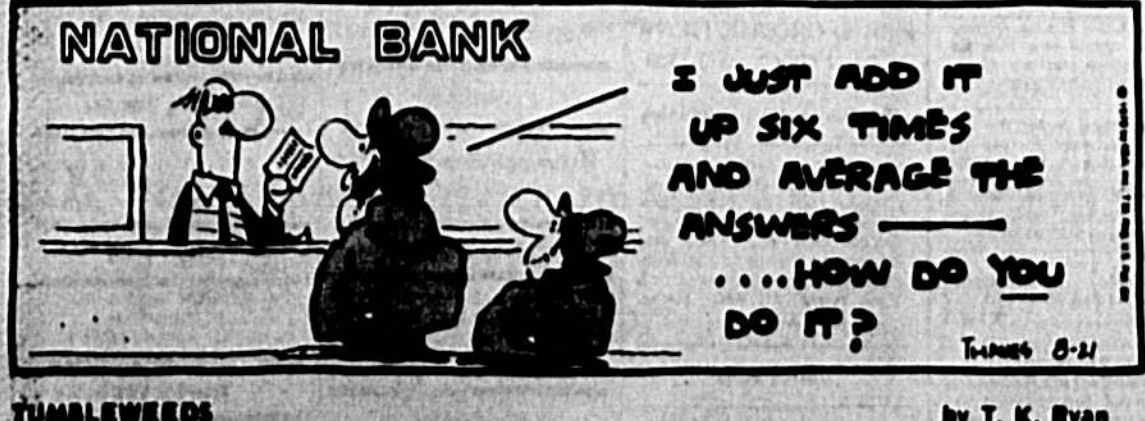

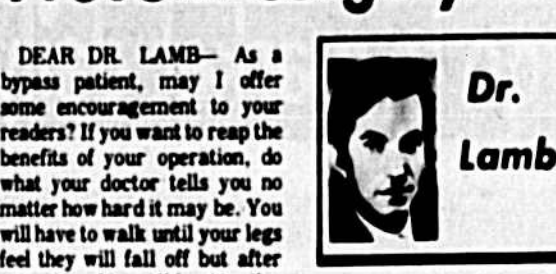

Exercise May Help Prevent Surgery



DEAR DR. LAMB—As a bypass patient, may I offer some encouragement to your readers? If you want to reap the benefits of your operation, do what your doctor tells you no matter how hard it may be. You will have to walk until your legs feel they will fall off but after you get used to walking 10 miles at a stretch, it becomes easy. Just be sure to get some thick-soled shoes. Sneakers will just not fill the bill. A treadmill will keep you in good shape in just about 14 months of walking. I was able to discontinue all medication. I eat no meat but eat fish, fish or turkey. Of course, chicken is good if you have cooked it without skin, but I don't eat chicken. Get off salt at the table. The natural salt in food is all you need after you get accustomed to it. Don't borrow trouble with your imagination. After you get in shape with lots of good exercise, your heart rate will settle down to a good easy rhythm.

Later you might experience some minor pains in the tissues in between your ribs and sternum, but as long as you can touch the pain with your fingers it does not mean anything. Be sure to tell your doctor during your check-ups. Remember you probably have several hundred small scars in the chest tissues due to the cutting and stretching during surgery and sometimes these scars hurt. Remember exercise is the name of the game if you want to get well.

DEAR READER—Thank you for your good words. Many readers with coronary bypass operations will appreciate your attitude. I would like to point out, however, that many patients with coronary artery disease can improve significantly by following the

same routine without surgery. It's much smarter to take preventive measures before surgery than having to do them after surgery. If you're in the coronary age group like most middle aged American men are, an adequate daily walking program with other exercise and diet could eliminate the need for surgery. That way a person can avoid all those little pains that follow the surgery that you talk about.

The diet is important and it must be a diet that causes a person to eliminate every ounce of excess body fat, not just part of it. I'm not in complete agreement with your diet since both veal and baby beef contain as much cholesterol as mature beef. The point is to eat very lean meat, cutting away all the fat before cooking. Eliminating fat makes it easier to lose weight. I'm sending you The Health Letter number 1-3, Diet, Preventing Atherosclerosis for general guidelines that will help you. With the exception of severe cases and certain by special X-ray studies, I feel that every candidate for a bypass operation should first try a strict dietary program coupled with a sensible exercise program. Of course, cigarette smoking should be totally and completely eliminated.

