

# Florida Needs Businessman, Burns Says

Gubernatorial candidate Harry Burns, mayor of Jacksonville, said Thursday a poll showing two of his opponents running ahead in the race is "wishful thinking."

Burns, speaking at Clearwater, said he felt the people of Florida prefer a businessman candidate "rather than a continuation of the regime of lawyers."

Burns referred to a newsman's poll which recently showed Doyle E. Carlton Jr. of Wauschula, and C. Farris Bryant of Ocala ahead of the 12-man field seeking nomination in the May 3 primaries.

He called "ridiculous" a statement by "a certain gubernatorial candidate that he can save \$50 million a year of wasted funds in state government."

Burns didn't mention him by name but he referred to Bryant's claim.

Two other candidates spoke about reappointment Thursday.

At Fort Lauderdale, Carlton said he can be achieved only through a constitutional amendment. He said, "If we do not change the present section of the constitution on reappointment, there is little we can do for our more populous counties."

At Fort Walton Beach, John McCarty of Fort Pierce said he has no outstanding alliances with the legislature and is in a "good position to act as leader and as a peace-maker and help effect a fair reappointment for North as well as South Florida."

At Orlando, candidate Ted David of Hollywood criticized sales tax exemption given Florida banks.

He referred to a regulation which he said exempts banks from paying sales tax on equipment and supplies. He called it one of the worst examples of special interest control in Florida government.

## Travel By Soviet Troops In German Zone Restricted

BERLIN (UPI) — The U. S. Army today announced restriction of travel by Soviet military mission to the former U. S. zone of Germany in the vicinity of Frankfurt.

Authorities clamped down on Soviet movement in the zone because of the failure of Soviet authorities in West Germany to issue acceptable passes to Allied mission members stationed here, the announcement said.

The Army's European commander, Gen. C. D. Eddyman, has advised the Soviet mission of the restriction, it added.

British spokesmen refused to say whether the Soviet mission in the former British zone also would be restricted.

The French two weeks ago restricted the Soviet military mission at Baden-Baden to a 10-mile radius around the town — the French headquarters in Germany.

Thirty-seven Negroes arrested during an anti-segregation demonstration at Alabama State College in Montgomery, Ala., last Tuesday were scheduled to go on trial today.

In Little Rock, a number of Negro lunch counter demonstrators who refused orders to leave

## Capital Penalty Opponents Plan New Vote Action

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Attorney George T. Davis said today that opponents of capital punishment would use the initiative to take their case to the people of California — possibly in time to save the life of convict-author Caryl Chessman.

Davis, one of Chessman's attorneys, said he would meet with the condemned man today to discuss possible new moves to save the 32-year-old kidnap-rape victim from his ninth appointment with the gas chamber May 2.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown's bill to abolish capital punishment was killed Thursday by a vote of 87 in the Senate Judiciary Committee at Sacramento.

Davis said the action cleared the way for an all-out drive by Californians against Capital Punishment, Inc., to put the issue on the November ballot.

He said every effort would be made not only to get the required 450,000 signatures by June 18 as required by law—but to get them before Chessman's latest 60-day reprieve expires.

Davis said he felt that if the signatures were obtained by May 2, Brown would have a solid reason for extending the reprieve.

## Furor Over AF Manual Quietens

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The storm in Congress over an Air Force manual making some churches with communion appeared to be blowing itself out today in the wake of two congressional inquiries.

But House investigators were still digging into the subject of military manuals on other topics ranging from how to wash an officer's dog to bartending. They promised further disclosures later.

Everyone concerned with the church-and-communion manual was agreed on one point if on nothing else — somewhere along the line the Air Force goofed.

Air Force Secretary Dudley C. Sharp told a House armed services subcommittee Thursday it was "inexcusable" that the passage about Communist infiltration of churches got into the manual.

In this view he had the backing of the National Council of Churches which stirred up the furor by protesting bitterly against the manual, written for reserve non-commissioned officers.

But Rep. Alvin E. O'Konski (R-Wis.) told Sharp Thursday the allegation in the manual hadn't been disproved "one iota" and the Air Force had no business with drawing it.

