



## KELLYS GIVEN LIFE, ENDING QUICK TRIAL

### Jury Deliberated One Hour Before Turning In Verdict Of Guilt Against Pair

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 12.—(A.P.)—George "Machine Gun" Kelly and his wife Kathryn were sentenced today to life imprisonment today a few minutes after a federal jury convicted them under the "Lindbergh Law" of the kidnaping of Charles Urschel, off millionaire.

The maximum sentences were pronounced by Judge Edgar Vaughn 15 days after the capture of the Kellys at Memphis, and only three days after they went to trial. Thus six of the nine persons convicted for the \$200,000 kidnaping conspiracy have been ordered to prison for the rest of their lives.

Federal agents had perfected plans to take Kelly by plane to the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary. His wife is to serve her sentence at the Women's Federal Prison in West Virginia.

The jury's verdict was reached last night after a deliberation of only one hour. Under the court's instruction however, it was sealed and was not returned until the court opened this morning.

"The court would feel it had been cowardly and derelict in duty if it had not pointed out this conviction that the defendant, Kathryn, was not wholly truthful," Judge Vaughn said to the jury yesterday.

"This court will not hesitate to tell you that Kathryn Kelly's testimony concerning her removal of the little girls from the Shan, non farm near Paradise, Tex., the day Mr. Urschel was brought there, did not sound convincing," said Judge Vaughn.

"Her conduct at the Coleman farm near Stratford, Okla., not only is a strong circumstantial point but is convincing to this court that Kathryn knew about the kidnaping and knowingly participated. Other testimony from this defendant is utterly convincing to this court that Kathryn Kelly had criminal knowledge of the abduction conspiracy.

"However, you can ignore my remarks altogether. They are not binding upon the jury."

## Raid Nips Plot To Storm Guard Armory

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—(A.P.)—Loaded pistols and a number of knives and clubs were seized by police today in raids on three headquarters of the Khaki Shirts of America while members of the organization were missing for a search on Washington.

Twenty one persons were taken in the raids and police said the cops slipped in the bud a plot to storm the armory of the 11th regiment of the Pennsylvania National Guard and seize the ammunition stored there.

In the meantime, police are searching for Art Smith, self-styled commander-in-chief of the Khaki Shirts.

It is estimated that several hundred members of the group had mobilized and were waiting for Smith for their trip to Washington when they were raided. Arresting plans for the journey were time ago, Smith said it is their intention to "install" President Roosevelt as dictator of the United States.