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WORLD IN BRIEF

Jomo Kenyatta, Founder Of Kenya, Dies At 85

NAIROBI, Kenya (UPI) — Jomo Kenyatta, the last of Africa's original nationalist leaders and the father of this thriving East African nation since it gained independence from Britain in 1963, died peacefully in his sleep today, the government announced.

He was about 85 years old though his exact birthdate was never established. Kenyatta died at Statehouse in the Indian Ocean port of Mombasa at 3:30 a.m. today (8:30 p.m. Monday EDT), an official statement said.

The government ordered all flags in this moderate East African nation to be flown at half mast and urged the country's 16 million people to remain calm.

SAN JUAN Puerto Rico (UPI) — More than 450 tons of oil in a slick 12 miles long and 300 yards spread across the Caribbean today, the result of a collision between a Brazilian freighter and a Greek tanker about 180 miles southwest of Puerto Rico.

Soviet Scientists: Save Seals

MOSCOW (UPI) — Soviet scientists warn that ringed and Baltic seals are almost extinct, the Tass news agency reported. The scientists, calling for killing restrictions, said inventories on the Gulf of Riga, Gulf of Finland and Lake Ladoga showed there are fewer than 200 seals per breeding spot in contrast to 1,000 seals 15 years ago.

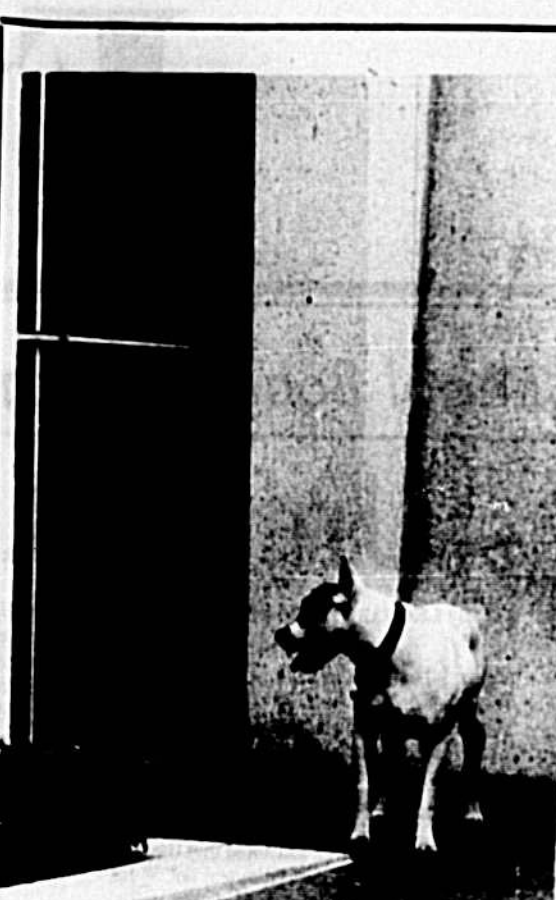

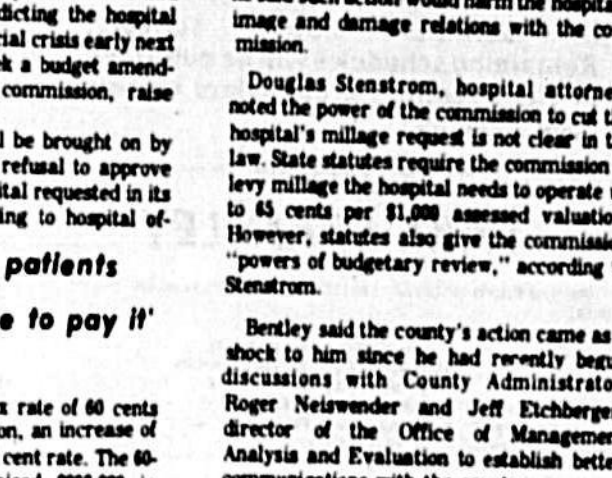

The American Telephone & Telegraph Company (AT&T) has had a new schedule of overseas rates with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) which decreases the charges for most overseas calls and increases the daytime rate to the United Kingdom. Rates to Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands will not be affected.

Additional minute rates reduced for most overseas calls

The additional minute rates are being reduced from about 6% to 20% for calls to most overseas countries and areas.

Exceptions to proposed rate reduction

All of the above rate changes are applicable to all overseas countries and areas except the Bahamas, Bermuda, Cuba, St. Pierre and Miquelon.

All overseas calls to be discounted 15% during next 12 months

In addition to the rate reductions mentioned above, a temporary 15% discount will apply to all overseas calls. The purpose of the discount is to pass along to telephone customers the refund COMSAT has received for satellite rentals from AT&T.