The armed forces subcommittee completed questioning Sharp, Gen. Thomas D. White, Air Force chief of staff, and other Air Force officials in two hours.

## Legal Measures Sought To Stop Wave Of Sitdown Demonstrations

A Woolworth store was promptly arrested by police Thursday. As the 20 to 25 demonstrators appeared, the store closed its lunch counters.

The Mississippi House of Representatives approved three bills Thursday setting punishment for similar "sitdowns" in the state. The bills would provide a maximum \$500 fine and six months jail sentence for anti-segregation demonstrators.

Alabama Gov. John Patterson ordered an investigation into the possibility of closing the Negro college in Montgomery because of racial tension.

Montgomery Police Commissioner L. B. Sullivan requested the action shortly after some 60 students marched around the campus several times Thursday with signs protesting the expulsion of nine classmates.

The Montgomery City Commission said no spectators would be permitted at the trial of the 25 Negro students, a faculty member and her physician husband. They were charged with disorderly conduct and disobeying an officer.

Another demonstration was held Thursday in Huntsville, Ala., where some 60 young Negro men paraded through the 10-block downtown area carrying signs which read: "Alabama, Heart of Dixie, House of Tyrants."

North Carolina Gov. Luther H. Hodges predicted Thursday that sitdown demonstrations against segregated eating facilities will not produce the results that Negroes are seeking. The governor admitted he was concerned about the demonstrations.

In Atlanta, six Negroes took seats in the front center section intended for white occupants at the matinee performance of "My Fair Lady" at the Municipal Auditorium. The presence of the Negroes did not cause any disturbance, but there were some complaints from some white patrons.

Gov. Ernest F. Hollings announced Thursday that South Carolina would "not tolerate" a proposed Saturday pilgrimage to the state Capitol by Negro students protesting racial segregation.

## School Board Discusses Use Of Portable Schools

The county school board discussed using insulated aluminum to build portable schools Thursday.

A representative of a Miami aluminum building company showed the school board sections of structural insulated aluminum which can be used for portable schools. He agreed with School Supt. R. T. Milwee that a school to accommodate 300 children could be built of this material for about \$60,000. The state has approved these structural aluminum sections for school construction.

"The portable schoolrooms could be used in overcrowded areas until permanent schools were built to house rising numbers of students."

Milwee told the board that he would talk to state School Plant Board member C. W. McGuffey about using this material.

Milwee also told the board that he would look at a metal building in Bithlo being offered to the county school system by the federal government. This could be used as a shop garage.

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# East Gripped By Freezing Ice, Snow

Ice-cold temperatures gripped the East today, hampering rescuer's effort to reach desperate families locked without food or fuel in the snow-covered mountains of North Carolina. The mercury dipped near zero in the southern Appalachians as rescue workers pushed through drifts up to 20 feet deep to help 1,500 mountaineer families snowbound for nearly a month. Helicopters dropped emergency fuel, food and medical packages to the stranded families, many of whom slowly starving since their food ran out last week. Weary rescue workers stubbornly pushed ahead today with the Herculean task of getting food and fuel to 1,500 mountaineer families snowbound in the southern Appalachians. But the rescuers, many of whom have labored for days with little or no sleep, were being well rewarded. United Press International Correspondent George Flowers, who has flown with helicopter pilots on food dropping missions, said: "It's wonderful to see the families — especially the children — run out to where the food packages fall." The rescue operations, brought on by snow-laden storms that repeatedly belted the area, were under way today in four states — Virginia, Tennessee, North Carolina and Kentucky. Drifts in some spots measured 18 to 20 feet deep. By late Sunday emergency food packages had been delivered to at least 200 North Carolina families. Gov. Luther H. Hodges of North Carolina flew over the stricken area to survey the situation and said the Army helicopters and "weasels" would continue working until all families had received aid. Hodges termed the situation "well in hand." A cold, clear day was predicted for the eastern United States, where temperatures dipped to record lows Sunday. Cleveland—with 3 above, Columbus—with 8 above, and Pittsburgh—with 6 above, all recorded their coldest March 13 in history. Freezing temperatures continued north of a line through northern Florida, Arkansas, Colorado and Utah. An airlift of a different sort flew a merry mission to drop several tons of corn to thousands of starving pheasants trapped by drifts in South Dakota. Another three to six inches of snow fell over the mountain areas of western Montana and Idaho, but most other precipitation was confined to light snow and showers on the eastern slopes of the Rockies. In Florida the morning temperature bulletin from the Lakeland Weather Bureau: Forecast for peninsula Florida for tonight and Tuesday morning: Partly cloudy and warmer. Lowest temperatures ranging from 45 to 50 north to the 30's central and near 60 in the extreme south. Forecast for Tuesday: Considerable cloudiness and mild. Showers north and central districts. Future temperature outlook: Mild Tuesday night. No frost danger through Wednesday.

