Child Abuse Detection Possible, Health Pros Told

Parents with the potential to abuse their children can sometimes be detected as early as the first hour after a child is born, Seminole Memorial Hospital Nursing Education Instructor Nancy Edwards told a group of 100 health care professionals at a Wednesday seminar on

The hospital sponsored the seminar to alert nurses and health care workers to what has reportedly become a growing problem in Seminole County. According to figures from the county office of Health and Rehabilitative Services, the number of reported child abuse cases rose from 560 in 1977 to 972 in 1978. The reports cited cases of abuse or neglect of children as young as two

Mrs. Edwards said the behavior shown by a mother immediately after a child is born can often be an indicator of the mother's future pattern of interaction with the

"There are three things to look for in detecting a parent who may abuse a child," she said. "First, you need a parent with the potential. Second, the child has to be exceptional in that in some way it does not meet the expectations of the parent. And third, there has to be a crisis

"In some cases the act of birth itself can be a crisis," Mrs. Edwards said a mother can interpret a baby who is not the sex desired by her or a baby who resembles an

unpopular relative as a crisis and turn away from the child almost immediately. "By the time a mother leaves the hospital she should be

exhibiting certain types of behavior — things like holding and rocking the child, gazing at it and talking to it," she If the mother refuses eye contact with the infant, does not respond to the baby's need for cleaning or has not

given or considered a name for the baby within a few days, after birth, a referral to a social worker on behal f of the mother may be needed, Mrs. Edwards said. Mrs. Edwards said the father of the child should also exhibit a desire to touch and hold the child. Angry facial expressions or harsh vocal disapproval of the baby by the father can make the mother feel inadequate or reinforce

Talks Start Sunday On Sinai Withdrawal

TEL AVIV, Israel - (UPI) - Israel announced today negotiations will start Sunday with Egypt on the first "phase of the Israeli withdrawal from the Sinai Desert under the terms of the Israeli - Egyptian peace treaty. The joint Egyptian-Israeli Military Committee will rheet at Tassa in the U.N. buffer zone of Sinai in the first round of talks devoted to technical details of the pullout, the military command said. The first phase is to be completed by Jan. 25.

It will mark the first formal session designed to implement the provisions of the treaty, made final Wednesday with the exchange of ratification documents.

Cease-Fire May Hold

BEIRUT, Lebanon - (UPI) - Israeli artillery and gunboats pounded several south Lebanon targets overnight but an unofficial U.N.-mediated cease-fire arranged early today appeared to be holding, Palestinian officials and reports from the scene said.

Arab newsmen in the south said Israeli artillery pounded the Palestinian-held town of Nabatiyeh and its nearby villages of Aishiyeh, Kfar Tibnit and Arnoun late Wednesday and early today.

The gunboats shelled Palestinian positions near the coastal town of Sidon shortly after midnight and were seen patrolling the southern coastline at daybreak.

Carter Unveils His

Windfall Profits Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI)- Defeated on one part of his energy program - stand-by gasoline rationing authority - President Carter planned another try today by sending Congress legislation for a windfall profits tax on the oil

companies as a result of his decision to decontrol oil prices, starting June 1.

Press secretary Jody Powell told reporters, "It will be a wugh ... fight to get the fax," and Carter made it clear he expects strong opposition from the "oil lobby," saying the "oil companies want all the money for themselves."

MIAMI (UPI)- The sun came out again Wednesday afternoon to end a 24-hour record-setting cloudburst that unleashed hurricane-like conditions along Florida's Gold

Mother Nature ended the 90-day drought dramatically with a 16.24 inch rain total at the Miami International Airport, setting a record for the most rain received in 24

That exceeds levels set during hurricanes that have lashed Miami through the years. In Fort Lauderdale, 15.63 inches of rain flooded streets and forced the closing of schools. One school roof collapsed, and Broward County officials decided to keep the schools closed until Monday to check for unsafe conditions at other schools throughout the county.



SALT, No Matter What The Costs

The Carter administration has left us no choice but to conclude that its political commitment to a new strategic arms limitation treaty with the Soviet Union is such that the White House is now prepared to ignore or discount alarming new evidence that the prospective agreement may be fatally flawed.

Consider two recent developments. A current U.S. intelligence study concluded that the Soviet Union probably possesses 1,000 more intercontinental ballistic missiles than are counted under either the SALT I agreement now in effect or the SALT II treaty reportedly close to completion. And Adm. Stansfield Turner, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, has admitted in closed testimony that loss of the two electronic listening posts in Iran will compromise this country's ability to verify Soviet compliance with SALT II terms until 1984, one year before the treaty

These disclosures are likely to deal a devastating setback to the administration's case for SALT. Yet the president's SALT spokesmen blithely discount the secret stockpile of Soviet missiles as of "little military significance." And, notwithstanding Adm. Turner's reluctant, damaging admission, the administration continues to insist publicly — as Secretary of Defense Harold Brown did — that U.S. verification capabilities are sufficient to detect Soviet cheating on either SALT I

Only political considerations could explain such untenable interpretations in the face of the countervailing evidence.

