-quarter inch thickness. Use cookie cutters for your basic shapes... stars, triangles, circles, etc. For base relief effect cut out smaller pieces with apple cutters or bottle caps or mold free hand, moisten and press into pre-cut larger shapes. Etch patterns with tip of knife. While clay is still soft, insert a twisted loop of wire into one edge for hanging. Ornaments will harden overnight. To speed up process, place on wire rack in warm (250 degrees) turned-off oven for a half hour.

**Making Of Ornaments Is Family Project**

That twinkling bauble in glowing colors hanging from your tree was no doubt mass produced by American wonder-makers, but up till fairly recently those little baubles were part of an industry which involved whole families.

Just as in medieval Europe families spent lifetimes weaving tapestries to hang on the manorial walls, so did Eastern European and Japanese families devote family skills to creating joy for your Christmas in the form of beautiful ornaments.

Many of our readers will recollect how in their childhood they were enthralled with the many colors, intricate shapes and sizes of these ornaments. Frequently they were heavy and bowed the tree limbs, but they lasted from one Christmas to another, and from one generation to another.

The fragile bubbles of glass, which are so much a part of the decorations of the Christmas tree, were once largely a cottage industry in Europe and Japan.

In the tiny villages that cling to steep mountainsides in eastern Europe whole families shared in the manufacturing process.

Special shapes and designs the exclusive property of certain families, the patterns frequently dating back for centuries unchanged.

Using a Bunsen burner, the father carefully blew the thin glass tubing to the desired shape, with the aid of an iron mold. His son removed the hot ornament to a cooling table. Next the mother silvered the inside, and the daughter applied painted designs.

Mechanical methods, developed in recent years by American glass manufacturers, have brought this picturesque industry to an end, except for rare instances where the handcraftsman art is still cherished.

**Christmas in Brazil, French Canada, and the Philippine Islands**

In Brazil, the Christmas season is in the nature of a fiesta. Yet it is solemnly heralded by an open-air Mass at midnight on Christmas Eve.

December 24 here is very tropical, with midsummer weather, which gives the Holiday distinction unknown in northern climes.

A colorful altar is set up in the Cathedral churchyard where the worshippers pray and chant religious hymns which reflect the Indian and native origins as well. Colorful banners and richly ornate religious trappings hail the Event of Christ's Birth.

After devotion the families have Christmas Eve supper in their homes.

French Canada celebrates Christmas with characteristic lightness of spirit yet intense religious feeling.

Christmas Day begins with a midnight Mass of great splendor, followed by the Revellon, an elaborate after-church dinner in the home.

Throughout the celebration is charmingly and simply observed... with great evidence of faith by the people.

On January 6 the Season ends with the feast of the Kings of Epiphany, celebrated with merriment and festivity. At this feast the traditional cake, Le Gâteau des Rois (The Cake of the Kings) is cut. It has a pea and bean in it. The man and woman receiving them are elected the King and Queen, respectively, of the Twelfth Night.

In the Philippine Islands colorful wreaths and chains of brilliant tropical flowers are worn by the children as they partake of the festive after-Mass parade. A band leads the parade, accompanying the children's singing.

A family dinner follows the after-Mass parade. Dancing and musical entertainment provide the celebrations for afternoon and evening.

The children do not have a Christmas tree but they deck their homes bountifully with flags, palms and colorful flowers adorn their homes, and a candle is kept burning in the window all night for the little Jesus and the lonely passerby. ◻ ◻ ◻

**Youths 'Dribble In' To Register For National Voting**

Seminole County's youth have been "just dribbling in" to register under the 18-year-old vote act, according to Camilla Bruce, supervisor of elections. Fifty-one have registered since the books were opened to them on Nov. 9. Among those and the very first on the list was this writer.

Of the 51 registered, 32 were boys, while 19 girls registered. Only one Negro has registered and of the 51 registered, 32 are 18-year-olds, 18 are 19-year-olds and 10 are 20-year-olds.

