

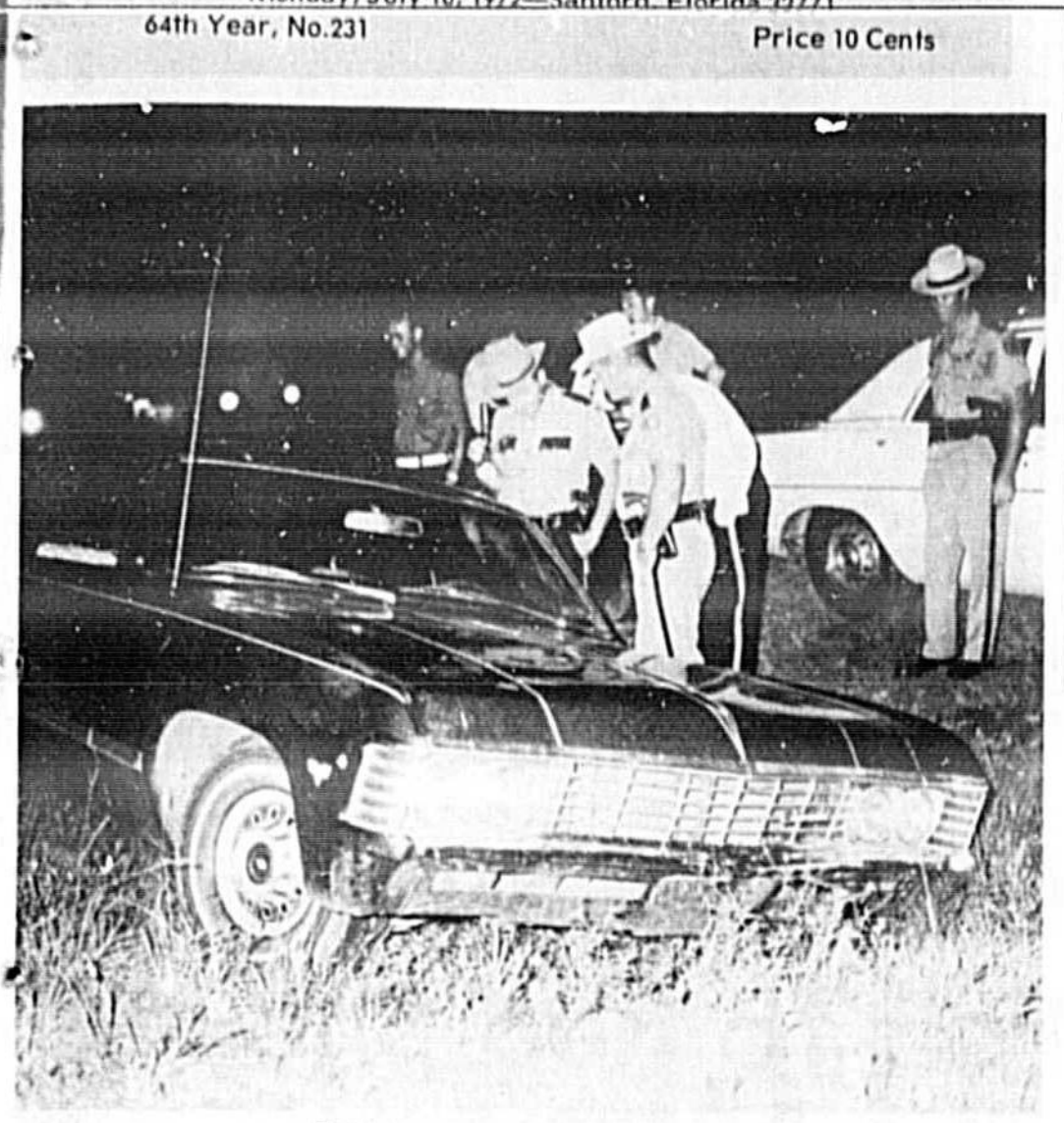

2 Robbers Escape After Wrecking Car

Two suspects escaped a Sanford police county dragnet on foot after wrecking their get-away car in a Saturday night chase that resulted after a robbery of a convenience store. Sgt. Jerry Caphaw, county deputy, reported he was driving on Country Club Road when he received a radio report that two men had held up the L11 Champ Food Store and escaped in a red car. At about the same time, Caphaw reported seeing a parked car just off Country Club Road. When he proceeded to investigate the vehicle, containing two suspects, it left the area at a high rate of speed toward French Avenue. Caphaw chased the vehicle while alerting units of county and Sanford police. With other cars joining in the chase, the red vehicle turned onto French Avenue, south on U.S. 17-92, to SR 436, then to SR 427. The vehicle finally ran into a ditch on Terrace Boulevard, just off SR 427 near the Winter Park Telephone Company warehouse at Altamonte Springs. The two suspects managed to elude the force of approximately 15 cars when they fled on foot into a nearby wooded area after first leaping a chain link fence.

McGovern Still Hopeful

Democrats Launch 1972 Convention Tonight To Nominate Candidate For Presidential Election

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Battering Democrats are preparing to launch their 1972 nominating convention under strict security tonight with Sen. George McGovern's hopes for a first-ballot presidential nomination riding on the bitter California credentials showdown.

Some aides saw the division of the delegation as the only feasible way to revive his faded nomination hopes, while a number of his backers were reported leaning to support of the McGovern position.

Supporters of George C. Wallace generally backed Humphrey's side. The crippled Alabama governor told Tennessee backers he expects to "play a large part" in the convention.

An array of 23 credentials challenges from 15 states is expected to keep tonight's kickoff convention session, scheduled to open at 7:30 p.m. EDT, going through much of the night.

Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, meanwhile, pondered his potentially decisive course on the California credentials case.

Defendant Waits Delayed Sentence Due

Muskie, As Mediator, Agreeable To Veep Post

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Sen. Edmund S. Muskie's advisers have left slightly ajar a door to a possible second run for the vice presidency in his efforts to mediate between feuding Democrats.