The Carter administration's cavalier willingness to dismiss a hidden arsenal of 1,000 Soviet ICBMs is mind boggling. This reserve force would give Moscow at least 2,600 ICBMs to fewer than 1,100 for the United States. If these reserve missiles are "military insignificant," why would the Soviets build them?

Granted, SALT I and SALT II limit only fixed missile launchers, not the missiles themselves. So, technically, additional missiles are not violations of any existing or prospective arms agreement.

But it is also true that about 350 of the Soviet

Union's 1,600 missile-launching silos are equipped to withstand the heat and blast of a launching and can thus be reloaded with new missiles in a matter of hours. Beyond the doubled threat posed by reloadable silos, can the Carter administration afford to ignore the possibility — that the Soviets could launch pre-positioned, reserve ICBMs from concrete pads whose existence could be easily

In truth, a secret and uncounted arsenal of Soviet ICBMs could, in a sudden crisis, be quickly deployed with devastating effect on the Soviet-American strategic balance. It would then, of course, be too late to bemoan the yawning gaps in SALT II that permitted the Soviets, legally, to

obtain a crushing strategic superiority.

Yet, by the administration's own admission, there is nothing in SALT II that would ban reloadable silos or limit the numbers of strategic missiles the Soviets could build. As we said, it boggles the mind.

As for verification, the revelation that the Soviets possess a concealed stockpile of ICBMs dramatically underscores the dangers inherent in anything less than foolproof safeguards against SALT cheating.

The loss of the listening posts in Iran crippled the critically important monitoring of Soviet missile tests and development. Without this monitoring, there is no way to know, among other things, whether the Russians are packing more warheads into their missiles than would be permitted under SALT II.

These disturbing disclosures are only the most recent in a series of developments that are rapidly eroding the case for SALT II despite the administration's desperate, and at times disingenuous, defense of the prospective treaty.

Logan Has A Chuckle

On the day in question, the Dodgers blanked the Braves, 7-0, at Ebbets Field, with starter Jim Wilson going until the fifth inning when he was knocked out and Ernie Johnson, the same fellow who broadcasts the Braves' games now, coming in to relieve in the sixth. Bickford came on in the eighth to finish up. "In the fifth inning, with Wilson still pitching for us," Logan

He put his own \$100 back in his wallet, then rolled up Bickford's and handed it back to him, saying, "I'm not a betting man." That only angered Bickford more.



Perhaps, it was this combination of academic talent and compassion that helped Mrs. Coleman to receive the title of Florida Teacher of the Year Tuesday. She will now represent the state in national competition in 1980.

What goes on inside the classroom of the Florida Teacher of the Year? Recently, a reporter spent one period with the sixth

graders of Mrs. Coleman's TEP class. These students

spend one school day with Mrs. Coleman each week and attend their academic classes the other four. "We do a lot of public speeches, debates and discussions of new events," explains Mrs. Coleman. Proudly posted on the classroom door, a banner announces "This is the classroom of the teacher of the

The chairs are arranged in a circle around the classroom and brightly-colored posters of animals and wise anecdotes hang indiscriminately on the wall. At one end of the room stands a dark brown lectern which will be in use today, Mrs. Coleman says. The students will exchange topics between themselves

bright (my life as a vampire) to intensely serious (my life in the depression). Topics that could spring only from a

One comical impromptu speech is cleverly presented by Rhett who told of his life as a "misused checkerboard" who lives in a dark closet until the kids decide to play with

"I don't know why I want them to play with me," Rhett says. "Whenever they win, they throw me up in the

Or Rhett adds, "I don't like people standing on me, it gives me a black square ache." Besides the impromptu speeches, the children of creative writing, try their hand at deductive-thinking puzzles and on May 15, they will present a 15-minute

All the students say they like the small class size and the personal attention they receive from their teacher. "I like when we have class discussions where all the class can be in it," says Scott Anderton. "We talk about the gas prices, the Voyager getting pictures from places, about articles and stuff in the newspapers."

One student comments on the freedom and flexibility of

"One thing I like is Mrs. Coleman lets us express ourselves, our thoughts and feelings." "This is a unique situation," Mrs. Coleman says.

"Regular classes usually have 40 students elbow to elbow. We develop a closer relationship with 15 students. It's a unique opportunity to work with these kids." Mrs. Coleman also instructs a TEP class for seventh and eighth graders at Tuskawilla Middle School. She has a total of 58 students under her wing and enjoys every minute of it, she says.

"When you work with children of this caliber, you can look to the future with all the confidence in the world."
