# Rock Lake student: 'They will all die'

Middle school student charged with bomb threat to 8thgraders

LONGWOOD - Brendan A. May, thirteen, put a scare into the community - probably more so into himself - on

He came to Rock Lake Mid-die School just another kid on just another school day, By

Seminole County Juvenile Assessment Center because of alleged plans he was making to kill his classmates.

May was charged with threatening to discharge a destructive device - a felony.

School and law enforcement officials took caution when one of the 7th-grader's friends alerted them to plans the youngster had to do harm to others at the school...

Deputy Sheriff Jo-Ann Strinko found a map and hand-written notes in Brendan May's school locker that necessitated further investigation. The map includes drawings of the achool hallways

and a note reading, "hide bomb in globe in science."

Strinko **Immediately** checked the two world globes located in the science room but found nothing. She also searched the student's backpack but found no gun. Quietly, May was taken from school to the assessment cen-Boo Bomb, Page SA

# Rock Lake incident causes little disruption

LONGWOOD - The arrest of a Rock Lake Middle School student who threatened to kill all

the eighth graders was made with little disruption to classes, school officials said.

Brendan A. May, 13, told two students he wanted to take his dad's sun and kill all the state his day. the 8th graders at Rock Lake Middle School, was arrested on Tuesday. A school administrator found a map in May's locker with plane to place a bomb in the science room and shoot "till eighth

"He is very remoracful," Ron Pinnell, director of secondary education for Seminole County schools, said. "He is very sorry he said these things."

Pinnell said it appears May made the threats 'just for

May had discussed his plans with told a school teacher. The teacher told School Resource Deputy Jo-an Stronko. Classes were not disrupted. investigators have not found a pun or bomb on campus, Pin-nell said.

"They were quiet and discreet," Pinnell said.

May's threat comes a week after a pair teenagers killed more than a dozen students. faculty and staff at Columbine gh School in Littleton, Colo. Pinnell said that because no lives were lost, this is not a

# Parents protest principal's transfer to Milwee Middle

LONGWOOD - On the same day a Rock Lake Middle School student was arrested for threatening to kill all the 8th graders who picked on him, the School Board also announced that the school's popular principal Paul Cave is transferring to Milwee Middle

Nearly 40 Rock Lake Middle School parents, students and teachers packed the School Board chambers Tuesday to protest Cave's transfer. They said Cave is instrumental in making the school successful,

safe and secure. "Our children feel safe," parent Tim Newton said. "It is

a well organized operation." Four parents, two teachers, and an eighth-grade student asked the School Board to not transfer Cave. The teachers said they learned of Cave's transfer during a morning faculty meeting. The parents said their children came home

# Why would kids join a gang?

This is the third of a threepart series examining gang activity in Seminole County, as well as violence and drugs in Seminole County schools. To-day: What can be done if your child is involved in a gang?

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Imagine walking into a child's room and seeing hand-painted satanic pictures hanging on the

A teenage giri who was active in a satanic gang in the Oviedo area nearly one year ago created a shrine for devilworship in her room. Her mother called counselors and the Seminole County Sheriffs gang suppression unit for

help. "The pictures were gro-tesque," Tony Diaz, the head of the Seminole County Sheriff's gang suppression unit,

At first, the girl resisted giving up "total control of the home," and was "pretty set in her ways," Diaz said.

in time, the girl left the gang and agreed to move with her mother away from the area. A small number of gang members in the Oviedo area are involved in devil-worship, according to the gang suppression unit.

"We cleaned up the room," Diaz said. "She needed to receive help."

Not all stories of children who are involved in street gangs have happy endings. In fact, by the time investigators deal with young gang members, they tend to be set in their ways. But, there are steps parents and friends can take if they are concerned a

teenager may be involved in gang activity.

Better still, parents and

others in a child's life who instill a sense of love and positive self-worth can prevent gang activity before it begins. 'it's much harder to get a kid out of a gang than to pre-vent a kid from joining." Diaz

Those who join gangs usually have low self-esteem, feel unloved at home, do poorly in school, and have a hard time communicating with others and making decisions, Diaz

Members are seeking fun, a sense of belonging, companionship, attention, and financial gain. They are strongly influenced by peer pressure.

"Kids join gangs to satisfy emotional and physical needs," Diaz said.

Diaz said parents should

pay attention to the music children listen to, including gangeta rap.

Gang members in the county range in age from 13 to 21, but can be as young as nine. Ten percent of the county's gang members are girls, according to the gang suppression unit.

Many gang members in the county adopt slashes on the skin, shaved eyebrows, tattoos, closely cropped short hair, and rolled up pant legs. The three main characteris-

ties of a gang member are an immediate need for gratification, a distorted view of reality leading to a sense of fatalism. and a strong survival instinct. They will do anything to

survive," Diaz said. Cang Suppression Unit members frequently give pres-





A taste of Oviedo will have a new wrinkle this year as Bell-South will have two line trucks providing free "bucket rides" for young and old altke.



