ST. LOUIS — This year's Riverfront Easter Egg hunt was canceled because last year parents rushed in before the kids and grabbed most of the 20,000 eggs.

"We just said enough is enough and we're going to take a break this year," said Thomas W. Purcell, chairman of the Downtown St. Louis Inc. committee that organizes the event.

The committee worried that someone would be injured. Children and adults were knocked over in the rush last year.

Parents have been a problem for the last three years and keep getting more aggressive, he said Wednesday.

The hunt — held the past nine years — is traditionally on the Saturday before Easter on the grounds of the Gateway Arch.

County refuses to shell out

GREEN COVE SPRINGS — Clay County commissioners have turned down a lobbyist's request for reimbursement for 371 pounds of Maine lobster he served to legislators while lobbying for support of a local road project.

The lobster was served in two meals for about 40 lawmakers last year. The bill, including butter and air freight from Maine, was about \$3,000.

The road funding was turned down but lobbyist Walter Law still wants to be reimbursed for the lobster.

New I-4 exit stalled

SANFORD — Local government, business and Chamber of Commerce leaders wrestled with whether to support a proposed additional I-4 interchange this morning. No decision was made to either endorse or oppose the interchange.

The area under discussion is located on I-4, at the overpass of S.R. 48-A, just south of the major exit area at the junction of the Interstate and Expressway.

Chairman of the Chamber's Transportation Committee, Bill Simmons, Sanford City Manager, led off the discussion by asking, "Should the

Committee and the Chamber take a position on this new interchange?"

At the conclusion of the lengthy meeting this morning, Chamber Manager Dave Farr said, "The Committee decided to hold off on any support until we see what the groups who are pushing for this interchange will do next." Farr explained, "By the groups, I mean people from Arvida, Paulucci Properties, and Simons and Associates, developers of the Seminole Towne Center Mall."

In addition to the Chamber members, representatives of other governmental bodies including Seminole County and the Department of Transportation were also on hand.

Gerald Brinton of the Expressway Authority

displayed a group of charts showing the proposed area and gave an overview of the project to date. He commented, "The next segment of expansion of the expressway is in the design planning stages right now, and we have a target date of 1997 to open the area between Highway 17-92 and I-4."

Regarding the subject under discussion however, he said, "The 48-A interchange is not planned to be built right now, at least not as part of the initial project." He suggested "We have about 15 weeks before we have to have any additional alternatives on any interchanges ready, and we will also have to include various financing alternatives to anything we propose."

Lake Mary talks to Russians

LAKE MARY — On Monday, a group of fourth graders from Lake Mary Elementary School will reach out to a group of Russian students with whom they have been corresponding since October.

American Telephone and Telegraph (AT&T) is donating a long distance call from the local youngsters to a class of nine and ten year olds in Ulyanovsk in the Russian republic.

"It is so wonderfully exciting," Bill Peoples, the fourth graders' teacher said.

When his class began corresponding with the Russian youngsters they were moved by their lack of basic school supplies. Their letters, Peoples said, are written on paper that has been reused so many times that they are full of holes from where the eraser has worn through the fibers.

"Our students were so moved by their situation that they asked me if we could do something for them," he said.

And do something they have. The students took the plight of the students to the school community and raised enough money to buy 600 pounds of paper, pencils, paint and other basic school supplies.

Peoples said that though he has talked to Larissa Kuznetsova, the Russian teacher on the telephone, Monday will be the first chance the students will have to converse.

"They have worked very hard to raise money for this project," Peoples said.

Woman killed in accident

LAKE MARY — A passenger riding in a late model Cadillac Wednesday afternoon was killed when the car veered from Lake Mary Boulevard, careened through brush and struck an oak tree.

Lake Mary Police Capt. Sam Belfiore said Lake Mary resident Myrtle Fory was airlifted from the scene while her husband, Ivan, 60, was transported to HCA Central Florida Regional Hospital. The extent of his injuries are unknown. Belfiore said Mrs. Fory died enroute to the hospital. The driver of a second vehicle involved in the accident was uninjured.

A police report filed by Lake Mary Ofc. Romanowski, states that Fory was traveling eastbound on Lake Mary Boulevard behind a pickup truck driven by Daytona Beach resident William E. Lee. Both vehicles were traveling about 40 mph. Belfiore said that Fory's vehicle "struck the rear of Lee's vehicle several times. The last time it struck, it caused the pickup to swerve across the westbound lanes of Lake Mary Boulevard and spin out on the grass."

Fory's car accelerated as it continued eastbound, hugging the side of the road, according to Belfiore.

"The vehicle left the road and drove through an area of bushes and shrubs until striking an oak tree,"

SANFORD — Middle and high school students from all over the state will be converging on Sanford's Ft. Mellon Park on Saturday for a Christian celebration. The community is also invited to attend a barbecue on Saturday.

The third annual Youth Blast, sponsored by the First Baptist Church of Sanford, will begin at 9 a.m. at the waterfront park. A variety of activities ranging from a magic show by Tommy Johns to a clown troupe from Sanlando Baptist Church will be going on throughout the day around the park.

Sanford voted Clinton; Lake Mary, Tsongas

Bush wins all north Seminole

SANFORD — Sanford and most north Seminole County Democrats supported Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton in Tuesday's Super Tuesday presidential primary, but upscale Democrats of Lake Mary and west of Interstate 4 gave Paul Tsongas the edge.

Pres. George Bush received the vote of confidence in all north county areas, although Pat Buchanan followed national trends and garnered about a third of the voters in many precincts. One Sanford precinct gave Buchanan 84 percent of its Republican vote.

Individual precinct tallies of Tuesday's vote were released Wednesday by the Seminole County

elections office. A total of 40 percent of Democrats turned out and 36.6 percent of Republicans voted. Countywide, Tsongas received 38.2 percent of the Democratic vote to Clinton's 37.7 percent. Republicans supported Bush over Buchanan by a 65-to-35 margin.

Sanford-area Democrats followed national trends and supported Clinton, voting 1,160 for him and 696 for Tsongas. Jerry Brown received 17 percent of the Sanford area vote.

About 82 percent of Sanford Republicans supported the nomination of Bush. But about 38 percent of the city's Republicans sent "message" votes for Buchanan with the exception of Precinct 18, which includes neighborhoods east of Summerlin Avenue and west and south of the airport. Buchanan received a total of 89 votes to Bush's 17. Democrats in the area chose

Florida retains election focus

MIAMI — State political leaders say President Bush and Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton have both shown enough appeal in their Florida appearances to put the Sunshine State on center stage in November — if Clinton can keep his momentum and win the Democratic nomination.

"I think it's going to be a horse race in Florida," predicted Lt. Gov. Buddy MacKay, who also serves as Clinton's state campaign chairman. "I think Florida is going to be a real battleground."

Bush has easily won primary fights in his last two Florida showings and he enjoyed a margin

of almost 1 million votes here during his 1988 blitz of former Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis.

Tuesday, Bush won more than two-thirds of the vote, while sweeping the 97 GOP delegates in his march toward renomination.