## Krider Won't Run; 36 File For Races

John Krider, County Commission chairman and commissioner from District 1, announced today he will not seek re-election. Krider has served as board chairman for three years. He is Chamber of Commerce manager and formerly served on the City Commission. Qualifying for election to local offices in the May Democratic primary ends at noon Tuesday. Six candidates filed this morning. They were Tax Assessor Richard McCanna; Longwood Mayor Alan Lorman; District 3 commissioner; County Judge Wilson Alexander; Ray Staton for the School Board from District 3; Karlyle Housholder for county prosecutor and O. G. Owens for District 4 constable. This far, 36 candidates have qualified. School Supt. R. T. Milwee will be a candidate for re-election and qualified Friday afternoon. Mrs. Mary Earle Walker also qualified Friday for the tax assessor race. George Bell, candidate for the District 5 County Commission race, was not listed Friday in a report of qualifying up until that time. Bell had qualified earlier. Krider made this statement: "For the past several months I have done a great deal of soul searching as to whether I should again seek the office of county commissioner from District 1 of Seminole County. As almost everyone knows, I have been active day and night for the past several years working to develop the potential of Sanford and Seminole County in every possible way. I have no regrets that I have served the citizens of this county as one of their commissioners, and I shall always be grateful for that opportunity. "There is no doubt that Seminole County is in the soundest shape financially that it has ever been, and that it stands today at the threshold of even greater business and job opportunity, and industrial development than some of our more progressive citizens believed possible. This firm, present position may be attributed to the determined effort on the part of forward-looking citizens to operate our government on a business-like basis, and to equalize fairly among all citizens the county tax load. "I realize that change always meets resistance, and that, unfortunately, even sensible people sometimes resist without reason, fighting personality instead of weighing carefully the merits of the change. I sincerely believe that we have had more progress in this county in the last four years than we have had in the entire history of the county. For this reason, it is difficult to understand why some fight so hard to resist changes that improve their governmental services and improve job opportunities when just 30 miles from us can be seen what cooperative effort has accomplished for the City of Orlando and the people of Orange County. A new health center is under construction, and an enlargement of our hospital is planned. ## House Begins Civil Rights Bill Voting

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House begins voting today on its civil rights bill with a plea from Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers to retain a provision to crack down on violators of school integration orders. An agreement reached Saturday between "civil rights" forces and Southern opponents for the House to start voting on amendments offered new hope for early action to break the deadlock in Congress. House leaders hoped they could get a bill passed by Thursday. On the eve of the crucial House votes, Rogers made a special appeal for the proposal to authorize federal penalties for persons obstructing federal court orders to desegregate schools. A similar provision was eliminated from the Senate's measure Friday. Rogers, in a letter to Rep. William McCulloch (R-Ohio), said the House should not let anyone into the "back room" where the federal government has a responsibility in other civil rights matters, including the duty to enforce court orders in school desegregation cases. The attorney general said the administration proposal would enable the federal government to enforce the school orders "without mob violence and without the necessity of using federal troops." "At the present time," he said, "when state officials fail to maintain law and order, the federal government, as a practical matter has no certain or very effective way to deal with mob violence except by the use of federal troops."

