### Wealth And Social Standing Influence Promotions In State Department, Is Claim

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7.—(INS) Charges that "wealth and social prestige" are allowed to influence promotions in the State Department's foreign service were discussed today when it was learned that three officers have resigned in protest against this alleged discrimination.

Those who have tendered their resignations are Tracy Law, Consul-General at Buenos Aires, John Gay, foreign officer stationed in Panama, and Lawrence Dennis, second secretary at the legation in Nicaragua. To date only Gay's resignation has been accepted.

Tracy Law, who helped frame the Rogers Act, which was framed to do away with unfair promotions and to combine the consular and diplomatic services, has taken the stand that the State Department is not observing the provisions of the Rogers law in distributing promotions equally among consuls and

diplomats.

The Dennis letter brought the prevailing feeling of resentment to a head. This directly charged that certain foreign officers who possess the necessary influence and accept or decline posts offered them as they wish, while other officers are given no choice in the matter. The letter also asserted that political considerations are permitted to influence promotions.

Dennis has been transferred to the State Department and it was learned today, has been offered an important position in the division of Latin-American affairs, subject, presumably, to his withdrawal of his letter of resignation. Under Secretary of State Grew refused to discuss either the charges raised by Dennis or the report that he will be given an important post upon reaching here early next week.

### Tax Assessments From Everglades Drainage Area Total \$1,604,061.40

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 7.—The tax assessments of the Everglades drainage district, comprising 4,257,638 acres, amounted to \$1,604,061.40 during 1926, according to the tax department of the trustees of the internal improvement fund today.

There will be collected from the district \$30,629.94 through the one-mill maintenance tax; \$1,579,769.97 from the Everglades drainage district acreage tax; \$1,861.85 from acreage tax from the railroad right-of-ways; \$1,636.61 from the one-mill assessment on railroad and telegraph lines in the district; and \$163.63 from the one-mill assessment tax on personal property.

If the owners in the district fail to pay the taxes assessed against them, the land is offered for sale by the district, the same as state and county tax sales are sold. If individuals do not purchase the certificates of delinquent taxes, they are purchased by the trustees of the internal improvement fund and the drainage district is thus always assured of a total collection of the assessed taxes for the carrying on of their drainage work. It was pointed out by the tax department today.

Palm Beach county had the largest assessment of the 11 counties in the Everglades drainage district. The county had 1,010,264 acres in the district at a valuation last year of \$30,629,629. The one-mill drainage tax on this county amounted to \$6,137,190; and the Everglades acreage tax amounted to \$554,971.70.

Broward county had 682,211 acres in the Everglades drainage district valued at \$9,911,663; the one-mill drainage tax assessment was \$3,911.67 and the acreage tax \$36,577.77.

Collier county, \$325,708 acres; assessed valuation, \$335,210; one mill drainage tax, \$335.21; acreage tax, \$33,573.

### VANSWERINGEN Child Marriage Is More Truck Crops Under Cultivation Than Ever Before In Glades Section

WASHINGTON, Mar. 7 (INS) —The bitter fight waged by a group of minority stockholders of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad to prevent O. P. and M. J. Van Swearingen, Cleveland financiers, from linking up five big railroad properties into a billion dollar corporation which resulted in the plan being turned down by the Interstate Commerce Commission, is to be renewed.

This was the inference drawn today by close followers of the Van Swearingen merger proposal from the action of the minority group, headed by George S. Kemp and Lindsey Hopkins, of Richmond, Va., Secretary of the Interstate Commerce Commission, who refused to intervene in the Van Swearingen case now pending before the commission.

Their petition, promptly granted by the commission, was presented by Henry W. Anderson and Thomas F. Gay, Richmond attorneys, who successfully led the fight against the Van Swearingen merger last year.

The minority group oppose the plan sponsored by the Van Swearingens of having the Chesapeake & Ohio acquire the Erie and Pere Marquette through the purchase of capital stock. They also are opposed to the issuance of \$50,500,000 of capital stock by the Chesapeake & Ohio on the ground it is "not for a lawful purpose."