International dial rates to 47 countries

The proposed new international daytime dial rate for calls between the U.S. and the U.K. that are billed in the United States will be 25% higher.

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High-Risk Opportunity

President Carter has accepted the risk of failure at the summit when he meets with Menem, Begin and Anwar Sadat at Camp David the day after Labor Day.

That's good. It took courage, but it was a necessary step in order to keep alive the peace hope engendered by Sadat's visit to Jerusalem last November.

The Jerusalem visit was unprecedented. This summit meeting on the Middle East is unprecedented.

But unprecedented actions are required to break the deadlock of the status quo.

There must be risk-taking by all parties to give peace a chance.

And there was news just Monday that Egyptian President Sadat is taking the upcoming summit as seriously as he can. Word is that he is preparing a detailed three-part peace plan to present at the meeting.

So that is encouraging.

Mr. Begin is also taking the summit seriously, this week suggesting that the United States must continue to play a role as a broker, that is not offer a plan of its own.

We agree.

Realistically, this country cannot impose a settlement and should not undertake to guarantee one through dangerous treaty commitments.

Egypt and Israel must come to terms themselves if their peace is to be meaningful and enduring.

Those who would display their courage only on the battlefield will never succeed in making peace in the Middle East simply because no military solution is possible.

Total victory can be ruled out as a possibility for either side.

The U.S. position has been, in effect, to guarantee the continued existence of a sovereign state of Israel by military aid, economic aid and firm pledges of support.

On the other hand, it has been the official position of the United States, ever since the 1967 war, that Israel will eventually have to relinquish control over the Arab lands occupied in that war.

That is the position of the United Nations and it is the position of the U.S. government.

At stake are the territories of Gaza and the West Bank of the Jordan River - lands apportioned to the Arabs in the 1948 partition of Palestine.

The lands question lies at the center of the present impasse.

We hope that with President Carter sitting at the negotiating table, some compromise can be worked out between the Arabs and the Israelis.

Both sides must be flexible. The compromise must protect the security of Israel's borders. But it cannot deprive the Arabs of the prospect of eventually regaining sovereignty over their lands.

WASHINGTON — If you're one of the millions of Americans who like to get back to nature and visit one of our national parks, you know how difficult it is to find accommodations. Each summer the reservations lists at the government-owned hotels and camps get longer, and the lines of traffic inching bumper-to-bumper into the more popular parks.

Government agencies and their VIP guests have no such problems when they want to get away from it all in the sylvan serenity of federal parkland. Unlike the ordinary taxpayers who support it all, these privileged few can check into one of five luxuriously appointed lodges maintained by the National Park Service in some of the most scenic locations.

Camp Hoover, deep in the picturesque woodlands of Shenandoah National Park, is one of the most popular of these rustic lodges. During the Nixon years, it was a favorite retreat for White House aides who wanted to get away from the Motorcade heat of the Watergate scandal.

This dubious precedent hasn't discouraged billions of other party from taking advantage of the camp's undeniable attractions, located only a mile from the federal offices. In the last two years, the rustic charm of Camp Hoover has lured such Carter administration notables as Vice President Walter Mondale, State Secretary Cyrus Vance, Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus and Federal Energy Regulatory

Chairman Charles Curtis. Nor have members of Congress been able to resist an occasional weekend in the woods. In the past two years, Camp Hoover guests have included Sen. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., Bob Packwood, R-Ore., Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, Gary Hart, D-Colo., and Wendell Anderson, D-Minn. Also Reps. Phillip Ruppe, R-Mich., Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, David Evans, D-Ind., Jerry Patterson, D-Calif., Henry Waxman, D-Calif., John Chafee, R-R.I., and William Brodeur, D-Mich.

Brinkerhoff House, an elegant lodge with huge stone fireplaces, high beamed ceilings and breathtaking picture-window views of Wapping's Jackson Lake and the Grand Teton Mountains, has been host in recent years to Reps. James Santill, D-Nev., and Tom Rucella, D-Wyo. "With Jack Anderson's abuse" financial comments in the state register on one visit.

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Liberal Can Hurt Carter?

WASHINGTON (NEA) — United Auto Workers chief Douglas A. Fraser was merely saber-rattling last month when he publicly spied with the Carter administration and started talking about the need for a new liberal-labor alliance.

Key UAW strategists are planning to meet this coming week (Aug. 21-25) to discuss the next steps toward convening a fall meeting of union leaders, liberals and social activists disenchanted with the performance of both Carter and the Democratic Congress.