"Now the fun begins," said Jeb Bush, the president's son and state campaign manager. "Now we begin to fight the Democrats, which is a lot more fun, frankly."

Clinton took a big step toward settling the Democratic fight with his impressive Florida showing Tuesday. He had captured almost 55 percent in a non-binding straw ballot of Democratic activists in December and he followed that up with 52 percent Tuesday — easily outdistancing challenger Paul Tsongas.

Both sides are optimistic about the November duel for Florida's 21

Government pays for beaches

JACKSONVILLE — The federal government has agreed to continue funding Duval County beach renourishment projects for the next 40 years.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers extended the federal cost-sharing project that began in 1980 to help pay to pump sand onto 10 miles of Duval County beaches south of the St. Johns River.

Without the continued federal funding, renourishment projects would have been in jeopardy.

The federal government's participation was to have expired in 1990, but the Corps agreed to share the cost of an Atlantic Beach project. After a study, it extended the project for 40 years.

T-shirt lands man back in jail

INVERNESS — After nearly two years, a man held in contempt of court because of the T-shirt he wore has been ordered back to jail.

The case began when Ray Bruce Riggs was sentenced to 10 days in jail for contempt. He had appeared in court on a traffic infraction wearing a shirt with an offending slogan and a picture of four scantily clad women in the back of a truck.

The T-shirt read: "Haulin' A--"

Citrus County Judge Gary Graham ruled Tuesday that Riggs, who served five days of his sentence in 1990, must serve the rest of it because all his appeals have run out.

No speech from beauty queen

LECANTO — Beauty pageant officials prohibited an outgoing queen from ending her reign with a speech about sexual equality.

Miss Citrus County Kala Calbeck went along with the ban under protest, using her time at the microphone during Monday night's pageant to say "Censorship is a terrible thing."

Ms. Calbeck, an 18-year-old University of Florida dance major from Crystal River, had choreographed a dance to a song by pop singer Madonna. She intended to perform the dance, then interpret it through her speech to the audience at Curtis Peterson Auditorium.

Discrimination victims could collect

TALLAHASSEE — Discrimination victims would be able to collect punitive damages up to \$100,000 in civil rights lawsuits under legislation that has passed in the Senate.

The bill (CS-SB 1368) also was amended Wednesday to include a measure banning discrimination in certain private clubs that the Senate had passed separately Feb. 12.

The Senate voted 38-0 for the bill by Sen. Arnett Girardeau, D-Jacksonville, and sent it to the House.

Blacks choose chairman

TALLAHASSEE — The Legislature's 14 black members, all Democrats, have chosen Rep. Al Lawson of Tallahassee as their next chairman, replacing Rep. Willie Logan of Opa-Locka.

Lawson beat out Rep. Jim Burke of Miami for the chairmanship of the caucus of black legislators. Rep. Tim Jamerson of St. Petersburg is vice president and Logan is secretary.

Rep. Darryl Reaves of Miami, said the election of officers is usually held in November but was accelerated this year because of dissatisfaction among some members with the caucus' stands on legislative and congressional redistricting.

Chiles: Budget piece of garbage

Lawmakers call special session

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Lawton Chiles praised lawmakers' action on health-care revision but called the Legislature's no-new-tax \$30 billion budget a "piece of garbage."

Chiles wrapped up a series of town meetings to promote beefing up the state budget with a speech Wednesday to the Capital Tiger Bay Club.

The health care bill would widen access to care and cut costs. "Today's action takes us one step closer toward removing health care as an item of luxury for the privileged and making it a right of the people," Chiles said.

But the budget needs work, he said. "I'm going to put on rubber gloves before I veto that piece of garbage."

Lawmakers will adjourn their regular 60-day session on Friday and return to the Capitol for a special session March 23 to settle unfinished business, Senate President Gwen Margolis said.

"If I had my druthers I'd just as soon they stay here, but if they want to go home a week that's up to them," Chiles said.

He's held 10 hearings around the state to push his proposal to close certain loopholes

in the 6-cent sales tax and expand the base of the state's general business tax.

The \$1.4 billion raised would go toward schools, health programs and prisons. The Legislature's budget plan for the fiscal year beginning July 1 sets aside no money for buying pristine lands under the 2-year-old Preservation 2000 program or for expanding health services to more poor pregnant women, Chiles said.

There is money to open a state prison by cutting prison education, the one program proven to cut recidivism, the governor said.

"I think it's intolerable," he said. In the last 10 years, the state has seen its budget grow 140 percent before inflation is accounted for and 83 percent after inflation is considered, according to Chiles.

Chan is named to county P&Z

SANFORD — Keylor Chan becomes the latest new face on the Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commission, an agency which has undergone dramatic changes during the last seven months.

Richard Van Der Weide, a candidate for the Seminole County commission, and a P&Z member since January 1990, resigned this week to spend more time on the campaign trail.

"As an announced candidate for election to the county commission, I feel that it is in the best interest of the citizens of Seminole County that I step down at this time," said Van Der Weide, 52.

Van Der Weide is president of Kida Stuff Child Care Inc., a chain of Central Florida day care centers.

Commissioner Fred Streetman named Chan, 56, to replace Van Der Weide Tuesday night. With the appointment of Chan, the majority of seven-member zoning review board will have served less than one year. Harry Hagle, appointed in December, did previously serve seven years on the board.

County planning observers say the P&Z has moved away from a pro-development stance of the early 1980s to a more controlled-growth attitude. Chan may add to that balance. Streetman said he selected Chan

because he was an "ordinary citizen."

"He has no real estate interests, no development interests, no strong environmental interests," said Streetman. "He's just an everyday, hardworking citizen."

Chan became active in the Republican Executive Committee soon after moving to Longwood in 1985. He and his wife, Marty, have explored real estate sales and catering. Marty Chan now owns a real estate management company. She is manager of Van Der Weide's campaign.

Keylor Chan has been occupational license and personal property manager of the Seminole County Tax Collector's Office for two years. Chan said county development needs to be balanced between environmental protection and controlled growth, and development of the county's tax base.

Alleged victim: No recollection of rape

TAMPA — A woman who claims she was raped at the home of a former newspaper executive testified she was apparently drugged and had no recollection of being attacked.

In more than four hours of tearful testimony Wednesday, the 22-year-old Clearwater woman said all she remembered was waking up in the nude.

"I just remember grabbing my pants and grabbing a sweater or something because I felt so dirty," the woman said. "They were all laughing at me. They said, 'You were having a good time last night — you enjoyed it.'"

Carl Allison, 26, is accused of picking up the woman at a downtown nightclub last April, slipping her LSD and assaulting her with his hand, a shoe horn and a small liquor bottle, even photographing the attack.

His four companions that night, sons of prestigious local families, all accepted plea deals in exchange for their testimony against Allison. They may be

the only eyewitness accounts of the evening.

Among those set to testify is Mark Urbanaki, 25, son of former Tampa Tribune president James Urbanaki. The father was out of town when the attack allegedly occurred in his home.

"I was screaming at them," the woman testified. "Why have you done this to me? What have you done?"