## Exhausted Team Continues Hunt For Trapped Men

LOGAN, W. Va. (UPI)—Coal-mined rescue squads early today began digging three different routes in their effort to reach 10 miners sealed in a coal mine less than six days. The exhausted crews late Sunday night inched to within 100 feet of one of two areas where mine officials believed the trapped men may have barricaded themselves from the dense smoke and deadly gas flames spawned by smoldering fires. The miners have not been heard from since 8:30 a. m. Tuesday when a slat fell ripped down electric cables and started a fire in the Holden No. 22 mine in southwestern West Virginia. "I have no doubt that within 24 hours we will know what, if anything, is in that first area," said Raymond Salvati, president of the Island Creek Coal Co., early today. Until today, rescue workers had attempted to plow through snow only the main corridor. They began using the three approaches feeling they had a better chance to converge on the areas. The second area lies some 1,300 feet beyond the closer section. Smoke has been one of the major obstacles crews have had to contend with. Fire that broke out some 65 feet beneath the ground surface and about two miles from the pitted belched forth clouds of choking smoke and carbon monoxide gas. The lack of fresh air forced rescuers to retreat countless times and "fresh air bases" have been advanced by sealing off side passageways. Hopes as to whether the imprisoned men would be alive rose and fell with every obstacle that loomed before the rescuers. Time was the most important element to be considered. Officials had estimated that the men may have had an air supply of about 300 hours if they barricaded themselves properly. The 144-hour mark was reached at 2:30 a. m. today.

## Finch Trial Jury Torn By 'Violence'

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Prosecution violence and obstinacy caused the Finch-Tregoff murder jury to become so hopelessly deadlocked that today the accused faces a second trial. "A case them or free them" stand by two jurors prevented efforts of the 10 other panelists to free Carol Tregoff, 31, and convict Dr. R. Bernard Finch, 42, of the murder of his wife, said one of the jurors, Mrs. Genevieve Lang. Superior Judge Walter R. Evans declared the three-month hearing a mistrial Saturday when the jury of five men and seven women announced it was deadlocked after eight days of deliberations. Evans scheduled Thursday as the day for a new trial to be set for the handsome physician and his red-haired mistress for the July 18 gunshot slaying of Mrs. Barbara Jean Finch, 33. Both remained in jail. Mrs. Lang said the outwardly compatible, smiling appearance of the 12 jurors during their recesses was far from the real state of affairs among them. "At the height of one heated debate, a male juror threatened to throw another out a window and turned over the jury table — he used to be a boxer — before she ran to the door," said Mrs. Lang. "She was hysterical and pounded on the door for the bailiff." The threatened woman was reported to have said she would seek protection from the district attorney because she was afraid of the male juror. Another juror said one of the male panelists passed at least three prepositioning notes to women on the panel. She said an extra bailiff was brought to the hotel where the jury stayed to guard the women's hotel door after she received the notes. "We could have voted Carol free at any time," said Mrs. Lang. "But we were trying to get these other two — they refused to listen to the law, conditions and degrees — to go along on Finch. "If they would have voted with us, we would have sailed for second degree on Finch and freed Carol. We never voted on second degree, though, we just voted on guilty." Juror Louis Worner identified the two jurors who refused to vote for conviction as Mrs. Dolores Hansen, a postal clerk, and Eddie L. Lindsey, a postal employee and the only Negro on the panel. Both declined comment.

Constable J. Q. Galloway said today that he is running for sheriff on the basis of his past eight year experience in law enforcement. The District 4 constable said that he feels his work as a criminal investigation officer qualifies him to serve as sheriff. Galloway is a member of the P.F.I. training school. Born in Albertville, Ala., the 46-year-old constable has lived in Sanford for the past 25 years. He is a member of the Central Baptist Church, president of the Sanford Elks Lodge, the American Legion, the 40 and 8 and the Seminole County Sportsmen's Association. Galloway was in the infantry in World War II. Galloway is married and has two children, James Hoyt Galloway, 20, of Lake Mary; and Mrs. Bobbie Jean Reeves, 27, of Sanford.