Muskie's long consideration of his role in the challenges to the seating of the California and Illinois delegations has led him, he said Sunday, to try to act as mediator.

One possible compromise that may help jell the party, key aides said, might be Muskie's willingness to accept the No. 2 spot on the ticket.

Although Muskie remains publicly reluctant about a casting as somebody else's running mate, his aides said he might be persuaded by the argument that his presence on the ticket means the difference between victory and defeat.

Others close to Muskie say it would take "an awfully hard selling job" to convince him to go that route again, as he did behind Minnesota Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey in 1968.

After a meeting with delegates pledged to him, Muskie called for a conference with Sen. George S. McGovern and Humphrey to head off what he called an impending "self-slaughter" over credentials challenges.

Muskie said he would have specific recommendations to make at such a meeting to resolve the crisis without affecting anyone's candidacy for the presidential nomination.

He did not hint at what his recommendations would be. Democratic National Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien coun-



Two Rape Cases Probed

Two county men have been arrested on charges growing out of two separate alleged assaults on juveniles since Friday.

Leslie was accused of taking two girls to a wooded area known as Oak Way, just off Sanford Avenue, and attempting to assault them sexually.

Deputy Kunkler stated the girls knew Leslie and got into the car with him when he offered them a ride.

After the reported unsuccessful assault, Leslie left the two girls and arrived at his home, where he was later arrested on a warrant by Raymond Parker and Kunkler, county detectives. He is being held in lieu of \$10,000 bond in the county jail.

The critical problem of permanent expansion of the county jail facilities will be pursued by the County Commission in work session tomorrow beginning at 10:15 a.m.

Discussing the complex situation will be Sheriff John Polk and County Administrative Assistant Rodney Laver. Sheriff Polk has indicated a desire to "fill to see how this is present structure and to initiate an agreement with the City of Casselberry to utilize that city's jail as an annex to house prisoners.

Also under discussion will be the proposed branch of the courthouse at Casselberry by Laver and Francis Odio, representing the Masonic lodge.

