## Industry Rushing To China, Solons Rushing To Protest

In the fore of U.S. industrial giants rushing to open trade with China, Pan American World Airways announced it will open direct air service to Peking Jan. 1, if it receives government approval. Coca-Cola Co. said it is planning to market its product in China beginning next month and Boeing will supply the country with three 747SP jumbo jets, with an option for two more.

## 2 Gandhi Pals Also Jailed

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—Former Prime Minister Indira Gandhi was joined behind bars by two former associates, charged with contempt of Parliament and breach of privileges in blocking a 1975 probe of her son's business dealings. Mrs. Gandhi's supporters called for a general strike in the city of Bombay today and throughout the state of Maharashtra Thursday to protest her jailing.

## It Can Happen In France

PARIS (UPI)—When the northeastern United States experienced a huge blackout in 1965 and New York City was plunged into darkness in 1977, France's national power company had boasted this could not happen in France. But, Tuesday, after a giant power failure caused a blackout in most of France and part of Switzerland and Belgium, which import French electricity, Industry Minister Andre Cisarud ordered a full public inquiry to determine where to place the blame.

## Temple Account Blocked

BERNE, Switzerland (UPI)—The Swiss government said today it has ordered a Zurich bank to block an account apparently opened by the Peoples Temple sect of the late Rev. Jim Jones.

## Italy Terrorists Firebomb

ROME (UPI)—Terrorists firebombed a business association outside Naples and torched a car in Milan today, raising to 20 the number of cities struck by violence since Friday in the most serious wave of terror since the abduction-killing of former Premier Aldo Moro last spring.

## Jet Hijacked, 132 Held

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—An Indian Airlines jetliner bound for New Delhi was hijacked today and forced to land in Benares, where its 126 passengers and six crew were reported being held inside the parked craft.

# Hospital Trustees Eye Lot To Purchase

Seminole Memorial Hospital's board of trustees is looking at the possibility of buying a lot on the east side of Melbourne Avenue across from the hospital and adjacent to three other lots already owned by the hospital.

any property that might be available to us." Mrs. Shoemaker noted the hospital would not be able to acquire more land north of its present site, because of Lake Monroe. She noted the hospital may have more land to the east in the future and the board member said she would like to see the hospital in a better position to relocate the hospital in Gainesville.

The board also met with members of the Seminole County Commission Tuesday for a tour of the hospital. Charles Bentley, hospital administrator, explained the hospital's plans for expansion include a 36-bed addition as well as new construction to relocate the surgical and intensive care facilities; expansion of long-range services; further expansion of business offices and lobby areas; modernization of patient rooms; two new passenger elevators and a service elevator.

The expansion would increase the hospital's total area from 115,000 to 122,000 square feet, an addition of 7,000 square feet. The \$13.5-million expansion would necessitate the hospital changing from a public to a private facility as it could not sell tax free bonds to private investors in order to finance the project.

The Orange-Seminole-Osceola Transportation Authority (OSOTA) buses serving the Sanford area will continue to operate on Saturdays through January, Seminole County Commissioners decided Tuesday.

The January Saturday runs will be a trial to see if ridership continues at a high level on that day after the holidays. County Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff, the commission's representative on OSOTA recommended the action, saying the highest ridership seen during the short time the buses have been in operation was last Saturday when 230 to 240 persons used the buses.

"The January operation will serve as a trial to see if continued Saturday service is feasible," Kirchhoff said. "Historically, January is not a good month in the business," he said. "We'll see what happens."

store, two female clerks, a pharmacist and one customer, to lay down in the back of the store.

When everyone had done as they were told, the pair went through a cash register and the narcotics cabinet in the pharmacy. The robbery took less than five minutes.

Records indicate the pair got away with about \$300 in narcotics and \$500 cash. The third robbery occurred at the Shop and Go convenience store at 1900 Country Club Road.