Through its internal union publications, the giant UAW has already started beating the drums for a new political alliance, perhaps even a new political party — forged from elements of the traditional New Deal coalition plus the social and political activists of the 1970's.

Fraser's determination to pursue such a course — and the interest expressed by him by other liberal unions and political groups such as Americans for Democratic Action — spells serious trouble for Jimmy Carter and perhaps for the Democratic Party as well.

The 1.3-million-member UAW played a crucial role in Carter's election and stuck with the beleaguered president longer than most other major unions.

But Carter's inability to push labor-backed legislation through Congress, and his retreat from comprehensive national health insurance, led to disillusionment and frustration.

"New right" conservatives within the Republican Party have been talking for some years now about the possibility of deserting the GOP to establish a "pure" conservative party.

This, however, is the first time any significant discussion has occurred about a similar move on the left. The chances are that the liberals will remain within the Democratic fold, when all is said and done, but that may prove small consolation to Jimmy Carter.

The left in the Democratic Party, like the right wing of the GOP, has a corner on enthusiasm and activism. It marshaled by Fraser and others, the liberals could very well deprive Carter of a second term.

A Near Disaster

DETROIT (UPI) — The Feminist Federal Credit Union, founded five years ago to help women achieve financial independence, came close to purchasing the Women's City Club building in downtown Detroit.

The Detroit-based institution, first of its kind in the nation, attracted a healthy membership and \$11 million in assets during its first two years of existence, then plunged a little too deeply into the sea of high finance.

The credit union, owned and operated by women but with a membership that is about 10 percent male, dealt solely in small loans until it decided to let a small group of investors borrow \$50,000 to purchase the Women's City Club building in downtown Detroit.

The group made an unsuccessful attempt to turn the building into a women's social center and defaulted on the loan in late 1978.

Not only were the financial repercussions severe, but the development also undercut confidence in the stability of the credit union and it lost most of its members.

"The circumstances involved in that transaction created ill feelings among much of the membership," said Karen Zeln, credit union treasurer and manager of its headquarters in suburban Oak Park.

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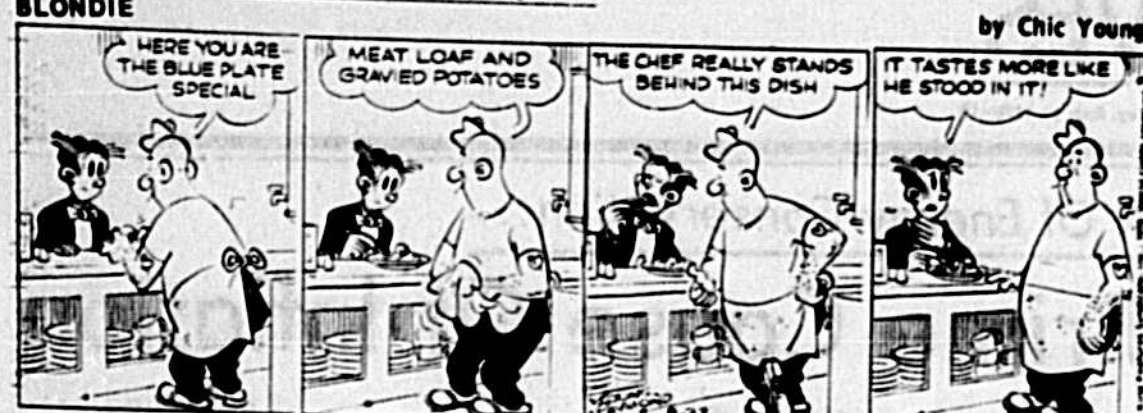
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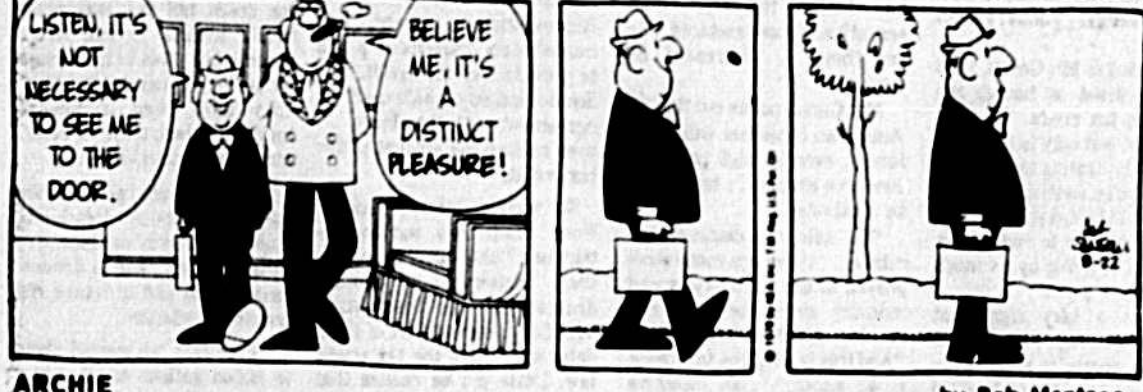