When the Van Swearingens had Kemp and Anderson named on the Chesapeake & Ohio board and made that board nucleus of the proposed merger instead of their own Nickel Plate system, it was believed they had achieved a master stroke in placing the disgruntled minority. The latest action of this group in intervening in the case indicates that the bitter fight will be renewed.

Their chances of success in defeating the aims of the Van Swearingen interests are believed to be somewhat dimmed. However, as the new merger plan is understood to have removed most of the objectionable financial features of the original plan.

### Child Marriage Is Being Studied By Lawmakers Of N.Y.

ALBANY, Mar. 7.—An intensive fight being waged in the New York State Legislature to provide for effective regulation of child marriages.

Upwards of a dozen marriage bills have been introduced at the present session, and advocates of this legislation hope the law makers will agree to pass at least one of the measures.

The bill which is most likely to be passed, according to Republican leaders of the Legislature, contemplates a five-day stay between the granting of a license and the wedding ceremony. It is sponsored by Senator William T. Bryne and Assemblyman John P. Hayes, Albany Democrats.

Another anti-child marriage bill for which a vigorous fight is being waged provides that in the event a girl is between 14 and 16 the marriage may take place only with the written consent of a justice of the supreme court or the judge of a children's court, in addition to the consent of the parents.

Another bill would make it a misdemeanor for any town or city clerk to knowingly issue a marriage license to a youth under 16 or a girl under 14. A fine of \$100 could be imposed.

### New York Merchant Is Reported Better

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 7. (INS)—There are more truck crops under cultivation in the Everglades Drainage District than ever in the history of Florida, Fred C. Elliott, state drainage engineer, declared to the International News Service upon his return from a tour of inspection of the district.

Elliott said that Everglades farmers are engaging in one of the most profitable seasons for truck crops they have ever had and the prices they have received in return for Everglades beans, peas, Irish potatoes, and other commodities have been excellent. Tomatoes are just coming out, he said.

From distribution points of Moore Haven, Clewiston, Belle Glade and Canal Point, 24 refrigerated cars and 3 express cars full of Everglades truck products left in one day of this week, Elliott reported.

"People in the Everglades district, and especially Moore Haven, are rehabilitating themselves faster than was expected," Elliott said.

The hurricane of September 18 that killed some 200 persons here wiped out the underrable buildings and poorly constructed structures and the people of the district are now doing better than in previous years.

"I also noticed a large number of field hands at work than ever before and it appears that there is a 'back to the farm' movement in the Everglades. The fields were dotted everywhere with men at work and this is something that was not noticeable in previous years."

Elliott remarked also that there was a large number of new residents in the Everglades district who are starting farms. Most of these are northern people he said.

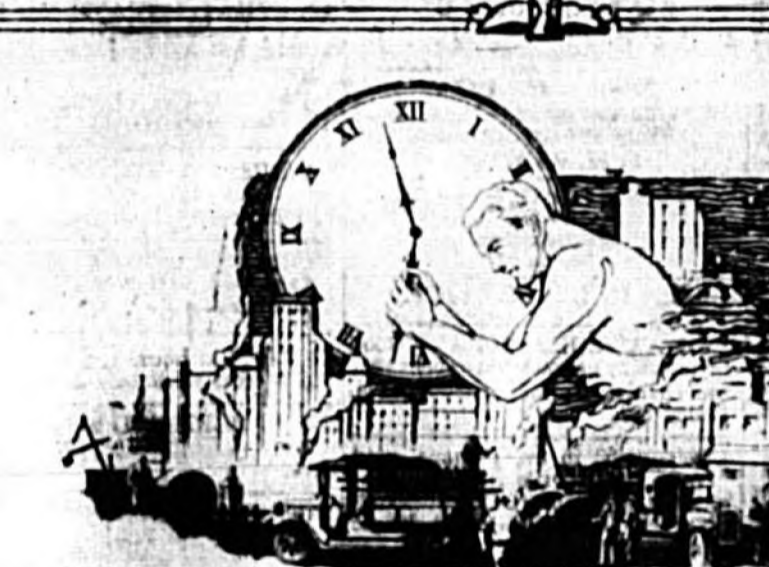
