Ford Signs Mortgage Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford has signed a bill that injects up to \$7.75 billion of government funds into the mortgage market to help the nation's ailing housing in

mediately for the mortgage market and the rest may be spent later if the industry fails to perk up from the lethergy that has afflicted it in recent years. The bill, signed Friday at a White House ceremony, initially will permit about 100,000 new buyers of homes to

Under the legislation, the Government National Mor-

tgage Association will have Treasury backing to purchase mortgages at 9 per cent and resell them at the higher market rate, now 10 per cent, and absorb the loss. The money is available for both new and existing housing, but not for those mortgages already insured by the government through the Veterans Administration and the Federal Housing Administration.

Ford said the housing bill, the first part of his new economic program to be enacted by Congress, would not cure all the ills of homebuilders but "will provide a shot in the arm for the housing industry.'

#### Rocky Owes IRS \$900,000

WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President-designate Nelson A. Rockefeller disclosed he will have to pay an additional \$903,-718 in federal income and gift taxes, a figure likely to soar past the \$1 million mark when the interest is included. Rockefeller's revelation was the result of an Internal Revenue Service audit that rejected more than \$1.2 million in deductions. And it added a new note to the growing controversy surrounding the former New York governor's vice presidential nomination.

#### Eckerd OK's Askew Plan

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Republican Senate candidate Jack Eckerd has backed Democratic Gov. Reubin Askew in a proposal to average fuel oil prices Eckerd said he endorsed the proposal outlined by Askew at the Associated Industries of Florida meeting

The plan "is an extremely good idea to help curb in-flation," Eckerd said in a press statement.

Candidates, working with the business sector, "must get behind Gov. Askew's program and make certain that Florida is not continually discriminated against because we must import oil rather than produce it domestically,





## Not All Ghouls In Halloween Parades

No matter what the ghost story writers tell you, there is a bewitching hour more frightening and deadly than midnight

And inspite of the annual parade of ghouls and gobblins in late October, there is another month and another specter taking more than the breath away from the people it haunts. This specter doesn't come out only with a full moon.

This specter isn't simply a child in ghost's clothing, and its goal isn't to extort candy from the

This ghoul appears most often between 6 and 7 p.m. He favors Saturday's most of all, and is particularly fond of the month of March.

He doesn't wear a mask, or fancy costume, and many times you don't even know he has been around, except when he makes a smashing appearance, like he did last weekend.

He resides in any number of places, Jordon's Bank, the Stygian Shores, or Elysium, and he is known by any of several names, Charon the Boatman, the Grim Reaper or more popularly

The Florida Highway Patrol issued a special report about this ghoul recently which indicates, in addition to the above statistics, he is found in the company of males twice as often as females.

In 1973, 2,662 persons died on Florida highways. One-fifth of them were pedestrians, almost half of whom met this fatal fiend crossing between

Slightly less than half of those who met Charon the Boatman, were involved in two car collisions. Forty-eight per cent more who died in trafficrelated accidents did so because of vehicles striking pedestrians, fixed objects, overturning, striking bicyclists or trains.

His favorite drivers are those who are reckless, fail to yield the right of way, follow too closely, who drive under the influence of alcohol, or travel too

On the average, he makes seven acquaintances every day throughout the state, and puts in an appearance at all of the 891 mishaps that occur daily. His handiwork, fatal and non-fatal alike, results in \$1.17 billion in property damage and

Last year he was busiest over the Memorial Day weekend, introducing 40 new people to eter-nity. He was pretty busy on New Year's, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas too. 