Wanda Thomson, 35, of Sanford was the clerk in the store at the time and she said the man was wearing a green fatigue jacket, a knit stocking mask over his face and a green cap. The woman said as the man entered the store and pulled a gun he grabbed the one woman customer in the store and ordered her to face the rear of the establishment.

He walked around the counter, the woman said, and when he became impatient at the clerk's slow movements, he grabbed the money himself and walked out of the store. Records indicate he got \$50 in the robbery.

Some law enforcement agencies have set up special patrols throughout December to watch convenience stores, which are especially vulnerable to armed robberies, this time of year. Officials explained the Christmas season traditionally is a time of numerous armed robberies because people feel the need to have money to spend.

## Cleveland: Mayor, Foe Deal Might Save City

CLEVELAND (UPI)—Mayor Dennis Kucinich and his City Council foes appeared today to have reached a compromise that could save the city from bankruptcy and avert the threatened layoffs of 2,000 municipal workers.

## 1st Carter Granddaughter

ATLANTA (UPI)—President Carter is a grandfather again. Daughter-in-law Judy Carter gave birth in Atlanta to a girl Tuesday. Husband Jack says they've named the child Sarah Rosemary—the middle name being a combination of the given names of her two grandmothers, first lady Rosalynn Carter and Mary Edna Langford. The Carters have two other grandchildren, but Sarah is the first granddaughter.

## Haldeman Home For Holiday

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Former President Richard Nixon's chief of staff H. R. Haldeman goes free on parole today, leaving only former Attorney General John Mitchell the only Watergate figure still jailed. Mitchell is scheduled to be paroled Jan. 16. Haldeman, 52, served 18 months, of an original sentence of up to 8 years, at the minimum security federal prison camp at Lompoc, Calif.

CONCORD, N.H. (UPI)—Gov. Meldrim Thomson has ordered the flag of Taiwan flown over the Statehouse this week to protest the establishment of diplomatic relations with mainland China. Thomson issued a proclamation ordering state flags on all state buildings be flown at half staff until Saturday. Early Tuesday the governor ordered the Taiwan flag flown under the U.S. flag.

## Anik-B Circling Equator

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—Anik-B circled Earth 23,300 miles above the Equator today to mark continued success in the \$40 million mission to provide Telesat Canada with its fourth domestic communications satellite.

## 20 Tons Pot, 13 Arrests

WILMINGTON, N.C. (UPI)—At least 13 people have been arrested and authorities are still searching for suspects in the seizure of 20 tons of marijuana at a marina on the Inland Waterway near Wilmington.

## U.S. Liable For Skylab

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An international treaty negotiated six years ago makes the United States liable for damage that might result from falling debris when Skylab plunges to Earth like a shower of meteors. The latest estimate is that Earth's atmosphere will drag the abandoned space station out of orbit and to fiery destruction as early as May and as late as mid-1980.

A Season For Taking Away?

We don't envy Grace Perry. While everyone else is figuring out what to give to whom this holiday season, Mrs. Perry must figure out from whom she must take away.

As director of the Meals on Wheels program for Seminole Community Action (SCA), Mrs. Perry administers a program under which 61 homebound elderly receive one hot meal daily.

But, as of Jan. 1, 1979, there will be only enough money to provide that one hot meal to 40 regular recipients of the SCA program.

What happened? Here's the story: Several months ago, part of the federal funding for the meals program was cut off and transferred to the Seminole County Federation of Senior Citizens Project OASIS (Older Americans Service in Seminole).

Through that program, 30 hot meals were being distributed daily. Along the way, for various reasons, 21 recipients were dropped. Not wanting to see anyone suffer, Mrs. Perry went to her drawing board and devised an accounting method lowering the per-meal cost and allowing her to add those 21 to her list of SCA clients.

But the bubble has burst. Mrs. Perry was informed by the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services this week that—cost savings or no cost savings—15 would have to be dropped from her SCA program.

Otherwise, she learned, the entire program would be doomed. Grace Perry accepts full blame for her predicament. "I knew I wasn't going to get by for long. I realize we can only do so much with what we've got," she concedes.