Defense attorney Norman Cannella contended the woman was a concubine, willing participant who told lie upon lie to cover her actions.

In opening arguments, he unfolded a huge billboard displaying more than a dozen different stories the alleged victim told her mother, police and prosecutors.

"I'm not a liar," the woman said under cross-examination. "I was just trying to make sense of things. Put things together."

Prosecutors acknowledged the woman made up some details of the attack only because she felt she wouldn't be believed if she had no recollection.

Judge rejects blanket gag order in student slayings

GAINESVILLE — A judge has turned down a request for a blanket gag order in the case of five student murders but agreed to give defense attorneys 90 days to argue against release of discovery material.

Public Defender Richard Parker wanted to silence all defense and prosecution attorneys, law enforcement officers and public employees involved in the case of Danny Harold Rolling.

Circuit Judge Stan Morris denied the gag order in a 13-page ruling issued Wednesday.

Morris said "the right to a fair trial is pre-eminent when it conflicts with the right of access or the right of free speech and press." But instead of imposing a gag order, he told prosecutors and defenders to stick to Florida Bar rules on trial publicity.

The judge said the State Attorney's Office has the duty to explain the restrictions to law enforcement agencies. State Attorney Len Register said his office had been following the

Florida Bar rules all along when dealing with the news media before and after the November grand jury indictments of Rolling.

Rolling is charged with five counts of first-degree murder in the August 1990 slayings of five college students.

Parker also sought to close, or keep secret, all records, materials and evidence provided by prosecutors until trial. Such "discovery material" is usually made public at the same time it is turned over to the defense.

Morris said the request was too broad but agreed to give the public defender or state attorney 90 days to move for a closed inspection by the judge and an order prohibiting disclosure of specific matters until trial.

Register said he knew of nothing he would seek to keep from public release but would review the materials. He said his office is ready to turn over materials to Parker when it receives a notice of intent to participate in discovery.

Parker didn't immediately return a phone call to The Associated Press.

Dark undercurrents

Cruise industry grows, but discounts stir calm waters

MIAMI BEACH — For an industry built on images of calm turquoise waters and relaxing sun decks, cruise line operators have a lot of worries.

The cruise industry was the only travel sector to grow in a year of war and recession, but its leaders realize they still must learn how to make money while selling heavily discounted tickets on costly new ships.

The industry had "a phenomenal year," said Robert Dickinson of industry-leading Carnival Cruise Lines and chairman of Cruise Lines In-

ternational Association. "Not what we could have had, but enough to keep the wolf from the door."

Passenger traffic rose from a record 3.7 million in 1990 to 4 million last year, but new ships will add space for 480,000 passengers this year, and 22 new ships will arrive by 1994.

Cruise lines have been selling two-thirds of their tickets at discount since 1989, but the Persian Gulf War sent prices even lower as lines competed to fill berths.

Ironically, cruise company executives told the industry's annual Seatrade forum Wednesday that the recession may be a

blessing in disguise for a business offering all-inclusive discount vacations.

But as profit margins tightened, ship prices were on their way up.

Britain's P&O Cruises has ordered a \$350 million ship. Carnival will pay \$315 million for its next one, and two new Norwegian Cruise Line ships will cost \$240 million each, said Trygve Hegnar, chairman of Kloster Cruise Ltd.

In a business dominated by privately held companies, news of a \$250 million profit last year for publicly traded Carnival painted a rosy picture. Royal Caribbean Cruises Ltd.

added the second of three "megaships" capable of carrying 2,300 passengers to become the industry's largest by capacity.

The three-line Kloster showed the most visible signs of sickness last year, losing money, ordering layoffs, losing a financing partner, selling two ships and leasing out a third.

But Kloster's Hegnar was the most openly optimistic at a forum on the state of the industry, saying January bookings hit records, discounts are less prevalent, ship orders are trailing off and his company's year "looks very promising."

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Tough exec nominated to run NASA

WASHINGTON — Daniel S. Goldin, an aerospace executive known for building tough, dependable space hardware, was named Wednesday by President Bush to head NASA, replacing a former astronaut who resigned under pressure.

Bush described Goldin, the 51-year-old vice president and general manager of TRW's Space and Technology Group, as "a leader in America's aerospace industry and a man of extraordinary energy and vitality."

Congressional sources said the selection of Goldin came as a surprise and Rep. George E. Brown Jr., D-Calif., chairman of the House committee that monitors the space agency, said he did not know Goldin. Officials in the space industry said it was not generally known that the White House was considering Goldin for the job.

If confirmed by the Senate, Goldin will take the job being vacated April 1 by Richard Truly, a former astronaut. Truly has said the Bush administration forced him to resign.

In making his announcement, Bush said Goldin will work with Vice President Dan Quayle, who chairs the Space Council, to "assure America's leadership in space as we enter the 21st Century."

Published accounts of Truly's forced resignation last month quote him as saying Quayle encouraged him to quit after the Space Council disagreed with his NASA leadership.

Sen. Al Gore, D-Tenn., chairman of a subcommittee that will act on Goldin's nomination, said in a statement that he was concerned about the Space Council influence on NASA.

"It's reasonable to assume that one reason Dan Goldin is being nominated is that he will take direction from the Space Council," said Gore.

Lost voice

Organizing a largely seasonal, migratory and unskilled work force in the militantly anti-union agricultural industry is a monumental feat. In the 1960s Cesar Chavez and his United Farm Workers made labor history by doing just that.

At the height of the union's power in the mid-1970s, more than 100,000 UFW members worked under union contracts. Because of the union, thousands of farm workers received health benefits and pensions for the first time in their lives. Wages rose and working conditions improved.

But the union has failed to live up to its early promise. UFW membership has dwindled to just 20,000. The union holds only a fraction of the contracts it did a decade ago. Conditions in the fields have deteriorated drastically.

Chavez, the union's charismatic leader is right when he says that the grower-dominated Agricultural Labor Relations Board helped kill the gains of farm workers. National immigration policies also hurt.

Pressured by growers, Congress permitted thousands of farm workers from Mexico to flood the already crowded agricultural labor market. But over the years, something went terribly wrong with Cesar Chavez and the union as well.

"The movement is good. Unity is good. But what doesn't work," says Paulino Gonzalez, a Tulare County (Calif.) farm worker, "is Chavez and his administration."

Gonzalez's words were echoed by scores of farm workers, former UFW organizers and union allies. A picture emerges of a labor organization that has stopped organizing, lost touch with its workers and retreated behind a wall of paranoia and mismanagement. Top-flight, efficient organization and management never has been one of the union's strong points. Nowadays, those who have tried to form alliances with the UFW or to fill the void left by it have been attacked by Chavez and his supporters and accused of being disloyal or even communists.

The UFW is not the only labor organization that has run into trouble. Over the past decade, with the decline of many manufacturing industries and an overall conservative political trend nationally, some of the strongest unions in the country have lost members and power.

But the losses by the UFW, whose hold on power was too fragile to begin with, have been devastating. The growers and do-nothing federal, state and local labor regulators must take primary responsibility for the deplorable conditions of farm workers today.