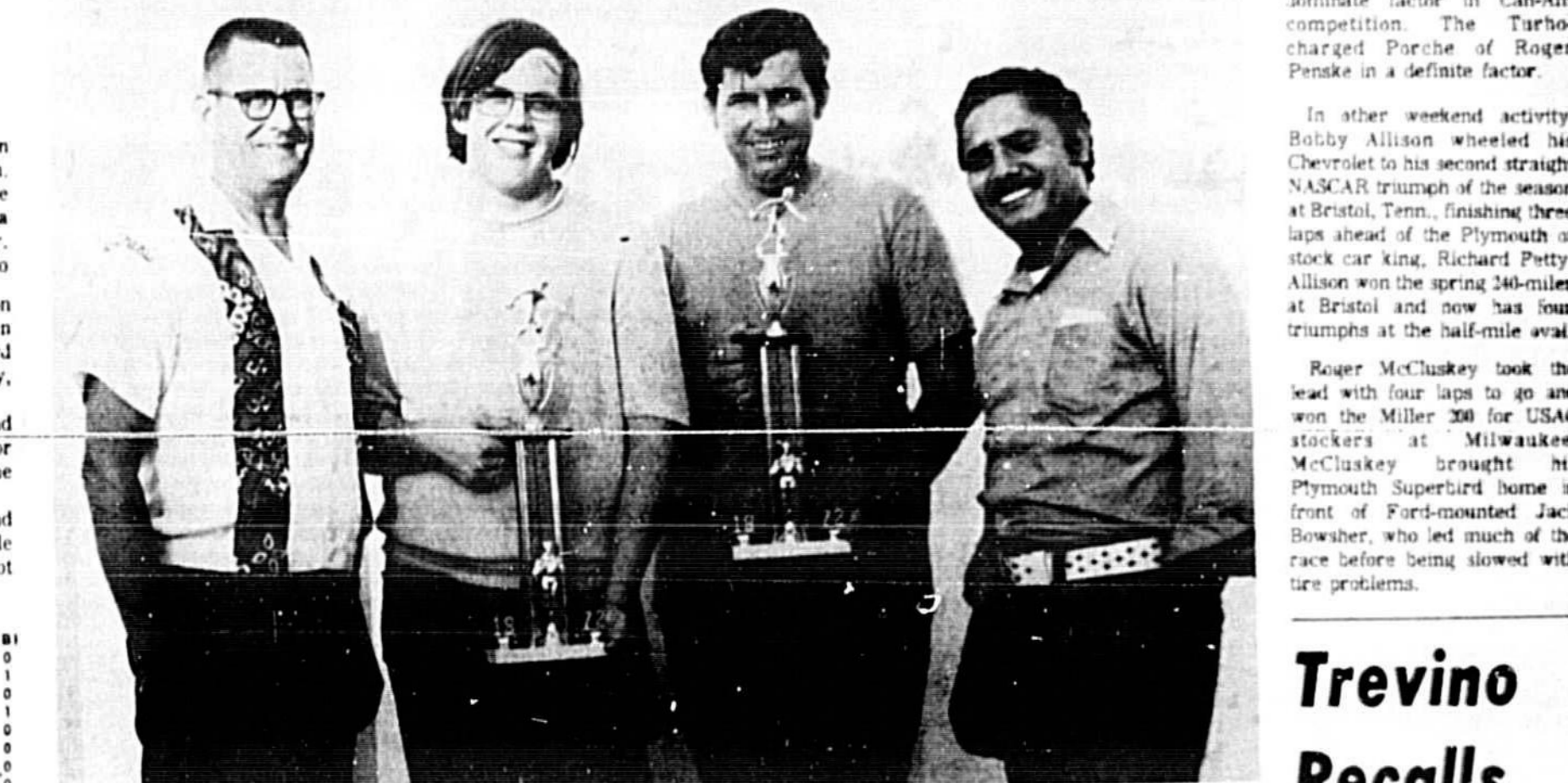