"I should not have added the 21 to our program, but I couldn't say to them they didn't deserve to eat."

So Mrs. Perry's task is a wretched one at this otherwise joyous time of the year for most. Should she take the meal from "the man with crutches... or the lady with no legs?"

That's her holiday choice as she studies her sad non-shopping list. "A little trying and praying never hurt," she says stoically, looking back.

We agree. And we commend Mrs. Perry for doing what she did. For helping those extra hungry neighbors even for those few extra weeks.

And, who knows? Maybe, just maybe between now and the Jan. 1 cutoff date, more "trying and praying" will pay off and a remedy be found.

Maybe, just maybe, someone out there just might find some way to fill the void on a one-to-one basis for that "man with crutches..." the lady with no legs..." or the 13 others who will be without what most of us take for granted: one hot meal a day.

Maybe, just maybe... This is, after all, also the season for miracles, isn't it?

Help Still Wanted

The Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) barely survived attacks on it in the recent Congress. Congress agreed to extend the act with a provision that greater emphasis be placed on training the chronically unemployed for specific jobs in the private sector.

Two people can be put through skills-training for what it costs to keep six on a public payroll for a year. A new program in San Diego, Calif., is showing how CETA can work in this desirable way.

General Dynamics-Convair, Rohr Industries and Solar Turbines International have had trouble finding trained machinists and machine operators in the local labor market. So 39 unemployed people are enrolling on a 18-month training program, under a CETA grant, that is expected to qualify most of them for jobs at the three companies.

Front pages frequently report a high unemployment rate while there are many columns of Help Wanted ads elsewhere in the paper.

A government program that helps build a bridge between the unemployed and specific job opportunities in a community can justify itself; one that simply creates make-work jobs in government cannot.

There is hope for CETA after all.

Carter 'Whip' Lacks Control

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Almost two years after Jimmy Carter's inauguration as president, his side still run a political operation that lacks the professionalism and sophistication expected of the White House staff.

Although the impetus of Carter's political agenda was the subject of considerable discussion in late 1976 and early 1977, there had been indications of increased competence during the past year.

But their performance during the Democrat's National Party Conference, recently held here, demonstrated that the White House's political influence over Carter's own party remains tenuous at best.

The size of the convention (more than 1,000 delegates were elected) presented the toughest challenge for Carter's political operatives since the 1976 presidential campaign, but the structure of the meeting should have given the White House an opportunity to maintain order but firm control.

The conference was sponsored, organized and run by the Democratic National Committee, whose staff is totally subordinate to the White House.

More than two dozen full-time White House employees — who usually work on political, personnel, legal and other matters for the president — were dispatched to Memphis as part of an elaborate, three-day "whip" operation to secure and hold delegate votes on Carter's

"In addition to these middle-level White House aides, the president's son Chip was active in soliciting delegate support, as were Hamilton Jordan, Carter's senior political aide; Tim Kraft, Jordan's deputy, and Frank Moore, the White House liaison officer with Congress.

Despite that show of strength, the White House contemplated to lose Edward K. Lewis, a Mississippi legislator, rather than risk a floor fight over the controversial issue of how quickly to initiate a national health insurance program.

When Douglas Fraser, president of the United Auto Workers, failed to gain similar concessions on a White House-opposed resolution rejecting any federal budget cuts for domestic social programs, that measure became the only item submitted to a full roll call vote at the conference.

In their direct challenge to the White House, the party activists and liberals led by Fraser lost, but secured a very respectable 28.3 percent of the total vote.

The votes of the individual state delegations in that confrontation indicated that the South generally remains firmly behind Carter but his support in other regions of the country is soft and thin.

In another display of ineptness, the White House allowed two separate, uncoordinated documents — the chart identifying its "whip" assignments on the convention floor and the administration's instructions to those floor leaders — to fall into the hands of both reporters and political opponents.