A breakdown shows that the boys have split almost evenly on party affiliations. Sixteen selected the Republican Party, 14 went to the Democratic Party, one signed up as an Independent and another registered under the Social Workers Party.

The girls, on the other hand, went almost entirely to the Democratic Party. Fourteen registered as Democrats, with four Republicans and one Independent.

In comparison with Orange County, Seminole County, 344,700 strong, has had only 75 sign up, with most of them 19 and 20-year-olds.

To date, the local office has had no instructions on the young voters registrations. Mrs. Dorothy Gibson, chief of elections division under the Secretary of State, told Mrs. Bruce that she has received no information on the matter since the Supreme Court gave its approval last week for national voting.

It will mean more work for the department, as it must issue special cards, and must keep special tabs on the young voters, so as to move them up after they reach their 21st birthday.

And right away, some of our military brass in Washington brand it as "propaganda."

And since they brought up the subject of propaganda... how about our casualties? For how many weeks now have we been told that it's the lowest ever: "only" three this day, or 10 all week... Did you know that as of this moment, for this year alone, there have been approximately 4,500 killed in "Nam"?

According to my math, that's an average of 90 per week. And then we have some who insist on referring to that total as ONLY so many killed...

I want our men out... NOW. Not after another 4,500 have been killed... nor to coincide with the elections in '72... not a lot of double-talk about how we can't do it right now.

Why not? Why not, right now?

South Vietnam has more men in uniform right now than does the Viet Cong... she has the comfort of complete air superiority, as well as the protection of our Navy (not counting all of the ships and boats we've turned over to them...)

So, if they have this vastly superior position right now and can't control the situation (that's one of the reasons I'm told we can't pull out now), then how will this situation change any in two years?

Other than sacrificing more American blood, that is...

**Further Delay On Decision Rumored Hassle Over Zoo Before City Again**

Petitions, spokesmen for concerned citizens groups and other interested spectators are expected to fill Sanford City Hall to overflowing tonight as backers of keeping the city zoo show their opposition to the City Commission's decision to phase out the attraction.