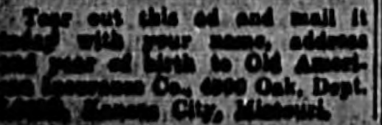

John McCarthy will concentrate his campaign for governor this week in vote-heavy Dade, Broward and Palm Beach counties.

Fred O. Dickinson moved to Jacksonville today after a weekend swing through Palm Beach County. Hayden Burns, after a brief respite at home in Jacksonville Sunday, moved into Central Florida. Burns planned to visit Lakeland, Winter Haven, Winter Park and Orlando today. Dickinson made a television appearance in Tampa Sunday before going to Palm Beach County. He said he was certain he could get the Legislature to pass a fair reapportionment plan if he is elected.

He said he would not do it with a "big stick," but would call in the senators from North Florida counties which control the Senate and work out a new formula.

Burns issued a statement from his headquarters in Jacksonville Sunday affirming his strong stand on states rights and home rule. "Florida needs a strong governor who firmly believes in states rights," he said. "Likewise, the governor should believe in home rule in cities and counties."

## Candidates Open Drives In Heavily Voted Areas

Five candidates for governor, including one Republican, spoke at the Stetson University Law School's gubernatorial jamboree Saturday.

Democrats C. Farris Bryant, Burns, McCarthy and Dickinson promised to do better things for roads and schools and to run the state in a businesslike manner.

Emerson Rupert, a St. Petersburg businessman, the only Republican in the 11-man race, said he would uphold "the principles of the Republican Party."

Rupert said he was against civil rights legislation, declaring "it is the responsibility of minority groups to lift themselves to the level of the majority."

In Tallahassee, the secretary of state's office reported Sunday that candidates for governor and Cabinet posts have spent a total of \$613,000 in their campaigns.

Total contributions were \$481,465.

Most of the spending has been concentrated in the governor's race with \$307,403 spent. Contributions were \$280,552.

The heaviest spender in the race was Doyle Carlton who reported \$82,800 in expenses.

## Matador Missile Veers Off Course

TAIPEI, Formosa (UPI) — A United States Matador guided missile veered off course in a test firing in January and crashed into the Formosa Strait between Nationalist and Communist China, a U. S. military spokesman said today.

The spokesman made the statement in response to a question from United Press International.

He said the six-ton Matador missile crashed before it came close to the Communist-held mainland.

The Matador is a winged guided missile — actually a pilotless jet dive bomber — with an operational range of more than 500 miles.

## Talman, The DA On The Perry Mason Show, And Seven Others Arrested On Morals Charge

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Actor William Talman, the district attorney on the Perry Mason television series, was one of four men and four women arrested Sunday on narcotics and morals charges when sheriff's deputies raided a party and found the guests frolicking unclothed.

"It must be some kind of mistake," said Talman today. "We just dropped into a friend's house for a drink and suddenly we find ourselves in the middle of a rumpus."

"This'll ruin me," groaned the 45-year-old actor, who plays "Hamilton Berger," the no-luck DA who is weekly outwitted by Perry Mason in the hour-long courtroom drama. He declined to say who was with him when he entered the apartment.

Talman and the others, including an associate television producer and an actress, were booked on narcotics and morals charges and released on bail. They were ordered to appear in court Tuesday.

Sheriff's Capt. Richard B. Brooks, head of the narcotics detail, said the raiding deputies found guests scampering for clothing and moaning, "this will ruin us."

Brooks said the eighth person, the apartment's tenant, Richard Reibold, 31, a salesman, had gone to the door to let in an undercover agent he unsuspectingly had invited to the party. Reibold's apartment had been under observation for some time, said Brooks.

Narcotics found scattered throughout the apartment included cigarettes with part of the tobacco pulled out and marijuana put in. Marijuana seeds and shreds also were found and benzadrine inhalers of the prescription type and a bottle of unidentified pills were confiscated, Brooks said.