Ted Kennedy: Socko Act

By ARNOLD BAVELZEL WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teddy Kennedy was the socko act in Memphis. The Massachusetts senator's speech on national health insurance provided just about the only excitement during the entire three days of the Democratic midyear conference.

As a result, there were some people who interpreted the Kennedy appearance and the response it received as the first real sign that the senator might be trying with the idea of a 1980 challenge to President Carter.

That is an interesting idea, except for two points. The first is that Kennedy did not remain in Memphis to lead the battle for the health insurance proposal he is pushing in competition with the administration's plan. Had he done so, it surely would have been taken as a sign that Kennedy was staking out a possible place in the 1980 picture.

The second is that there was no visible political follow-up to the Kennedy appearance or any extended appearance working on his behalf in Memphis. The Kennedy are not new to campaign organizations and nothing happened at Memphis that looked like a Kennedy operation.

So what conclusion can be taken from Kennedy's impromptu appeal to the midyear conference? There is the possibility that the speech was exactly what it was labeled — an expression of Kennedy's deep belief that the right and the administration is wrong on the issue of imple-

On-Again, Off-Again Policies

None of the European leaders put it in just those words in my recent meetings with them, but it did not take much reading-between-the-lines to get the message: stop your on-again, off-again policy contradictions if you expect our confidence in the United States to be restored.

For defense reasons and economic ones, our Western European allies have good reason to worry when U.S. actions are inconsistent and seem to lack a coherent design. They live under the shadow of Russian SS-20 rockets and SA,000 Warsaw Pact nuclear tanks, most of them not more than three hours' drive from West Germany's capital of Bonn.

These allies depend to a far greater extent than we on export trade. And, when the dollar weakens because of sustained deficits and the inflation and cheapened money supply the deficits produce, our allies worry about how such problems will seep through their own economies.

The start of the new European monetary system is at least partially a defensive move by nations concerned that we will not act fast enough to cure our economic problems and strengthen the dollar.

Has the White House gotten the message? One gets the clear impression that the message has been delivered all right, but also that it is possible no one in Washington was listening. The contradictory policies continue. Consider two actions which were reported on successive days a few days ago. They are symptomatic of the confused signals the administration is sending out.

One headline proclaimed, "Carter Renews Adherence to a Tough Rights Policy." It reported a speech by Mr. Carter at a White House ceremony on the 30th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. It was a ringing speech. To "regimes which persist in wholesale violations of human rights," he said, "we will continue to convey our outrage, nor will we waver in our determination to be unrelenting."

He proceeded to list governments that practice repression, and the Soviet Union leading the list. He added, "Human rights is the root of our foreign policy."

How's that again? The day after the president delivered his rhetorical commitment to human rights, Secretary of the Treasury Michael Blumenthal was in Moscow for trade talks. He delivered a little lecture to the Soviets for arranging a U.S. businessman last summer on trumpeting a charge.

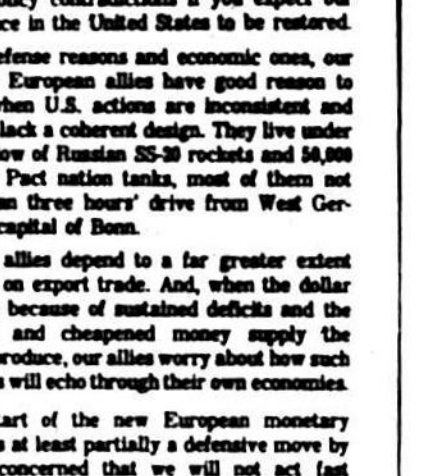
But, having done this, he then unleashed on his hosts the terrible swirl of the Carter administration's human rights policy he announced that a much-needed other purchase of \$5 billion of oil and gas exploration equipment by the Soviets from American companies had at last been approved by our government!

TEDDY'S NATIONAL HEALTH CARE PLAN

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teddy Kennedy was the socko act in Memphis. The Massachusetts senator's speech on national health insurance provided just about the only excitement during the entire three days of the Democratic midyear conference.