There was a time when the strong voice of the UFW and Cesar Chavez could have been counted on to rally and protect the people who tended the fields and harvested the crops. One day, perhaps, there will be a voice again.

Blowing whistle on whistle-blowers

One of the great institutions of American society (or so we are told) is the "whistle-blower." This is an employee of the government or a private business who becomes aware of illegalities of some sort in the course of his or her work and "blows the whistle" on them — i.e., goes public with charges of wrongdoing.

Of course, this can be very useful to society as a whole, exposing (for example) fraud and corruption in government, or tax-dodging or shoddy manufacturing processes in private industry, and whistle-blowers naturally come in for a lot of after-the-fact praise for their courage, public spirit, etc.

But I often wonder, in the case of these whistle-blowers, which came first — the chicken or the egg? The disaffection or the whistle?

There is a good example of the problem on the Op-Ed page of March 9th's New York Times. The author is Aldric Saucier, of whom the Times tells us only that he was "a senior scientist for the Army Strategic Defense Command from 1984 to 1992." Saucier adds one other intriguing datum in the course of his article: "On Feb. 14, I was fired for submitting a research paper suggesting that an upgraded, modified Patriot Air Defense System is our best immediate step for a timely, cost-effective ballistic defense missile shield."

Saucier's article then proceeds to dump all

over, and I mean all over, the Strategic Defense Initiative (Star Wars) ballistic missile defense system. He declares that it "has become a serious obstacle to a strong national defense"; that it is riddled with "systematic illegality, gross mismanagement and waste, abuse of power and the subordination of political science for the scientific method"; that it is "a still-expanding, high-risk, space-age national security pork barrel for contractors and top Government managers"; that it "was born in deception and raised in cynicism"; that it is "largely a paper program" and "The reports are a shameful waste"; and that "the Star Wars bureaucracy

regularly churns out false and misleading statements to Congress and the public." And those are quotations from just five of Saucier's 21 paragraphs.

Now, the first thing to note is that this is all pure catnip to Ted Kennedy and the other liberals who have fought SDI from the very beginning. If even a quarter of the charges Saucier makes are true, we are in the presence of a major rip-off of the American body politic.

What bugs me, though, is Saucier himself (about whom, I hasten to add, I have no private information). Is he really in the great tradition of American whistle-blowers, entitled to a medal for exposing rot? He clearly thinks so, boasting that "the Office of Special Counsel, a Federal whistleblower protection agency, ordered the Pentagon to review my assertions."

But isn't it a bit curious that this high-minded public servant could work without apparent complaint as "a senior scientist for the Army Strategic Defense Command from 1984 to 1992," or in other words for eight years, and then come forward with this interminable laundry-list of scathing accusations less than one month after he "was fired"?

SYDNEY, Australia — Queen Elizabeth II, who is technically queen of Australia as well as Britain, came here to help Sydney celebrate its 150th birthday. The trip did not go all that well. In fact, it ended with Australia and Britain — at least the British press — trading some rather pointed insults.

The pr breath waiting for the usual knight-hood that goes to an Australian prime minister upon retirement.

Apparently, as the professor was putting his portable phone into his coat pocket after calling his wife, he inadvertently triggered the redial button. When his wife answered the call she was treated to a very clear rendition of her husband's conversation, which she apparently listened to for the next couple of hours despite the mounting phone bill.

What was the result of all this, the newspaper asked Mr. Williams.

"We're still married," was his curt reply.

A major Australian scandal is developing: People are cooking their car license plates.

In most big cities in Australia, police use cameras to catch people going through red lights at intersections and even speeding. The cameras are tripped automatically by an electric eye; a few days later, the registered owner of the car receives his ticket and usually a rather stiff fine in the mail.

However, someone has discovered, and spread the word, that if you heat your license plates to a high enough temperature (in an oven, for example) the numbers become sufficiently discolored and distorted so that they can no longer be clearly captured on film — even though to the naked eye they seem normal.

The Melbourne telephone company has just published its new "White Pages A-Z." It's no surprise that Smith remains the city's most prevalent surname (7,501 listings). Second place, though, was hotly contested between the Jones, Wilson, Brown and Williams entries — each about 3,800 listings.

One socio-ethnic note that shows how the world is changing: For the first time a non-Anglo Saxon name has moved into the top 10 in Melbourne. The Vietnamese family name Nguyen (2,185 listings) has replaced Johnson.

Anatomical parts are also represented in the listings. There are 109 Heads, 100 Brains, 41 Fists (and 94 Feet), 82 Hands, 46 Leggs, 36 Fingers, 134 Chins, 22 Knees and 10 Necks — a significant body of work indeed.

Cuomo infatuates, infuriates again

It was the morning after our latest big election night, the one in which Bill Clinton won in Georgia, Paul Tsongas won in Maryland, Jerry Brown won in Colorado and George Bush won in every Grand Old Party primary, but not by enough to make Pat Buchanan shut up and go away.

And when we turned on our TV sets, we saw — for one full hour — Mario Cuomo. Say what?

Yes, the 10th-year governor of New York and quadrennial non-candidate of Democratic presidential primaries was the sole guest on a Phil Donahue show devoted to America's favorite topic: Why not, Mario? And Cuomo — who can be the most infatuating and most infuriating figure in politics today — was, once again, all of the above.

That's the way it goes in this, the campaign Year of Anybody But —

Every Tuesday, Republican voters tell us they want Anybody But Bush, as long as it is Anybody But Buchanan. And Democrats say they only want someone who is electable and wish they could vote for Anybody But Clinton/Tsongas/Brown/Harkin/Kerry. Voting these days has become a two-listed ordeal; one hand holds the lever, the other holds the nose.

And that seems to have been what was troubling Phil Donahue, as he opened his show with a dramatic reckoning about a deadlocked convention turning to Cuomo. "What the hell is wrong with this kind of speculation?" he asked. To which the governor gave a most Cuomoian reply: "It is not compatible with my own nature to do things in a kind of oblique, indirect, eccentric way. If you can't go into New Hampshire, rule yourself out. ... To have me and Jesse (Jackson) and other candidates hovering around the margins would not be good for the party."

Donahue, better prepared than most political reporters, interrupted to show a videotape from Feb. 12, just before the New Hampshire election. There, hovering around the margins of the first primary state, was Mario Cuomo, speaking at Harvard as television carried his words to viewers (read also: voters) just a half-hour's drive to the north:

"People are saying, 'We think Mario should be the president; we want to write his name in. ... You can write in Pinochio, you can write in Mario Cuomo (a timely tutorial on precisely how it must be written). ... Why shouldn't they do it if they feel like it? In my own state, they're saying lousy things about me; if they want to say nice things in New Hampshire, I'm going to encourage them.'"

Mario Cuomo: Most infatuating/Most infuriating. He was easily the best campaigner and probably the best candidate the Democrats could have fielded in 1992. Opponents would have painted him with all the sins of New York; he would have dealt with that and come back with more. And mainly, by campaigning in the South, he could have proven what he's always professed (and I've always believed): When times are tough, the same message that moves a middle-class voter in Buffalo will also move a middle-class voter in Birmingham.