NBA — Pacific Division 1973-74 finish: W 27, L 55 — 5th place

The Trail Blazers' ignominious record of four last- place inishes in their four years in the NBA is about to come to a reeching halt. No longer will they be pushovers or patsies. Now that they have Bill Walton, the three-time All-American and two-time Player of the Year from UCLA, they have become an instant and serious threat to win the division title - and even

was considered capable of turning around a franchise, as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar did in Milwaukee in 1969. Surprisingly, a short time after the Trail Blazers signed Walton, Coach Jack McCloskey quit, citing irreconcilable differences with management. The move paved the way for Lenny Wilkens to get

FORWARDS: Sidney Wicks, also an ex-UCLA All- American who helped persuade Walton to join Portland, said after the signing that the heralded rookie would "enable me to do more things." That will be something, because Wicks already does quite a bit. Last season, he averaged 22.5 points a game, finished a close second on the team in rebounding and was the assists leader. John Johnson, the other starting forward, has averaged better than 16 points per game in his four pro seasons, but generally is underrated. Benind them are Barry Clemens, Lloyd leal and Greg Smith, none spectacular but all serviceable.

CENTER: Walton, the 6-11, red-haired vegetarian, is the most ballyhooed rookie in pro basketball this season. The only question mark concerning him is whether his tender knees will be able to take the constant pounding of an 82-game schedule. Otherwise, he is an outstanding shooter, scorer, rebounder and & Associates also won two defensive player - a franchise maker. When he is forced to rest, games each. Petrie, one of the NBA's premier shooters (24.3) and Larry Steele, a defense-minded guard, who, ironically, led the league in steals last season. The main problem is that neither is a firstrate playmaker, a prime requirement for a backcourtman. The Trail Blazers could use someone with Wilkens' all-around skills at guard. Bernie Fryer, who made the team as a "write-in" candidate last season, probably is their top playmaker, but he doesn't shoot as well as Petrie nor play defense as well as Steele.

PREDICTION: Walton unquestionably will add a new dimension to the Trail Blazers. Not only will he give them a superstar in the middle, but he will make better performers of the other players. Teamed with Wicks and Petrie, he will give Portland an awesome scoring trio. Second in Pacific.







# Flood Insurance Required By Law

As we said before, this includes savings and loan associations, commercial banks, savings banks, and even credit unions - as long as they're Federally regulated, supervised or insured. But, let's hasten to add one important point. Loans on properties not located in flood prone areas do not need flood in-

proposed home is or is not in a flood prone area? Right off the bat it's the lenders responsibility to decide if a property for which a loan is requested is or is not in an area that requires flood insurance.

That means the lender is going to have to know up one side and down the other the specific guidelines handed down by an agency known as the Federal Insurance Administration (or FIA) - a part of the Department of Housing and Urban Development

For a city or a town to enter the flood insurance program so that's its citizens can become eligible for loans requiring flood insurance, there is a two-stage program. has certain flood hazzard areas and points these areas out on a

necessary land use measures and makes application for entrance

Once all of this has been done the way Uncle Sam wants done FIA is supposed to accept the community's application within 15 days. Property owners whose real estate holdings are in the affected areas become eligible for Federally subsidized flood insurance.

The second step requires FIA to publicize a flood insurance rate map for the community. And, once the community has a rate map, the date of that

map indicates the community's entry into the regular flood insurance program.

# Fishing Adventure May Be Last

Mrs. Dorothy Jordan, 72, of Winter Park got her first "plane" ride just before midnigh Saturday and it's one ride she won't forget. Mrs. Jordan and her 84-year-old fishing companion, John E. Smith, also of Winter



Park, were plucked by a rescue helicopter from their 16-foot boat marooned in a mass of water hyacinths on Lake Jessup near Black Hammock Fish Camp.

Both retirees told sheriff's deputies and Oviedo emergency unit crewmen they "weren't scared" when they found their boat blocked by the wind-whipped hyacinths about 5 p.m. when they tried to head for the fish camp with their catch of four speckled perch. Fishermen on shore 100 yards away heard the pair's calls for help but were unable to get to their boat with an airboat because of the

tightiy packed hyacinths.
The Sheriff's Department was notified and during next six hours rescuers tried to pull the boat to shore with a winch but a rope that they had attached to the boat became dangerously