As a result, there were some people who interpreted the Kennedy appearance and the response it received as the first real sign that the senator might be trying with the idea of a 1980 challenge to President Carter.

That is an interesting idea, except for two points. The first is that Kennedy did not remain in Memphis to lead the battle for the health insurance proposal he is pushing in competition with the administration's plan. Had he done so, it surely would have been taken as a sign that Kennedy was staking out a possible place in the 1980 picture.

The second is that there was no visible political follow-up to the Kennedy appearance or any extended appearance working on his behalf in Memphis. The Kennedy are not new to campaign organizations and nothing happened at Memphis that looked like a Kennedy operation.

So what conclusion can be taken from Kennedy's impromptu appeal to the midyear conference? There is the possibility that the speech was exactly what it was labeled — an expression of Kennedy's deep belief that the right and the administration is wrong on the issue of imple-

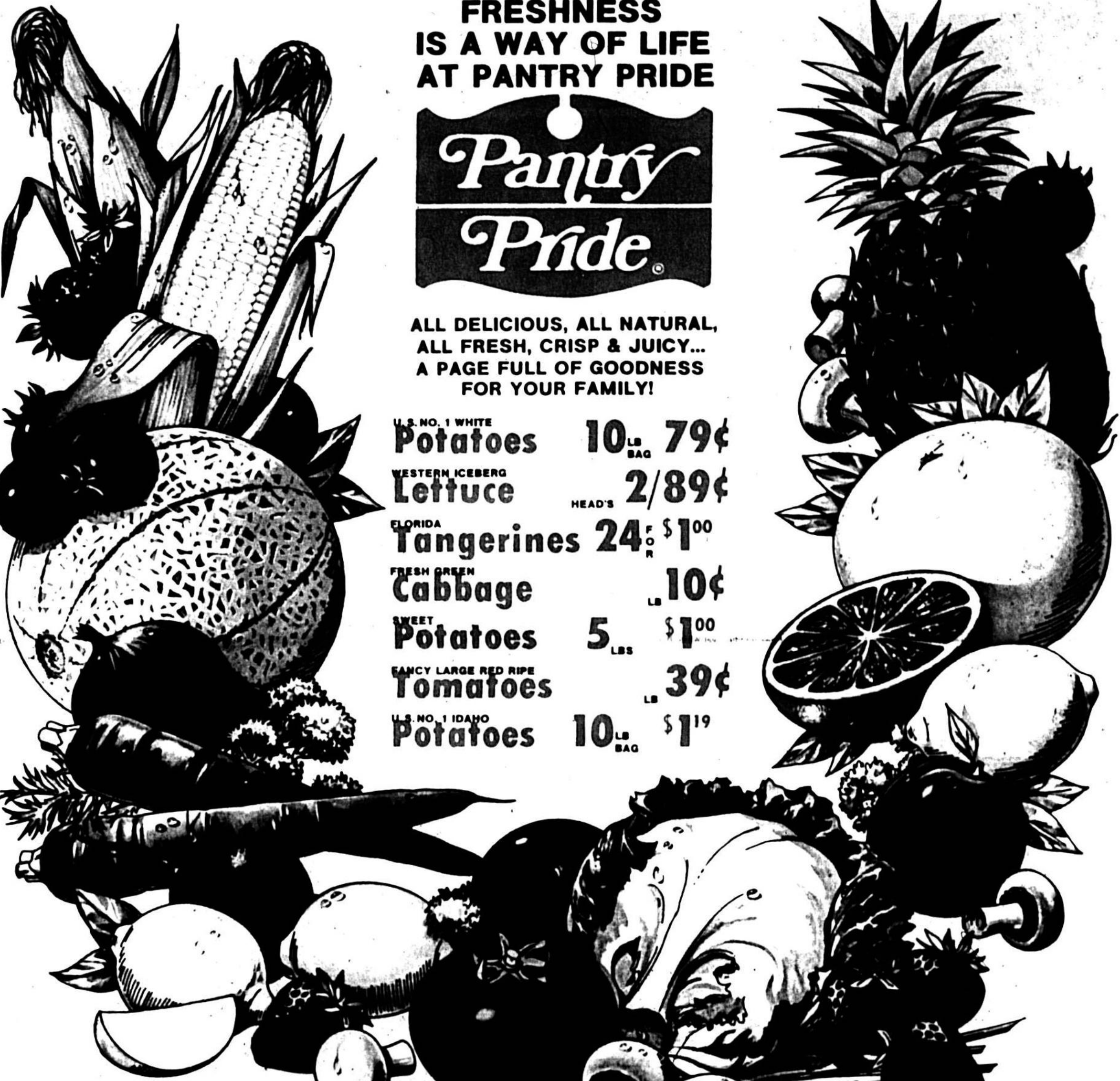

## Women CAN And DO Work For Women

By ELLEN GROSSMAN  
NEW YORK (NSA) — There are two reasons one woman will work for another: (1) she likes to hang her head against the wall; (2) she needs her head against it.

Masochistic or mad, that's what she is — because everyone knows female bosses give awards to female employees.

But then there's Jo Foxworth, a large, plump, 40-year-old woman from the South who's been on both sides — successfully — during her 27 years in advertising, and has written about them all in "Boss Lady," (T.Y. Crowell).

True, she says, as an employee, she worked for her share of bosses. "I had a creative director once who never let me hand her my copy and walk away. She'd call me back and say, 'let's go over this together right now.' I'd read and read and her face would cloud up as if everything in the world was wrong with it. Finally she'd say, 'daring, we place punctuation inside quotation marks.'"

Cute. Almost as cute as the "masochist," another type Ms. Foxworth has known who "lets the other's on a horse and give herself great airs. She also does things to make you feel small and foolish like picking list off your shoulder when you aren't any." Or looking every man's but in your eye. That does wonders for her ego and flatens your, which is how she wants it.