(As luck would have it: If you want to prove yourself by running in Birmingham, you can get on the Alabama primary ballot up until April 3. Also, you can get on the California ballot by March 19 and New Jersey's by April 9. Win those three and you'll earn credentials strong enough to break any convention deadlock.)

This has not been a good 12 months for Cuomo.

Senate rejects Bush tax plan

WASHINGTON — A nearly party-line vote against President Bush's tax plan clears the way for final Senate action on a newly trimmed Democratic middle-class tax cut that is headed for a veto.

Dozens of amendments were still eligible to be considered as Democratic leaders pushed for a vote on their bill by tonight. But the 80-37 vote Wednesday night against a Republican substitute removed any doubt about the end result.

"It will be vetoed ... and that veto will be sustained," said Republican Whip Alan Simpson of Wyoming.

Bush's plan failed on a technicality: It did not meet anti-deficit requirements. But the same law forced Democrats at the last minute to scale back their middle-class tax credit, making it available only to families with incomes under \$50,000, rather than \$70,000 as originally written.

Northern primaries gear up

WASHINGTON — The political assembly line is shifting gears as the presidential campaign moves north, preparing to crank out ads targeted to the large blue-collar populations in Michigan and Illinois.

Expect the Bush campaign to take Republican challenger Patrick Buchanan to task for advocating an "America first" trade policy while owning a German-made Mercedes Benz car.

"That fact that he calls for America first but drives a Mercedes probably won't be lost on the good people of Michigan," said a Bush adviser, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Paul Tsongas is poised to attack Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton's commitment to the working class — armed with statistics such as a right-to-work Arkansas' last-place ranking in one worker safety study.

Iraq, U.N. wrestle with complianc

UNITED NATIONS — Saddam Hussein's top envoy and the powerful nations that drove Iraq to its knees are wrestling rhetorically over whether Baghdad is honoring cease-fire terms and still deserves crippling economic sanctions.

The diplomatic combatants were to face off again today with Tariq Aziz, the Iraqi deputy prime minister, addressing detailed questions about weapons destruction, human rights, Kuwaiti detainees and other issues.

On Wednesday, Aziz described Iraq as a proud, suffering nation devastated by allied bombing and battered by economic sanctions that Western nations bent on Saddam's ouster are refusing to ease.

He charged that the U.N.-imposed economic embargo is forcing Iraq into "a pre-industrial age."

U.S. aids southern Africa

WASHINGTON — Teams of U.S. and international experts are being sent to southern Africa to assess the impact on food supplies of what is the worst drought of the century in some areas. Officials said millions of people will be affected.

Among the hardest hit of 10 drought-stricken countries are Zimbabwe and South Africa, traditional food exporters that this year will have to import substantial amounts of grain. As the drought persists, estimates of the grain harvest throughout the region have been falling precipitously.

The deteriorating situation in southern Africa adds a new dimension to the overall food crisis on the continent. The most deprived area is northeast Africa, where the lives of 15 million in Sudan, Ethiopia, Somalia and Djibouti are thought to be at stake.

To the south, officials in Zimbabwe last week said 80,000 people died from starvation in February alone and thousands more will die unless heavy rains come soon.

Light shed on pre-human ancestry

NEW YORK — Scientists today reported the discovery of a 13 million-year-old piece of jawbone from a previously unknown, ape-like forerunner of gorillas, chimpanzees and humans.

The discovery "opens up a whole new geographical area for exploration into pre-human ancestry," said Glenn Conroy, one of the researchers reporting the find in today's issue of the journal Nature.

The fossil was found in Namibia, showing that such "Miocene hominoids" ranged much farther south in Africa than previously known from fossil finds in Kenya and Uganda, researchers said.

The creature apparently lived before hominoids evolved into two branches, Conroy said. One branch led to humans and the other to chimpanzees and gorillas. The split is thought to have occurred between 10 million and 5 million years ago.

Democrats in only two areas of north Seminole County gave Tsongas the edge over Clinton. Voters in Lake Mary and the Markham Woods Road area gave Tsongas a slight lead over Clinton. The three largely Lake Mary precincts voted for Tsongas 180-135 over Clinton. Markham Woods Road Democrats gave Tsongas a 147-98 edge. About 66 percent of both areas' Republicans supported Bush.

Republicans in the Precinct 30 communities of Lake Monroe and Upsala gave Buchanan strong support, giving nearly 44 percent of their votes to him.

Black voters in north Seminole County matched white voter trends and supported Clinton and Bush. In Precinct 3, which includes Midway and areas east of South Beardall Avenue, Clinton received 156 votes to Tsongas' 15. Bush received a 71 percent approval rating.

Precinct 3 has 558 black Democrats and 22 black Republicans, according to county voter registration records. The precinct has 42 white Democrats and 95 white Republicans.

Sanford Precincts 21, 62 and 63, which have black voter populations of 30 to 50 percent followed a similar trend of supporting Clinton and Bush.

Chaac Laabury, of Belair Grove Limited questioned, "If we decide not to do anything at this time, but the S.R. 40-A interchange comes up later, wouldn't that just about double

the cost?"

Steve Homan, public information officer with the DOT commented, "When you are referring to an overpass exit area, you have to plan for everything from the start, including extra lanes, rail areas, ramps and

other needs." He added, "Such changes would have to be approved by the Federal government. I'm not saying it can't be done, but without all of this additional consideration, the Feds won't approve it."

Nick Pope, attorney for Paulucci properties said he had conducted previous discussions with land owners in the proposed interchange area. "If all of the land owners involved would donate their property, that would be one of the big ways to reduce construction costs."

Pope added, "If people won't cooperate and this interchange isn't built, the land value will stay right where it is now and none of the landowners will benefit from this proposal."

Karen Adamson, with DOT, reported the total project could be estimated at \$19.7 million. "We estimate the cost could be reduced by about \$7 million if the right-of-way land would be donated."

electoral votes in a general election face-off, something Democrats haven't won since Jimmy Carter was the nominee in 1976. The Democratic-controlled state Legislature is so confident that Clinton can make inroads that they're attempting to change the existing law that awards all the electoral votes to the majority winner.

"I believe that Bill Clinton put together the coalition that a candidate must have in November, with appeal across all the lines," said U.S. Sen. Bob Graham, who said he is delighted at the prospect of seeking re-election this fall with Clinton

at the head of the ticket.

In an unofficial delegate count, Clinton had 87 Florida delegates secured, Tsongas 58, and Brown three. Tsongas received 34 percent of the vote, Brown captured 12 percent.

MacKay predicts some of the conservative Democrats who favored Bush and former President Ronald Reagan will come back this year.