"In the drawers of a dresser we found large amounts of stag films and filthy literature of the kind you can buy in Tijuana, Mexico," he said.

All of those arrested denied any knowledge of narcotics or any wrongdoing.

Others arrested and charged with morals and narcotics counts were Lolla K. Dewitt, 31, an actress; James H. Baker, 39, a TV producer; Peter Neal Hestell, 29, a finance company manager and his wife, Susan, 24; Jean Donovan, 26, a housewife, and Peggy L. Flanagan, 31, also a housewife.

Talman only last September was sued for divorce by his wife, actress Barbara Reed.

They had a question and answer period with the rangers as they were shown the tower and equipment.

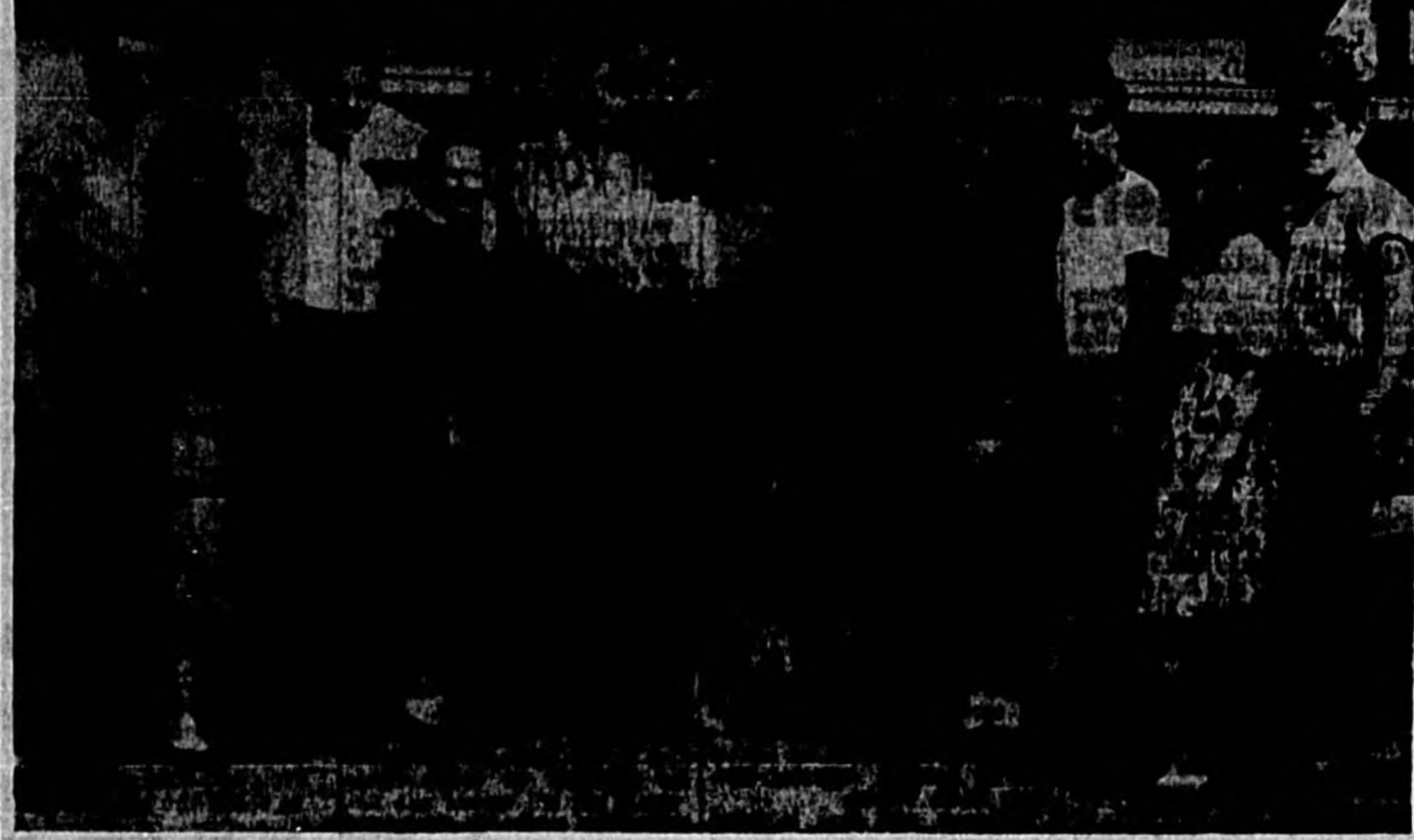

## Racial Demonstrators Go On Trial Today

Thirty-five students arrested during a racial demonstration go on trial today in Tallahassee for disturbing the peace, while in Petersburg, Va., eleven Negroes who took seats in the white section of a public library must answer trespassing charges.

The Tallahassee students — including 20 Negroes from Florida A&M and six whites from Florida State — were arrested Saturday during a day-long demonstration that police finally broke up with tear gas.

Most of them were unable to raise bond of \$500 and spent the weekend in jail.

A Leon Lowry, president of the NAACP in Florida, charged that authorities would not permit the students to post property bonds, demanding cash or the services of a professional bondsman instead.

He said all the resources of the Florida NAACP would be "placed at the disposal of the students" for their legal defense.

Lowry also disclosed that two shots had been fired into his home early Sunday morning, one zipping over the bed where his wife lay sleeping. He said he had received about 30 threatening phone calls in recent weeks, with most of the callers warning him to cease his NAACP activity.

Use of the tear gas on the students was criticized by E. W. Saunders, Florida NAACP field secretary. He said the step was "not in accordance with proper crowd-handling methods," and charged that one Negro girl and several youths were burned by the bombs.

In New York a national officer of the NAACP, executive secretary Roy Wilkins, charged Alabama Gov. John Patterson and other state officials with whipping up a "lynch spirit against Negroes." He asked President Eisenhower to intervene to prevent a "massacre."

# We Need Teachers, Dr. Edmunds Says

A man who admitted he speaks selfishly when it comes to talking education, Dr. J. Ollie Edmunds, president of Stetson University, said here Thursday night that the rest of us had better take more interest in schools and teachers, too.