After all, you're a woman, Ms. Foxworth says, which is what makes the female-for-female working situation so often better. "If women are born competing with each other, largely for male attention and favors," Ms. Foxworth says, "and the competitiveness carries over—even when there are no male favors involved."

Still, Ms. Foxworth, who heads her own New York advertising agency, says she adored a couple of the women she worked for and her own secretary says she's a swell boss herself. Her's is done.

"First of all," she says, "the only place to put anything is up front, when you're interviewing. If you're straight with people they'll usually be straight with you. I always ask the person if she's worked for women before and how she feels about it. If there's any hostility, that will come out in her answer. There'll be some hesitation." Or some other sign, like a Brown cheer and the job will go to someone else.

Whoever does get it, though, will know what it's all about. hours, money, watering or not watering plants. As Ms. Foxworth will know what the candidate wants. "I like to say you tell me your dreams and I'll tell you mine. And when I have someone, it's always with the stipulation that we give each other six weeks to see if it will work. You usually can tell in two weeks, but things can happen. And at the end of six weeks, as agreed, I give my secretary an increase of \$10 and another increase at the end of six months."

Naturally, once welded, gripes will develop along the way (on both sides, and all should be strict, she says). Bay the secretary comes to with a letter where margins look like station runs. Don't roll it in a ball and fire it back at her. That's just what a female boss would be expected to do.

"The female boss with a complaint always has to start with what's right about a thing first," she says. "If my secretary brought me a letter like that, I'd say this is just beautiful but I really would like it if the margins were even."

Don't start wailing like a woman, either, when things go awry, and don't turn your secretary into your therapist. "You can be nice and friendly without making your secretary to take on all your personal problems," she says. "That's overpersonalizing the relationship."

