

DISTRICT AGENT TELLS HOW TO KEEP POTATOES

Florida's 1924 Sweet Potato Crop Expected to Be One of Largest Harvested Since Beginning of World War

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Oct. 21.—The 1924 sweet potato crop is expected to total more than three million bushels, the largest crop in several years.

The time for gathering and storing potatoes soon will be at hand, and suggestions for storing the crop are considered timely because of the fact that throughout the state, as well as other sweet potato growing areas, a large percentage of the crop is lost each year through careless handling and improper methods of putting the potatoes away.

Farmers, it is suggested, therefore, should be sure to gather their potatoes before frost has killed the vines, as this injures the roots and makes them more subject to rot.

Plans for the construction of the sweet potato storage house may be had from the county agents or by writing to the College of Agriculture, University of Florida, Gainesville, or the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington. Ask for copies of Farmers' Bulletins 970 and 847.

Railroad Facilities Are Said to Be Inadequate

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The development of railroad facilities, which has not kept pace with general transportation, must be the next step in solving the problem of marketing the country's farm products Secretary Hoover declared.

Declaring an estimate of dollars lost through inadequate facilities, he declared that the loss was great and that inadequacy caused further damage because the necessity of reassigning commodities due to inability to handle them at original points for their destination.

Florida Motorists Benefit Greatly By Gasoline Tax Law

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 21.—Persons in Florida who travel by automobile pay in the form of gasoline taxes and registration fees an average of about one-fourth of a cent a mile, according to estimates based on information compiled by the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of Agriculture.

A greater part of this license and tax charge, however, is expended for the benefit of the motorist. It is pointed out, for during last year 81 per cent of the motor vehicle license revenues and 68 per cent of the gasoline taxes collected throughout the country were turned over to the state highway departments for expenditure under their supervision.

Thirty-five states now have the gasoline tax, the rates ranging from one to three cents with the exception of one state which has a four cent tax.

The proposed amendment of Article VII of the Constitution of Florida relative to local county and Jacksonville relative to various counties consideration from the voters of the state of Florida.

Section B. The Legislature shall have the power to establish, change and abolish a local government existing territorially throughout Duval County in the place of all county, district, municipal and local governments, boards, bodies and officials, legislative, executive or judicial, and shall prescribe the jurisdiction, powers, duties and functions of such government, its legislative, executive and judicial departments, and its boards, bodies and officials.

No more radical change in government would be conceivable than that which could be established under this proposed amendment.

It appears from the amendment that the power must be exercised of creating the office of governor of Duval County a body of representatives and a senate and a supreme court of Duval County.

It is concluded that the people of the State of Florida will regard such a change as the least desirable by adopting this amendment to the Constitution. It is not to be feared that the people of Duval County wish any such amendment to be adopted.

The people of this proposed amendment probably conceived that if the people of Florida would allow Duval County to be an independent state then the taxpayers of that territory would escape their just proportion of taxation for state purposes.

Duval County should not be allowed to secede from the state government, but should bear her proportional part of taxation. Adv.

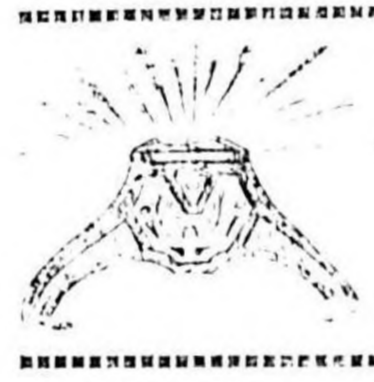
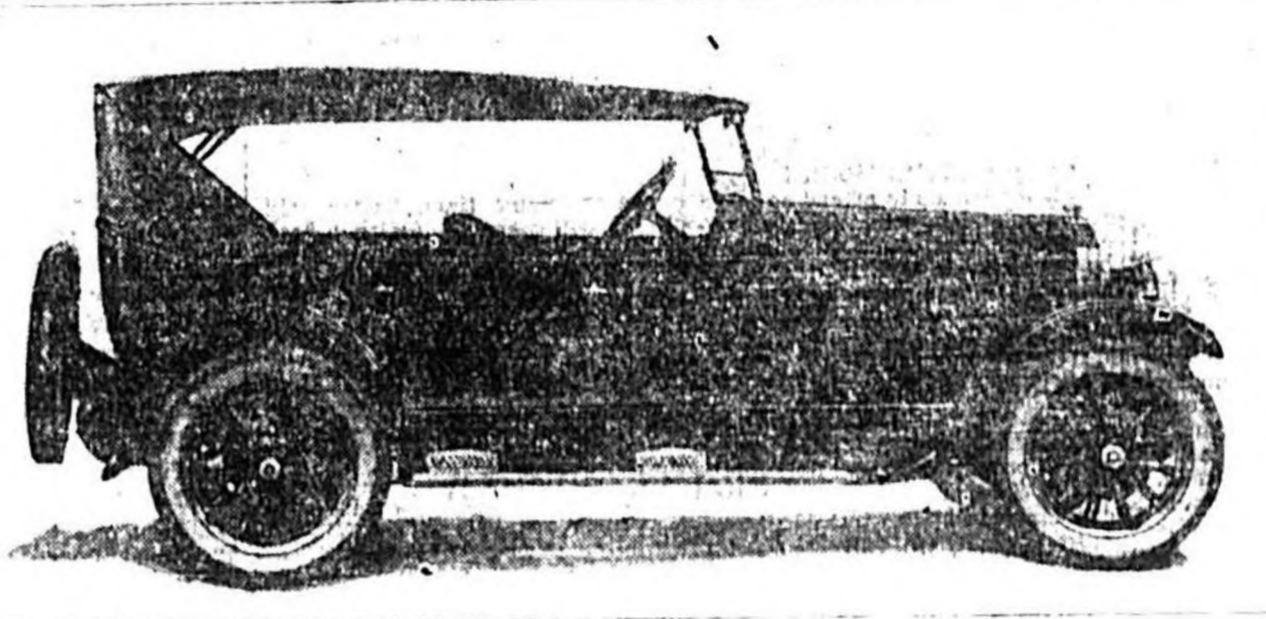