Dr. Edmunds told 300 Chamber of Commerce members that "education is everybody's business" and said the public should follow the activities of the mathematics teacher just as it does those of the athletic coach.

Dr. Edmunds plugged for increased public support of independently endowed colleges and said he favors a bill in the Congress to allow tax deduction to persons, businesses or organizations who make such contributions.

He also said it's time we stopped concentrating on building new buildings and get to work building up facilities. Dr. Edmunds said that Americans have allowed the teaching profession "to lose the respect it deserves" and he urged that citizens take a closer look at how our educational programs are going and to take part in doing something about them.

America has found out that no amount of money plowed into missile research can close the gap the Russians have opened "until we have young scientists trained and capable of carrying out developments," Dr. Edmunds said.

To accomplish our higher educational goals, we must have many more highly educated, dedicated teachers, he stressed.

"We don't need buildings, we need professors," was the way he put it. "It's something to think about—nationally and here at home."

**CASE E — 401:** Elaine B., aged 4, is a cute little girl. "Oh, Dr. Crane," her mother sobbed, "Elaine is in the hospital and is burned so badly we don't know if she will live. 'I was making some apple sauce and Elaine reached up for the handle of the pan and tipped it all over herself. 'Now I can't even go near the kitchen stove! It seems so awful that a pan of apple sauce should spit so the life of our little girl. Mothers, this kind of case is multiplied thousands of times right here in America. Do please learn to employ the back burners on your stove, for when your pans or skillets will be out of reach of toddlers: As a rule, on your four-burner kitchen stove, you seldom have more than two burners in use at any given time. Make it a habit to avoid the front two burners, except when you require more than two. If you mothers (and fathers, too) would just teach yourself this simple safety habit, you'd save thousands of youngsters from dying by burns or from being disfigured by bad scars. In the past year, many children have died of scalding because they stuck plastic bags over their heads. Others crawl inside refrigerators and then get locked inside, either because they themselves slam the door or a playmate may do so. In education, we are realizing the great value of using actual cases for teaching purposes. Good parents need to select ALL the common dangers a child may possibly meet and then explain them in advance.