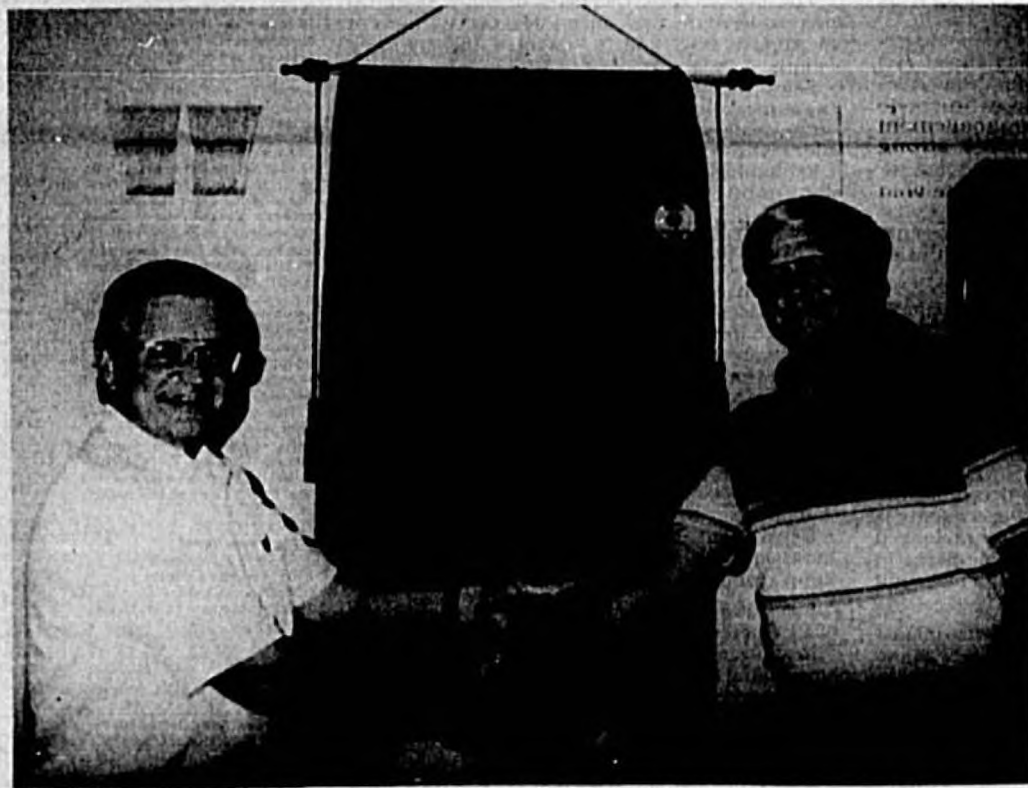
"I think we'll have some of 'em all right," said MacKay. "I think it's going to be very, very different."

Perhaps more importantly for Florida Democrats running for office, they won't have to hide from the national ticket as

became the case in 1988 when the Dukakis candidacy was seen as an albatross for many candidates including MacKay, who was defeated by Connie Mack in the closest U.S. Senate race in the state's history.

Meanwhile, Bush's chief Florida loyalists — son Jeb and Republican Party chairman Van Poole — are confident the president will be too strong for his Democratic opponent in November.

"Frankly we don't care if it's Tsongas or Clinton," Poole said late Tuesday during a celebration at Bush headquarters. "We're ready to get on with the real issues of the campaign."

Wastewater line expected to be completed in two months

SANFORD — Work is expected to be completed in about two months on the line that will eventually end Sanford's wastewater dumping into Lake Monroe.

By the end of 1992, the city will pump much of the 6 million gallons per day of highly-treated wastewater to a citrus irrigation system near Lake Jesup and to the city's growing reclaimed wastewater system for businesses and residences. Excess treated wastewater will flow into the line extending around Lake Monroe to the U.S. Highway 17-92 bridge, where it will flow into the St. Johns River.

The \$40 million system was required as part of a 1986 deal with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to stop pumping treated wastewater into Lake Monroe by the year 1994.

Most of the treated wastewater from the city now flows into a canal next to the wastewater facility that empties into the lake.

Crews with Interbay Marine Construction, a Largo firm, are installing pipeline that will extend from the city wastewater treatment facility northwest along U.S. Highway 17-92 to the St. Johns River and pass underneath Lake Monroe Park and under the river bed. The treated sewage will flow up from the bottom of the river from a point about 100 feet from shore, said city utilities technician Charles Turner.

Retail sales increase again

Joblessness again up but economy improves

WASHINGTON — Retail sales jumped 1.3 percent in February, marking the first time sales have risen more than 1 percent for two consecutive months since 1985, the government said today. All categories except for grocery stores posted gains.

The report was the latest suggestion of a turnaround in consumer spending, which is vital to any recovery from recession since it represents two-thirds of the nation's economy. Retail sales account for half of consumer spending.

However, in another report, the Labor Department said the number of Americans filing first-time claims for unemployment benefits rose to 459,000 in the last week in February, pushing the claims figure to its highest level in a month. The new claims for jobless benefits rose by 22,000 from the 437,000 level of the previous week, officials said.

Economists said the number underscored the fact that even though they believe the economy is finally beginning to emerge from its prolonged slump, the unemployment rate is not likely to begin showing significant improvements until mid-year or later.

Sales had edged up just 0.8 percent in 1991 as the economy struggled to recover. That was the smallest increase in 30 years and compared with gains of 3.8 percent in 1990 and 6.0 percent in 1989.

The Commerce Department said sales of such items as apparel, appliances and automobiles totaled a seasonally adjusted \$157.7 billion in February, up from \$155.6 billion a month earlier. January sales were even stronger than first estimated. They were revised to a 2.1 percent

advance, rather than the 0.8 percent in the initial report. The revision reflected higher automobile, furniture and department store sales and marked the steepest increase since a 2.2 percent gain in February 1991.

The back-to-back increases of more than 1.0 percent were the first since sales rose 1.1 percent in August 1985 and 2.7 percent the following month.

Sales had been flat in both November and December.

Car dealers reported sales were up 1.4 percent after rising 2.5 percent in January.

Excluding the automobile category, sales still were up 1.3 percent.

Sales of durable goods, items including cars and carpets expected to last more than three years, increased 2.3 percent, slightly less than the 2.8 percent advance in January.

Purchases at building material and hardware stores soared 5.7 percent, even stronger than the 3.9 percent gain a month earlier. Stores selling furniture, appliances and other home furnishings posted a 1.3 percent gain following a 2.5 percent advance the previous month.

Sales of non-durable goods such as gasoline and groceries rose 0.8 after a 1.7 percent increase in January.

Department stores rang up a 1.4 percent increase in February, down from a 7.3 percent jump a month earlier.

Sales at apparel stores rose 2.3 percent on top of a 1.6 percent advance in January.

Restaurant and bar sales inched up 0.1 percent after falling 0.2 percent the previous month.

Drug store sales rose 1.2 percent following a 0.1 percent gain in January.

Sales at gasoline stations, which had been unchanged in January, rose 3.1 percent the following month.

Grocers saw their sales fall, however. They were down 0.8 percent after rising 0.3 percent a month earlier.

Investment cupboard looking bare

NEW YORK — Be careful out there!

That's the message savers and investors get over and over again these days when they seek advice on how to manage their money in an especially tricky financial climate.

Stocks are way overpriced, bonds are behaving badly, and money-market interest rates are, in the words of one recent advisory, "pathetically" low.