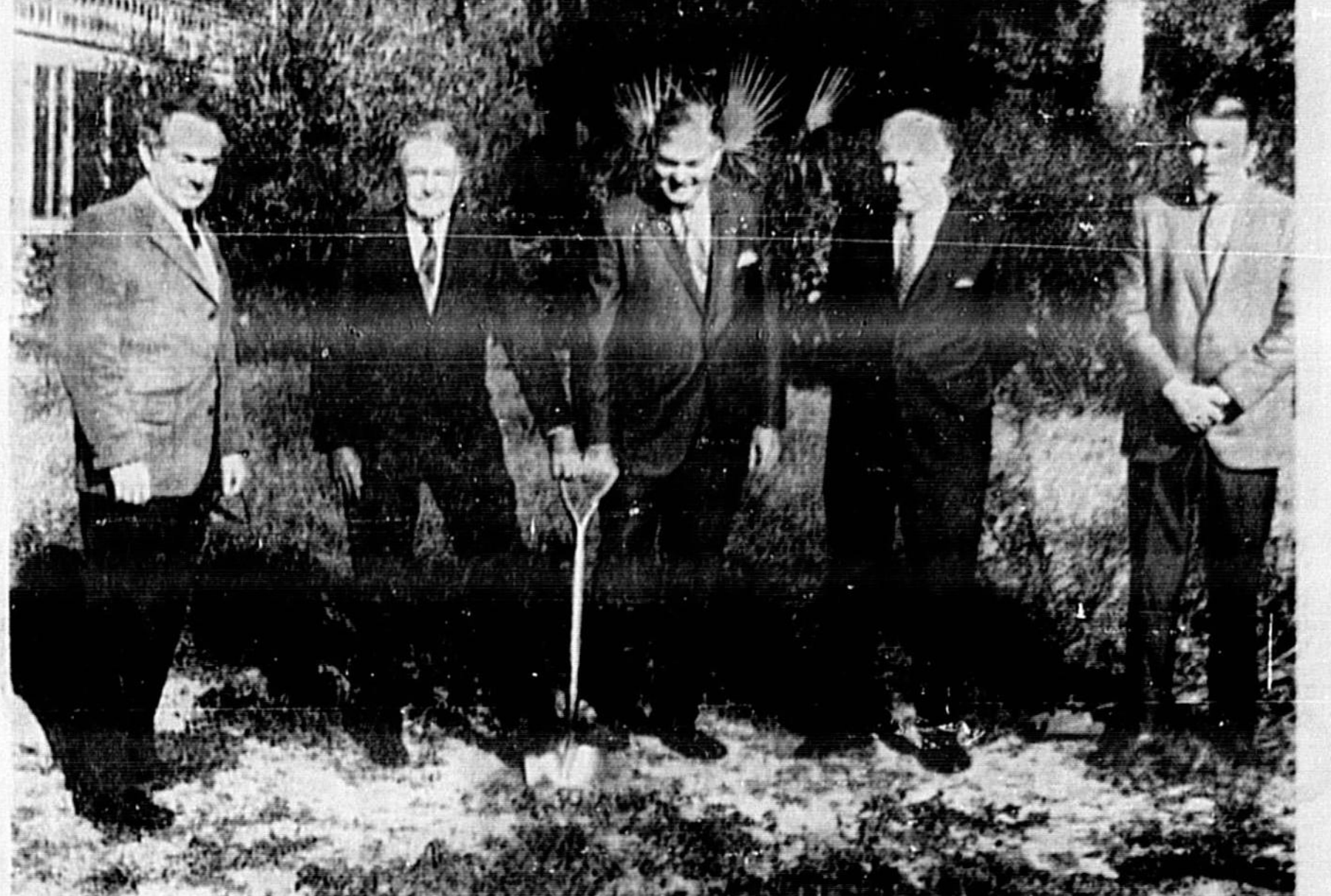
Representatives from SISTER, women's civic improvement group; Sanford school teacher Karen Gager's "Save the Zoo" movement; city of Sanford zoo committee and others have announced plans to keep the zoo at tonight's commission session.

The city's zoo committee, headed by its chairman, City Commissioner Gordon Meyer, will offer plans and suggestions for starting a non-profit zoological society to relocate the animals from the existing site to a new designated 14-acre zoo facility, located adjacent to The Sanford Herald.

City Commission will be asked to lease the new site for 99 years; the present site for two years and appropriate \$30,000 from budget funds originally slated for zoo relocation to the zoological group, now in the process of being formed.

The alternative to the society for zoo operation is a millage levy of up to four mills to be sought by a referendum to raise the estimated \$200,000 mentioned as costs to ready the new site.

Relocating public funds to private groups. These problems are expected to prevent the commission from acting on the zoning of the zoological society's requests immediately. Other agenda items to come before the commissioners include: Consideration of resolutions by a public hearing on the proposed paving of city's east-west streets in Goldsboro area; First readings of new city ordinances to amend city utility by ordinance to exempt churches; Presentation of city equipment bids.

**Headed House Armed Forces Unit Veteran Solon Dies Of Heart Failure**

**BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)** — Rep. J. Mendel Rivers, the colorful and controversial chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, died today at 81. He had undergone open heart surgery 11 days after he had undergone a similar operation in January.

Rivers was the hawkish chairman of the powerful congressional committee, was a hero to servicemen everywhere and a recurring thorn in the flesh of their civilian bosses. He took the servicemen's side in most Pentagon battles and aggravated presidents and defense secretaries alike with his insistence that Congress had a constitutional right to make major decisions affecting the military.

With his death, the chairmanship of the committee, under traditional seniority rules, passed temporarily to Rep. Philip J. Philbin, D-Miss.