# Going private with public education

Five years ago this week, the Santa Monica Freeway reopened. The story provides a worthwhile history lesson for advocates of education reform (that's right!).

It may be recalled that two vital portions of the freeway collapsed in January 1994 during the Northridge earthquake. California state officials rechoned that repairs would take as many as two years.

However, because closure of the world's busiest thoroughfare was costing the Los Angeles economy an estimated \$1 million a day, those same state officials decided that they ought to accelerate the repair.

So they set a five-month deadline. And rather than task public employees with completing the repairs, they turned the job over to the private sector. And, io and behold, not only did a private construction firm meet the state's five-month deadline, but it actually finished 74 days ahead of sched-

So here's the lesson: If a private company could successfully repair a major public freeway ahead of schedule (not to mention under budget), why are government officials doubtful that the private sector can be similarly succeasful in improving the academic performance of youngsters mired in the nation's worst public schools?



Indeed, the public sector has been "reforming" education for the past two decades, at least. And elementary and secondary school students are no smarter in 1999 - as measured by scholastic achievement — than they were in 1979.

So it's high time that state and local governments give the private sector a fair shot at education reform. Indeed, private individuals, companies and foundations are already beginning to make a positive difference in the education arena.

Like the Children's Scholarship Fund, co-founded by John Walton, an heir to the Wal-Mart fortune, and venture capitalist Ted Forstmann. The pair has underwritten their fund with \$100 million of their own money, which is to be matched by local partners throughout the country.

The fund provides scholarships of \$600 to \$1,600 to low-income parents This enables the parents to liberate their kids from bad public schools and enroll them in better private or parochial schools.

That's not to say that the private sector is unsupportive of public achools. Indeed, one of the biggest supporters of excellence in elementary and secondary education is the Milken Family Foundation, co-founded by Michael Milken, the former junk bond financier, and his brother Lowell.

Then there's the private sector part-nership with a public school system for the purpose of improving education at a given school or schools. The New York-based for-profit Edison Project, founded seven years ago by millionaire Christopher Whittle, falls into

that category.

Edison boasts 51 schools in 12 states. The Edison school day is three hours longer than the average public school day and its school year is about 25 days longer.

And Edison schools boast a rigorous curriculum, concentrating on the classics in literature, science and the humanities, and giving students one hour a day in art, music or physical educa-

Edison students are also instructed In "character education," with emphasis on such virtues as honsely, respect and responsibility.

These sheptics, these critics, believe that the public education establishment alone knows best how to educate America's schoolchildren. And that the private sector ought to stick to things it knows best — like building freeways.


This kind of education chauvinism might be tolerable — somewhat — if only a tiny minority of public school children were underschieving academically. But when two-thirds of the nation's fourth-graders cannot read up

### Prognosis for Paget's disease

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diag-nosed with Paget's disease. My serum alkaline phosphatase is 795. I experi-ence extreme fatigue and weakness. Sometimes my hearing is impaired. What is the cause and prognosis of

DEAR READER: Actually, Paget's disease refers to two dissimilar ailments: A form of breast disease and a disorder of bone. I assume that you are referring to a bone abnormality.

are referring to a bone abnormality.

Paget's disease of bone is a slowly progressing affliction, marked by spotty bone destruction in certain areas, followed by realignment of calcium in an abnormal pattern, resulting in bone deformity. The bones most commonly affected are the skull (few if any symptoms) and the weightbearing bones (leading to painful fractures). The diagnosis i.: ordinarily established by two means; X-ray established by two means; X-ray examinations show the rounded, examinations show the rounded, "punched-out" appearance of Paget lesions; the alkaline phosphatase blood test is elevated (normal values in most labs are 20 to 70 units). Patients often complain of bone pain, kidney stones and impaired hearing. Fractures are common. Heart failure DR. GOTT PETER GOTT, M.D.

and the appearance of bone malignan-cies are rare but do occur. Weakness

is not ordinarily a symptom of the dis-order. The cause is unknown. If your doctor has diagnosed your problem as Paget's disease, through X-rays and blood tests, you probably need treatment. Remember, however, that Paget's disease can, in some

instances, resemble a bone disorder caused by the spread of cancer from various organs. Although most patients with mild-

to-moderate forms of Paget's disease need no therapy, they should be examined at periodic intervals. Severe disease, on the other hand, almost always needs attention from a

bone specialist or an endocrinologist, because the standard therapy for the disorder (Fosamax and other drugs) may not be sufficient.

Without treatment, the prognosis for your disease is unfavorable. Given your astronomically high alkaline phosphatase, I believe that you need a specialist. You may require experimental drugs to maintain your inde-

on a personal note, one of my patients is a 99-year-old gentleman who has been treated with medication for more than 20 years. His Paget's disease has stabilized. He is in great shape. I love him.







I don't think that three or four minutes to get to class at Millennium Middle School is enough because our campus is so spread out that we don't have time to get to class.



I have heard many other students complaining about it as well. My teachers think that I have enough time to get to my classes when I don't, even if I don't stop to talk to my friends and go straight to class.


I wish they would consider extending our time between classes to at least five or six minutes.