Furthermore, the real estate boom is over, gold is dead, and collectibles of all types don't have rapid inflation to carry them along any more.

All in all, many experts say, it is no time to be taking big risks. Play it safe.

Such advice is usually well-intended, logical, maybe even wise. The trouble is, it can be

about as helpful as counseling an insomniac to relax and get some sleep.

How does a person invest "conservatively" in a period when the nation's economy, or the world's for that matter, appears to be going through a long, wrenching transition to a future whose shape still can't be discerned?

Since the pursuit of that mission is an art, rather than a science, advisers say the question can't be answered fully in a sentence or two. But they have some suggestions to offer that bear consideration.

Two important precepts, most analysts agree, are to stay diversified and to avoid rushed choices prompted by a sense of having "missed the boat."

"Don't follow the crowd into the most popular of last year's high flyers," says Sheldon Jacobs in his newsletter The

No-Load Fund Investor.

"We think 1992 will be a year of gains in the market, but it's not a year to bet the farm. So stay fully invested, but invest on the conservative side."

The steep drop in money-market interest rates is a major source of urgency for many investors, since it has drastically lowered the income they receive from their assets.

"Savers are all throwing up their hands and saying, 'What do I do now?' It's a real dilemma," observes Jeff Thredgold, chief economist at the multilateral bank holding company KeyCorp.

In their quest for answers, Thredgold says, people who are switching out of bank certificates of deposit into bonds or stocks may be "taking on a element of risk they don't understand."