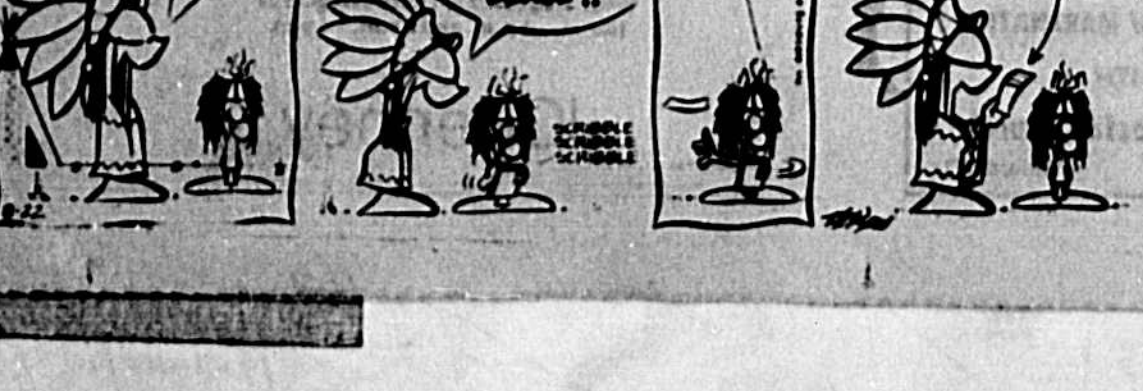

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a woman 80 years of age in good health and quite active with plants in the garden and pot plants. I do all my housework, read and listen to music very classical. I enjoy operas. I live alone but keep busy. I'm concerned because a year ago I began developing bunions. I think bunions look terrible. Mine are not very big yet and don't hurt. Is there something I can do about bunions?
DEAR READER - Most bunions are associated with bad shoes. The chief offender is the pointed toe, with or without an associated high heel. Any shoe with the big toe is forced outward the abnormal position causes irritation where the big toe joins the rest of the foot. The irritation and inflammation gradually thickens the tissue in that area and creates the bunion which you're describing.
The best thing you can do is change your shoes at once to those with sufficient room to allow you to move all your toes freely. I would also recommend eliminating high heels in case you happen to be using them. A low-heeled comfortable shoe with plenty of room for your toes will go a long way toward preventing any progression of your bunions.

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 25-year-old female with heavy coarse hair on my chin. This is a hereditary problem for females on my father's side of the family. Enclosed is an ad for a device supposedly used by doctors to remove hair. Is it safe for me to buy this instrument to remove hair?
I am a reader of your column and you have helped with many problems. I was especially thankful for your column on ice eating. After reading the article I visited my doctor and was told that ice eating to solve my hair problem. I had gotten to the point where I would have for ice to eat. Now I don't have that problem.
Regarding the electrical device to remove hair from the face, I don't recommend this as a do-it-yourself project. Electrolysis is an effective means of removing hair but for it to be effective, the proper amount of current has to be delivered to the root of the hair (hair follicle). If you deliver too much you can injure the tissue and cause scarring. When electrolysis was first used for this purpose it got a bad name because many of the operators either didn't know how to use the device or the devices weren't adequate to control the electric current delivered to the root of the hair.
My best advice to anyone who has a hair problem of sufficient magnitude to warrant it is to go see a professional and let them do the electrolysis process. If you have a dermatologist, he can either do it himself or refer you to someone in the area capable of doing it.

Sanford: Will It Become 'Train-Town USA?'

Sanford's interested Sarahs To Encourage Rejuvenation (SISTER) plans to push for development of a mini-train to aid public transportation in Sanford and draw Auto-Train customers to the city's business district. Val Colbert, chairman of SISTER's Train Town Project, will present a proposal to the Sanford City Commission Monday to change the city's slogan from the "Friendly City" to "Train Town USA" as a first step toward securing the mini-train.