If, when you were sitting out there for years, you had your head picking up your boss' laundry, by all means don't let your secretary do it. And if the young woman makes Joe something, maybe you should let her lunch, but don't send you to hang her about it. Her mother

In warm bowl, mix together flour, sugar and salt. Stir in egg yolk and lemon rind with a fork. Blend in butter with

Measure warm water into medium, warm bowl; sprinkle in yeast; stir to dissolve. Stir in 1/2 teaspoon sugar, salt, and eggs. Beat in flour until completely blended. Beat in orange rind and 4 tablespoons melted butter until dough is shiny. Brush 3-ounce molds or 2 1/2-inch muffin-pan cups with remaining 1/2 cup butter. Fill each mold half full with dough. ## Panel Has Evidence 2nd Gunman In JFK Slaying

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House Assassinations Committee scheduled to go out of existence Dec. 31, will reopen public hearings next week into new evidence suggesting Lee Harvey Oswald may have had an accomplice in the murder of John F. Kennedy.

The committee member said expert analysis of a police recording made at the instant shots were fired at Kennedy's motorcade as it passed through Dealey Plaza in Dallas, Texas, showed "beyond a reasonable doubt" someone other than Oswald was involved.

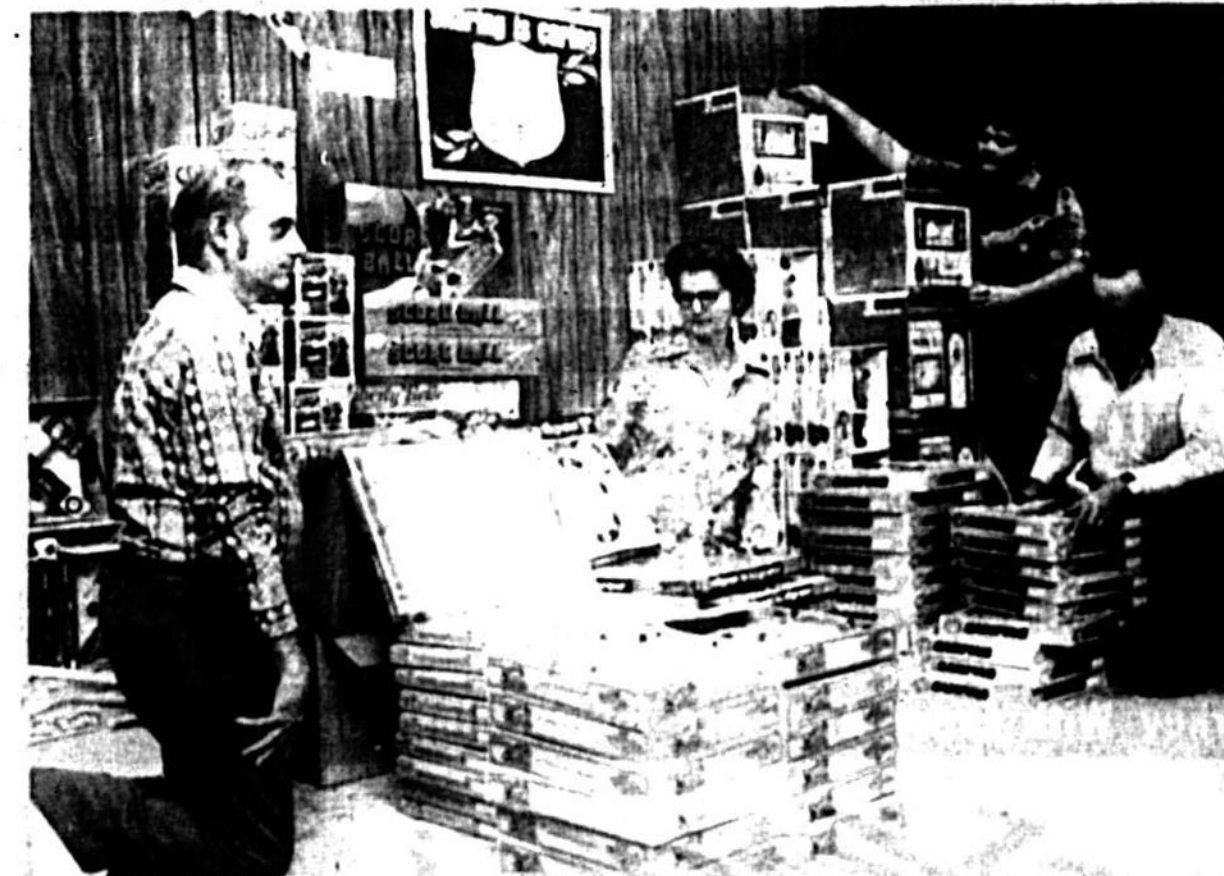
All previous evidence, including the findings of the Warren Commission which investigated the Kennedy assassination Nov. 22, 1963, has led to the conclusion that Oswald—acting alone—fired three rifle shots from the sixth floor window of the Texas School Depository Building, Kennedy was killed and Texas Gov. John Connally wounded.