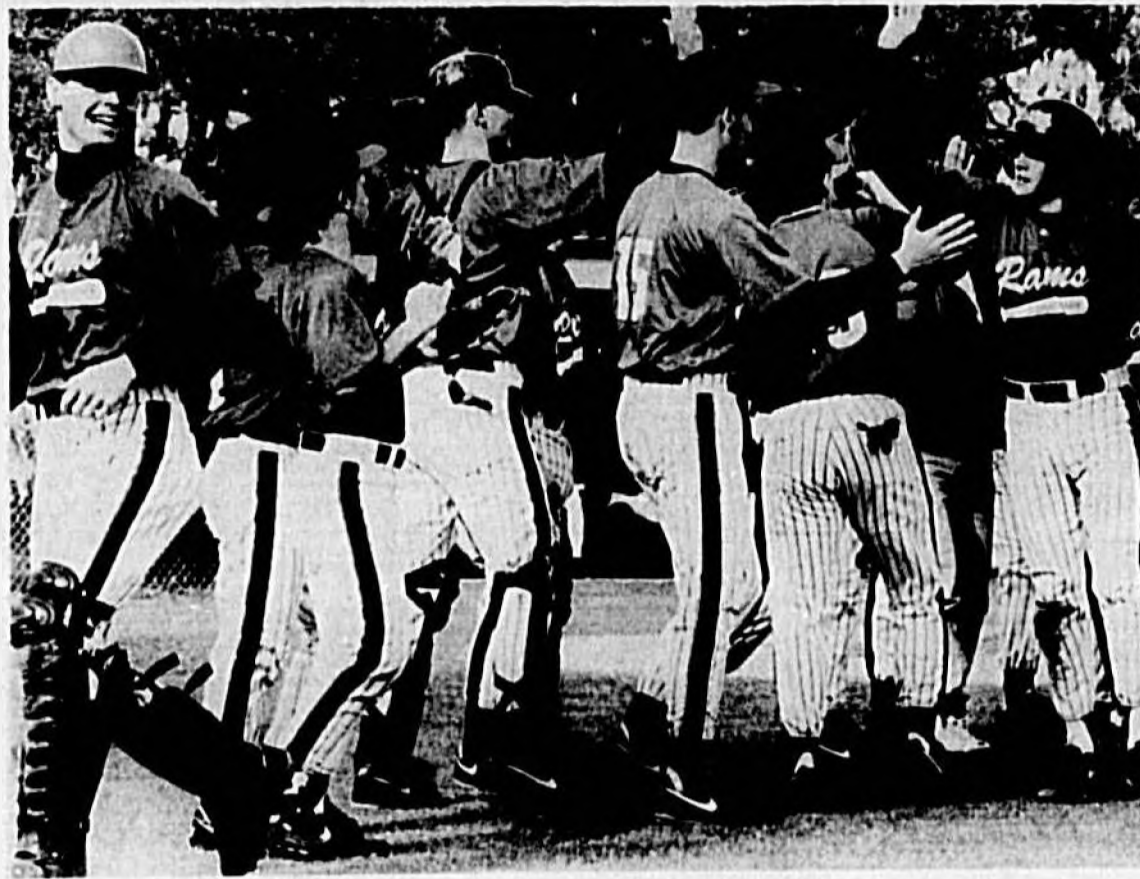

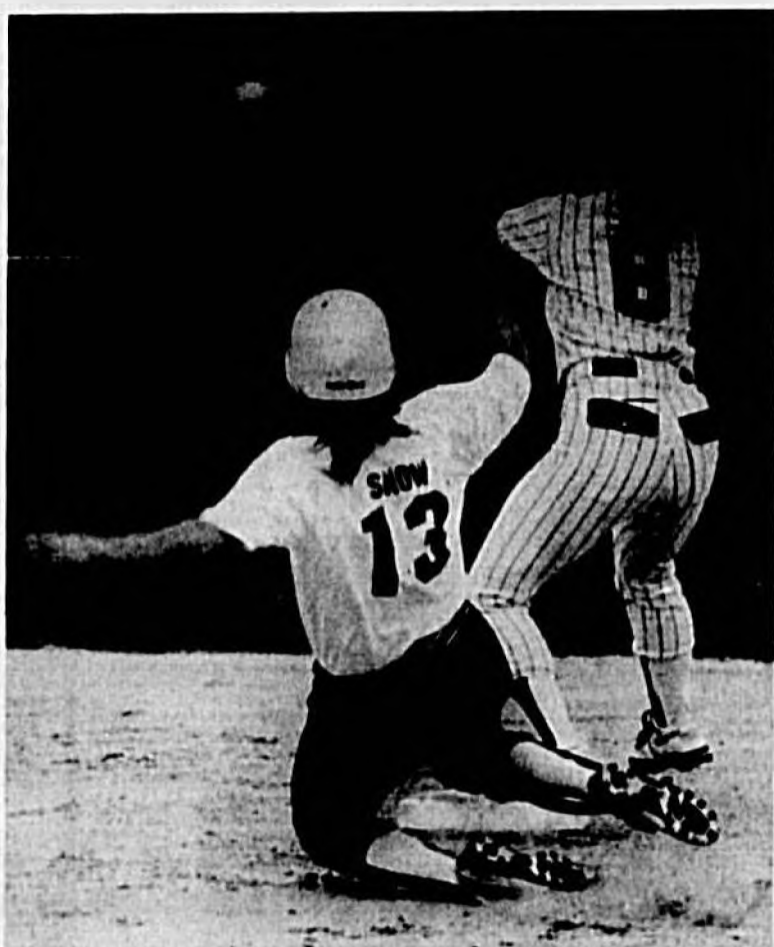

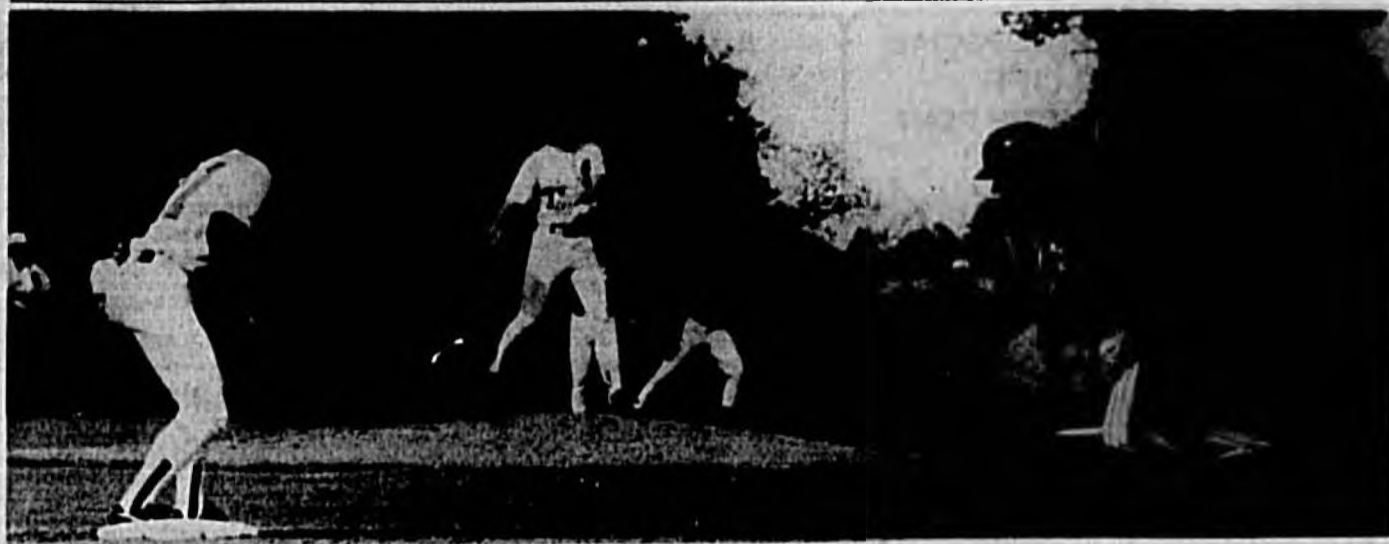

Babysitters rip through refrigerator

DEAR ABBY: If a sitter is going to be at your home during mealtimes, we always buy enough food for her. Here's the problem:

If your instructions are not followed, hire a sitter who is more mature and who will not clean you out.

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

Is a restricted diet truly the way to go?

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband has diverticulosis and a hiatal hernia. What foods should he eat, and which ones should be avoided?

DEAR READER: Opinion varies about which, if any, foods should be avoided by people with these conditions.

Diverticulosis, the age-related appearance of small saccular outpouchings in the intestinal lining, is common and usually causes no symptoms. Some practitioners advise patients to avoid roughage, spices and foods with indigestible seeds.

However, a consensus is far from unanimous that these prohibitions will prevent diverticulosis from becoming infected (diverticulitis), which can cause severe abdominal pain and, sometimes, bleeding.

Many doctors suggest that patients limit their dietary intake of fruit — such as raspberries, blackberries, strawberries and the like — that contains small seeds; this prohibition also includes jams (but not jellies). In my practice, I haven't observed much of a difference between patients who are cautious about seeds and those who aren't. Hiatal hernia, on the other hand, may respond to some dietary restrictions. In this condition, there is a weakness of the diaphragmatic ring through which the esophagus passes. Sometimes this weakness is so pronounced that a portion of the stomach herniates (becomes displaced) into the chest cavity. Hiatal hernia often leads to heartburn and bloating because, without the protective action of the diaphragmatic ring, gastric

juice and acidic gastric contents can backwash up into the esophagus. Termed "reflux," this pain may respond to dietary modification: avoidance of alcohol, caffeine and spices.

Also, patients with hiatal hernia should not lie down after eating or eat too much, as these behaviors can aggravate reflux. Perpetrating heartburn can usually

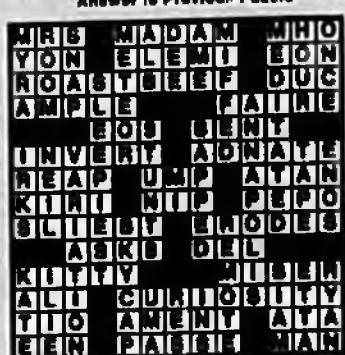
be controlled with antacids or medicines, such as Axid, which reduce the formation of gastric acid.

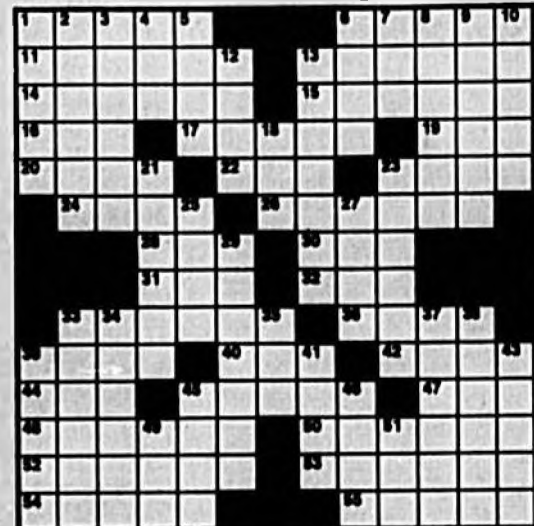

WIN AT BRIDGE

Yesterday's column featured Andy Robson's Bolo Bridge Tip. Robson was also center stage in Terence Reese's tip. As Reese says, there are many situations in which the declarer has to "take a view" on the second round of a suit. In this area both sides have opportunities for clever play.

Cover the East-West cards in the diagram. Against your contract of three no-trump, West leads the spade six: 10, three, two. You play a diamond to your king, which holds, and run the club nine, losing to East's 10. Back comes a spade, your queen losing to West's king. He returns the spade jack to your ace. How do you continue?

After winning with the spade ace, Robson led a club and, when West played the three, went up with the ace, dropping East's king. Now Robson had nine tricks: two spades, three

hearts, one diamond and three clubs.

Why didn't Robson finesse dummy's club queen? He applied the Principle of Restricted Choice. If East had the J-10 doubleton of clubs, he might have won the first round of the suit with the jack rather than the 10. His winning with the 10 suggested that his choice was restricted: that he didn't have the jack. Also, Robson knew that a 3-2 split was much more likely than 4-1, so he decided not to play East for a singleton 10. Thus he put up dummy's ace to drop the king.

Good play, but West missed an opportunity. On the second club lead, he should have played the jack. Then declarer would have placed him with K-J-2 of clubs and would surely have finessed, going two or three down.