The train would consist of a small locomotive and one passenger car that could carry up to 20 people, according to Mrs. Colbert.

Mrs. Colbert has already discussed the matter with Dick McFadden, who represents Trolley Lines, Inc., Ft. Lauderdale.

"Mr. McFadden said for Sanford they would design and build a special train on wheels," said Mrs. Colbert. "The train would cost about the same amount as a trolley car, Mrs. Colbert quoted McFadden as saying. Trolley Lines is building trolley cars for Winter Park and Daytona Beach at a cost of \$60,000 per car.

The train could be rented and operated at a cost of \$175 per day by Trolley Lines, according to Mrs. Colbert.

Mrs. Colbert is not sure how the train would be financed. However, she said today SISTER may approach the city commission and/or the Seminole County Commission to the cost of rental or purchase. The county commission was informed of the train idea in a letter from Mrs. Colbert this week.

"I think the first thing we need to do is establish the train could also relieve traffic problems downtown, according to Mrs. Colbert, by stopping at municipal parking lots and taking commuters to work and shopping areas.

Unlike the trolley, the special train would not require a track, said Mrs. Colbert.

"It will be on wheels that will not need a track," said Mrs. Colbert. "so they could go out to the zoo or anywhere they want. I think it would be a good idea to go to Braun Towers and the hospital, because those old people don't have a way to get around in a lot of cases.

"I thought the train would tie in real great if Sanford develops the train town concept," said Mrs. Colbert.

"I thought the train could make a stop at the Auto-Train and take people downtown for an hour. It would be a nice break for them and while they are there they could spend money," she said.

Contempt Probe Not Ended, Says State's Attorney

Warning From Nicaragua Officials Palace Siege: No \$\$ Till Hostages Out

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) - Nicaragua authorities said today the initial guerrillas holding the National Palace with about 60 people trapped inside must allow some of the hostages to go free before negotiations on their demands for \$10 million and amnesty can begin.

The guerrillas have threatened to kill their hostages but have not shot at a deadline.

A government statement to the guerrillas said, "We must demand that you release the women, children, wounded and dead. This is the condition for negotiations."

The government also asked for an additional 36 hours to consider the guerrillas' demands.

"A spokesman for the presidential press office denied reports that a number of hostages already had left the palace. "No, that's absolutely false," the spokesman said.

About two dozen heavily armed members of the Sandinista Liberation Front, which has been waging a guerrilla war against the regime of President Anastasio Somoza Debayle, burst into the palace Tuesday.

Four people were killed and 15 wounded in the initial assault during a one-hour gun battle with National Guard forces.

Fred Debaty, the president's cousin, who was slightly wounded in the assault and was evacuated, said the hostages were bound and hurled into a library.

The number of people actually being held at gunpoint by the guerrillas in the sprawling government building, was not clear Monday, according to witnesses, the hostages included cabinet officials and a majority of the nation's 70-member Chamber of Deputies.

Most of the government workers in the building were believed to have fled to other offices, but some guerrillas looted all the cash, the presidential spokesman said.

Somoza was meeting with cabinet ministers and officials of the national guard.

Somoza's Summa Carolina Archbishop Miguel Obando y Pino said he hopes to meet into the palace Tuesday to confer with the guerrillas and reported their demands to the government.

In its statement early today, the government said the guerrillas had made seven demands.

In addition to the \$10 million, the demands included a general amnesty for all political prisoners and safe passage for all Sandinistas currently in jail in Costa Rica, Venezuela, Mexico or Panama.

"They also wanted guerrillas communication to be published in the national press and broadcast daily."

And they demanded they be granted safe passage to Panama with their hostages.

In reply, the government statement said, "We carefully read your demands and we're analyzing them to try to arrive at a reasonable solution. However, no condition that meeting your demands is conditioned by a series of circumstances that do not depend exclusively on the government of Nicaragua."

"For those reasons, we need an additional 36 hours to answer your positions."

The guerrillas, including a woman who is acting as spokesman, addressed each other only by names. They were armed with submachineguns, high-power rifles and hand-made bombs.

The hostages, all first used as human shields against government forces, were being kept bound and gagged.

The prison received reinforcement by a major counterforce that included Capt. Oscar Sierra, Somoza's minister to the south. The guards, numbering 750 in the National Guard, cut off access through Nicaragua, closed buildings and sealed ground routes to the already shelled situation.

The government closed Somoza airport and border crossing points.

Somoza declared a national state of emergency and sent the National Guard into the streets of Managua and other major cities.