WASHINGTON — In a mood to discard for the moment the civil rights debate in the Senate chamber, I turn to a few light-hearted anecdotes collected the last few days.

The half-foot of snow outside the window recalls the tale of frustration suffered the other day by Sen. Gordon Allott (R-Colo.). The senator took off by air for Colorado to speak before several hundred people at a big banquet; he ended up 2,000 miles later back in Washington talking to himself and eating a sandwich.

Allott embarked for Lamar, Colo., to help toast the town named 1967's All-America City. After his airplane landed in Denver, a blizzard closed in on Lamar. The senator called for a private plane and (he's a pilot himself) even offered to fly himself down, but at that point even the sparrows were skiing.

Allott was due back in Washington the following day to appear as a Congressional witness on his own bill. He hopped on the next available eastbound airliner. Three thousand miles for nothing! This next episode happened to a prominent Washington couple having lunch with their two small daughters in the Embassy Room of the Statler Hotel. The girls, both under 10, excused themselves to visit the ladies' lounge. When they got there, they discovered they needed a dime. The older girl said to her sister: "You wait here while I go back and get one from mother."

Said the first little girl: "But I can't wait." At that moment, a woman appeared with a key and saved the day. She was the hotel's pianist, who had a key as a hotel employee. Sometime later, the lovely lady of the piano took her place on the stage and the little girls spotted her. "Look!" one of them shrieked. "The cleaning lady plays the piano!" There've been a lot of leg-pulling stories about the purported confidence of the Republicans in the forthcoming presidential election.

## WASHINGTON CALLING by Marquis Childs

WASHINGTON — If the recent samples coming out of the primary warmup are any clue we are in for a bad time this fall. Both Paul Butler, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, and New Hampshire's Governor Wesley Powell got about as far out of bounds as possible. Butler, a chronic sufferer from foot-in-mouth disease, had the grace to apologize to the president for having said that the death of the Navy bandman in the Rio disaster was on President Eisenhower's conscience.

Powell tried to justify his charge that Sen. John F. Kennedy was soft on communism even after he had been repudiated by Vice President Nixon, whose campaign in New Hampshire he was supposed to be managing. In so doing he compounded the damage he had already done, not to Kennedy but to the vice president running unopposed in the Republican primary.

How much Powell's folly contributed to Kennedy's astonishingly large total no one, of course, can say. But it was probably a last minute factor in getting out voters eager to repudiate the Powell slur. Kennedy's margin of four to three as the final returns come in, contrasting with the traditional Republican edge of two to one, gives the youthful-looking Massachusetts senator a new boost for the nomination.

He could hardly have expected such a break with all its national implications. While the charge is on its face absurd, given Kennedy's whole background and conditioning, it will give pause to those liberal Democrats who suspect him of never having really opposed McCarthyism. In short, this was the kind of advertising Kennedy could not have bought, for all his efforts and resources, and it was handed to him free, gratis, in New Hampshire's snowy hills.

While Butler's statement was, to put it mildly, an offense to good taste and decency, it did not have any effect on the political race.

George Koder was second, and Joe Leonard third.

Tom Soergave of Orlando, won the 100-mile amateur motorcycle race Saturday. His winning time

was one hour, one minute and 49 seconds.

In other racing news Sportsman Briggs Cunningham has entered a new "Birdcage" Maserati in the Sebring International 12-hour endurance race for sports cars March 26.

Cunningham named Ed Crawford of Chicago and Walt Hansen of Westfield, N. J., as drivers.

Cunningham's car is the fourth of the new Maseratis entered. Camorati USA, the Miami based racing club, has entered a team

of three with Maserati factory backing.

Camorati's drivers will include Britain's Stirling Moss.

The Maserati got the nickname "Birdcage" because of its body construction of steel tubes. The airplane-like construction was designed to make the car lighter and stronger.