The committee now is faced with evidence that indicates a fourth shot was fired, coming from a grassy knoll farther down Dealey Plaza.

More than 2,500 low-income families are on waiting lists for public housing in Seminole County, but it will be at least three years before housing is available for even a few of those families and maybe not then. But a beginning has been made. And "it's about time," according to Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore.

The Seminole County Commission this week gave its blessing to applications from the Seminole County Housing Authority for federal grants or loans totaling \$2.5 million to build 150 units somewhere in the county, preferably in the north end. Glenn McCall, chairman of the authority said. Currently, the Seminole Housing Authority owns and manages 28 units of public housing in the Oviedo area. And

## They Left The Turmoil In Iran...

In the wake of rioting against the Shah of Iran and anti-U.S. demonstrations many U. S. citizens working there and their relatives have been evacuated.

Among those who arrived in Casselberry this past week with first-hand descriptions of conditions there are Mrs. Terry (Shana) Young and Mrs. Linda Michner.

A concern of a different sort is that of Mrs. Eddie Miller, also of Casselberry, a native Iranian with relatives there. If it weren't for the possible difficulty of evacuating her two children, ages 9 and 11, Mrs. Miller of 12 Carriage Hill Circle, Casselberry, would have stayed in Teheran. Her husband's Texas-based company anticipated possible danger or violence during the Muslim religious holiday last weekend and chartered a plane for evacuation of employees to return to the United States.

They plan on returning after Christmas if the situation does not worsen, she said. Her husband, a missile control range instructor, stayed in Iran.

"We heard gunshots in the distance; it was hard to say how far away they were," she said. "There are military tanks that come by our house and they make us feel safer."

"What I can gather from talking to taxi drivers and other people there, is that they will not stop until the shah

is gone," said Mrs. Michner. "The lower class wants more socialism, but they do not favor communists. They want to keep their religious freedom."

"The people resent the control outside countries have on them now; they feel Carter has his thumb on the shah. It is mostly the lower class that is demonstrating," she said.

"I was told that before they used to grow all their own food and now they have to import commodities and things are more expensive."

"We really like it there. Teheran is a modern city. You can get anything you want there as long as you can afford it," said Mrs. Michner.

"There have been lots of strikes and the school had to be closed. The water, phone and electricity have been turned off at times. We just roll with the punches," she said.

The Michners are very fond of the Iranian people. "They are very nice, they have more patience than Americans. The only negative incident they had happen personally was a note slipped under their apartment door that said 'Yanqui go home,'" she said.

Mrs. Young, staying with husband's parents in Casselberry, came home last weekend on the same chartered flight.

She said that it was bad, the airport with everyone trying to get flights out, but they had no problem. Her husband was worried that she might have trouble leaving later on.

"She is expecting a baby in three months and he wanted her to have the medical care she might not get there, because of the unstable conditions."

Mrs. Young believes that the major issue is about the religion.

"The people are scared of the Western way and influence taking over," she explained. "The shah is too liberal for many of the more orthodox Muslims."

She believes the military kept the demonstrations on the whole peaceful and from getting out of hand. Most of the demonstrating and rioting took place in the southern part of Teheran where the lower class lives.

"We lived within 10 minutes' walking distance from the
